The Silver Star is described as the third-highest military decoration for valor in combat and is typically awarded for actions over a short-term and may be earned for specific acts in combat. Compare that to

other types of medals for longer-term service, the Meritorious Service Medal, for example, which is awarded at the end of a military tour when conditions warrant.

National, State, & Local News

Occasionally I will be asked "What is MOAA doing for me". Here is the list of their priorities. As you can see these are a mix of active duty and retiree issues. In my case, several of them will directly affect me and I suspect will also affect you. When you receive a request to contact your legislators please take the time to do that. We are 350,000 strong and our voice can be heard if we all speak up.

- Protect the Value of the Military Health Care Benefit
- + Protect the MHS Pharmacy Benefit and Achieve Flexibility in TRICARE Pharmacy Copays
- + Address Barriers to Accessing Care Within the MHS, Including TRICARE Coverage Gaps and Mental Health Care Access Challenges
- + Achieve Concurrent Receipt of Service-Earned Retirement Pay and VA Disability Pay
- + <u>Protect Family Support Programs, and Ensure Military-Provided Services (Housing, PCS, Child Care) Are Affordable, Readily Available, and Meet Quality Standards</u>
- + Reform the Presumptive Process to Support Veterans Claiming Service-Connected Disabilities for Toxic Exposures
- + Achieve Equity of Benefits, Protections and Administrative Support for Guard/Reserve Members Consistent With Their Active Duty Counterparts
- + Sustain Veterans Health Administration (VHA) Foundational Missions and Services
- + <u>Protect Arlington National Cemetery as an Option for Those Currently Eligible to Receive</u> <u>Full Military Honors, Through Expansion of Our National Cemetery</u>
- + Sustain Pay Raises for Servicemembers and COLA Raises for Retirees
- + Improve Survivor Benefits
- + Ensure the Coast Guard Receives Pay During a Government Shutdown

<u>Urge Your Elected Officials to Support Comprehensive Toxic Exposure Reform Legislation</u>

Comprehensive toxic exposure reform is needed to ensure we avoid the problems faced by Vietnam veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange.

<u>Urge Your Elected Officials to Fix the TRICARE Young Adult Coverage Gap</u> MOAA continues efforts to build support for The Health Care Fairness for Military Families Act of 2021 (H.R. 475), introduced by Reps. Elaine Luria (D-Va.) and Michael Waltz (R-Fla.). This bipartisan bill would expand TRICARE eligibility to young adult dependents up to age 26, bringing TRICARE in line with commercial plan requirements.

Ask Your Lawmakers to Support the Military Hunger Prevention Act Food insecurity among junior servicemembers is not a new concern, but like many ongoing problems, it's been made worse by the economic fallout from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Military Hunger Prevention Act would establish a Basic Needs Allowance (BNA) for these servicemembers, helping them overcome financial difficulties and allowing them to concentrate on their duties.

These important issues require your immediate attention. Send your elected officials a MOAA-suggested message today.

Urge Your Senators to Support Legislation to Repeal the TRICARE Select Enrollment Fee

Act now to urge your senators to support the TRICARE Select Restoration Act, which is an important first step to repeal the enrollment fee for grandfathered retirees.

<u>Urge your legislators to support concurrent receipt</u> Contact your representative and senators and urge them to support The Major Richard Star Act, which would provide concurrent receipt for servicemembers unable to complete 20 years of service due to combat-related injuries. Help ensure these men and women get their full service-earned retirement, as well as their disability compensation from the VA.

<u>Support Health Care for Children of Disabled Veterans or Veterans Who Have Died Due to a Service-Connected Disability</u> Did you know many adult children of veterans who are disabled or who died from a service-connected disability lose access to their parent's health well before the age of 26?

