- Their children must be followers of the Lord and not accused of wild, unruly living

From the Office of the A bishop (pastor) of a church in particular:

⁷ For a bishop must be blameless, as a steward of God, not self-willed, not quick-tempered, not given to wine, not violent, not greedy for money, ⁸ but hospitable, a lover of what is good, sober-minded, just, holy, self-controlled, ⁹ holding fast the faithful word as he has been taught, that he may be able, by sound doctrine, both to exhort and convict those who contradict.

- Have a good reputation as a steward of God
 (Superintendent, Overseer, Governor, Manager)
- ♦ Not self-willed (arrogant)
- ♦ Not quick-tempered (easily angered)
- ♦ Not a heavy drinker (drunkard)
- ♦ Not violent (Bully, contentious, guarrelsome)
- Not greedy for money (Will do anything/dishonest things for gain)
- Hospitable (Welcoming, friendly, and generous to guests)
- Love what is good
- ♦ Sober-minded (Sane, sound mind)
- ♦ Self-control (Curb his desires and impulses)
- ♦ Just (Equitable in the treatment of others)
- ♦ Holy (God-like character and conduct)
- ♦ Self-controlled
- ♦ Firm in the faith
- ♦ Sound in doctrine
- ♦ Able to exhort (encourage) and convict (convince)

WELCOME TO GREATER SALEM PASTOR CARL JONES AND FIRST LADY CARMEN JONES


ev. Carl Jones was born in Millen, Georgia and raised by his widowed $lue{\Gamma}$ mother along with seven siblings in south Florida. He was the first in his family to attend college and earned an Associate Degree in Architecture from Broward Community College in Fort Lauderdale.

He began preaching at the West Lauderdale Baptist Church in Fort Lauderdale, Florida and was licensed to the Gospel Ministry under the pastorate of Rev. Donald LeMaster. In 1975, he moved to Louisville to attend the Boyce Bible College of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Upon arriving in Louisville, he became a member of West End Baptist Church and was ordained under the pastorate of Rev. Lincoln N. Bingham, October 3, 1976, and served as an associate minister until 1979. He received a Diploma in Christian Ministry from Boyce Bible School in 1977, a Doctor of Divinity degree from Simmons Bible College in 1995, and a Diploma from the Theological Seminary of Zimbabwe, South Africa in 2008.

In October 1979, he was called to pastor Forest Baptist Church in Newburg and served there until June 1989 when he heeded to the call to serve as a missionary associate for the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist

Convention. His missionary role included work as Superintendent of Missions for Central District Baptist Association and Director of the Baptist Fellowship Center, pulpit supply preacher, and interim pastor for several local congregations. In 1990, his was asked to serve as Interim Pastor of Green Street Baptist Church. The following year Green Street extended the call to him to be their 8th pastor. Pastor Jones was installed as pastor of Green Street on September 2, 1991, and retired on August 31, 2020

By the grace of God, Rev. Jones has also served as President of the Newburg Ministerial Association, Chairman of the Joint Committee of Baptist Fellowship Center, President of the Board of Directors of Baptist Fellowship Center, President of the Central District and Long Run Baptist Association Joint Com-

February 2022 Health Notes: Bits and Pieces

From the Nurses Ministry

BOOSTER

Bits and Pieces

Below are bits and pieces of information that may be helpful to you in 2022.

When to call 911 or seek medical attention immediately:

One of your most powerful tools is your own observation. If your instinct tells you it's serious, call 911 or go to the nearest emergency room. Do not drive yourself.

- Chest Pain or pressure that lasts more than a couple of minutes, or if it comes back, call 911.
- Shortness of breath that happens suddenly and is keeping you from your everyday activities.
- Burns that cover a large part of your hands, feet, face, or other body parts. If you have blisters, splotchy skin or if your skin is charred or white.
- For a child less than 6 years old Vomiting that lasts more than a few hours.
- Head injury. If you pass out, have a seizure or headache that won't go away, persistent vomiting or nausea, feel confused, weak, less coordinated.
- Stomach pain that lasts more than 30 minutes especially if it's sudden and intense.
- A baby younger than 3 months old with a temperature of more than 100.4 F should be seen right away. This is also true for a child between 3 months and 3 years old with a fever of 102.2 and an adult with a fever of 104 or higher.
- If you take blood thinning medication, even a minor injury can be serious. Call 911 if you have an injury and your heart rate or breathing becomes fast, you have trouble breathing, feel faint or dizzy.

<u>Spot a stroke F.A.S.T.</u>

FACE DROOPING

Does one side of the face droop or is it numb? Ask the person to smile.

