

What does the Bible say about Rioting!!!

Answer: A riot is a violent, noisy disturbance of the peace by a crowd. Riots usually result in property damage and injuries to people. We are seeing an increasing number of riots across the world, fueled by everything from race to religion. Sometimes a peaceful gathering can turn into a riot when something triggers strong emotion among the majority of attendees. Often those who are rioting believe themselves in the right as they passionately express their opinions en masse. But are they right? Does the Bible say anything about rioting?

The Bible mentions a few riots, none of them favorably. Paul was the victim of rioters on several occasions (2 Corinthians 6:5; Acts 17:5; 19:23–41). In each case, jealousy and deception were at the heart of the riot. It was the hate-filled agenda of the instigators that fired up the townspeople, many of whom were not even sure of the issues at stake. The fact that most of the Ephesian rioters "did not even know why they were there" says volumes about the mob mentality (Acts 19:32).

The most infamous riot in the Bible occurred during Jesus' trial before Pilate. The governor had found no fault in Him (Luke 23:4; John 19:4). However, the chief scribes and religious leaders were determined to kill Jesus, so they stirred up the crowd (Matthew 27:20; Mark 15:11). Here we have a clue as to the nature of most riots. Many of those in the crowd had seen Jesus' miracles, heard Him teaching in their synagogues, and may have even been healed by Him. Yet, under the influence of impassioned leaders, they quickly turned against Him. The same people who had shouted "Hosanna! Hosanna!" only days before (Mark 11:9–10) now shouted, "Crucify Him!" (Mark 15:13–14)

Most riots begin with an instigator, someone with an agenda. Riots may appear to be spontaneous outbursts of unified outrage, but closer investigation usually reveals people behind the scenes stirring up the passions of the crowd. Those who expect to benefit from the riot may use inflammatory speech, exaggerated details, and the cooperation of a few colleagues to make the riot seem spontaneous. In other words, those who incite riots today use the same tactics that the scribes and Pharisees used in Jesus' day.

People caught up in the fervor of the moment don't realize they are being used. They have been manipulated into believing they are making a righteous point by pillaging and indiscriminately destroying the property of others. Social pressure is a powerful motivator, and when everyone around us is inflamed with fury, shouting opinions and slogans and demanding "change," it is easy to be swept along with the crowd. It would be interesting to know how many of



those who demanded Jesus' crucifixion later regretted it when passions cooled. We have one glimpse into a possible change of heart in Luke 23:47. A centurion who had helped with Jesus' crucifixion suddenly realized what he had done and said, "Surely this was a righteous man!"

Rioting is a form of lawlessness, which the Bible condemns (1 John 3:4). Even if the rioters are seeking to advance a just cause, they are going about it in a sinful way. As the city clerk of Ephesus reminded the rioters in his city, "The courts are open and there are proconsuls. . . . If there is anything further you want to bring up, it must be settled in a legal assembly" (Acts 19:38–39). To be lawless is to consider oneself an exception to the law or to act as though there were no law. The lawless think rules don't apply to them, and they become a law unto themselves. That's what happens in a riot. Even normally law-abiding people can become inflamed with fury and selfrighteousness and decide that their cause is worth breaking legal, moral, and ethical laws. They may destroy property, hinder transportation, harm innocent bystanders, and tie up law enforcement personnel who could be spending their time on more worthy pursuits. Rioters place themselves and their leaders above the law, and that is sin (Romans 13:1–2). Anger, especially when motivated by vengeance or spread by selfseeking rabble-rousers, is never a trustworthy guide (James 1:20). Those who allow themselves to be controlled by it may become foolish participants in ungodly riots.

Sunday School Lessons At-a-Glance

Wisdom

Quarter At A Glance

We admire wisdom, but struggle to define the term. In 2016, a team of psychologists attempted to understand how people perceived the concept of wisdom. The team presented historical figures who were generally esteemed as being wise, then asked what specific qualities made them wise. Three templates emerged: practical wisdom, philosophical wisdom, and benevolent wisdom.

Scripture confirms that wisdom manifests itself in many ways. Bezalel was filled with wisdom for his work constructing the tabernacle (Exodus 31:2, 3). Joshua was filled with wisdom to lead Israel into the promised land (Deuteronomy 34:9). A wise woman persuaded her city to slay David's enemy and save themselves (2 Samuel 20:16–22). Even in biblical times, it was apparent that wisdom has diverse blossoms.

The Roots of Wisdom

True wisdom is rooted in a single source: God himself. We open unit 1 with a survey of wisdom in the book of Proverbs. King Solomon, the primary contributor to the anthology, taught young men that "the fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge" (Proverbs 1:7). The word fear is best interpreted as a worshipful awe and respect of God, not an unhealthy terror of the divine.

