Sunday School Lessons At-a-Glance

Love Beyond Allies

Over the last decade (at least), American politics has become increasingly more partisan, emphasizing divisions rather than points of agreement. We have seen the effects of raw tribalism. Is love reserved for those who agree with us? We wring our hands, looking for a better way.

Our second unit examines the better way. We see those who practiced a risky love, a love that reached beyond one's faction. Jonathan, son of King Saul, was heir to the throne. David was a populist hero whom Saul saw as a threat to his dynasty. Yet Jonathan and David became fast friends and refused to let political differences sully their relationship. Jesus taught that people could love those who occupied their nation and accept those of a despised ethnic group as neighbors. Finally, Paul poetically described what love could do and what real love should never do.

3 Key Steps to Take While Waiting for Your COVID-19 Test Result

Tohelpstop the spread of COVID-19, take these 3 keysteps NOW while waiting for your test results:

Stay home and monitor your health.

Stay home and monitor your health to help protect your friends, family, and others from possibly getting COVID-19 from you.

Stay home and away from others:

 If possible, stay away from others, especially people who are at higher risk for getting very sick from COVID-19, such as older adults and people with other medical conditions.



- If you have been in contact with someone with COVID-19, stay home and away from others for 14 days after your last contact with that person.
- If you have a fever, cough or other symptoms of COVID-19, stay home and away from others (except to get medical care).

Monitor your health:

Fever or chills

difficulty breathing

Muscle or body aches

Cough

Tiredness

Headache

 Watch for fever (100.4*F), cough, shortness of breath, or other symptoms of COVID-19.
 Remember, symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to COVID-19 and can include:



- New loss of taste or smell
- Shortness of breath or
 Sore throat
 - Congestion or runny nose
 - Nausea or vomiting
 - Diarrhea

Think about the people you have recently been around.

If you are diagnosed with COVID-19, a public health worker may call you to check on your health, discuss who you have been around, and ask where you spent time while you may have been able to spread COVID-19 to others. While you wait for your COVID-19 test result, think about everyone you have been around recently. This will be important information to give health workers if your test is positive.

How Should a Christian View Politics?

Question: "How should a Christian view politics?"

Answer: If there is anything that will spark a spontaneous debate, if not an outright argument, it is a discussion involving politics—even among believers. As followers of Christ, what should be our attitude and our involvement with politics? It has been said that "religion and politics don't mix." But is that really true? Can we have political views outside the considerations of our Christian faith? The answer is no, we cannot. The Bible gives us two truths regarding our stance towards politics and government.

The first truth is that the will of God permeates and supersedes every aspect of life. It is God's will that takes precedence over everything and everyone (Matthew 6:33). God's plans and purposes are fixed, and His will is inviolable. What He has purposed, He will bring to pass, and no government can thwart His will (Daniel 4:34-35). In fact, it is God who "sets up kings and deposes them" (Daniel 2:21) because "the Most High is sovereign over the kingdoms of men and gives them to anyone he wishes" (Daniel 4:17). A clear understanding of this truth will help us to see that politics is merely a method God uses to accomplish His will. Even though evil men abuse their political power, meaning it for evil, God means it for good, working "all things together for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28).

Second, we must grasp the fact that our government cannot save us! Only God can. We never read in the New Testament of Jesus or any of the apostles expending any time or energy schooling believers on how to reform the pagan world of its idolatrous, immoral, and corrupt practices via the government. The apostles never called for believers to demonstrate civil disobedience to protest the Roman Empire's unjust laws or brutal schemes. Instead, the apostles commanded the first -century Christians, as well as us today, to proclaim the gospel and live lives that give clear evidence to the gospel's transforming power.

There is no doubt that our responsibility to government is to obey the laws and be good citizens (<u>Romans 13:1–2</u>). God has established all authority, and He does so for our benefit, "to commend those who do right" (<u>1 Peter 2:13–15</u>). Paul tells us

in <u>Romans 13:1–8</u> that it is the government's responsibility to rule in authority over us—hopefully for

our good—to collect taxes, and to keep the peace. Where we have a voice and can elect our leaders, we should exercise that right by voting for those who best demonstrate Christian principles.

One of Satan's grandest deceptions is that we can rest our hope for cultural morality and godly living in politicians and governmental officials. A nation's hope for change is not to be found in any country's ruling class. The church has made a mistake if it thinks that it is the job of politicians to defend, to advance, and to guard biblical truths and Christian values.

The church's unique, God-given purpose does not lie in political activism. Nowhere in Scripture do we have the directive to spend our energy, our time, or our money in governmental affairs. Our mission lies not in changing the nation through political reform, but in changing hearts through the Word of God. When believers think the growth and influence of Christ can somehow be allied with government policy, they corrupt the mission of the church. Our Christian mandate is to spread the gospel of Christ and to preach against the sins of our time. Only as the hearts of individuals in a culture are changed by Christ will the culture begin to reflect that change.

