



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














During the last Ween show, my toe was poking through my sock. Not the baby toe or one you can forget about that smooshes into your shoe, but the second toe right next to the big guy.





Ween is not for everyone, but if we try hard enough, it just may be. That's exactly what a group of comedians from New York City did. As many of you may know "God Ween Evan" is a podcast where three friends try to convince their fourth friend to like Ween. It was a rocky road for Will Nunziata, Paul Gutkowski and Katie Hartman at first but song by song and Boognish by Boognish their friend Evan Kaufman may have finally came around. Tune in to the Podcast to find out. Lets see what they had to say when I sat down with them for a rousing talk about podcasting, Ween, and life.

Eli: So I'm wondering about the genesis of the 'cast. What event lead to you guys being like, "Oh Evan you GOTTA know. You gotta become, not just a fan but in love with Ween's bodies...of work."

Paul: Great question, I wish I knew the exact moment that the seed was planted but it had a lot to do with thinking that Evan is a pretty funny, charming, smart and loveable man. The first time I met him I though he was just another A-Hole that moved to New York to try and be funny but then very quickly I learned that this is a very sweet man who is very funny and not a dick about it. He's earnest and funny and goofy, which is a hard combo. I'm not sure I knew why I cared that he liked Ween, Evan do you know? Were we in a car or something? Will? I don't know why it meant so much but we started posting the 100 days of Evan on Facebook.

Evan: I think it's cause it was baffling to you guys and then you (Paul) and Will and Katie triangulated on this thing and it was like, when you have a friend that you know and love and you're like, "We should go out and get pizza," and that friend is like, "I don't like pizza," and your like, "But you're a human being, you should love pizza."

Katie: That's a great way to put it Evan. You're a human being you should love Ween already!

Paul: We were like, you're a very specific kind too. You enjoy comedy, and having watched you perform and performed with you, I knew that you liked music and things that were kind of absurd so I was like, "Have I got the band for you!" Then Evan was like, "This is stupid." [laughs]

Will: For me it was like, there are plenty of people that I respect that are funny, like Evan, but when Evan said he loves Prince and my eyes lit up and I was so excited like, "Oh you're funny, you should love Ween, right?" Evan was like, "Fuck Ween, what a shitty jam band." I was like, "Oh this is a challenge."

Evan: I don't remember saying that.

[Laughter]

Eli: Well it's in print now! I feel like when you're a fan of Ween, and it becomes clear in the podcast how deep seeded youre love of Ween is, if you have a friend that can't seem to understand this thing that you love you feel like you need to change that.

Will: Yeah especially a comedian. There are so many comedians I know that love this band and it's one of the reasons they got into comedy, I know it was for me.

Paul: I think that's a big part of it. I have a friend who still hates Ween, he actively hates Ween, he went to the reunion shows and that was the first time he saw them in Commerce City.

Will: I think you should name names Paul.

Paul: Scott Thorpe, he's just not a funny guy. He's a friend from college; we used to play basketball together. He's a

good dude but I don't give a shit that he doesn't like Ween. You can't do psychotherapy with some one who doesn't have a sense of humor. I think Freud said that or Jung, I don't know. It's the same thing with convincing someone to like Ween. I would never try to convince someone who doesn't have a great sense of humor to like Ween. So that was a big part of it. Evan had the sense of humor that seemed like it would be open to this experience.

Katie: I genuinely thought it was gonna be easy and then in his brain he decided to...

Evan: Where we make all our decisions Katie!

Katie: Oh I make all mine out of my clitoris so... I don't know.

Paul: Everybody knows that Hartman makes lots of decision with her clitoris.

Katie: It's the one thing everybody knows about me. So, I genuinely thought it was going to be easy and then suddenly he was becoming like a stubborn mule, it was like trying to pull his bridle while he dug his shitty Mule feet into the ground. Eventually when you hear the stories and you experience things through other peoples eyes it becomes your own story and there's something about sitting there with people listening to them talk about a thing they really care about, it affects you.

Eli: So then you're torn between truly finding a new love for this band and creating more content for your podcast listeners. Will you ever relent or does that work against this content that people love and has obviously made you famous?

Evan: I mean it's hard right, because if like, Thanos joins up with the Avengers what's the point right? The Avengers have nothing to fight.

Paul: Spoiler alert!

Katie: Is that what happened? I haven't seen anything.

Evan: I don't know, it feels as if we have come to this place where I, at the very least, have an appreciation for the band if not listening to it on a daily basis.

Katie: Great question.


Evan: Wow! Uhhm, oh boy, uh, no because this social media thing is just to send me a bunch of sponsored ads for *White Pepper*.

Eli: So you finally all went to see a live show together and did a live performance of the podcast at Garcia's at the Cap. What was it like to all see Ween together and then bring your show to those fans there?

Will: I will say, seeing the show with my friends was the best Ween show going

experience I've had. Just 'cause there was so much weight put on it. I've been to a bunch of shows with just a friend or even by myself in the past. It was nice to have a crew of people and this project that we worked on all together. I was more excited to see the show as **TEE** opposed to doing the live show but it was all a great experience.