Solomon's belief that wisdom was accessible to anyone is evident through his anthropomorphizing (giving human characteristics to) wisdom as being a woman. She stands at the gates of the city and invites anyone who would come to partake in her lavish feast. But Solomon also recognized that wisdom wasn't the only voice calling out to his rising leaders.

- These new sites will utilize self-swab test.
- Tests will be available to individuals meeting Centers for Disease Control and Prevention criteria, in addition to state and age guidelines. Patients must register in advance at <u>CVS.com</u> beginning Friday, May 29 to schedule an appointment.
- Patients will be required to stay in their cars and will be directed to the pharmacy drive-thru window.
- Tests will be sent to an independent, third-party lab for processing and the results will be available in approximately three days.
- Testing will not take place inside any retail locations, and CVS Pharmacy, HealthHUB and MinuteClinic will continue to serve customers and patients.

As Governor Beshear allows more businesses to open, we must be aware of the increased risk of contracting Covid-19.

Multiple times a day, wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom, before eating, and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing. Avoid close contact with people who are sick.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol if you have symptoms of acute respiratory illness.

Stay home from work or school until you are free of fever, signs of a fever, and any other symptoms for at least 24 hours and without the use of fever-reducing or other symptom-altering medications.

GET READY AND VOTE IN THE 2020 KENTUCKY PRIMARY

Please check to make sure you are still correctly registered at this <u>site</u>. <u>https://vrsws.sos.ky.gov/ovrweb/govoteky</u> Because of the coronavirus pandemic, everyone is being encouraged to vote by mail-in absentee ballot. For the first time, you will not need an excuse to vote absentee.

Voter may now request mail-in ballots in a portal on the <u>State Board of Elections website</u>. You also can request a ballot through the Jefferson County Clerk's Office.

If you are a registered voter in Jefferson County, go o <u>jeffersoncountyclerk.org/AbsAppReques</u> to apply for a mail-in absentee ballot application or call 502.574.6100. If you choose that route, you will receive an absentee application in the mail, which you will need to return to the Clerk's Office to receive a ballot.

After voting, ballots will be sent to the County Clerk. Mail-in ballots will have to be requested by June 16, postmarked by June 23 and be received within three days of Election Day. In-person voting, with the possibility of drive-through voting, will be allowed, in new ways, for those who need to vote in person.

Post cards will be sent out to Kentucky voters explaining the whole process.



Question: "If Jesus paid the price for our sin. why do we still suffer the consequences of our sin?"

Answer: The Bible gives the good news that Jesus paid the price for our sin (Ephesians 1:7), yet in many ways we still suffer the consequences of our sins. For example, a drug dealer may become a Christian in prison, but that doesn't mean he will be released from prison the next day-he will still experience the consequences of his past sin. A born-again Christian who falls into adultery may lose his family, his career, etc.-even after he confesses and forsakes his sin, the consequences of his sin remain. Coming to Christ does not erase

the temporal effects of sin; rather, our salvation guarantees that we will not face the eternal consequences of sin.

The consequence of sin is death (Romans 6:23a). As sinners, we deserve to be eternally separated from God and His holiness. On the cross Christ paid the penalty of our sin with His own blood. He who knew no sin was made to be sin on our behalf (2 Corinthians 5:21). On the basis of Christ's perfect sacrifice, those who believe are no longer under God's condemnation (Romans 8:1).

It's important to understand that, when the believer in Christ experiences consequences for sin, it is not because he is under God's condemnation (Romans 8:1), His wrath (1 Thessalonians 5:9), or His retribution (2 Thessalonians 1:8). Believers are under God's grace (Romans 6:15). Jesus took the wrath of God upon Himself (Isaiah 53:10). Sin's consequences still experienced by believers could be classified in one of these ways:

Universal consequences. Some of sin's consequences are experienced perpetually by every human being on earth, because we are all children of Adam. We all have weeds growing in our gardens, we all face natural disasters, we all get sick and grow old, and we all eventually die physically (Romans 5:12). As sinners living in a sinful world, there's no avoiding

these consequences of original sin.

Natural consequences. We live in a world of cause and effect, where the law of sowing and reaping is in full effect. Some of sin's consequences are built-in and practically guaranteed, no matter if the sinner is saved or unsaved. The Bible warns that sexual immorality is a sin committed against one's own body (1 Corinthians 6:18). "Can a man scoop fire into his lap without his clothes being burned?" (Proverbs 6:27). If you steal something, you should expect to get caught and face the natural consequences that follow the sin of theft. If you resist arrest when you get caught, you pile on more consequences. Sowing and reaping.

Instructional consequences. Very likely, God allows some of sin's consequences to remain in our lives to teach us the heinous nature of sin and to remind us to depend upon God's grace. Sin is a serious enough problem for God to have sent from our successes. His Son into the world to die. We dare not take sin lightly. In the face of sin's consequences, we humble ourselves and seek God's kingdom and righteousness all the more (see Matthew 6:33). When Ananias and Sapphira were disciplined for their sin, it was instructive for the church: "Great fear seized the whole church and all who heard about these events" (Acts 5:11). See also 1 Corinthians 5:5 and 1 Timothy 1:20.

