#### Sunday School Lessons At-a-Glance

#### Love as Selflessness

Robert Ringer, a businessman and motivational speaker in the 1970s, directed those looking to succeed in life to the path of Winning Through Intimidation and Looking Out for #1. His books claimed that the only way to thrive in a hostile world was to practice a selfish love that kept one from being manipulated by others. Our third unit demonstrates how the first-century church was characterized by those who put others before themselves. Jesus set the example as he shared a Passover meal with his disciples. Instead of being a domineering boss, Jesus took the role of a servant. He encouraged his disciples to abide in his love, following that example in daily life. The apostle John counseled believers to practice Jesus' love confidently. The earliest Christians selflessly gave to fellow believers—to the point where no one lacked what was needed. Finally, James warned fellow believers to show love without partiality.

The world may say that cars love gasoline, that opponents of any kind do not deserve love, or that true love is looking out only for ourselves. But we know that love has a very real meaning. We love because we are recipients of divine love!

#### HEALTH NOTES FOR NOVEMBER 2020 Healthy Aging

Our bodies are amazing works of God but we all know that changes will happen starting about age 30. Many see aging as a negative, but you can make the most of it. So what can be done to deal with the changes that happen with age?

Little aches and pains. Whether it's an old injury, arthritis or causes of aches and pains, there are going to be some as you age. Regular movement/activity can ease pain and make your joints more flexible. Take a walk (inside the house is o.k., too). Get up out of your comfy chair and move every hour. Wrinkles and dry skin show up because the skin gets thinner, drier, and less elastic. Smoking and too much sun can make them worse. Use warm water instead of hot for bathing and use a moisturizer. Drinking water and having a well-balanced diet also help.

Loss of muscle occurs as we age. Many people lose strength and endurance but it's not just because of aging. "Use it or Lose It" applies here. Strengthening exercises such as lifting weights (or use canned foods if you don't have weights), walking, gardening, etc. can help. Aim for at least 30 minutes a day or two sessions of 15 minutes each.

Memory. Can't find your car keys? Forget your grocery list? Everyone forgets things occasionally. There are no guarantees when it comes to preventing memory loss or dementia, but certain activities might help.

- Include physical activity in your daily routine to help increase the blood flow to your brain. Sleep well most adults need seven to nine hours of sleep a day.
- Stay mentally active to keep your brain in shape. Crossword puzzles, studying your Bible or playing board games are mentally stimulating.
- Eating a healthy diet is as good for your brain as it is for your heart. Eat more fruits and vegetables and less processed foods such as chips, cookies, etc.
- Seek help from your doctor if you're worried that memory loss is affecting your ability to complete your daily activities.

#### Coronavirus Update

By now we are accustomed to many of the changes that help to prevent the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19). However, as numbers of people infected keep rising, it's important that each of us do our part. A few reminders:

- Wear your mask/face covering whenever you are around people not living in your home. Lately COVID-19
  has been spreading among relatives who get together for special events. It will be very hard this time of
  year, but gatherings should be limited as much as possible.
- Practice social distancing (at least 6 feet apart) whether you're wearing a face covering or not.
- You will be contacted by the health department if you have been exposed to or have COVID-19. Contact tracers help you monitor your symptoms and quarantine or isolate. You will not be asked to give your social security number or other personal information.
- Wash your hands and frequently touched surfaces often. Wash hands with soap and warm water for 20+ seconds. Use hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.
- Signs and symptoms of COVID-19 include fever or chills, cough, difficulty breathing, loss of taste or smell, unusual fatigue, headache, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea. If you suspect you may have coronavirus, call your health care provider first.
  - Be sure to continue to get your regular check-ups and screenings (diabetes, breast and prostate cancer, etc.). Neglecting your health could make you more susceptible to the virus.

#### **Deaconess Audrey Jones has** been a member of The Missionary Baptist Deacons' Wives and Widows Council of Louisville, Kentucky and Vicinity for almost four decades. She joined the Council 39 years ago in 1981 under the leadership and presidency of Mrs. Maurine Snow. Sister Jones describes the Missionary Baptist Deacons' Wives and Widows Council as one of the best organizations she has ever known. She has nothing but praise for the Council and is convinced becoming a member almost 40 years ago, was one of the best decisions she could have **made.** Sister Jones shared how women in the Council, specifically Sister Snow, Sister Dorothy King, Sister Chin, and Sister Harris were always so helpful to her. In fact, she said one of the things that made the Council so special was the willingness of everyone to help each other.

