

How Does God Distribute Spiritual Gifts?



We are also told in <u>1 Corinthians 12:28-31</u> and in <u>1 Corinthians 14:12-13</u> that it is God (not us) who chooses the gifts. These passages also indicate that not everyone will have a particular gift. Paul tells the Corinthian believers that if they are going to covet or long after spiritual gifts, they should strive after the more edifying gifts, such as prophesying (speaking forth the word of God for the building up of others). Now, why would Paul tell them to strongly desire the "greater" gifts if they already had been given all they would be given, and there was no further opportunity of gaining these greater gifts? It may lead one to believe that even as Solomon sought wisdom from God in order to be a good ruler over God's people, so God will grant to us those gifts we need in order to be of greater benefit to His church.

Having said this, it still remains that these gifts are distributed according to God's choosing, not our own. If every Corinthian strongly desired a particular gift, such as prophesying, God would not give everyone that gift simply because they strongly desired it. If He did, then who would serve in all of the other functions of the body of Christ?

There is one thing that is abundantly clear—God's command is God's enablement. If God commands us to do something (such as witness, love the unlovely, disciple the nations, etc.), He will enable us to do it. Some may not be as gifted at evangelism as others, but God commands all Christians to witness and disciple (Matthew 28:18-20; Acts 1:8). We are all called to evangelize whether or not we have the spiritual gift of evangelism. A determined Christian who strives to learn the Word and develop his teaching ability may become a better teacher than one who may have the spiritual gift of teaching, but who neglects the gift.

Are spiritual gifts given to us when we receive Christ, or are they cultivated through our walk with God? The answer is both. Normally, spiritual gifts are given at salvation, but also need to be cultivated through spiritual growth. Can a desire in your heart be pursued and developed into your spiritual gift? Can you seek after certain spiritual gifts? First Corinthians 12:31 seems to indicate that this is possible: "earnestly desire the best gifts." You can seek a spiritual gift from God and be zealous after it by seeking to develop that area. At the same time, if it is not God's will, you will not receive a certain spiritual gift no matter how strongly you seek after it. God is infinitely wise, and He knows through which gifts you will be most productive for His kingdom.

No matter how much we have been gifted with one gift or another, we are all called upon to develop a number of areas mentioned in the lists of spiritual gifts: to be hospitable, to show acts of mercy, to serve one another, to evangelize, etc. As we seek to serve God out of love for the purpose of building up others for His glory, He will bring glory to His name, grow His church, and reward us (1 Corinthians 3:5-8, 12:31–14:1). God promises that as we make Him our delight, He will give us the desires of our heart (Psalm 37:4-5). This would surely include preparing us to serve Him in a way that will bring us purpose and satisfaction.



SAVED FROM OURSELVES

"I do not do what I want," writes the apostle Paul in frustration, "but I do the very thing I hate" (Romans 7:15, ESV). Which of us hasn't felt disappointed in our own actions at some point? For spouting off instead of holding our tongue, turning in a mediocre assignment when we could have done better, turning away from a friend in need because of peer pressure or uncertainty?

Inner conflict is part of human nature. Consider part of William Cowper's poem-prayer "The Contrite Heart":

I sometimes think myself inclined to love Thee if I could; but often feel another mind, averse to all that's good.

My best desires are faint and few, I fain would strive for more; but when I cry, "My strength renew!" seem weaker than before.

So what can we do? "Who will deliver me from this body of death?" cries Paul in verse 24. But then his despair turns into a profound "aha!" moment: None of us can rescue ourselves. We are saved, again and again, by divine love and forgiveness. "Thanks be to God," we declare with Paul in verse 24, "through Jesus Christ our Lord!"

HEALTH NOTES: COVID UPDATE FOR AUGUST 2021

Why Get Vaccinated?

COVID-19 (the Delta variant) is spreading fast. As of June 14, 2021, the delta variant has reached 74 countries -- just 6 months after discovery. Delta is anywhere from 30% to 100% more infectious than the first, alpha virus. In just a few weeks the positivity rate in Kentucky has increased from 3% to 8%.

It is affecting younger people more often. Currently most hospitalized patients have not been vaccinated and a growing number are youth and young adults.

Symptoms appear to be more severe. People may be more likely to end up in the hospital if they have the delta variant. Studies suggest it might have almost double the risk of hospitalization and severe illness than the alpha variant.

