A pastor ensures that members of the congregation are trained and developed for service; is an example for members to follow; help members grow in the grace and knowledge of the Lord; and identify and use their spiritual gifts. This is called discipling.

A pastor leads the congregation to carry out its Godgiven assignment. This is called evangelism and missions.


A pastor is responsible for managing his own life well and for maintaining His walk with Christ. This is called faithfulness.

OUR FEEBLE PRAYERS OUR FATHER'S RESPONSE

In *He Still Moves Stones*, Max Lucado recalls the story of Derek Redmond, a 1992 Olympic competitor in the 400-meter race. Halfway through Redmond's semifinal run, a torn hamstring sent him tumbling to the ground. His dad, Jim, immediately ran onto the track. He met up with Derek, who, though crying, had managed to stand and was hopping forward.

"You don't have to do this," Jim said. But Derek insisted. "Well, then, we're going to finish this together," said Jim, who supported his son as he hobbled to the finish line. The crowd cheered and wept as Derek, with Dad's assistance, finished the race.

Lucado writes: "What made the father do it? ... Was it the strength of his child? No, it was the pain of his child. ... God does the same. Our prayers may be awkward. Our attempts may be feeble. But since the power of prayer is in the One who hears it and not in the one who says it, our prayers do make a difference."

March 31,2024 Lesson: Return to a Just God - Malachi 3:1-10


Malachi informs the faithful that God requires justice and faithfulness and will bestow abundant blessings in proportion to what they are willing to give.

March Health Notes from the Nurses Ministry Be Aware to Prevent Colon Cancer

Colorectal cancer starts in the colon or the rectum. These cancers can also be called colon cancer or rectal cancer, depending on where they start. Colon cancer and rectal cancer are often grouped together because they have many features in common.



Risk Factors

A risk factor is anything that raises your chances of getting a disease such as cancer. Different cancers have different risk factors. Some risk factors, like smoking, can be changed. Others, like a person's age or family history, can't be changed. But having a risk factor, or even many, does not mean that you will get the disease. And some people who get the disease may not have any known risk factors. Researchers have found several risk factors that might increase a person's chance of developing colorectal polyps or colorectal cancer. These include not being physically active, being overweight or obese (the link is stronger in men), smoking, diet high in

red meat and processed meats, heavy alcohol use.

- Your risk of colorectal cancer goes up as you age. Younger adults can get it, but it's much more common after age 50. Colorectal cancer is rising among people who are younger than age 50 and the reason for this remains unclear.
- Your risk of colorectal cancer is increased if you have inflammatory bowel disease (IBD), including either ulcerative colitis or Crohn's disease.
- Most colorectal cancers are found in people without a family history of colorectal cancer. Still, as many as 1 in 3 people who develop colorectal cancer have other family members who have had it.

Prevention

Screening is the process of looking for cancer or pre-cancer in people who have no symptoms of the disease. *Regular colorectal cancer screening is one of the most powerful tools for preventing colorectal cancer.*

- With regular screening, most polyps can be found and removed before they have the chance to turn into cancer. If you're age 45 or older, you should start getting screened for colorectal cancer. If you have a strong family history of colorectal polyps or cancer, talk with your doctor about your risk.
- Several types of tests can be used to screen. Talk to your health care provider about which ones might be good options for you. No matter which test you choose, the most important thing is to get tested.

Lower your risk for colorectal cancer!

- Stay at a healthy weight
- Increase the amount and intensity of your physical activity may help. You don't have to go to the gym, just **move**.
- Limiting red and processed meats and eating more vegetables, fruits, and whole grains may help lower your risk.
 Overall, diets that are high in vegetables, fruits, and whole grains, and low in red and processed meats, probably lower colorectal cancer risk.
- Alcohol: Several studies have found a higher risk of colorectal cancer with increased <u>alcohol intake</u>, especially among men. Not drinking alcohol may help reduce your risk.

These are a few of the words and phrases that come to mind when we think about the journey of our search for a new pastor. The search and the journey started in March of 2022, yes, this month makes two years the search committee has been working. We are very pleased to report to the congregation that our two year journey is finally coming to an end. As we shared with you before in our updates and reports at the church business meetings, we had 93 candidates to apply. The Pastor's Search Committee conducted a process that included seven phases. We were guided by constant prayer, scriptures from the Bible and the Kentucky Baptist Convention (KBC) Pastor Search Team Guide. Rev. Carl Jones, Interim Pastor served as our advisor and consultant.

