

However, the crafty burglars were clever to avoid all the closed-circuit cameras and security guards. Even their getaway vehicle was never found. Fortunately, they left behind one important clue: a single perfect fingerprint.



Our fingerprints are very special



You might have the same eye colour as someone else, the same shaped nose and, if you are an identical twin, you might even have a face that looks the same but not a single person on earth has the same fingerprints as you.

Fingerprints are the patterns on the pads of your fingers made by finy ridges in the outer layer of your skin. These ridges help you get a better grip on smooth objects. This is particularly important if you are climbing trees and swinging between branches.

Fingerprints don't lie

Most importantly, fingerprints help solve eriminals. For more than a hundred years, police have used fingerprints to identify people. Every time you touch something, you leave sweat and oil prints which are the same pattern as your fingerprints. Criminals often leave very clear fingerprints behind because the stress of carrying out a crime causes them to sweat more than usual. While these fingerprints are normally invisible, police can make them visible by dusting them with some fine powder or spraying them with fine chemicals. Once a fingerprint is developed, it can be compared with the images on police files.