Top symptoms reported include: headache, sore throat, runny nose, fever.

Researchers are concerned people may mistake symptoms for a bad <u>cold</u> and avoid <u>quarantine</u>, helping the variant spread.

How to Protect Yourself

Getting vaccinated is your best bet. All three vaccines (Moderna, Pfizer and Janssen) help to protect you from coronavirus (COVID-19) infections. Kentuckians aged 12 and up can sign up for vaccine appointments

What to Expect after Getting a COVID-19

Vaccine

COVID-19 vaccination will help protect you from getting COVID-19. You may have some side effects, which are normal signs that your body is building protection. These side effects **may feel like flu** and **may even affect your ability** to do daily activities, but they should go away in a few days.

Common side effects

On the arm where you got the shot: Pain and/or swelling

Throughout the rest of your body: Fever, chills, tiredness, Headache

Helpful tips

If you have pain or discomfort, talk to your doctor about taking an over-the-counter medicine, such as ibuprofen or acetaminophen.

To reduce pain and discomfort where you got the shot: Apply a clean, cool, wet washcloth over the area. Use or exercise your arm.

To reduce discomfort from fever: drink plenty of fluids. Dress lightly.

In most cases, discomfort from fever or pain is normal. Contact your doctor or healthcare provider:

If the redness or tenderness where you got the shot increases after 24 hours

If your side effects are worrying you or do not seem to be going away after a few days

If your side effects are very severe, such as chest pain or shortness of breath, call 911 or proceed to the nearest Emergency Room.

Remember

With most COVID-19 vaccines, you will need 2 shots in order for them to work. Get the second shot even if you have side effects after the first one, unless a vaccination provider or your doctor tells you not to get a second shot. • It takes time for your body to build protection after any vaccination. COVID-19 vaccines that require 2 shots may not protect you until a week or two after your second shot.

It's important for everyone to continue using all the tools available to help stop this pandemic as we learn more about how COVID-19 vaccines work in real-world conditions. Cover your mouth and nose with a mask when around others, stay at least 6 feet away from others, avoid crowds, and wash your hands often. cdc.gov/coronavirus

Question: "The Fruit of the Holy Spirit - What is goodness?"

Answer: In Galatians 5:22-23, Paul lists the "fruit of the Spirit." "Fruit," here, means "beneficial results," the good things that come from the Spirit's indwelling. As the Holy Spirit works in our lives, our character changes. Where we had harbored selfishness, cruelty, rebelliousness, and spite, we now possess love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Everything in the list reflects the character of God, and goodness is one that relates directly to morality.

Goodness is virtue and holiness in action. It results in a life characterized by deeds motivated by righteousness and a desire to be a blessing. It's a moral characteristic of a Spirit-filled person. The Greek word translated "goodness," *agathosune*, is defined as "uprightness of heart and life." *Agathosune* is goodness for the benefit of others, not goodness simply for the sake of being virtuous.

Someone with *agathosune* will selflessly act on behalf of others. Confronting someone about a sin demonstrates goodness. So do giving to the poor, providing for one's children, visiting the sick, volunteering to clean up after a storm, and praying for an enemy. Expressions of goodness are as varied as the Spirit is creative.

Goodness is not a quality we can manufacture on our own. James 1:17 says, "Every good thing given and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights." This certainly includes a life characterized by goodness. In letting the Holy Spirit control us, we are blessed with the fruit of goodness. As others see our good works, they will praise our Father in heaven (Matthew 5:16).

EDUCATING OUR KIDS

This is the first in a series of answers to questions posed by one of your GNL staffers interested in the education and development of our youth. This month's Q&A were asked of Sister Jacque Austin, a mother, grandmother, and aunt who is also a distinguished educator, who was raised here in the Greater Salem church family.



How do you stress the importance of education at a young age?

The importance of education can be stressed at an early age by instilling in children the concept: the more we know, the more we grow! It is just as important for us to grow intellectually as it is for us to grow physically. The best way for us to grow intellectually is to "feed" our brain. We need to learn as much as we can about as many things as we can. Parents should identify the things their child is interested in and provide multiple opportunities and activities for them to learn about their interests. Establishing early learning habits and making learning fun will communicate how important learning is. Trips to the library to check out books on their topic of interest are important. Trips to the zoo, to museums and art galleries are experiences that will help them explore this world we live in and develop new interests. Spend time reading every night. Be an example, let children see you reading and doing educational things. Allow children to explore and discover the joy of learning, as they learn various skills (skills that include math skills, reading skills and vocabulary skills). Play educational games together, work puzzles together. Tell your child how smart he or she is and how you want them to be as smart as they can be!

