

Read The Entire Bible In One Year October 1, During Week 5 Read Deuteronomy

The Heart of the Law-Deuteronomy 10: 12-22, 16:18-20

The principle underlying justice in this passage does not originate in humankind, but in the nature of God. Loving God involves more than a sentimental response; it means serving God with one's heart and soul.

October 8, During Week 6 Read Joshua

God is Victorious-Joshua 6:2-3. 4b, 12-20b

At God's command, Joshua and the children of Israel marched around Jericho for seven days. On the final day as Israel conquered the city, God miraculously caused the walls to collapse.

October 15, During Week 7 Read Judges

Listen to God's Judges—Judges 2:11-19 This passage is an introduction to the book of Judges, which explains Israel's recurring cycles of national apostasy.

October 22, During Week 8 Read 1-2 Samuel

God's Covenant with David-2 Samuel 7: 1-13

This lesson is based on the story of David's desire to build a permanent structure for the Ark of God, a house for the Lord. Instead, God promises to establish David's dynasty including a descendant who would build the temple and establish his kingdom forever.

October 29, During Week 9 Read 1-2 Kings

Josiah Brings Reform—2 Kings 22:8-10; 23:13, 21-23

During the repair of the temple, the Book of the Covenant was found and brought to King Josiah. 

OCTOBER HEALTH NOTES FROM THE NURSES MINISTRY

Respiratory Virus - Triple Threat COVID-19, Flu and RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus)

The difference between the flu and COVID-19

There are many similarities between influenza (flu) and COVID-19. The flu and COVID-19 are both contagious respiratory illnesses, but they are caused by two different germs. However, you may not be able to tell the difference between the flu and COVID-19, the only way that you will know for sure is to get tested. It is important to know that you can have both the flu and COVID-19 at the same time.

RSV

RSV (respiratory syncytial virus) is a common respiratory virus that usually causes mild, cold-like symptoms. Most people recover in a week or two, but RSV can be serious. Infants and older adults are more likely to develop severe RSV and need hospitalization.

There are <u>preventive actions</u> you can take to help yourself and others stay healthy:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Cover coughs and sneezes. Wear masks as needed.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces regularly.
- Stay home if you are sick.

Fall, ideally by the end of October, is the best time to get immunized against these diseases. Flu and COVID-19 vaccines can be given at the same time. COVID-19 vaccines

The Food and Drug Administration has approved updated vaccines against COVID-19 for Fall 2023.

The CDC has recommended everyone aged 6 years and older should get an updated Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine.

People aged 65 years and older can get a second dose of updated Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine.

<u>People who are moderately or severely immunocompromised</u> may get additional doses of updated Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine.

Children aged 6 months-5 years may need multiple doses of COVID-19 vaccine to be up to date.

• Consult with your healthcare provider for best vaccine and doses for you.

Please check with your health care provider or local pharmacy as to when they will get the new updated vaccines and schedule an appointment.

To find COVID-19 vaccine locations near you: Search <u>vaccines.gov</u>, text your ZIP code to 438829, or call 1-800-232-0233.

Free COVID-19 At-Home Tests available at Louisville Metro Community Centers

Tests can be picked up during operating hours from each clinic **beginning** *Monday*, *October* 2nd *and available while supplies last*.

Anyone age 2 and older can be tested at home and get results in just minutes.

People who don't have symptoms can still spread COVID-19 so testing is critical to knowing if you're infected.

Not sure what to do if you test positive? When can you go back to work or school after testing positive or being in close contact of someone who tested positive? Need to find a place to get tested? Want information on the COVID-19 vaccines?

Need support to safely stay home if you tested positive or were around someone who was positive?

Flu Vaccines

Flu vaccines reduce the risk of severe flu-related illness by 40%-60%.

Everyone ages 6 months and older can get the flu vaccine When to get immunized? Fall, ideally by the end of October.

RSV Vaccine

Recommended for adults 60 years and older after discussing with your healthcare provider.

Vaccine Costs:

Your private insurance may cover vaccine costs.

Medicare continues to cover the COVID-19 and flu vaccines, as well as several tests and treatments to keep you and others safe.

CDC's <u>Bridge Access Program</u> offers COVID-19 vaccines at no cost for adults ages 18-64 without health insurance and adults whose health insurance does not provide zero-cost coverage for COVID-19 vaccines. COVID-19 Vaccines through this program are available at select local healthcare providers, local health centers, and pharmacies.

- October 24, 2023 11:59PM (local time) Last day to request a mail-in absentee ballot. Voters are encouraged to request well before the deadline if they know they will be voting absentee.
- All mail-in absentee ballots must be received by 6:00PM Local Time, on Election

Day, November 7, 2023 to be counted. Voters are highly encouraged not to wait until Election Day to hand deliver their absentee ballot. Cast your ballot as soon as you receive it. Do not delay!

