
Utes get it together, beat UTE

start for the Utes, as they won the coin toss for the first time in four games. Following a mad scramble for the ball on a Utah punt, and 22 yards worth of fumbling early in the first quarter, UTEP's talented quarterback Gary Keithley stood as far back in his end zone as he could while awaiting the snap for his own punt. The newly refurbished Robert L. Rice stadium then saw its first two points, as a furious rush by amazing Alan Gilreath smothered Keithley's attempt and the ball rolled out of the end zone for a safety.

The game was billed as a duel between the WAC's top two quarterbacks, Keithley and Don "Brownie" Van Galder. Seems that Keithlev won the battle of the stats, but a well-rounded attack by the Utes ultimately produced the victory. For the first time this year, even the defense was superb. The pass rush was so heavy at times on Keithley that sportswriters in the press box were prompted to say, "It looked like the whole student body got him that time.'

Midway through the first quarter, Utah's Ike Spencer scored the first touchdown on the new Astro-Turf, making the score 9-0 with a Fleming Jensen conversion, the first of his five successful at-

Gene Belczyk, the tough little runner who runs so slow but gets the job done, picked up 116 hard earned yards in 21 carries and one touchdown. Gene, however, was only slightly ahead of teammate Ike Spencer in the ground gaining stats. Ike picked up 83 yards in 12 rushes, including a 27-yarder.

And is there any way to say enough about the fantastic moves of speedy Steve Odom? With Keithley again back to punt (he always seemed to be involved in the big plays), Odom waited on his own 20-yard line. The booming spiral sent Steve back to the 14 where he fumbled and chased the ball back to his five. The rest is history. He dazzled the 20,860 fans by streaking down the West sidelline, then faking the UTEP safety man out of his shoes and almost walking in from the 30, for a record setting 95-yard punt return. It was a new Utah and WAC record, the old Utah record being 93 yards by Frankie Nelson in 1949 vs.

Soon after, Van Galder passed to Willie Armstead for 38 yards and another score to make it 25-0, and that was how it looked as the players went in for the halftime pep talk. Willie later caught another TD bomb, this one for 41 yards.