In the First Review of the candidate applications, we used the Pastor Profile that was created by the results from the congregational survey to complete a screening checklist and identify viable and non-viable candidates. Using this process, we were able to decrease the number of candidates from 93 to approxi-

mately 50. The criteria we looked at included education, pastoral experience and skills, age, family, achievements, employment, qualifications (being ordained).

In the Second Review, we looked more closely at the resumes and used the five categories of Biblical, Congregational, Professional, Personal and Procedural as evidence to have the candidate continue in the process or be eliminated from the search. The candidates selected to continue in the search were asked to respond to a Pastoral Questionnaire. They were required to respond to questions in the following categories: 1) Personal Testimony and Calling, 2) Doctrinal, 3) Ministry, 4) Staff Relations and 5) Family Life. The candidates were given specific guidelines and a timeline to respond to the questions. Following a very detailed screening process, we very methodically decreased the number of candidates from 93 to the top two candidates. This is an overview of how we have arrived to this final stage of the process. Now it's time for the congregation to play an active and very role in the process by voting for the next pastor.

The meeting to Elect the next pastor will be scheduled this month. The exact date and time will be announced during morning worship service, and letters will be sent by U.S. Mail informing members of the meeting date and time. The Pastor Search Committee will present and recommend the two top candidates for your vote. Each candidate will be presented in alphabetical, order, one at a time. Each member will have only ONE VOTE. You will cast your vote, according to the Church By Laws, which is by standing for the candidate you want to be the next pastor.

To help you prepare for this very important vote, we are providing you with an update and overview of the work that has taken place and brought us to this point in the search process. We are also providing you with each candidate's Bio and a list of the questions he was asked and the responses he gave during his visit to Greater Salem a few weeks ago.



Bio - Rev. Dr. Virgil Hill

Rev. Virgil A. Hill, M.Div., D.D. Rev. Dr. Virgil A. Hill, was born on June 27, 1965, in Winchester, Kentucky. He is a devoted servant of God and a highly respected pastor whose life's journey has been marked by unwavering faith and a profound commitment to God and his community.

As the youngest of five children born to James Theodore and Mary Ella Hill, Rev. Hill's spiritual journey began at an early age. At just nine years old, he embraced the Lord as his personal Savior and was baptized at the Broadway Baptist Church in Winchester, Kentucky, under the guidance of the late Rev. Dr. Henry E. Baker.



Dr. Hill's commitment to service and faith led him to a distinguished nine-year career in the United States Army, where he achieved the rank of staff sergeant. His military service included the specialized role of a U.S. Army Drill Instructor, as well as an overseas tour in South Korea. Following his honorable discharge, he returned to his roots and dedicated himself to various roles within his home church, demonstrating his deep-rooted devotion to his faith in God.

In 1995, he received a divine calling to ministry, leading to his licensure to preach in December of that year by the Broadway Baptist Church, under the esteemed leadership of Rev. Dr. James H. Brooks. In June 1999, Rev. Hill was ordained by the same church, recognizing his resolute dedication to God and his fervent passion for ministry.

Throughout his spiritual journey, Rev. Hill served in numerous capacities within his church, including roles as Youth Minister, Audio/Video Ministry Director, Church Trustee and a dedicated Sunday school teacher. He even humbly served as the church custodian. Notably, he was a cherished member of the renowned men's group, "The Broadway Six," which recorded a studio tape, "The Broadway Six".

In October of 2000, Rev. Virgil A. Hill answered the divine call and excepted the esteemed role of becoming the 21st pastor at the First Baptist Church of Harrodsburg, Kentucky. Since then, his unyielding faith and steadfast commitment have consistently illuminated his service to the congregation, garnering profound love and respect from its members.

Rev. Hill's dedication to education is reflected in his academic achievements. He completed an Associate Degree in Broadcasting at Barstow Community College in Barstow, California in May of 1987. Subsequently, he earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Christian Education from Simmons College of Kentucky in May 1999, followed by a Bachelor of Theology from Simmons College in May 2000. In June 2001, he successfully obtained a Master of Divinity degree from The Master's Seminary in Evansville, Indiana. Furthermore, on December 16, 2023, he is poised to graduate with a Doctor of Divinity degree from Newburgh Theological Seminary in Newburgh, Indiana.

In addition to his pastoral responsibilities, Rev. Hill has taken on leadership roles in several Baptist associations. He served as the Treasurer and Parliamentarian for the South District Baptist Association, previously held the esteemed position of President in the General Association of Kentucky Baptist "Ministers & Messengers," and fulfilled the role of Recording Secretary for The Consolidated Baptist District Association. Currently, he serves as the 2nd Vice Moderator for the Consolidated Baptist District Association.

