Over 200 Days Without Representation for the people of the 35th District

It has now been more than 200 days since the 35th State Senate District seat became vacant—yet Governor Gretchen Whitmer has still not called a special election to fill it. The seat, left open when Kristen McDonald Rivet joined Congress in January, represents over 270,000 residents across Saginaw, Midland, and Bay counties.

This is now the **longest delay** for a special election under Governor Whitmer, far exceeding her past timelines. Even members of her own party, including Lt. Governor Garlin Gilchrist and Attorney General Dana Nessel, have joined the chorus calling for action.

Meanwhile, instead of addressing this growing concern at home, Governor Whitmer recently traveled overseas, turning her back on constituents who have gone more than half a year without a voice in Lansing. Residents of the 35th District are left without a senator to advocate for them on critical issues like education funding, infrastructure, and economic development.

Under Michigan law, the governor has the sole authority to call a special election—but she continues to delay. If no action is taken, this seat could remain vacant until **November 2026**.

Michigan citizens deserve leadership that puts people before politics. It's time to end the silence and *call the special election now*.



Saginaw Township and Birch Run Bond Proposals: Still Too Much for Taxpayers?



This November, Saginaw Township voters will again be asked to approve a massive \$169.2 million school bond—a proposal strikingly similar to one that residents already rejected. While the bond is being promoted as an investment in our schools, the price tag remains excessive and out of touch with the financial realities many families face.

As Republicans, we absolutely support the education of our children. Strong schools are vital to our community and our future. But support for education must be balanced with fiscal responsibility. We question

whether this proposal simply demands too much from taxpayers at a time when families are already stretched thin.

The bond includes costly renovations and upgrades, some of which may improve facilities but will not directly enhance student performance. These are not sudden needs. Many of these projects could and should have been anticipated and budgeted for over time. Instead, school leadership has chosen the easy route: ask taxpayers to hand over more money.

Let's be clear—this tax hike isn't minor. It's estimated to cost residents about \$11 per month for every \$100,000 of taxable property value. While that may not



seem like much to some, for others, it could mean one less box of diapers for the month, a missed utility payment, or skipping necessary medication. Every dollar counts, and we can't ignore the burden this places on struggling families and seniors on fixed incomes.

A local group, **Vote No Nov 4th**, has already formed in response. They were successful in defeating the last bond attempt, and for good reason. They say this one may have a new coat of paint, but it's still too big, too expensive, and too poorly justified.

And it's not just Saginaw Township. Birch Run Area Schools is also pursuing a major bond proposal of \$17.8M. Voters across the region are being asked to dig deeper into their wallets, with little assurance these spending plans will deliver results.





Another point to consider, by putting this proposal out in a Special Election, the election alone will cost about \$113,000. They would not incur such a huge expense if this was done in an election year.

Perhaps it's time our school leadership learned to do more with less—just like the families they serve. Responsible budgeting, not repeated tax hikes, is the answer.

WHY MICHIGAN SHOULD SAY:

NO TO RANKED CHOICE VOTING

Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) is gaining popularity in some states—but it's a bad fit for Michigan. Though it's promoted as modern and fair, RCV is confusing, unreliable, and threatens Republican victories.

What Is RCV?

Voters rank candidates in order of preference. If no one wins a majority, the lowest-ranked candidates are eliminated, and votes are redistributed until someone hits 50%. Sounds simple—but it's not.



RCV complicates voting, especially for seniors, new voters, and busy workers. Many ballots end up tossed because voters don't rank enough candidates. In Alaska, over 11,000 ballots were discarded during their first RCV election.



Unpopular Candidates Can Win

RCV can elect candidates who didn't win the most first-choice votes. That means voters' top picks might be eliminated early—letting bland, middle-of-the-road candidates win by default.

Slow and Untrustworthy Counts

RCV delays results for days or weeks as ballots are manually retabulated. That fuels mistrust, legal battles, and voter frustration.

Hurts Republican Candidates

RCV favors liberal candidates, especially in urban areas. It dilutes bold conservative messaging and penalizes voters who don't rank every option. In 2022, RCV helped a Democrat win Alaska's House seat—despite a Republican majority.

Keep Michigan's Elections Simple

RCV is a confusing, flawed system that threatens voter confidence and Republican wins. Saginaw County Republicans must stand firm:

No to Ranked Choice Voting. Yes to fair, secure, and transparent elections.

ELECTION WORKERS NEEDED!

State law requires that election inspectors (also known as election workers) be hired in equal numbers from the two major political parties. For the 2024 Presidential Election, Detroit hired 4,500 inspectors. However, only 12% of them were Republicans. Why so few? While the law requires party balance, that balance can only be achieved if enough qualified applicants from each party are available.

Despite strong recruitment efforts in 2024, too few Republicans applied, completed training, and showed up to work. The bottom line: If we want election oversight, we have to show up and provide it. Those who work as election inspectors in 2025 will be given priority for hiring in the critical 2026 election. This is a paid position, with daily pay ranging from \$300 to \$600.
