The gentleman made a comment earlier about Vistra having a permit out He did yell that out at the meeting last night, which isn't usually the way you get an answer. I could not find him because he had said he had already left.

So I couldn't have a chance to talk to him. But there is a VISTRA permit that's out there. It has not scheduled for hearing. It hasn't gone to CEQA yet.
