Sunday, October 8, will begin a series of worship experiences focused on "Abundant Living."

In John 10:10, Jesus said, "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly." Unlike a thief, the Lord Jesus does not come for selfish reasons. He comes to give, not to get. He comes that people may have life in Him that is meaningful, purposeful, joyful, and eternal. We receive this gift before we are even aware it exists. God's grace is moving and shaping us. From the moment we take our first breath, God's grace is leading us into abundant living. When we recognize that gift of grace, we then lean into it by responding with a Christlike life – which includes living in community, practicing compassion, and extending justice and love.

To culminate the series on October 29, Rev. Dr. Dustin Petz from the Kansas Methodist Foundation will be preaching in our morning worship services. At noon, he will lead a workshop on legacy giving.

Worship: His sermon will focus on "Giving to Change Lives." The focus text will bring us back to our more current readings in Matthew 25:14-30.

Workshop: The noon workshop is called "Giving Generously & Leaving a Legacy". In his presentation, Rev. Dr. Dustin Petz will focus on giving now and estate planning. Petz will share ways to maximize your giving during life and provide general information about estate planning and considerations for charitable giving through an estate to support the church and ministry.

Endowment Moment

This month's Endowment Moment will focus on the six general funds of the Church's Permanent Endowment. The operating document that governs the activities of the Permanent Endowment Committee outlines these six general funds:

- · Undesignated Ministry
- · Missions and Outreach
- · Children and Youth
- · Education
- Building
- · Non-Endowed Building

Since almost all the current Endowment Fund Balance is undesignated, the remainder of this article will discuss the Undesignated Ministry Fund and future Endowment Moments will focus on the other five funds.

Undesignated Ministry - This pooled fund includes the Altar Fund. This fund will receive gifts and bequests which are not designated for a particular purpose or restricted in any way. Income from this fund will be used to fund the ministries or missions selected by the Permanent Endowment Committee.

Gifts to any of the six funds can be made at any time during one's lifetime or as a bequest.

Naomi, a key gatekeeper in one of our communities walked over and sat across from me as our team served tea and played cards with our usual crowd. This wasn't my first interaction with Naomi-she is genuinely curious and challenged by our consistent presence. The behaviors, language, and appearance of the community aren't always kind, yet we always show up. Why?

We're here to learn. We're here to sit and listen. We're here to see

People nobody else sees, or wants to see. We're here to show love and respect, because we believe everyone deserves love and respect.

This sparked a conversation that lasted nearly half an hour before our team had to leave. While there is a Time and place to come in with resources, solutions, and alternatives, it's impossible to know what those s

Time and place to come in with resources, solutions, and alternatives, it's impossible to know what those should be without first building a solid foundation of trust. Over the years, this particular community has experienced dozens of individuals and organizations coming in with resources and programs first-only to disappear months later. It could be due to lack of funding, relocation, other time commitments, or any numbers of reasons. Much of the community has internalized these disappearances as a lack of love and care, as disappointment and shame-that they aren't worthy of help. As Deep Water, we sit and listen to the pain and internal struggle. It's not that they don't deserve resources and programs-we are so excited for a season when we can start trying different interventions, whether that's next year, in two years, or in five years. Until then, we sit and listen, just as Jesus did with the Samaritan woman at the well. Just as He did with Zacchaeus at his home. Just as He does with each one of us in our own journey.

We are so excited to announce that Deep Water is embarking on our very first Awareness Campaign in the U.S. this fall! We will be venturing through Denver, Fort Worth and parts of Kansas throughout the month of October to share what's happening in Manzini. Thank you all again for your support in this journey!

History & Heritage

When L.T. Griffin undertakes something, he sticks to it with bulldog tenacity until it's completed. Take that elevator in the First Methodist Church for instance. Griffin is custodian at the church and he'd seen handicapped members of the congregation try to negotiate steps within the four-story structure. At one time he had been bedridden with inflammatory rheumatism and knew of such problems.

He decided an elevator should be installed and his action put into motion an enterprise that has attracted antique and bargain hunters from all over Kansas and many other states. He set up a "country store" in three rooms of the basement of the church and most of his off-duty hours are spent in loading, hauling, sorting, pricing and selling items that parishioners and others have contributed. Every Thursday, Griffin holds a sale, and he has held four other big auctions. Every morning, he sets out a huge pot of coffee for the elevator.

The first thousand dollars came hard, Griffin said, but he recalled his Irish grandfather's words to him as a boy: "Whenever you get your teeth into something worthwhile, see it through if it takes hide and hair and all." Parishioners were skeptical. Some said he couldn't raise \$1,500 for an elevator, others were almost hostile, and some called it "a nutty idea". But the 62 year old custodian began collecting the money. Suddenly he had \$3,000. The Board of Trustees made an offer to Griffin: Raise \$7,500 and we'll match it and put the elevator in.

Griffin stepped up the temp of his "store". He accepted all donations, even when people said "that'll never sell," and sold them. A barber chair sat in the store for months, then sold to a delighted customer. Another couple gave Griffin their household furnishings when they left town. A \$400 windfall for the collection resulted. Griffin went to other auctions and purchased items to stock his store. His judgement was well founded. He bought an old-fashioned washstand, with water pitcher for \$3 and sold it for \$20.

All of his work has paid dividends. The elevator has been installed in the church and Griffin has raised more than his half of the cost. With the money he's raised-or is raising-past the original \$7,500, Griffin has his eyes set on buying a bus with special loading ramps to serve a dual purpose. It can be used to transport handicapped persons to and from church and can be used by the youth groups for trips. Many of the doubters in the First Methodist Church at Hays have revised their opinion of Griffin. They figure that if he says he's going to get a bus, he'll get it.