<u>Area' Retirees</u> The TRICARE Fairness for National Guard and Reserve Retirees Act (S. 829), introduced by Sens. Rob Portman (R-Ohio) and Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass.) and the House companion bill (H.R. 1997), introduced by Reps. Bill Johnson (R-Ohio) and Dean Phillips (D-Minn.) would ensure these "gray area" retirees who qualify for retirement pay before age 60 are eligible for the TRICARE retiree benefit.

Ask Congress to Preserve Arlington National Cemetery and Eligibility for 20-Year Retirees

Help MOAA stay in the middle of this important conversation – Contact your representative and urge them to designate in the FY 2022 NDAA the next national cemetery as ANC reaches capacity.



CINCO DE MAYO

Cinco De May's deeply rooted history in the Franco-Mexican War influenced Mexican-Mexican American communities in the early years of the American Civil War. In the early 1860s, as the Civil War erupted, these communities took up the banner of the Cinco De Mayo celebration as a way to commemorate the cause of freedom and democracy. Today, in the United States, Americans celebrate Mexican-American heritage and pride annually on May 5th.


Cinco de Mayo is Spanish for "fifth of May."

NATIONAL SPACE DAY

National Space Day dedicates the first Friday in May to the extraordinary achievements, benefits, and opportunities in the exploration and use of space. The goal of the observance is to promote math, science, technology, and engineering education in young people, The hope is to inspire them to pursue a career in science, especially a career in space-related jobs.

National Space Day History

In 1997, Lockheed Martin Corporation created National Space Day as a one-day event. In 2001, due to its extreme popularity, former astronaut and senator John Glenn expanded Space Day to International Space Day.

Raising the flag at noon signifies the nation lives, that the country is resolved not to let their sacrifice be in vain but to rise up in their honor and continue to fight for

Six National Military Appreciation Month Observances & Events

<u>Loyalty Day</u> - **Saturday**, **May 1**st. Loyalty Day kicks off our Nation's month-long celebration of military appreciation. It is a day set aside for the reaffirmation of loyalty to the United States, and to reflect on the proud heritage of our American freedom.

<u>Public Service Recognition Week (PSRW)</u> - **May 2**nd – **Saturday, May 8**th. Celebrated the first full week in May. A time set aside to honor the men and women who serve our nation as federal, state, county and local government employees and ensure that our government is the best in the world.

<u>Victory in Europe Day AKA V-E Day or VE Day</u> - May 8th, 1945 is the day when Germans throughout Europe unconditionally surrendered to the Allies. This day marked the end of World War II in Europe.

<u>Military Spouse Appreciation Day</u> - May 7th. Traditionally set for the Friday before Mother's Day. The day set aside to honor military spouses with appropriate ceremonies and activities. Recognizes the important role our military families play in keeping our Armed Forces strong and our country safe.

<u>Armed Forces Day</u> - May 15th. Celebrated the third Saturday in May every year. A single holiday for citizens to come together and thank our military members for their patriotic service in support of our country. This day honors everyone serving in the U.S. Military branches, the Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marines, Navy, and Space Force. There is also <u>Armed Forces Week</u>, which typically leads up to Armed Forces Day, although it is not an official observance, many activities are planned nonetheless during the week.

<u>Memorial Day</u> - May 31st. A Federal holiday observed on the last Monday in May. A remembrance of our veterans. Commemorates the men and women who died while in military service. All Americans are encouraged to pause, wherever they are, at 3:00 pm local time for a minute of silence.

These groups are now also eligible for a COVID-19 vaccine at VA when their local VA health facilities are able to offer more vaccines:

- 1. All Veterans
- 2. Spouses and surviving spouses of Veterans
- **3.** Caregivers of Veterans. For COVID-19 vaccine eligibility, we define a caregiver as a family member or friend who provides care to a Veteran. Caregivers may help a Veteran with personal needs like feeding, bathing, or dressing. They may also help a Veteran with tasks like shopping or transportation.
- 4. Recipients of Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Department of Veterans Affairs (CHAMPVA) benefits.