Eli: Now Paul, you mentioned in the podcast that part of your night was spent watching the joy on Evan's face and seeing how much Katie enjoied it. So what did it meant to you to see the deep-seated joy released on Evans and Katie's faces?

Paul: I was emotional. This thing started as a joke and it's still kind of a joke in some ways but I don't think any of us ever really thought anyone would ever listen to it. Maybe there was a chance because Ween has such a committed and excitable

fan base that it would catch on. I was always excited to go to a show with Katie but I'don't think that when we started taking Evan to a show seemed realistic. Then for it to become this huge event, in terms of our friendship, and then for the show and the fact that Mikey worked so hard for us to get this opportunity to do the thing at Garcia's. I was pretty overwhelmed and I was pretty high and it was great. Just the idea that Evan was participating in a druggy way was vindication.

Eli: So Evan what were your thoughts during the show? You're seeing Ween and knowing all that brought you to that moment. Was there ever a time during the show when you were like, "I was right. This does fuckin' suuuck"?

Evan: Could you imagine, I just slowly turn my head like an owl and go, "This fuckin' suuuuuucks!" Hahaha.

Eli: But that didn't happen?

Evan: No it didn't happen. I mean it's funny, early in this podcast Paul kind of broke down this thing where he was like, "You're afraid to be welcomed by a crowd. You're afraid to be part of something." At this

Ween show I felt like I was part of something, through meeting people who listened to the podcast and knew who we were, which is a crazy thing. Like Paul said, I just assumed like, six people would listen to it, my Dad and us.

Will: Turns out there was eight of us.

Eli: Yeah everyone's Dads.

Evan: Haha, yeah, so to feel like I was part of something and also to know the songs and dip into the subculture, it's like if you leave someone in the wilderness for while and you come back and they've got a bear skin on and they dug out a tree for shelter and they're part of the woods now. That's how I felt.

Eli: Like Robin Williams from Jumanji?

Evan: Exactly. I woke up and was like, "What year is it?" I came back to my

house and ran around my apartment and I looked as if I had aged forty years, which is a pretty good description of a Ween show. You feel as if you have aged forty

Paul: I joked around a lot about being "Post Boogni" but I never stopped caring if Evan liked Ween or not. I didn't want to but there was a moment that we talked about in the live show, about looking over and seeing him kind of GET "She Fucks Me." Which was one that we really struggled with when we played it for him. Then, what it meant to see the interplay between Deaner and Gener, it meant a lot more then it should. Like seeing this thing that like, "Oh yeah, you didn't get it and now you get it, I think." That was a very cool experience.

Eli: There is a major thing about really good bands, I feel like you have to see them live to really get them. No amount of records can compare. That's something with bands like The Doors or Zeppelin for us, we can never see them live so the experience only goes so far. So when you see Ween live for the first time you can be like, "Oh yeah, there it is."

Will: Yeah Evan gave us a lot of shit as we were going along. Like he would make fun of us for saying, "Oh this songs great but you gotta see it live, it's so much more intense." He kept giving us shit about that. I think that when he was there and he saw that these songs have a new life of their own and he sees why people are so obsessive about like, keeping the set lists for the shows on Browntracker. Like maybe he gets a taste that this band is something even more special when you experience it

Mikey: That's the sort of take that someone would have who has "Trouble with rock and roll," as Evan once said. That is someone who would not understand that the live experience could be so profound and deep.

Eli: Mikey how much editing do you have to do? Are you really cutting the episode up? How much work is it to really hone this thing in?

Mikey: Most of them are not cut down. We just let it roll. What I do is just take what is the conversation at hand and just

add music and adjust the levels to make it all sound right. Then at the same time throw in a couple "Easter eggs" or if they were talking about something I can find an audio clip of that's gonna be added in to heighten the experience and to also put on the listener to what their actually talking about because some of their references can be kind of obscure sometimes.

Katie: Wait, whose references? Just Paul's.

Paul: "Ya smoke crack don't'cha boy?' I think Mikey would want it on the record that he does not put Osama Bin Laden* on the recordings.



Katie: Yeah that's all Paul.

Will: I think there was only one episode that really needed to be edited a little more and that was the infamous "CBD/12 Golden Country Greats" episode.

Eli: Ah yes, a classic.

[Collective sigh from group]

Paul: I had just had physical therapy for my hand. It's an ongoing saga.

Mikey: When I do edit it, I'm also coming from the perspective where, not only do I get the joy of working with these guys but I'm also a fan! I've seen all four of them do comedy on their own and I just loved seeing them. They are great performers and hilarious so getting the chance to kind of "live" see them every time and talk about one of my favorite subjects, Ween. It's just such a joy and something I really love and I think everyone loves. You know, not only do we love the Evan Experiment.

...and where this is going and, "Are they gonna get him?" We just love listening to these four talk about Ween, it's just tons of fun. Any hours I spend meticulously messing with levels is nothing but a joy.

Eli: So it seems like the icing on the cake of this whole thing is your band, "Guacamole Hat's" rendition of "Your Party," that occurred at the Cap. So what was the genesis of that and how much work went into learning that? For me it seems like Evan loves that song, listens every day and just knows it by heart. Is that how it went?