Drop boxes are available in each county to hand deliver your ballot. To find out where the drop box is located in your county, voters should visit the State Board of Elections website at: govote.ky.gov

In-person, excused absentee voting October 25, 26, 27 and October 30, 31, & November 1, 2023. To find out when and where in-person, excused absentee voting will take place in their county, voters should visit the State Board of Elections website at: govote.ky.gov

Early in-person, no excuse absentee voting will take place **Thursday, November 2, Friday, November 3, and Saturday, November 4, 2023.** To find out when and where early voting will take place in their county, voters should visit the State Board of Elections website at: govote.ky.gov Voters that know they wish to take advantage of early in-person absentee voting are encouraged not to wait until May 16th to cast their ballot.

In-person voting on Election Day, **November 7, 2023**, will take place from 6:00AM to 6:00PM, local time. To find out where to vote inperson on Election Day, voters should visit the State Board of Elections website at: govote.ky.gov

Christian Symbols



WATER

Water flows through the Scriptures: the Flood, the Red Sea crossing, water springing from a rock to nourish Israelites in the wilderness, the healing of Naaman's leprosy when he washed in the Jordan River, John baptizing Jesus and, chiefly, our baptism into Christ. The water of baptism symbolizes cleansing from sin, the quenching of our spiritual thirst and God raising us from death (drowning in sin) to life everlasting. Just as we cannot live without physical water, neither can we truly live without the living water Jesus gives (see John 4:13-14).

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FULLY KNOWN AND FULLY ACCEPTED!!!

I spent a good part of my life hiding, ashamed of sins I had committed in thought, word, and deed—desperate for people to accept the false identities I fought hard to maintain. Right up to the day of my conversion, one of the most often reviewed fears in my heart was that people would find out who I really was.

When Jesus stopped in Sychar of Samaria, on his way north to Galilee, he met a woman who was hiding. Tired from his long journey on foot, and needing a reprieve from the heat at noonday, he found a well and sat down. His disciples surely would have gotten him some water immediately, but John tells us they were off buying food, (4:8).

Then he saw a woman carrying a jar. She had come to draw water from the well. It's likely that this woman was trying to go about her business unnoticed because she came to the well at a time when others wouldn't be around. Morning and evening were the popular times to get water.

Jesus said, "Give me a drink," (4:7). "Why are you asking me," she replied, "I can see that you are a Jew." John informs us helpfully that, "Jews have no dealings with Samaritans," (4:9). Well, Jesus is not just any Jew.

Jesus went on to explain to her that if she knew who he was, she would have asked him, and he would have given her *living* water. She disagreed by pointed out that Jesus had nothing to draw water with, and then questioned with a dose of snark whether he thought that he was greater than Jacob, the man who dug the well. Jesus *knew* he was greater than Jacob.

Explaining further, Jesus helped her see that he could give her water that would quench her thirst forever. That was something she wanted desperately. "Sir give me this water, so that I will not be thirsty or have to come here to draw water," (4:15). Finally, the woman was interested in what Jesus had to say. If it were possible to never be thirsty again, she would never have to show her face at the well.

But Jesus had more to say, "Go, call your husband, and come here," (4:16). Why was he asking that? The woman told Jesus that she had no husband, and he agreed saying, "You have had five husbands, and the

one you now have is not your husband," (4:17). Everyone in the town knew this already. She couldn't hide her sin but was avoiding shame by drawing water at noon. But how did this stranger know? Could he really give her what he promised?

What are you hiding?

Is there something about your present or past life that you would rather not talk about? You may be succeeding in keeping it hidden, or you may be avoiding more exposure like the woman in the story. She had been rejected by numerous men and fellow citizens until this prophetic Jewish man began to draw her in.

There by Jacob's well, Jesus, knowing the depth of this woman's sin and shame, offered her forgiving acceptance. Not just a fresh start but an eternal life. The story continues with her explaining to him that she knew of the coming Messiah who would, "tell us all things," to which Jesus replied, "I who speak to you am he," (4:25-26). She believed him. He had already demonstrated knowledge of things he could not have known otherwise.

And then she went back into town, already so free, speaking to any who would listen, "Come and see a man who told me all that I ever did. Can this be the Christ" (4:29)?

Let's be honest. Jesus isn't scrolling through social media trying to figure out who you really are. He already knows. And because of his cross-work he is able and willing to give you what you deeply need. He is able to quench your thirst to belong. Jesus is the giver of eternal life who knows everything about you and yet reveals himself as the fullness of forgiving love for you. In him you are fully known and fully accepted. Your shame is covered. Your guilt is removed. You are free.