Disciplinary consequences. Some of sin's consequences are the result of God's treating us as a father should his children. There's a difference between a penalty for sin and discipline for sin. As God's children, we experience discipline designed to guide us back to the right path. "My son, do not make light of the Lord's discipline, and do not lose heart when he rebukes you, because the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and he chastens everyone he accepts as his son" (Hebrews 12:5-6; cf. Proverbs 3:11 <u>-12</u>). Note how many of God's children undergo discipline: "everyone" (Hebrews <u>12:8</u>). We are all wayward at times. God's purpose in allowing us to experience disciplinary consequences of sin, true to His nature, is perfect: "God disciplines us for our good, in order that we may share in his holiness" (Hebrews 12:10).

The church of Corinth provides an example of Christians facing the disciplinary consequences of their sin: in partaking of the Lord's Table in an unworthy manner. they brought God's displeasure: "That is why many among you are weak and sick, and a number of you have fallen asleep" (1 Corinthians 11:30). We see similar disciplinary action taken in 2 Samuel 12. Even after David confessed his sin and was forgiven, God allowed certain consequences to befall David and his household (verses 11-14).

God allows us to experience some of the temporal consequences of sin to show His love for us. If God never disciplined His straying children, He would not be a good Father. If we were never disciplined or never suffered the consequences for our wrong action, we would never learn right from wrong. We tend to learn from our mistakes more readily than we learn

Praise the Lord for His goodness. He allows us to experience

the temporal consequences of sin (for our own good). But He has saved us from the eternal consequences of sin. Jesus paid the penalty for our sins so we will never experience the second death, which is the lake of fire (Revelation 20:14). Believers in Christ are promised that the curse and consequences of sin will be completely removed one day, and "nothing will hurt or destroy in all my holy mountain" (Isaiah 11:9, NLT).




What you need:

WE began "The Assurance of Salvation" series of articles by covering "The Basis of Assurance' in the May issue of the GoodNewsLetter. This Month we will cover.......

The Tests of Assurance

We do not say that every person who professes to be a Christian is saved. There are some tests by which one can tell.

(A) The test of obedience. 1 John 2: 3 says "and hereby we do know that we know him, if we keep his commandments ". We can know that we have eternal life because we are keeping his commandments. The Greek word translated "keep" was used to describe the "watch" of a soldier who was keeping guard at his post; just as one who is saved is to keep his eyes fixed on the commandments of God. It is not natural for man to want to obey God and please him in all things. God's command often runs contrary to the things we would naturally like to do if we had our own way. But as Christ takes up residence in our hearts, He gives us new desires to please Him and new power to carry out his commandments to the glory of God. John says then that the very fact that we want to keep God's commandments is one sure sign that we abide in Him and He abides in us.


(B) The test of loyalty. 1 John 2: 15 says, "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him". The passions and pursuits of the worldly mind are altogether contrary to the delight and the activities of the spiritual mind. The things which the believer once loved he now hates. The things which he once hated he now loves. One who is born again does not mind going against the world's ways and notions and customs. He finds no pleasure in the things most people around him like to do. He cannot enjoy their entertainments. Those things weary him. They appear vain and unprofitable. To please the world is out of the question for the Christian. His first aim is to please God.

(C) The test of conduct. 1 John 3:9 says, "Whosoever is born of God does not commit sin; for God's seed (Christ) remaineth in him and he cannot sin, because he is born of God." The real child of God will do what is right and will keep himself from evil. A person who is born again does not commit sin as a habit. The Christian does not keep on sinning. He may fall into sin, but sinning is not his habitual way of life. No one can say he has not sinned. The scriptures even provide for our restoration in the event we do sin (1 John 2: 1). When God saves a person, He does not fix him so that he can't sin anymore, but He fixes him so that he can't sin and "get a kick out of it." The child of God hates sin and flees from it and longs to be delivered from its grip altogether. Any deviation from God's standard of conduct will result in a spiritual pain that makes the genuine Christian uncomfortable.

(D) The test of love. 1 John 3: 14 says, "We know that we have passed from death unto life, because we love the brethren." The Christian loves even the worst of sinners, and often weeps over them. But he has a special love for those who are believers in Christ. This love holds the Saints of God in high esteem and delights in kindly relationships with them. Any person who habitually dislikes and misunderstands his fellow Christian is evidently not walking in the light and cannot have the assurance of Salvation. But the Christian who has a genuine love for his brethren has evidence within that he has passed from death unto life. If you are conscious of a strange pull that unites you to others who believe in the Lord Jesus Christ, this is a clear indication that you have passed out of death into life.

The tests of obedience and loyalty and conduct and love for the brethren are guidelines by which we can evaluate our relationship with Christ.