During the time Sister Jones became a member of the Council, she was working full time in the dry cleaning industry. She worked very long hours at Spalding Cleaners, but she always made time to be actively involved with the Council. In August of 1982, Sister Jones was presented with a Certificate of Recognition and on August 29, 2003, she was presented with a Certificate of Appreciation for her dedication to the Council. Sister Jones served on the Telephone Tree Committee and the Membership Recruitment Committee. While working to recruit new members, Sister Jones recruited the current

Council President, Sister Jacqueline Austin and the Vice President, Sister Sarah Toney as members. She also recruited Past Assistant Recording Secretary, Sister Dolores Johnson.

Sister Jones is originally from Hazard, Kentucky. She was born 88 years ago in the winter of 1931 on December 1st. Her birth, like so many other Council Members, occurred during the Great Depression, when families were struggling to make ends meet. Living in the Appalachian Mountains and in the city of Hazard, where the racial makeup of the city was 90% White and only 6% Black, created an additional layer of hardship. Sister Jones' father worked in the coal mines. During those days, coal miners were paid by the amount of coal they were able to collect. They were paid an unbelievable 16 Cents a ton!!

Although life had to be extremely hard in every sense of the word, the hard times were not what Sister Jones talked about or focused on. She focused more on the quality of life they had as a family. Sister Jones is from a family of thirteen children. Her parents had eight boys and five girls. They were raised with strong family values. The family was always seated at the table together for both breakfast and dinner. Sister Jones and all of her sisters and brothers were expected to recite a Bible Verse from memory. All of the children had chores and jobs they were responsible for completing. She remembers vividly going to the homes of older people in the community to help them. Sadly, Sister Jones' mother passed away when she was only twelve years old and her baby brother was only two. Understandably, she had a

very difficult time dealing with her mother's death. She remembers asking her father, who was an Apostolic Pastor, about her mother's death and expressed she couldn't see how God could take her life and leave 13 children motherless if He was so good and kind. When Sister Jones questioned her dad about God, He quickly put her in her place and after a special "laying of hands on her," in a way she still remembers to this day, he told her to never ever question God! He explained that God is too compassionate to be unkind and too wise to make a mistake! Sis. Jones' father gave her the Bible Verse John 3:16 and required her to remember it and recite it everyday during mealtime. He told her he expected her to remember that verse as long as she lived. If you have ever had the opportunity to hear sister Jones speak publicly, on any occasion, you have heard her recite this verse. She said it became her favorite Bible Verse. Today, Sister Jones is the only surviving sibling of the 13 children in her family.

Young Audrey moved to Louisville when she was sixteen. She came to live with her brother to help him and his wife take care of their children while they worked. After getting settled in Louisville, young Audrey got a job as a waitress at the Owl Creek Country Club in Anchorage. This club was for the very rich and sophisticated. This is where Audrey, the teenager, met her future husband, Alex Jones. She was introduced to him by one of her friends who was also an employee of the Club. Alex Jones asked Audrey if he could take her to a movie, she said yes, and as they say, the rest is history. He asked for her hand in marriage when

they had been dating for less than a year.

Sister Jones reminisced, "I loved him from the moment I saw him, and I still love him today! They were married on September 2, 1950. They have been blessed to celebrate 70 years of marriage! When asked what attracted her to him, she replied his good looks; he was a good looking Black man! Sister Jones also admired his honesty. When asked what is the key to a long happy marriage, sister Jones said you have to pray to God and ask God to help you, and you have to have forgiveness in your heart. She said God has never failed them. Through all of their sicknesses and ups and downs, God has blessed them beyond measure. They have always made it a point to keep others out of their private life. If they have a problem, they take it to God. She proudly stated that she never allows anyone to interfere with her marriage. She said with conviction, "We live Good!" Sister Jones shared that she adopted The Five Day Rule to deal with any disagreements or issues they encounter. When they disagreed about something, she would wait five days to give herself time to consider all sides of the issue or problem. On the 5th day, she would ask Deacon Jones if his position on the issue had changed. If he said no, they would not discuss it any further or ever again.

Sister Jones and her husband Deacon Jones are members of Greater Salem Baptist Church. She joined in 1954 under Rev. William H. Ryan. Sister Jones was a member of West Chestnut, but when Deacon Jones wanted to join Greater Salem, she moved her membership to be with him. She has been actively involved in all areas of the church. She served on the Nurses Guild and the Benevolent Society for more than 20 years. She has always had a special place in her heart for children and youth. Although she didn't have any biological children, she has been mother and grandmother figure to hundreds of children at Greater Salem over the years. She is also Step Mother to one son, Thomas, and two grandsons. Deacon and Sister Jones donated all of the monetary gifts (over \$3,000) they received for their 50<sup>th</sup> Wedding Anniversary to the Youth of Greater Salem.