ARM WEAKNESS

Is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

SPEECH DIFFICULTY

Is speech slurred, are they unable to speak, or are they hard to understand? Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence, like "the sky is blue." Is the sentence repeated correctly?

TIME TO CALL 911

If the person shows any of these symptoms, even if the symptoms go away, call 911 and get them to the hospital immediately.

THOU SHALT LOVE THY NEIGHBOR AS THYSELF.


This Bible study concentrates on 1 Corinthians 13 and Romans chapter 12. These chapters are sometimes called "the love chapters" and they show that the main thing we should focus on, next to Christ, is in how we treat one another. Our actions betray our hearts, for good or for bad, and if we treat others and even esteem others better than ourselves, then we are fulfilling the royal law to love our neighbor as ourselves (James 2:8). Of course we don't have trouble loving ourselves.

We nurture, care for, provide for, and yes, even pamper ourselves but do we treat others in this same way? The first and greatest commandment is to love God (Matt 22:37), "And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt 22:39). Luke chapter 6 is also a superb example of not only how we treat one another but how we treat even those who are our enemies.



The Fleming parents taught their children honesty, respect, value of education and being churched

The holiday season is an exciting time to bring family and friends together. Before you know it, you're heading down memory lane, reminiscing, sharing childhood memories and reflecting on the past. The Fleming family is no exception. Growing up in Shelbyville's black community with a house full, eight siblings and two loving parents, there are a lot of stories to share. Of the eight siblings, only James and Margaret have passed away. Through a collection of conversations, e-mails, and phone calls the six remaining Fleming siblings, ranging in age from late 80s to late 90s remembers what it was like growing up on Henry Clay, Bradshaw streets and Martinsville.

Frances, Anna, Lina, Willie "Billy," Bessie and Ollie shared some of their childhood memories: the importance their parents placed on education; the responsibilities their parents gave them when they were growing up; what career paths they took, and how proud they are with their children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. They also offered some words of wisdom. There is a shared belief that, "it takes a village to raise a child."

"Neighbors would watch over us back in those days, it was a real sense of a village," explains Lina Fleming Wiggington, the fifth sibling. "William Newton and Bessie Payne Fleming were role model parents who raised us to

be respectful of every adult person, for we knew we would be corrected at any time by anyone," explains sixth child Ollie Fleming Hackett. She remembers the constant love and direction that guided the children throughout the day, as Mother Bessie worked from home.

When our elders share their childhood memories it's like getting an oral history lesson. What's the old saying, "The family that plays together stays together." That holds true as Anna Lee recalls





how they loved it when their father would take the family fishing at the creek near the Depot Dam. The memories of playing baseball on Bradshaw, behind the Saffell Funeral home, to sleigh rides down Fourth Street offers an insight into what the eight siblings did and the fun they had growing up playing outside, as children once did. Anna Lee remembers that they could play outside late because it was hot in the house in the summer, and they didn't have the modern convenience of air conditioning. They were also highly active in church at Bethel AME and St. John United Methodist.

History of Fifth Street Baptist Church*

First Baptist Church in the city of Louisville was a White congregation; now known as Walnut Street Baptist Church.
This organization had its beginning in the

year 1815; just five years after Louisville became a city. As was the custom in most southern communities, Negro slaves were admitted as members, with very limited privileges and assigned to seats in the balcony.

In the year 1829, on the first Sunday in November, 18 slave members were given letters of demission and were granted privilege of worshipping to themselves, "under their vine and fig tree", which was described as swampy and difficult to reach (U of L archives).

The location of the new church was in the neighborhood of 8th and Market. But in the year 1829, a call was extended to Rev. Henry Adams, a highly educated Negro, living in Georgia. Under this leadership, the congregation continued to grow, and soon new quarters were sought. In 1833, a White friend, by the name of Benjamin Stansburg, deeded to the congregation a lot at Fifth and York Streets, where upon the first building owned by Negroes, in the city of Louisville, was erected. The congregation continued to grow in favor with God and man.

In fullness of time there arose a need for more commodious quarters, which was fulfilled by the availability of a building on Fifth Street, between Walnut and Chestnut. The First Christian Church, having moved to another location, sold the property to the First Colored Baptist Church for the sum of \$5,000. By 1845, the name of the church had changed to Fifth Street Baptist Church but the congregation remained the same.

The Rev. Henry Adams departed this life in the year of our Lord 1872, after having served as Pastor for 33 years. The General Association, first known as the State Convention, was organized August 15, 1865, at Fifth Street Baptist Church. Also, the first school for Negroes in the city of Louisville was organized and taught by the Rev. Adams at Fifth Street Baptist Church. Rev. Adams was also instrumental in organizing the Colored Baptists Church of Jeffersontown, KY.

