SALT LAKE CITY - Utah's Homecoming turned into more than just the Roberta Flack Concert as the inspired Utes ambushed eighth-ranked Arizona State, 36-31, Saturday afternoon at Rice Stadium.

The victory snapped the nation's longest unbeaten streak at 12 games and provided a big lift to Utah's football season and an equally big boost to the job security of Coach Bill Meek.

Prior to the season, the Utah-ASU game was viewed as the game of the year in the Western Athletic Conference. Then the Ute made a lot of errors in losing to Arizona last week to dim the Spotlight on the ASU

Utah used mistakes to their

temperatures Saturday to topple the four-time defending WAC champion. It was an exciting matchup after all as the Utes jumped to a 30-3 lead early in the second quarter and then withstood a fierce Arizona State comeback in the second half.

Despite the ASU rally, the final score might well have been wider. Utah, leading 36-24, got to the six-inch line late in the game but didn't score and ASU came back to score on a long bomb with no time left on the clock.

As the exciting as the game was to the 22,135 fans, it did little to change the WAC title picture. Utah is tied with ASU at 3-1 while Arizona is 4-0. But Utah plays one less conference game so the chase is basically a two-team affair. Even if Arizona beats

BYU this week, the Wildcats still must beat ASU in their meeting Nov 24 in Tempe. Should both teams tie at 6-1, the champion would be the wirner of the game between the two contenders. So the Sun Devils are still in a good position to return to the Fiesta

But the Utes got their day of glory and brought the high-flying Sun Devils down to earth by forcing 10 turnovers (four pass interceptions and six fumble recoveries).

Danny White, the nation's leader in total offense, completed 22 of 48 passes for 361 yards but he was forced into some bad throw by the Ute defense and was sacked several times in key situations.

Woody Green, the Sun Devils' highly-touted halfback, was held to 48 yards. Green had trouble holding on to the ball and was completely overshadowed by ASU's hard-running fullback Ben Malone. Malone end up with 112

Split end Greg Hudson caught 11 passes for 185 yards but 51 of were on the final rlay of the game when Hudson made a diving catch at the goal line. Most of his receptions were sideline patterns which Utah was giving up with lots of deep coverage.

The real heroes were the fired-up Utes who won in spite of five turnovers of their own. Don Van Galder passed for two touchdowns and ran for two others in leading the Utah onslaught. "Brownie," as he is called by the Utah players and

fans, was nearly the goat with some early fumbles but ASU was somuch worse it didn't matter.

Midway through the second quarter, Van Galder was hit hard and suffered double vision. His replacement, Lou Onofrio, couldn't move the team so when Van Galder came back for the fourth quarter he received a warm welcome

Stave Odom was the difference in the game. He returned punts 73 and 70 yards to set up touchdowns and made a spectacular catch for what proved to be the winning touchdown.

The game was interrupted for nearly 10 minute early in the fourth quarter when a major controversy developed. ASU completed a pass to Morris the Sun Devils a first down. But a personal foul was called on Steve Marshall, moving the ball half the distance to the goal.

Because it was a dead-ball foul, ASU had a first-and-three at the 71/2.
