**December 13 , 1636**

The National Guard was founded on December 13th, 1636 and had its first drill on the village green in Salem, Massachusetts. This military tradition was taken from England and was designed as a way for citizens to organize themselves for securing the common defense of villages and towns. It was originally known merely as the militia, but in 1916 its name was changed to the National Guard. Over the past 384+ years since they’ve been first established, they have not only secured the defense of local, state, and national assets but have also helped with natural disasters, moments of civil unrest, and have served in major wars.

**Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day**

Each year on Dec. 7, Pearl Harbor Survivors, veterans, and visitors from all over the world come together to honor and remember the 2,403 service members and civilians who were killed during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. An additional 1,178 people were injured in the attack, which permanently sank two U.S. Navy battleships (the USS Arizona and the USS Utah) and destroyed 188 aircraft. On Aug. 23, 1994, the United States Congress designated Dec. 7 as **National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day**. Every year on December 7, WWII veterans and Pearl Harbor survivors commemorate the attack with services across the U.S. This year, the commemoration theme for the day is “Above and Beyond the Call” and there was a ceremony held at the Pearl Harbor visitor centre in Hawaii. Due to the coronavirus pandemic, the Pearl Harbor service this year was closed to the public to protect the veterans attending the event. Instead, the event was live streamed via the National Park Service Facebook page at 11.30am on Monday.

### National, State, & Local News

As I write this, we still do not have an agreed to National Defense Authorization Bill. We are operating under another Continuing Resolution which is due to expire on December 11th. It appears that one of the major disagreement relates to the renaming of several Army bases that are currently named for Confederate soldiers. The language in the Democratic version requires the renaming within one year while the Republicans want more time. The President has threatened to veto any bill that requires the renaming. Of critical interest to MOAA are three things that are currently in the bill. First a fair pay raise for active-duty military. Second is stopping the restructuring of Military Treatment Facilities. The last item is the addition of three new diseases to the Agent Orange pre-condition list. By the time you read this we will either have a bill, have a CRA or a government shutdown. The last two items are very undesirable. As for the future with a new administration, who knows? I would not believe the doomsday rumors until they are solid proposals by the congress or by the Presidents Executive order. More on this in January.

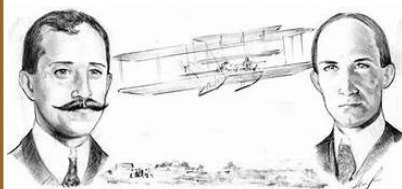
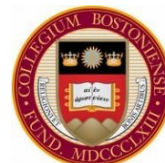
### COVID-19 Vaccine Planning - Frequently Asked Questions for Veterans

**Sarkis H. Kavookjian**, Colonel, USAF Retired, of Stillwaters in Dadeville, Alabama passed away peacefully after stroke complications at the age of 88 (February 10, 1932 – November 23, 2020). Sark was born as the son of hard working Armenian immigrant parents, and grew up in the Boston suburb of Somerville, Massachusetts. He frequently told his children and grandchildren stories about skipping school as a child and sneaking into Fenway Park to watch Ted Williams and the Boston Red Sox practice. After graduating from Somerville High School, Sark attended Boston College and graduated from Syracuse University. He entered the Air Force and served as a Navigator for the B-29 bomber during the Korean War. He then went to pilot training and flew transport airplanes in the Military Airlift Command (MAC), including the C-141 in the Vietnam War. He next flew the C-5 as the initial cadre (the elite pilots first selected), and flew the first C-5 from assembly line to delivery at an Air Force base (Altus, Oklahoma), eventually becoming their Squadron Commander. His career in the Air Force spanned nearly three decades with several command positions, culminating as Deputy Commander of Operations for the 436th Airlift Wing at Dover Air Force Base in Dover, Delaware, where he served for over two years before retiring in 1978. He had previously earned his MBA at Auburn University in Montgomery in the early 1970s while attending the Air War College, and earned his PhD from Temple University after retirement from the Air Force. His second career included teaching at community colleges in Delaware, including Delaware Technical and Community College, where his teaching touched the lives of many students and colleagues. In the mid-1990s, Sark moved near family in Alabama and enjoyed his retirement golfing and fishing on the lake; he also participated in and taught classes for several years in Auburn University's Adult Lifetime Learning program (now OLLI). He was a lifetime member of the Air Force Association and attended the Lake Martin Living Waters Church. Sark was preceded in death by his parents, Harry Sarkis Kavookjian and Sina Dinjian Kavookjian, his very close uncle and aunt, Mihran Kavookjian and Marie Zolmian Kavookjian, his sister Mary Kavookjian Danielian (George), and his former late wife, Patty Jones Kavookjian of Albany, Georgia.