Paul: Yeah that's absolutely correct Eli. That's how it went. Hahah.

Will: Evan how often do you listen to "Your Party?"

Evan: Uh, once in the morning and once in the evening.

Eli: Now that you have a recording of your self singing it did you insert that into the middle of the day so it's like Ween then Guacamole Hat then Ween?

Evan: I mean, learning any song for me is a challenge, my brain is filled with spiders and stuff. I just really like that song so leaning it was not difficult and it was really fun to play. I think the hardest part was not melting my band mates' faces with those rattling, gut wrenching kazoo solos.

Will: My favorite part of the rehearsal process for that was the day of the Garcia's show we were in an underground parking garage and it was pouring rain out and we just opened the back of Evan's car and I was playing Guitar and Katie was playing...what's the name of the instrument Katie?

Katie: It's called a QChord. It's like an electric Auto Harp.

Will: So Katie was playing the QChord and Evan was playing the Kazoo in this empty, damp parking structure. We just ran it for like, an hour.

Katie: Until our fingers got too cold.

Paul: I would say, much like Evan attending the show was overhyped compared to Katie seeing the show, it's analogous to Evans Kazoo to Katie's' QChord. Katie's QChord was the most important part. It filled out the "Your Party" sound in a way that if we didn't have it, it would have been a different experience for everyone. That thing fucks really hard.

Will: Here, here!

Eli: So then Katie what did seeing two nights of Ween, not just as a concertgoer but as someone people recognized from the podcast, mean to you?

Katie: It really felt like a dream. The anticipation leading up to it and, there was no let down; it was just 100% joy. Including the people who listen to the podcast, which is still a little overwhelming. I sort of knew people listened and people were gonna be there but it felt really nice and the shows were so fucking good. I don't see too many live music shows and being there and feeling that, I was like, "I need to do this a lot more." It just was perfect. They have so many songs and every time I was delighted by what was next. The crowd felt so together, I knew Ween had a deep community but this felt amazing.

Eli: And living something like you guys do with the podcast and starting to create in this world makes the experience so much richer because your fan community has been so active and supportive.

Katie: Yeah, it really felt like the culmination of a years work with people I really love and meeting people that I now love.

Will: There are so many smiling people at Ween shows but it was like this extra level when people would look at you with wide eyes and come up to you smiling and their like, "Hi I listen to the show! Did Evan like the show?" It was such a fun experience to just have these happy faces that are so happy to see you. I'd never felt that before.

Eli: Evan did anyone yell at you or anything?

Evan: No, no one yelled at me. Though it is funny when you know something about

someone and they know nothing about you, you can come up to them and start a conversation half way through. You know what I mean? So like people would come up to me and be like "pretty good second song huh, but we



all know you don't like to hard guitars," and I'd just be like, "Hello." I'll double up on what Will said that some people would come up just smiling and I would think they knew the podcast was cause they were smiling at me but no, they were just on drugs and they'd be like, "Hi man, great work out there tonight," and I'd be like, "Oh thanks, you're a fan of the podcast and they'd be like, "What's a podcast?"

Eli: You guys have been doing this over the course of three years and I'm not sure how often you go back over the cast but you could have met someone that just binged the entire show this week and so everything you ever said on the show is right on the tip of their tongues.

Will: I definitely met a couple of those people.

Paul: Speaking of content maybe you could mention in the Zine that there is an entire lost Red Rocks movie that features Eli, from the Ween Zine that Evan is just sitting on.

Will: He hasn't edited that video.

Paul: I think Evan shelved it. He made the executive decision to hold off.

Evan: Oh no, I have it. It's coming Paul. I'm a very busy man.

Paul: Maybe we can get "Fatherly" to release it.

Eli: Yeah, "Dude to Boog!"

Paul: It can be a cautionary tale for when your 39 and have no kids and go to Colorado by yourself.

Evan: Yeah, that sounds like good content.

Eli: So what's next for the 'cast? Can the podcast continue now that Evan is "in love with Ween" as a band?

Will: I don't know

Katie: Yeah, Evan can't live without Ween. Write that down.



Ween The Pod

To truly get down with the sickness, you mustn't prance through asbestos-ridden abandoned children's hospitals to the frolicking chugga-chug riffs of Disturbed. It seems that, to be truly down with the sickness, you must hole up in a rotting cabin with cabinets full of scotchguard cans and a leaky roof that saturates your pillows with dew, eventually causing mononucleosis. The brothers Ween have created a suffocating soundscape that hammers its way to the truth of being legitimately sick, disturbed, and funny as hell. Listening to The Pod on good headphones is probably not what Ween had in mind. Better yet would be blaring the music in the red on a tape deck with blown speakers. I have done both, and unlike many anomalies of audio art, this album heralded two completely different experiences. As you strap on that Jammy Pack to prepare for the journey, you must remember to keep your wits about you, but at the same time let go to the wills of prime, unquantized analogue fuckery that will envelop your every fiber if you play it LOUD. I am telling you that you will go from bewilderment to tears by the time Sorry Charlie hits its stride. However, we are getting ahead of ourselves. 














GRANT US THE Grant STRENGTH grants


