What Is Vodun?

Vodun—also spelled Vodoun, Vodou, or Vodu—is not superstition, dark magic, or folklore. - Candomblé and Quimbanda in Brazil
- Santería in Cuba (blended with Yoruba Orisha work)

Each of these systems retains core Vodun elements—spirit contact, ancestor veneration, ritual precision—but adapted to the land and context of the diaspora.