### Wright Brothers Day

**Wright Brothers Day** is a United States national observation. It is codified in the US Code and commemorates the first successful flights in a heavier-than-air, mechanically propelled airplane, that were made by Orville and Wilbur Wright on December 17, 1903, near Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. On September 24, 1959 U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower declared **December 17** to be Wright Brothers Day. Wright Brothers Day was announced as an official commemorative day in Ohio, on October 5, 2011, celebrating 100 years of practical flight for the



**December, a month that encompasses the Christian and Jewish celebrations of Christmas and Hanukkah, includes spiritually significant days for Muslims, Buddhists, Pagans and Zoroastrians. There are also secular events and traditions that are celebrated during this “most wonderfully holy time of the year”.**

EVENT/ DATE	DESCRIPTION
<p><u><b>Ashura</b></u> December 5th</p> 	<p>Ashura, the 10th day of the first month on the Islamic calendar. Sunnis, the largest group of Muslims, remember that the Prophet Muhammad fasted in solidarity with Jews who were observing Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement.</p>
<p><u><b>St Nicholas' Day</b></u> December 6th</p> 	<p>Some Christians revere the fourth-century bishop of Myra, a Greek province in Asia Minor. His reputation for piety may have inspired the legend of Santa Claus. The tradition of leaving gifts for children on St. Nicholas Day began in the Low Countries and spread to North America with Dutch immigrants.</p>
<p><u><b>Bodhi Day</b></u> December 8th</p> 	<p>Bodhi Day is the Buddhist holiday that commemorates the day that the historical Buddha, <u>Siddhartha Gautama</u> (Shakyamuni), experienced <u>enlightenment</u>, also known as <u>bodhi</u> in <u>Sanskrit</u> and <u>Pali</u>.</p>
<p><u><b>Feast of the Immaculate Conception</b></u> December 8th</p> 	<p>Roman Catholics observe this day as the feast of the Immaculate Conception, believing that Mary, the mother of Jesus, was born without sin.</p>
<p><u><b>Chanukah/ Hanukkah</b></u> December 10th -18th</p> 	<p>Chanukah/Hanukkah which is a Jewish holiday that celebrates the liberation of Jerusalem from the occupation of Antiochus IV, king of the Seleucid Empire in 165 BCE. Hanukkah is an eight-day Jewish festival with the first day known as Chanukah, Festival of Lights, and Feast of Dedication. In the Gregorian calendar, Hanukkah may occur between late November to late December.</p>
<p><u><b>Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe</b></u> December 12th</p> 	<p>This is a primarily Catholic holiday celebrated by Mexicans and Americans of Mexican descent that honors the reported appearance of the Virgin Mary in Mexico City.</p>
<p><u><b>Yule/Winter Solstice/Wicca/ Pagan</b></u> December 21st</p> 	<p>Yule or winter solstice is the point in the year "when the earth is most inclined away from the sun. It is the most southern or northern point depending on the hemisphere. Juul, a pre-Christian festival observed in Scandinavia, featured fires lit to symbolize the heat, light and life-giving properties of the returning sun. Pagans and Wicca believers will celebrate that event through Yule, in which believers also honor "<u>the winter-born king, symbolized by the rebirth of the sun</u>. Scholars have connected the original celebrations of Yule to the Wild Hunt, the god Odin, and the pagan Anglo-Saxon Mōdraniht.</p>

