His major awards include the Bronze Star, the Meritorious Service

Medal, and the Afghanistan Campaign Medal.

National Medal of Honor Day is on March 25th and it is the day the nation honors the valor that the most courageous servicemen and servicewomen in the United States military have displayed. Awarded by the President of the United States, only military members who have gone above and beyond the call of duty will receive this distinction. There are actually three different versions of the Medal of Honor, for the Army, the Navy,



and the Air Force, though Coast Guard members and Marines are also eligible to earn the Navy version. To date, there have been 3,468 Medals of Honor awarded to those who fight to keep our country safe – and March 25th is the day to honor their exemplary service.



We commemorate those who fought in the Vietnam War on **National Vietnam War Veterans Day, March 29th**. There's no doubt that the Vietnam War was one of the most brutal. In fact, over three million people were killed during the 20 years it went on. It was known as the Second Indochina War to Americans, and considering its long fighting time and brutality, **National Vietnam War Veterans Day** was created to honor all the men and women who fought during its time. Aside from honoring those who fought, four other parts of this day that

are meant to be highlighted are the service of the Armed Forces and support organizations during the war; the wartime contributions at home; the advancements in technology, science, and medicine; and the contributions by American allies. https://nationaltoday.com/national-vietnam-war-veterans-day/

National, State, & Local News

At different times folks ask, "Why should I join MOAA". Below are 12 good reasons.

MOAA engages with Congress on all manner of issues related to the uniformed services community. These efforts can include collaboration with other like-minded organizations and with The Military Coalition. We also rely heavily on our members who make their voices heard by contacting lawmakers via <u>MOAA's Legislative Action Center</u>, by participating in our annual signature advocacy event, and through local efforts at the level. For <u>more than</u> <u>90 years</u>, this work has led to real results – pay and benefits protected from budget-driven threats, continued access to quality medical care, and countless other areas of concern to our members, our military, and the wider uniformed services community. No list could encompass everything MOAA's achieved since 1929, but below, you'll find some of the highlights. Click the links for details on each of the items (or scroll below the boxes to see the full list), and reach out to MOAA's legislative team at <u>legis@moaa.org</u> to discuss your concerns on these or other topics. Note: Items with an asterisk (*) are reoccurring under attack or under resourced.

- <u>Repealing SBP-DIC offset</u>, known as the 'Widows Tax' saving up to \$12,000 per year for nearly 67,000 surviving spouses.
- Executing a credible game plan for oversight of DoD's health care protecting continued access to quality care.*
- Securing comprehensive privatized military housing reform improving housing, establishing Tenant Bill of Rights, and Congressional oversight.*
- Lessening impact of TRICARE fee hikes (Family = \$300 vice \$900) fighting multiple efforts to end grandfathering for those who entered service before Jan. 1, 2018.*
- Protecting TRICARE For Life (TFL) blocked five consecutive administration budgets proposing TFL enrollment fees (2013-2017).*
- Maintaining pay raise comparability ensuring pay raises for our uniformed services keep pace with civilian sector increases.*
- Providing Wounded Warrior protections and caregiver enhancements

 securing multiple improvements to VA caregiver programs.*
- Defeating 'COLA Minus 1 Percent' ending Congressional attempts to reduce retired pay, costing an E-7 retiring after 20 years \$83,000, and an O-5 \$124,000, by age 62.*
- Securing major GI Bill upgrades to include transferability and improving benefits for National Guard on Title 32 orders.*
- Boosting compensation significantly for retirees with 50% VA disability still fighting for the rest to include those medically retired.*
- + Improving Guard and Reserve TRICARE coverage and securing a premium cut.
- Ensuring Guard and Reserve retirement age credit for active duty service now allowing 90 days to stretch over two consecutive years.

Chris Richie



The Uniform Time Act of 1966 established the system of uniform daylight saving time throughout the US.

Julius Caesar

The luck of the Irish and all things green is celebrated on St. Patrick's Day on March 17th every year. Initially a day to honor patron saint St. Patrick of Ireland, over time the holiday has evolved into a fun and festive celebration of Irish culture.

National K9 Veterans Day, March 13th, is a day set aside to honor and commemorate the service and sacrifices of American military and working dogs. On March 13, 1942, the Army began training for its new War Dog Program, also known as the "K-9 Corps," marking the first time that dogs were officially a part of the U.S. Armed Forces. Border Patrol K9s, Customs K9s, Police K9s, Secret Service K9s, Airport Service K9s and FBI K9s work daily to serve and protect Americans and the homeland. K9 Veterans Day was created by Joe White of Jacksonville, Florida. He was a Vietnam War veteran, K9 handler and trainer. https://militarybenefits.info/k9-veterans-day/

March 15th, the Ides of March, was originally the date on which Romans settled their debts. Other ancient traditions on this day included the slaughter of a sheep, the 'Ides sheep', by Jupiter's high priest; the feats of Anna Perenna, the goddess of the year, to celebrate the first full moon of the year with drinking, picnics, and lively festivities; and in the 'holy week' of festivals during the Imperial Period, which celebrated the goddess Cybele and the god Attis. The unlucky pall over the Ides of March has a more portentous tie to ancient Rome. Roman Emperor Julius Caesar was famously unlucky on the Ides of March in 44 B.C. when he was assassinated by his senators, fearing their ruler was becoming a dictator.

St. Patrick's Day is celebrated in more countries around the world than any other single-day national festival, largely due to America's enthusiasm for what many consider a holiday, although it is not an

official holiday in America.

FIVE SURPRISING FACTS ABOUT THE PATRON SAINT PATRICK

- + St. Patrick was not an Irishman He was born Maewyn Succat around 385 A.D., son of a Christian church deacon and wealthy family, in Britain which was under the rule of the Roman Empire at that time. He chose the name Patricious after he became a priest.
- + He arrived in Ireland as a slave The rich kid was kidnapped from Britain at the age of 16 by a band of raiders who enslaved him as a shepherd in Gaelic Ireland for six years, during which time he converted to Christianity.
- + He was a saint, but not really Although Patrcious is known as Saint Patrick and is the most beloved of all patron saints of Ireland, he has never been formally canonized as a saint by the Catholic Church.
- Patrick did not rid Ireland of snakes He could not have done this because there have never been any snakes on the island nation of Ireland. This is a folklore legend.
- + Four-leaf clovers are never shamrocks The 4-leaf clover being lucky has nothing to do with St. Patrick. Legend has it that Patrick used a green plant with three leaves, commonly called a shamrock, to teach the Christian concept of the Holy Trinity. Only a 3-leaf clover can be a shamrock; a clover with more or fewer leaves is never a shamrock.
