On Tuesday 17th March the Archbishops suspended public worship for a season. And so has begun the most bizarre period my ministry thus far. So many of the things I

have previously done to exercise a ministry in this benefice are now no longer open to me. COVID-19 prevents us from being community and from being church in the ways that we had got used to. And yet unsettling though this is we will still be church and still be community.

I am astounded and humbled by the number of people offering themselves in the service of others. There is a determination that none in this community can be forgotten which is being wonderfully expressed by so many people.

This unusual time is only just beginning; we are likely to have to live differently from before for months to come. As time progresses the needs of people, especially the vulnerable, will change. We need to be aware of where people are at so that we can minister effectively to each other.

To this end:

- We will be setting up 'telephone visiting' so that isolated folk receive a daily phonecall checking in on them. If you would like to be visited please be in touch.
- We will still be a praying and worshiping community. Church

will be open for people to go and be in. If you encounter other people whilst you are in church please do keep your distance from one another.

•Our Facebook output is being ramped up hopefully will include the livestreaming of services (many people are on a fairly steep technical learning curve at the minute but we'll get there!) If you know an older person with a computer who might need help in setting up a Facebook account, likely with very tight privacy settings, you might like to offer to help.

Keep praying, keep smiling, keep being community in the wonderful ways you already are. Remember that God is with us through this and God is good.



By now, most of you will know that we have a toilet in St. Mary's Church. We give sincere thanks to all those people who have helped us to raise the money for this facility. The toilet will not only make life easier for those of us who attend the church regularly, but the church can now be used for a greater variety of events.

Over 4.5 billion people across the world do not have access to a safe toilet. Bad sanitation is one of the world's biggest killers and women and girls suffer most. We take our toilets for granted but in third world and developing countries, millions of people must still defecate in the open. Worldwide, more than 800 children die every day from preventable diseases linked to dirty water and unsafe toilets – that is one child every two minutes. Toilet Twinning was established in

Toilet Twinning was established in 2010 by Tearfund. This charity raises money to enable poor communities to

have clean water, a basic toilet and to learn about basic hygiene. When toilets are provided in schools, more children are able to attend in safety. Girls in particular are able to attend school without fear of being sexually assaulted or bitten by snakes.

You too could twin your home toilet. For £60 you will receive the exact location of your donated toilet together with a photograph which you can hang in your toilet. Go to www.toilettwinning.org. We are proudly displaying our photograph in St. Mary's toilet. It is latrine number 11951 in the Democratic Republic of Congo and we have the exact coordinates should anyone want to visit it!

There is an additional benefit of twinning our toilet: it earns us extra points on our Eco Church rating – we are hoping for a Silver Award.

Reasons to be cheerful

In these dark times for people around the world, as many are being forced into isolation. there have also been reasons to find hope.

As countries go into lockdown over the virus, there have been significant drops in pollution levels. Both China and northern Italy have recorded major falls in nitrogen dioxide - a serious air pollutant and powerful warming chemical - amid reduced industrial activity and car journeys. Researchers in New York also told the BBC that early results showed carbon monoxide, mainly from cars, had been reduced by nearly 50% compared with last year. And with airlines cancelling flights en masse and millions working from home, other countries around the world are expected to follow this downward path.

On a similar note, residents of Venice have noticed a vast improvement in the water quality of the famous canals running through the city. The streets of the popular tourist destination in northern Italy have emptied amid the outbreak leading to a drastic drop in water traffic, which has allowed sediment to settle. The usually murky water has gone so clear that fish can even be seen.

There are plenty of stories of panic buying and fights over toilet roll and tins, but the virus has also spurred acts of kindness around the world. Two New Yorkers amassed 1,300 volunteers in 72 hours to deliver groceries and medicine to elderly and vulnerable people in the city. Facebook said hundreds of thousands of people in the UK had joined local support groups set up for the virus, while similar groups have been formed in Canada, sparking a trend there known as "caremongering". Supermarkets in Australia are among those to create a special "elderly hour" so older shoppers and those with disabilities have a chance to shop in peace. People have also donated money, shared recipe and exercise ideas, sent uplifting messages to self-



isolating elderly people and transformed businesses into food

distribution centres.

Between a hectic work and home life it is often easy to feel disconnected from those around you. As the virus affects us all, it has brought many communities around the world closer together.

In Italy, where a countrywide lockdown is in place, people have joined together on their balconies for morale-boosting songs The virus has also highlighted the importance of health workers and other people working in key services. Thousands of Europeans have taken to their balconies and windows to applaud the doctors and nurses fighting the virus,

while medical students in London have volunteered to help healthcare professionals with childcare and household chores.

With millions of people now stuck in isolation, many are using the opportunity to get creative. Social media users have shared details of their new hobbies, including reading, baking, knitting and painting. The DC Public Library in Washington is among those hosting a virtual book club, while Italian Michelin-starred chef Massimo Bottura has launched an Instagram series called Kitchen Quarantine, teaching basic recipes to aspiring foodies who are stuck at home. An art teacher in the US state of Tennessee has been live-streaming classes for children who are out of school, inspiring them to get creative at home. Pop stars including Coldplay frontman Chris Martin and country singer Keith Urban have also been live-streaming gigs to combat the boredom of selfisolation.

And while many public spaces have been shut, art fans have been making the most of virtual tours offered by the world's biggest galleries, observing the famous paintings of the Louvre in Paris and the classic sculptures of the Vatican museum from their living rooms.

Australia's Sydney Observatory offered a tour of the night sky for people stuck at home.

Ian's early life was spent in Felling. Following junior school, he was educated at Washington Grammar School, and then worked in County Hall in Newcastle.

He continued his education at Newcastle University, during which time he met Sylvia at a church in Felling. After they married, he began his teaching career at Walbottle School.

They moved into Ovingham in 1972, and Ian's career progressed when he became Head of English at Slatyford School in the west end of Newcastle and after a few years he moved back to Walbottle School (they had a daughter and three sons by then).

His health deteriorated and he had to have a triple heart by-pass in 2001.

After he retired, and his health started to improve, Ian vowed to get involved in some of the village activities. He joined the village choir and the drama group, (becoming secretary for a number of years in both) and became a Councillor, playing a full part in each of these activities.

He also had a season ticket at St. James' Park, where he regularly went to see his beloved Newcastle United.

Over the years the family often went on camping holidays in the summer, and there are many stories about his determination to follow his instincts, rather than the sat-nav or the family member who was map-reading resulting in journeys taking much longer than intended!

All who knew Ian will miss him greatly, not only for his dedication and commitment to his many 'societies' but also for his humour and his gentleness.