<p><b><u>Christmas Day</u></b></p> <p><b>December 25th</b></p> 	<p>Christmas is primarily a Christian holiday that celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ. Many will attend church, have family parties, and exchange gifts. Many of the traditions surrounding the Christmas holiday revolve around the Nativity Story, or the story of Jesus’ birth. However, Christmas is also celebrated by non-Christians as a civil holiday and is an integral part of the holiday season, which involves Santa Clause, reindeers, and the North Pole. The Christmas holiday season accounts for almost 20% of the total annual retail sales in the United States.</p>
<p><b><u>Kwanzaa</u></b></p> <p><b>December 26th January 1st</b></p> 	<p>Kwanzaa is a week-long observance in the United States and other countries with populations of African descendants that celebrates and honors African culture. Most Kwanzaa celebrations are based on Nguzo Saba – or the seven principles of Kwanzaa.</p>
<p><b><u>Boxing Day</u></b></p> <p><b>December 26th</b></p> 	<p>Boxing Day is a holiday celebrated the day after Christmas Day, thus being the second day of Christmastide. It originated in the United Kingdom and celebrated by Commonwealth countries, particularly Australia, Canada, and New Zealand. Originally, on this day, servants, tradespeople, and the poor traditionally were presented with gifts. Boxing Day has come to be a day of sporting events, including horse races, foxhunting, and rugby.</p>
<p><b><u>Zarathosht Diso (Death of Prophet Zarathustra)</u></b></p> <p><b>December 26th</b></p> 	<p>An important day of remembrance in the Zoroastrian religion. It is a commemoration of the death anniversary of the prophet Zoroaster. It is an occasion of remembrance with lectures and discussions held on the life and works of the prophet. Special prayers are recited and attendance at the fire temple is extremely high.</p>
<p><b><u>Holy Innocents Day</u></b></p> <p><b>December 28th</b></p> 	<p>Christians solemnly honor the <u>deaths of children killed by King Herod</u>, who was attempting to kill Jesus, according to Interfaith Calendar.</p>
<p><b><u>Watch Night-Christian</u></b></p> <p><b>December 31st</b></p> 	<p>A watchnight service is a late-night Christian church service. In many different Christian traditions, such as those of Moravians, Baptists, Methodists, Anglicans and Pentecostals, watchnight services are held late on New Year’s Eve.</p>
<p><b><u>New Year's Eve</u></b></p> <p><b>December 31st</b></p> 	<p>One of the biggest and most prominent tradition in the U.S is the dropping of the ball in Times Square, New York. It is an event that is watched by people from around the world. It features a gigantic ball (weighing almost 12,000 lbs. and measuring 12 feet in diameter) made from Waterford Crystal dropping from the top of a seventy-foot pole in the last minute before New Years. When it reaches the ground, it is exactly 12 Midnight Eastern Time. At this time, everyone grabs their significant other and plants a big wet kiss on them.</p>

## TAKE ACTION

These important issues require your immediate attention. Send your elected officials a MOAA-suggested message today.

### **Pass a Budget to Avoid Damage Caused By Continuing Resolutions**

Continuing resolutions stall plans to modernize DoD and improve the lives of servicemembers, military families, retirees, and veterans. New programs receive no funds while outdated ones limp forward. Looming shutdowns put some servicemembers' pay at risk. Ask your lawmakers to pass a budget before the current continuing resolution expires on Dec. 11, 2020.

### **Ask Your Lawmaker to Help Expand Benefits for Vietnam Veterans Exposed to Agent Orange**

The Senate version of the FY 2021 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) would expand the VA benefits available to Vietnam veterans exposed to herbicides such as Agent Orange, adding medical conditions scientifically linked to such exposure.

### **Urge Your Lawmakers to Support FY21 NDAA Provisions to Stop Cuts to Military Medicine**

Act now to urge your elected officials to support FY21 NDAA legislation that will halt cuts to military medicine and increase congressional oversight of these efforts.

### **Ask Your Elected Officials to Pass the FY 2021 NDAA**

The FY 2021 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) contains important provisions that impact servicemembers, veterans, their families, and survivors. These include: a military pay increase, a halt to military treatment facility (MTF) restructuring and medical billet cuts, the addition of three Agent Orange presumptive illnesses, and other important sections. Please contact your elected officials and urge them to support the final bill's passage.

## Contact Your Representatives

### **Protect Gold Star spouses during future shutdowns**

Under current law, Gold Star spouses receiving benefits from the Department of Defense are protected from interruptions in payments during a government shutdown. But because Coast Guard paychecks come from the Department of Homeland Security, these survivors are still at risk.

### **Urge your legislators to support concurrent receipt**

Contact your representative and senators and urge them to support H.R. 5995, the Maj. Richard Star Act, and the companion S. 3393 -- which would provide concurrent receipt for servicemembers unable to complete 20 years of service due to their combat-related injuries. Help ensure these men and women get their full service-earned retirement, as well as their disability compensation from the VA.

### **Act now to extend CHAMPVA coverage**

Did you know many adult children of veterans who are disabled or who died from a service-connected disability risk losing their health care through no fault of their own during the COVID-19 pandemic?

### **American-made Meds for Troops and More Oversight of Foreign-Made Drugs**

Our nation increasingly relies on generic medications manufactured outside the U.S. Unfortunately, this reliance includes the associated medication manufacturing processes and ingredients, which are not under the strict scrutiny of the FDA.

**FYI:** If you are wearing a non-disposable cloth mask to prevent the spread of Covid-19, be sure to wash your mask in hot water and soap, scrubbing at least 20 seconds.