The Rev, Andrew H. Heath, a son of the church, and protégé of Rev. Adams, was called to shoulder the burdens of pastoring (1872-1886). It is reliably reported that Rev. Heath's administration was phenomenally successful. The Baptist Women's Educational Convention was organized during his administration on September 18, 1883. Rev. Heath was a zealous worker, consecrated and dedicated to the Gospel ministry. His health soon became impaired, and after fourteen years of grueling toil, he was laid to rest.

Following a precedent already established, another son of the church, the Rev. John H. Frank, was elevated to the high position of leadership. The membership grew to and unprecedented high early in this administration. The Baptist Women's Convention

had its inception there, as well as the National Baptist Convention of America, the Laymen's League of Kentucky, and the City-Wide Deacons' Union.

Dr. Frank had the longest tenure of office, serving as Pastor fifty years, after which time the church made him Pastor-Emeritus. As such, he remained among us for another two years. After life's long fitful fever has ended, he too was laid to rest, just six days after the passing of his son John, Jr. March 23, 1941, which brought to a close one of the most outstanding pastorates among Negro Baptists.

The church extended a call to the Rev. W. Augustus Jones, who was pastoring the Pinn Memorial Baptist Church of Philadelphia, PA. Rev. Jones was a son of the church, having been nurtured and trained by the late Dr. Frank. Rev. Jones accepted the call and began his ministry midyear of 1937. For 19 years, Rev. Jones toiled among the people, endeavoring to rehabilitate the work and bring about reforms vitally necessary in these modern times.

Dr. Jones, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, not only paid off the indebtedness incurred from remodeling the Fifth Street site, but also brought us to this present site in 1949. When Dr. Jones retired in 1956, the church made him Pastor-Emeritus, and voted to him a lifelong pension. Fifth Street has had some outstanding laymen— male and female representatives in all the high walk of life. The late William H. Steward was perhaps "the noblest Roman of them all". He was Secretary of the General Association of Kentucky Baptists for more than fifty years, and Secretary of the National Baptist Convention, Inc. On January 4, 1935, he departed the walks of men and passed on to his eternal reward.

After the retirement of Dr. Jones, the Rev. J. Walter Ramsey, by vote of the church was chosen as acting pastor and held forces together until the church extended a call to Rev. W. J. Hodge Pastor of the Diamond Hill Baptist Church in Lynchburg, Virginia on April 12, 1957. Of his many accomplishments, the planning and construction of the J.O. Blanton House and the H. Temple Spears Apartments stand out. Under his guidance, the church added a new wing that included a Pastor and Secretary's office, dining facilities, a kitchen, and additional space for Sunday School. Other physical additions are central air conditioning and new buses. Rev. W.J. Hodge served as Pastor for 38 years. On December 26, 2000, Dr. W.J. Hodge also departed from us to a building not made by man.

Rev. Phillip L. Hodge, Sr., a son of the church, was called in 1995. Since Rev. Phillip L. Hodge came to historic Fifth Street, the former parsonage next door has been renovated and re-opened as the Marian T. Hodge Center for Excellence, where programs for the church as well as the community are flourishing. With acquiring the lot next to the church, the parking lot has also been expanded. His seventeenth anniversary was celebrated in July and the new "Fifth", as he fondly speaks of it, is growing both spiritually and physically.

Other noteworthy accomplishments for Fifth Street are: In 1866 it began a movement for a hospital for freed slaves. In the 1870s the revolutionized the concept of social welfare by assigning a deacon to supervise the visitation in each of the city's wards. It provided boxes of clothing for the poor members and gave financial support to destitute members during the 1873 depression. By June 1876 the church was able to give \$3 a week to the poor, comparable to a laborer's weekly wage. The church gave annual financial support to and held fund-raising drives for the Colored Orphan's Home and St. James home for the elderly. The church also sponsored missionary work in Africa and established several branch missions, some of which became churches. Our current location is only the 4th in our church history.

Green Street Baptist Church History*



Green Street Baptist Church began in the early part of 1844. The church's initial efforts, was to organize the second African-American church in Louisville, Ky. In fact, "Second African Baptist Church" would have been the name of the church. On April

28, 1844, thoughts and discussions of creating more Baptist churches for coloured people, was held in a meeting by several leaders involved in the community and church. The first written records of the efforts are found at Green Street Baptist Church (Second African Baptist Church), Fifth Street Baptist Church (First African Baptist Church), and Walnut Street Baptist Church (First Baptist Church). It reads, "We this church, has been informed that a certain minister intends to establish a second coloured Baptist church in this city. Forthwith, now while we would be pleased to do anything in our power to promote the cause of Christ, yet we believe such a movement in the bounds and under the sanction of this church at the present time, and under existing circumstance would be hazardous and likely to produce much mischief to the Baptist cause among the coloured community in this place. Therefore, resolved, that in the opinion of this church for us to encourage or sanction such a measure at this time would be inexpedient and unwise. Resolved, that any minister or members of this church who shall hereafter engage in any measures of this

kind under existing circumstances will be regarded by the church as acting contrary to good order."

