### Program: Lethality and Joint Warfighting By: Dr. David Bottomlee

Dr. David Bottomlee is the Dean of the U.S. Air Force Air War College, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama. The Air War College is the Air Force's senior professional military education institution, providing post-graduate senior leader development programs focused on joint, multinational, multi-agency warfighting and international security operations, air, space, and cyberspace force strategy development and national security planning. Dr. Bottomlee earned a Ph.D. from Auburn University as an Air Force Institute of Technology fellow where his research focused on leadership in Public Administration.

Dr. Bottomlee retired from the USAF as a Colonel following a 30 year career. His last operational assignment was the NATO Director of Air Operations in Kabul, Afghanistan. In this role, he was responsible for the planning and execution of all combat aviation flights including close air support, airlift, MEDIVAC, space, helicopter, and unmanned aerial vehicles.



Dr. Bottomlee entered the Air Force in 1993 as graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy earning a Bachelor of Science Degree in Political Science, while also commanding the Cadet Soaring Instructor Pilot Squadron, serving as the Academy's Soaring Aerobatic Team captain, and lettering on the golf team. Later, he was a distinguished graduate from the Euro-NATO Joint Jet Pilot Training Program and then served as an F-16 instructor pilot, evaluator pilot, and mission commander for multiple assignments including several combat deployments. Additionally, he served at the U.S. Embassy in Cairo, Egypt while also instructing Egyptian Air Force F-16 pilots as part of the Office of Military Cooperation's Peace Vector program. Dr. Bottomlee was a command pilot, accumulating 2,500 hours in multiple aircraft including the F-16 and AT-38C while also flying 100+ combat missions.

In addition to the Ph.D. from Auburn University, Dr. Bottomlee earned Master's degrees in Business Administration from California State University; in Counseling & Leadership Development from University of Colorado; and in Strategic Studies from the U.S. Army War College. He lectures on leadership, the Profession of Arms, moral courage, and ethics.

Dave Moore talked about his parents and their love of the army life.

Fort Moore was named after LTG Harold Moore and Julia Moore. He fought as Infantry in Korea, Cavalry in Vietnam and was a paratrooper while his wife Julie served as a Red Cross volunteer in Army hospitals and dental clinics and supported other Army wives who received news that their husband had been killed. The couple was married in 1949, and both have been laid to rest in the base cemetery with the service members who were killed in action at the Landing Zone Xray in Vietnam as well as Julie's parents.


The name change was set in motion by the 2021 National Defense Authorization Act. The initiative to honor both Hal and Julie was led by their sons Dave, Greg and Steve Moore. LTG Hal Moore wrote a book We Were Soldiers Once... and Young with Joseph Galloway about the first major battle of the Vietnam War in the Ia Drang Valley in 1965. Julie followed every taxi to offer comfort to the widows and attended every local funeral of every soldier lost in combat in her husband's command leading to change in notifications.


