'At Christmas time, when we receive presents we don't really need, God offers us a gift we cannot do without.' (J John).





# SPIRE PROGRESS REPORT

We submitted our Round 2 application to the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) in early September and it is due to be considered at the HLF committee meeting on 4th December. Given a positive outcome from the meeting, the Representative Church Body in Dublin will then be in a position to appoint a contractor to carry out the work on the spire.

It may be useful to recap on the terms of the HLF award. We were awarded £250K, the maximum amount under the 'Listed Places of Worship' scheme.

*The award was in two stages:*

**Round 1** – involved survey work and the development of a specification and tender process. This was successfully completed, at a cost of approximately £48K to date. Not all of this cost is eligible for grant aid and we have received £29,520 of a total £32,800 awarded by the HLF. Hopefully we will receive the balance of £3,280 when Round 1 the Development Stage is signed off.

**Round 2** – is a review of Round 1, with the addition of accurate costings following the tender process, which is our submission for continued grant support for the actual work of dismantling and rebuilding the Spire. This is known as the project Delivery Stage. Round 2 is the stage when HLF will make a decision on the credibility of our submission and whether to fully, partly or not award the balance of £217.2K. The grant we receive from HLF will be released in 3 stages, at the start, the midpoint and the end of the refurbishment project. If we are successful, then we should be in a position to proceed with the project in early 2019.

You will have observed recently some work around the pedestrian gate and pathway leading from the Derriaghy Road. We were replacing the overhead power supply to the church with an underground power cable. This was essential, as it would not be permissible to erect scaffolding around the spire due to the proximity of overhead power cables. Although NIE covered their own costs, the parish was responsible for the cost of the new underground cable, excavation and reinstatement of the path. This amounted to approximately £5K and our thanks go to Mervyn Moulds, Glebe Warden, for organizing this work.

# MONEY MATTERS

## 1. Spire Refurbishment Appeal and Spire Account

As noted in the Spire Refurbishment Project Progress Report all documentation relating to the Delivery Stage (the actual dismantling and rebuilding of our Spire) has been submitted to the HLF for approval of grant aid of up to £217,200 (maximum) which will go a considerable way towards meeting the refurbishment cost. We should know early December 2018 the outcome of our submission and the amount of financial support the HLF will set aside for our project.

The following table set out the monies raised by the Spire Appeal (income) and monies paid out (expenditure) up to 31st.October 2018.

The Spire Appeal figures (£169,531) above include the monthly envelope appeal, donations and Spire fundraising events. Also included are grants which have been received to date, namely HLF £29,520, Esmee Mitchell Trust £4,000 and All Churches Together £6,700. Other grants in addition to the HLF which are pending payment and are only available when work

commences on the Spire refurbishment are, Garfield Weston Trust £30,000, National Churches Trust £20,000 and Lady Dunleath Trust £1,000. YOU have made a considerable contribution to meeting the cost of our Spire Refurbishment and to date £129K has been raised by the envelope appeal, related gift aid and fundraising. On behalf of the SV, I thank you all for your efforts and support. Perhaps now I CAN rest a little easier knowing that we can move forward in the refurbishment of our beautiful church not only for us, but the generations who will follow. I know we have still some way to go and we will get there, hopefully by autumn 2019, when the refurbishment is planned to be complete.

### **2. Closing date for FWO and Spire Refurbishment Appeal Envelopes: Sunday 6th. January 2019**

The closing date for 2018 envelope offerings to appear in the 2018 Financial Account is earlier than normal so we can implement new accounting arrangements for 2019 to meet the criteria set out by the NI Charity Commission. Any 2018 envelope offerings received after Sunday 6th. January 2019 will be added to 2019 figures.

### **3. 2019 Envelopes**

The FWO & Spire Refurbishment / Building Fund Appeal envelopes for 2019 will now be combined in the one box which you should receive in December 2018 or early January 2019. This will avoid the distribution of two sets of envelopes to each parishioner / household and hopefully reduce one set being miss delivered or mislead. The FWO envelope will remain weekly and the Spire Refurbishment / Building Fund Appeal envelope remain monthly and will be inserted in the second week of each month between the weekly FWO envelopes. Hopefully this will not initially cause too much confusion.

### **4. Country & Western Concert**

The C&W Concert was a great success and very well supports. A BIG C&W thank you for Christ Church Choir and others who helped out on the evening raising £2,285 for the Spire Appeal.

## **MOTHERS' UNION NOTES**