The written records also state that First Baptist Church (Walnut Street Baptist Church) conducted a regular meeting on July 20, 1844, which they discussed "Second African Baptist Church". The record reads: "A communication was received from Brother George Wells, a man of colour, who has been preaching for some time past to people of colour in the city. A committee was appointed to consider the request." Brother George Wells' request was not approved during this meeting. The final decision of Brother George Wells' request, was made on September 25, 1844 during a call meeting, which was held by First Baptist Church. The record reads, "On motion was voted that Brother George Wells, a man of colour, be received into the church and be encouraged to go on with his ministerial labours to our coloured friends in the city and that Brethren Heth, Bagley, Clark, Hampton, and Wilson be appointed a committee to advise and superintend Brother Wells in his labour."

The Protection Committee was given their first assignment. On September 29, 1844, twenty-eight African Americans met for the constitution of the Second African Baptist Church (Green Street Baptist Church). On the first Sunday, in January of 1848, Second African Baptist Church moved into its new home, which is located on the north side of Green Street (It is called Liberty Street today) between Preston Street and Floyd Street. The church bought the building from Brother William C. Buck and the East Baptist Church for \$2,815. The building was the worship site for East Baptist Church for six years. Second African Baptist Church struggled financially. The upkeep of the building was a sacrifice for a small group of black believers during slavery. However, with the blessing of the Lord, the church grew, and the property was paid for in four years.

Although the church grew and had a membership of 280 people, it lost a member. Brother George E. Wells died in 1850. The new leader of the church was Reverend Caddie. Second African Baptist Church had plenty of success as they grew. In fact, three churches were organized as independent churches by Second African Baptist Church—Forest Baptist Church (Newburg Baptist Church) in 1873, First Baptist Church (Anchorage Baptist Church) in 1874, and Hill Street Baptist Church in 1896. The church also voted to allow George Thomas to organize the first choir.

As the church grew and changed, so did the leaders, location and name of the church. The church would be called Green Street Baptist Church soon and the new church would be at 519 East Gray Street. The church's Building Fund Committee hired a local black firm of Plato & Evans to construct the new building. The cost of the construction was \$100,000. A ground-breaking ceremony was held in conjunction with the 1928 National Baptist Convention, to allow the president of the convention and others to participate. On Sunday, September 28, 1930, the last service was conducted in the "old church", which had been home for 86 years. The members proudly marched from Green Street to Gray Street. With a lingering depression and a mortgage, the church faced financial hardships. However, with prayer, sacrifice, dedication, and vigilance, the pastor, officers, and members worked to pay the mortgage. On September 24, 1944, with cause to commemorate and celebrate, Green Street observed its Centennial and burned the mortgage.

Green Street was also actively involved in the struggle for civil rights for blacks as early as 1886. The church circulated a petition urging the state legislature to pass a Civil Rights Bill. In 1893 and 1919, Green Street hosted meetings and participated in the successful movement to defeat the efforts to segregate the public transportation system in Louisville. The church joined the Interracial Commission headed by Dr. James Bond in 1920. Green Street was one of the first institutions to give support to the 1961 student led sit-in movement to desegregate public accommodations in Louisville when three of its members, Raoul Cunningham, John Arnold, and Lawrence Williams were among the first five arrested. On August 3, 1967, Green Street hosted a city-wide rally to encourage blacks to register and vote. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. spoke and made his last appearance in Louisville at this rally.

Today, the church is a member of the East Louisville Community Ministry, the West Louisville Community Ministry, and holds Lifetime Membership in the NAACP...... Green Street has been blessed. It is one of the few African American churches possessing a complete history of existence. During one hundred and fifty years, the church has been led by eight pastors (Ed. Note -inc. Pasor Carl Jones). Three pastors served until death, and two voluntarily retired after more than thirty-five years of service. Green Street has never had a split in membership and has always settled differences of opinion according to the New Testament doctrines and Baptist principles





- 1 cup pearled barley
- ½ cup sundried tomatoes
- 1 Tbsp dry minced garlic
- 1 Tbsp dry minced onion
- 1 veggie bouillon cube
- Glass pint jars with lids Cardstock
- Scissors
- Pen

- 1. In order, layer the first five ingredients into the jar.
- 2. Trace the outline of the lid onto cardstock. Cut out.