When your student is not motivated, how do you encourage them?

We can encourage students by giving them positive learning experiences that help them feel successful. - When they experience success and feel successful, they will be more motivated to try! The key is to find

out what is blocking their understanding. This can involve a series of steps or strategies. Once we can "unlock the block" the light bulb will come on and students will become enthusiastic about learning. If students are not excited about learning, it's our responsibility to find a way to engage them in the learning process. Establish realistic and high expectations for students. Help them to evaluate their work and identify what mistakes they made and what they need to do to correct them. Once students begin to experience a sense of accomplishment and success, they will be motivated to do their work.

Do you promise, bribe, threaten or shame students that are not trying or working up to their potential? What works, what doesn't work?

It's never effective to promise, bribe, threaten or shame students in any situation. In order to get students to work to their potential, we have to show them they can be successful. This can be done effectively by setting goals that are realistic and obtainable. These goals must be measurable and monitored. It is important to show the students how close they are to reaching their goals. Small steps of success will keep them encouraged and not wanting to give up. Progress Monitoring is the key to helping students reach their goals. Use pre-tests to establish base line data. Use on going assessments to determine if they are learning the concepts that are being taught. Once concepts have been taught in small segments, administer a post test to determine if the concepts and goals have been attained.

When the student states "the teacher doesn't like me" or "the teacher is not being fair" or "the teacher is not respectful", how do you address that with the student? How far up the chain (of command) do you go? Who do you believe? How do you fact check (what really happened)?

Always listen to your child! Engage in lots of conversation, ask questions to find out why the student feels that way. Ask the student to share specific examples. If the teacher is not being respectful, this should be addressed in a parent-teacher conference with the student present. If no resolution is reached, don't hesitate to take your concerns to the next level, the principal. Make sure you get a clear understanding regarding your expectations about how your child is to be treated.

How do you speak with teachers, assistant principals, and administrators in a Christian and calm manner and still get your point across and feeling like you are being heard?

This can be accomplished effectively by being very specific about your concerns and staying focused on those concerns in a conference. It's very easy to get off topic and start discussing other items, which will in most situations cause confusion. Be a true advocate for your child, but remain open-minded and willing to hear all sides of the story. Remain calm and don't allow any comments made to upset you. Have the teacher, principal or administrator document the conference in writing by stating the purpose of the conference (state the specific concern). Identify solutions: specifically what will the teacher do, what will the parent and the student do as you move forward. Identify a date to check back in and follow-up to ensure things are still going well or that another conference needs to be scheduled. Don't accept subjective data or statements about your child. Establish the expectation for transparency and objectivity. Request frequent (weekly if necessary) progress reports.

How do you make teenagers complete homework, complete projects, and work on their virtual classes without standing over them? How do you get them to be responsible and independent?

Most importantly, we must start teaching responsibility and independence long before they become teenagers! Unfortunately, if we have not laid a solid foundation and established an environment that is structured with behavioral and academic expectations before they become teenagers, it will be very, very challenging to get them to "get on board at this point." Entering into a student contract that identifies expectations, consequences and rewards can be effective in addressing these issues, however, these contracts must be created on an individual basis. The goal is for students to work independently, without someone making them do their work. We want them to be self starters and independent workers. These are skills we must teach early in life.

Are sports or other extra curricular activities a help or a hindrance to academic studies?

Sports and extra curricular activities are helpful to student development and growth. Our goal is to educate the whole child, in order for that to happen, we must address not only the academic needs, but the physical, emotional and behavioral needs as well. Striking the balance is the key!

What do you do if you student is performing better in athletics than in academics? How do you help?

Again making academics a priority is important. We want students to participate in sports, this is also important. Teaching students to make sure they are maintaining a balance will ensure they perform well in academics and sports. Most sports teams and coaches embrace the rule that students must perform well and successfully in the classroom or they will not be able to participate in the sport. Providing tutoring can be a successful strategy to help students maintain the proper balance. We must communicate to students, "Performance in the classroom will determine if you get to perform on the field or on the court!!"