In his personal life, Rev. Hill is happily married to Vonda L. (Daugherty) Hill, and together they share five children and enjoy the blessings of six grandchildren. His interests span from a dedicated member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Incorporated and Masonic Mosaic Lodge #25 to an avid Corvette enthusiast, fisherman, and percussionist.

Rev. Dr. Virgil A. Hill is undoubtedly a beloved and courageous pastor, a devoted servant-leader, a visionary, an unfaltering friend, and a highly sought-after lecturer and preacher on a national level. His passion for sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ, making the Word of God relevant in the lives of believers, and advancing the Kingdom of God, both locally and nationally, radiates throughout his ministry. He is a Born Again Preacher of the Gospel, called by God to inspire and serve others on their sacred spiritual journeys. Embodying the words of Isaiah 40:31, "But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint." His unshakeable dedication to God, Faith and Community continues to soar to new heights, a testament to his steadfast commitment to God's calling.

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Rev. Dr. Virgil Hill Pastoral Candidate

Rev. Dr. Virgil Hill was the first candidate to visit our church. He preached during morning worship on Sunday, December 8, 2023. His sermon title was "Do You Know the Man Named Jesus?" The text was Luke 19:1-6 and 9 -10.

Rev. Dr. Hill answered questions posed by the Ministries and his responses follow.

1. How would your church members and community describe you as a

person, other than being a pastor? Church members and community describe Dr. Hill as a hard working person. Many people in the community have known him since he was a teenager.

2. What are your thoughts on using technology and social media in ministry? Rev. Dr. Hill loves technology. He shared that his skills were elevated during covid. He's on twitter, all social media, uses Zoom for Bible study.

3. What will you do to bring back the age group of members 25 to 40? *He would make church accessible to them and the community. He wants to take the church to the people. He would teach them and have them become leaders to learn how to work with church groups. Get them active and involved by having them volunteer as chaperons to youth, etc.*

4. What success have you had in ministering to youth? Dr. Hill was given the task of being a youth director at an early age. He gained great experience working in this capacity..

5. Why do you think you are a good fit for Greater Salem? Shared his experience of working with the youth and strategies he would use to bring them back to the church. The youth are our future.

6. What is your vision for the music ministry? Dr. Hill is a musician. With his style of preaching, he likes to be backed up with the organist. Our former organist, Jonathan Higgins knew his Daddy and he kept up with him and what he was doing here at Greater Salem. He knows a lot of musicians locally.

7. What will you do to increase the footprint or involvement of the church in the community? *Dr*. *Hill believes we have to fellowship with other churches, not be snobbish, but show unity – with revivals and other activities with different churches. He prefers ecumenical , being open to other faiths, not just with Baptist. We must all work together outside the doors of church to bring us together inside the church.*

8. What approach will you use to increase the membership of the church? Using personal contacts to invite them to come back to church, will be one strategy he will use.

9. What are your thoughts regarding events such as church Anniversary, Church Picnic, Pastor's Anniversary and Ministries Day? Rev. Hill likes the way each ministry had its own day in the past -to show aspects of all ministries, not just one day for all ministries combined.

10. What process do you use when planning your sermon topics? *Dr. Hill looks at what's going on in society for topics, he emphasizes God is THE topic. He May not have a title - he waits on the Lord to give him a title and listens to Him. The Lord uses him as His instrument.*

11. What type of outreach programs do you feel are important and relevant to the church? Believes in reach one, teach one. Believes we should offer programs like a Food ministry and reach out to youth to bring them back to church; find out how we can help. Those who are Blessed must help the rest of us.





Bio - Rev. Dr. Justin Shamell

Rev. Dr. Justin M. Shamell is a native of Louisville, KY. He is the youngest son of Lois Shamell and the late Jasper Shamell. He was the father of an adult son.

He accepted Christ at the early age of eleven years old at Greater Salem Baptist Church in Louisville, KY. He delivered his initial sermon and received his License to the Gospel Ministry on September 29, 1991 at the First African Missionary Baptist Church, Kingsland, GA. He received a Certificate of Ordination on November 30, 2008 at Metropolitan Missionary Baptist Church, Indianapolis, IN. He has served as Youth Pastor at churches in Kingsland, GA, Louisville, KY, Denver, CO and Atlanta, GA. He is presently an associate minister at Westside Baptist Church, St. Louis, MO.

He earned a Bachelor of Business Administration Degree from Marian University (2007); a Master of Divinity Degree from The Morehouse

School of Religion at The Interdenominational Theological Center (2010) and a Doctor of Ministry Degree from United Theological Seminary (2019).