Her favorite song is also her testimony: "We've Come this Far By Faith!" When asked what words of advice she has for the Council, she said her advice is to continue serving God and never stop! He is all we have to depend on, He has never lied, and He is true to His Word. We need to read His Word and put it in our hearts.

We concluded the interview with Sister Jones identifying differences between life when she was growing up and life today. She said the biggest difference is when she was growing up there was total respect for all people. She said there were many white people who helped her family in Hazard and she remembers their kindness to this day. If anyone disrespected you or was nasty to you, you addressed them directly. You would fight them, if necessary, but you would fight in the appropriate way.

We thank you, Sister Jones, for your membership, your dedication and your service to the Council. Your humility, positive outlook on life and sweet spirit make you a strong example for young women both in and out of the church. We pray that God will continue to bless you in a mighty way.

#### REVELATIONS

First off, this title is not to be confused with the book of Revelation in the Bible, *notice the "s."* 

I have for quite some time now come to the realization that scripture can provide many different meanings/lessons in life and as long as one is interpreting it through God's point of view - then all is correct. #### **Growing through gratitude**


Thankfulness, studies show, has multiple physical, mental and emotional benefits. Psychologist Robert Emmons calls gratitude "fertilizer for the mind" because of its powerful effects.

He admits gratitude isn't always easy — especially when life throws us curveballs (see the year 2020) — but says it can be most helpful during and after difficulties. Emmons suggests reframing challenges using thankfulness -based language. Ask, for example: Though I wasn't grateful for the experience at the time, how can I be now? What lessons did I learn, and how did I grow as a person?

Throughout his letters, the apostle Paul reframes his extensive sufferings and urges us to do the same. "Give thanks in all circumstances," he writes, "for this is God's will for you in Christ

## Question: What does it mean to accept Jesus as your personal Savior?

Answer: Have you accepted Jesus Christ as your personal Savior? To properly understand this question, you must first understand the terms "Jesus Christ," "personal," and "Savior."

#### Who is Jesus Christ? Many people will

acknowledge Jesus Christ as a good man, a great teacher, or even a prophet of God. These things are definitely true of Jesus, but they do not fully define who He truly is. The Bible tells us that Jesus is God in the flesh, God in human form (see John 1:1, 14). God came to earth to teach us, heal us, correct us, forgive us—and die for us! Jesus Christ is God, the Creator, the sovereign Lord. Have you accepted this Jesus?

#### What is a Savior, and why do we need a Sav-

ior? The Bible tells us that we have all sinned; we have all committed evil acts (Romans 3:10-18). As a result of our sin, we deserve God's anger and judgment. The only just punishment for sins committed against an infinite and eternal God is an infinite punishment (Romans 6:23; Revelation 20:11-15). That is why we need a Savior!

Jesus Christ came to earth and died in our place. Jesus' death was an infinite payment for our sins (2 Corinthians 5:21). Jesus died to pay the penalty for our sins (Romans 5:8). Jesus paid the price so that we would not have to. Jesus' resurrection from the dead proved that His death was sufficient to pay the penalty for our sins. That is why Jesus is the one and only Savior (John 14:6; Acts 4:12)! Are you trusting in Jesus as your Savior?

Is Jesus your "personal" Savior? Many people view Christianity as attending church, performing rituals, and/or not committing certain sins. That is not Christianity. True Christianity is a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Accepting Jesus as your personal Savior means placing your own personal faith and trust in Him. No one is saved by the faith of others. No one is forgiven by doing certain deeds. The only way to be saved is to personally accept Jesus as your Savior, trusting in His death as the payment for your sins and His resurrection as your guarantee of eternal life (John 3:16). Is Jesus personally your Savior?

### If you want to accept Jesus Christ as your personal Savior, say the following words to

God. Remember, saying this prayer or any other prayer will not save you. Only believing in Jesus Christ and His finished work on the cross for you can save you from sin. This prayer is simply a way to express to God your faith in Him and thank Him for providing for your salvation. "God, I know that I have sinned against You and deserve punishment. But I believe Jesus Christ took the punishment I deserve so that through faith in Him I could be forgiven. I receive Your offer of forgiveness and place my trust in You for salvation. I accept Jesus as my personal Savior! Thank You for Your wonderful grace and forgiveness—the gift of eternal life! Amen!"