How do you teach your student to avoid distractions (inappropriate relationships, rebellious spirit, overruling parental wishes?) This is a life lesson that students and parents will have to deal with as children and teens get older. There is no magic formula. If you have established a good relationship with your child, including good communication between you, it will make things somewhat easier, however these things will still be challenging. Establishing clear rules for behavior and clear and specific consequences for not following those rules will allow you to provide the structure that will be needed to keep students focused on the right things, without being distracted. Remember, there will be challenges and many of these situations will have to be dealt with according to the individual situation....there is no one answer that will be appropriate for all situations. So much depends on the rapport and relationship you have with your child.

How do you celebrate academic achievements vs birthdays, State Tournament wins, etc.?

Academic achievements should be celebrated on an ongoing basis. One effective strategy is to have students identify something they would like to earn...they get to choose. At the beginning of the grading period, determine what they will earn if they achieve a certain grade point average. Another way to celebrate students accomplishments is to set a monetary amount they can earn for each grade. For example, you could agree that every A they achieve, they could earn \$5, every B could earn \$4 and every C \$3. The list of rewards is endless for student achievement, the most important thing to remember is the reward must be something the student WANTS to work for or earn.


When do you allow your student to get a part-time job? What are the requirements of grades vs. hours worked?

Working a part time job can be very beneficial for students. This decision should be made on an individual basis. Some students are able to handle working part-time without their grades suffering, some students are not. School performance and grades should take priority. It's fair to give students the opportunity to work and earn their own money, however, if working proves to be too much to handle, the student needs to understand that working, not even part time will be an option. Enter into an agreement/understanding that acceptable grades must be maintained, if not, they will no longer have the opportunity to work.

If your student has "fallen off the track" and made some mistakes, how do you get them headed back in the right direction? We get students back on track by showing them the same type of GRACE and MERCY God shows us. It's not productive to dwell on mistakes. We get them back on track by forgiving and focusing on moving forward. It's important to start over everyday without bringing the problems from yesterday into today! Catch students being good and doing the right thing!! Positive reinforcement and attention will go a long way!! Give lots of specific and positive praise for things the students do correctly.

Is it do as I say and not as I do or leading by example?

It's definitely always leading by example. We must remember our ACTIONS speak much louder than any WORDS. We need to always SHOW, not TELL students what is good, right and acceptable! They will always remember and do what they see us do.

We have exciting news about a new way you can contribute. We have partnered with Vanco Services which is an electronic giving resource which will assist members and friends who prefer another option to contribute to GSBC.

GSBC now offers electronic giving using the Vanco Online and Vanco Mobile app to make Tithes, Missions, Building Fund, Sunday School, Scholarship and Capital Campaign contributions. The following is a description of the electronic giving options.

Vanco Online giving is on the GSBC website greatersalembaptist.org under the HOME/GIVE heading. Click on the link and it is a simple step-by-step process, and you can sign up to track your giving.

Vanco Mobile is a free app you can download from the Apple App Store or Google Play and the app allows you to contribute via your mobile phone.

- After you download the app, open the app and search for the church by entering *Greater Salem Baptist Church*.
- After you locate the church name, enter the following Invite Code YMU4J5
- You will need to complete your profile to register to make contributions by entering your name, address, phone number and email address.
- Completing the registration steps allows you to receive a receipt for your contribution, review contribution history, etc.
- Online/mobile contributions will be credited to your annual contribution statement during the month they are received

A Glimpse of Grace - "Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat!" (Isaiah 55:1, NIV). I thought of this verse when I read about a seven-acre farm in Atlanta where people can pick fruits and veggies straight off the trees and vines, like a fresh-air produce market but bigger — and all free!

The Food Forest at Browns Mill, located amid a "food desert" in a city where one-fourth of the population experiences food insecurity, offers 2,500 edible and medicinal plants for anyone in need. People take only what they can use, and volunteers harvest extras to distribute in the community. It's one of about 70 free-food forests in the United States. To me, it looks like a glimmer of God's kingdom.

Imagine a world where everyone's basic needs are met: food, clean water, shelter, clothing, health care, education, meaningful work, love — and the fulfillment of assisting and supporting one another. Isaiah envisions this reality coming true. Sometimes, even in our troubled world, we catch a glimpse of God's abundant grace, tangibly lavished on all. Even better, sometimes we're blessed with the privilege of helping it happen.



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