He served seven years in the United States Navy. He was one of the original crew who commissioned the USS Kentucky submarine in July, 1991.

He worked in the hospitality industry for seven years as a Hotel Sales Manager. He worked for seven years as a Meeting Planner for several non-profit organizations.

Currently, He is the Relationship Manger and Recruiter of Congregations at Eden Theological Seminary, which is located in St. Louis, MO.

He is currently a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. He is a Kentucky Colonel, which is the highest award presented by the governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. He published an article entitled "Bridging the Generation Gap" for the African-American Lectionary.

Rev. Dr. Justin Shamell Pastoral Candidate

Rev. Dr. Justin Shamell was the second candidate to visit our church. He preached during morning worship on Sunday, January 14, 2024. His sermon title was **It's Only a Test!** The text was James 1: 2-4 and 2 Timothy 3:15. Rev. Dr. Shamell answered questions posed by the ministries and his responses are below.

- 1. What type of worship do you prefer, Traditional Black Baptist, mixed/ eclectic or contemporary praise and worship? Dr. Shamell likes mixed, traditional and contemporary music.
- **2. What is your vision for the music ministry?** *Dr. Shamell has experience in directing youth choirs, he likes all types of music (hymns, gospels, anthems, and contemporary sounds).*
- **3. What steps should the church take to minister to the people in our surrounding community, Beecher Terrace?** Dr. Shamell would like to take the church to the people, Sunday services outside, collaborate with other churches. He wants to continue the food pantry, bring back the clothes closet and do some of those things Greater Salem was known for in the past and work more closely with other area churches.
- 4. What are your plans to bring the youth and young adults ages 25-35 into church or back to church? He plans to grow youth participation and young adults (ages 18-35)by inviting them to a meeting to find out why they are not attending and what the church needs to do so they will want to participate. Invite them to be part of committees (ministries) and teach them leadership skills. Invest in them.



- 5. How will you address the problem of persons joining the church and then ceasing to attend church? Dr. Shamell would have church membership classes and other sessions to answer questions about church and reasons for not going to church. Help them find out about their talents and gifts. Welcome them to the church and teach them about the church so they understand more and don't have "buyer's remorse" or feelings of regret about joining the church.
- 6. What are your thoughts regarding events such as church anniversaries, church picnics, Pastor's Anniversary and Ministries Day? Should these days be celebrated individually or all celebrated together for Ministries Day? Celebrating the church is needed especially since the 96th church anniversary is coming up next year, there is a lot to celebrate. This Church was started in 1926 (first started) and in 1928 (the name Greater Salem was added). Dr. Shamell shared the history of Pastor's Anniversaries and why anniversaries started in the church. Years ago, when most people were not financially able to give money on a regular basis, churches were not able to pay the pastor a salary, so they were asked to contribute money and gifts to the pastor once a year. Since the church started as a Missionary Baptist, we may need to relook at missions again.



- 7. What are your thoughts on having Pastors from other churches preach on Sunday morning at an event? No problem. Dr. Shamell was an interim pastor and had the opportunity to preach on a regular basis on the 3rd or 4th Sunday. He recognizes the importance of providing preaching opportunities to others.
- 8. Do you feel okay with providing a message to the members of the congregation via the GoodNewsletter on a monthly basis? Dr. Shamell would feel very comfortable providing a message to the congregation on a monthly basis in the GoodNewsLetter.
- 9. How can the GoodNewsLetter be used as an evangelistic tool or do you think it should be used as such? He feels it should be used as an evangelistic tool for the community, sending to sick and shut ins and those in nursing homes too, using bulk rate with USPS to send to addresses around the church. He said we should acknowledge an important fact if GSBC burned down and couldn't be rebuilt, would the community miss it? If not, then that's a problem.
- 10. It is essential to train our youth and teach them about God, however, members must be willing to teach. How would you address the lack of teachers to work with our youth? We need to survey the membership to find out who is willing to teach youth. Then they need to be trained so they really know what to do.
- 11. How are you currently demonstrating missionary interest and involvement? Dr. Shamell goes to conferences as part of his job now to recruit students to the seminary. It has been his experience that intentionally learning about church is needed. He wants us to be involved more in the community, such as collaborating with the NAACP, Urban League and others in social justice issues where churches need to speak up as they did in the past.
- 12. What makes you think you would be a good fit for Greater Salem? Dr. Shamell believes he's a good fit for GSBC. He was born and raised here in the church. He knows the history and knows first hand what we are capable of doing. He already knows many people and has many connections in the city even though he's been away for 20 years. It's not about him but about the kingdom of God He stressed that we would need to learn about each other together.