Believers throughout the ages have lived, and even flourished, under antagonistic, repressive, pagan governments. This was especially true of the first-century believers who, under merciless political regimes, sustained their faith under immense cultural stress. They understood that it was they, not their governments, who were the light of the world and the salt of the earth. They adhered to Paul's teaching to obey their governing authorities, even to honor, respect, and pray for them (Romans 13:1-8). More importantly, they understood that, as believers, their hope resided in the protection that only God supplies. The same holds true for us today. When we follow the teachings of the Scriptures, we become the light of the world as God has intended for us to be (Matthew 5:16).

Political entities are not the savior of the world. The salvation for all mankind has been manifested in Jesus Christ. God knew that our world needed saving long before any national government was ever founded. He demonstrated to the world that redemption could not be accomplished through the power of man, economic strength, military might, or politics. Peace of mind, contentment, hope, and joy—and the salvation of mankind—are provided only through Jesus' death and resurrection. GOODNEWSLETTER

Voter Guide 2020: Everything you need to know about voting in Jefferson County, Kentucky

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — The <u>2020 general election</u> will be held Nov. 3, 2020. In Kentucky, there are several ways you can vote, both on Election Day and during the weeks leading up to it. Important Dates and Deadlines:

- Last day to register to vote: Oct. 5 at 4 p.m.
- First day to request an absentee ballot: Aug. 22
- Last day to request an absentee ballot: Oct. 9
- First day of early voting: Oct. 13
- Last day of early voting: Nov. 2

Election Day: Nov. 3, polls open 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Am I registered to vote?

If you aren't sure whether <u>you're registered to vote in Ken-</u> <u>tucky</u>, you can <u>check your registration online at GoVoteKy.com</u>. You can also <u>update your current registration</u> if you've changed addresses since the last election.

How do I vote?

In Kentucky, you can either vote absentee or in-person. Due to the <u>coronavirus pandemic</u>, more exceptions have been made than in previous years. More people are eligible to vote absentee and in-person voting will be open for three weeks before election day.

Absentee Voting

If you choose to vote absentee, you will need to request a ballot. The request form for an absentee ballot will be available on <u>Kentucky's online Voter Portal</u> starting Aug. 22 and ballots should be mailed out sometime in September. You can request a ballot through Oct. 9. Ballots can be returned through the mail or dropped off at a county clerk's office/or Drop Box Locations.

In-person Voting

You can vote in person on Nov. 3 or during the three weeks before

Election Day. Early in-person voting begins on Oct. 13 and polling locations will be open every weekday leading up to the election, as well as for four hours each Saturday.

On Nov. 3, polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

What do I need to bring?

If you're voting in person, you will need to bring <u>a form of iden-</u> tification with you.

Starting with the 2020 November election, Kentucky voters must present a valid photo ID, like a driver's license or student ID, in order to vote. 2Corinthians 5:21 "For He hath made Him to be sin for us, that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him."

-Forgiven of All Sin-

Colossians 2:13, "And you, being dead in your sins, and the uncircumcision of your flesh, hath He quickened together with Him, having forgiven you of all trespasses;"

There are two important truths we learn from this verse.

- Saints have been (past tense) Forgiven
- Forgiveness includes all sins

God forgave us the moment we trusted Christ and imparted forgiveness to the saints. Saints never need to be "reforgiven."

Ephesians 1:7, "In whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace;"

God tells us that we have (present tense) forgiveness of all our sins.

-Forgiveness According to Grace-

We have His forgiveness, "according to the riches of His grace." God's "grace" and the riches of His "grace" are found in the precious blood of Christ. It is because of His blood that God could accomplish the full and complete payment for our sin. It is by these riches that believers have already been forgiven.

Romans 5:20, "moreover the law entered, that the offense

might abound. But when sin abounded, grace did much more abound."

Where sin abounded, grace did much more abound! The riches of God's grace are greater than the depths that sin can go. Paul tells us that there is always more grace than sin. Not just more, but "much more!" Saints should have complete confidence in the riches of the grace of God to be more than sufficient to bring about their full and complete forgiveness.

-Forgiven for Christ's Sake-

Ephesians 4:32 "And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."

Christ's love sent Him to Calvary's cross to endure the agony and ultimately the penalty for every sin. It was Christ who sweat great drops of Blood in the Garden of Gethsemane as He prayed to the Father. It was Christ who willingly laid down His life to pay for our sin. It was Christ who was forsaken by God the Father when He became sin and satisfied the justice of a Holy God.

The work of the cross made full payment for sin and the work was finished by Christ. Christ proclaimed victory from His Cross with the words, "It is finished."