Rev. Dr. Shamell would like to be considered as the adult that he is today (his many experiences and as a professional adult who is 55 years old). Resurrection rumblings

In *Easter Earthquake*, James A. Harnish explores the "earthshaking promise" of Jesus' resurrection. Easter Sunday "shatters the power of fear," he writes. "Because Christ is risen, we no longer allow fear to dominate, control or manipulate us. We don't remain imprisoned in the tombs of our past failures or buried under the weight of present anxiety. In the risen Christ, old things pass away and everything becomes new."

Easter, Harnish adds, is proof that God hasn't forsaken us and is present among us. "The Resurrection contradicts the assumption that Christ resides on an ethereal cloud in a distant heaven. Rather, we find him on the dusty road that leads to the real stuff of our ordinary world."

Jesus' followers can find him everywhere, Harnish concludes. "The risen Christ will meet us along the confused, chaotic, fearful paths of our lives and speak the same words the women hear at the tomb,



'Do not be afraid.'"

Because Jesus saíd so

One intriguing person in the Passion account is the thief on the cross whom Jesus promised a same-day entrance to paradise (see Luke 23:43). Pastor and radio host Alistair Begg says he can't wait to meet that man and ask how everything unfolded. "You were cussing [Jesus] out with your friend," Begg says. "You've never been in a Bible study. You've never been baptized. You didn't know a thing about church membership, and yet you made it!"

In a sermon, Begg pictures an imaginary angel at the pearly gates, growing frustrated during the sinful thief's entrance interview. After receiving no clear answers from the thief about doctrines such as justification, the angel finally asks, "On what basis are you here?" The thief simply replies, "The man on the middle cross said I can come."

When You Can't find Easter

Easter is the most joyous Christian holy day ... except when it's not. What do we do when our mood isn't what we think it "should" be? The kids are sugared up, we're juggling family gatherings (and maybe conflicts), our everyday challenges remain, and festive hymns — however rousing — fail to lift our spirits. We wonder, "What's *wrong* with me, that I can't seem to find Easter?"

Been there, done that. And it's okay. You're okay.

Jesus' resurrection doesn't scoop us out of our troubles, but the death-defying Christ walks through them beside us, on our own Emmaus road (Luke 24). We aren't alone. When we can't find Easter, Easter somehow finds us — if not on this designated Sunday, perhaps two days from now, or next week or mid-May. Watch for it; keep your heart open. Christ is risen indeed — and you shall be too. —Heidi Mann

BLACK HISTORY HIGHLIGHTS WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH



3 African-American Women Judges who Paved the way for U. S. Supreme Court Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson.

Her rise to this lofty position is, in part, due to the work of these women and Black men—and to Black women judges dating back almost a century.



Maya Angelou (born April 4, 1928, St. Louis, <u>Missouri</u>, U.S.—died May 28, 2014, Winston-Salem, North Carolina) was an American poet, memoirist, and actress whose several volumes of autobiography explore the

themes of economic, racial, and

sexual oppression.

Although born in <u>St. Louis</u>, Angelou spent much of her childhood in the care of her paternal grandmother in rural Stamps, <u>Arkansas</u>. When she was not yet eight years old, she was molested by her mother's boyfriend and told of it, after which he was murdered; the traumatic sequence of events left her almost completely mute for several years. This early life is the focus of her first autobiographical work, <u>I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings</u> (1969; TV <u>movie</u> 1979), which gained critical acclaim and a <u>National Book Award</u> nomination. Subsequent volumes of autobiography include *Gather Together in My Name* (1974), *Singin' and Swingin' and Gettin' Merry Like Christmas* (1976), *The Heart of a Woman* (1981), *All God's Children Need Traveling Shoes* (1986), *A Song Flung Up to Heaven* (2002), and *Mom & Me & Mom* (2013)






The nation's first Black female judge was Jane Matilda Bolin, who was appointed a Domestic <u>Relations Court judge</u> by New York City Mayor Fiorello La Guardia, serving from 1939 to 1978. Bolin was the first Black female Yale Law School graduate, as well as the first Black female member of the New York Bar Association.

In 1961, **Attorney Constance Baker Motley** became the first Black woman to <u>argue a</u> <u>case</u> before the U.S. Supreme Court. She became the country's <u>first Black female federal</u> judge.



In 1975, **Judge Julia Cooper Mack** was appointed by President Gerald R. Ford to the District of Columbia Court of Appeals, becoming the first Black woman to sit on a federal appellate court.








What you need:
