



Ranked-Choice Voting

A Scheme to Divide and Confuse Michigan Voters

Some groups are pushing to bring *Ranked-Choice Voting (RCV)* to Michigan, promising that it will make elections "fairer." But behind the slick talking points is a system that confuses voters, delays results, and often leads to outcomes that don't reflect the true will of the people.

Ballots Can Be Thrown Out

In RCV, if all the candidates you rank are eliminated in successive rounds, your ballot is "exhausted" — tossed out before the final tally. That means your vote no longer counts toward deciding the winner, even if you showed up, followed instructions, and cast a ballot. In Maine, where RCV is used statewide, studies show up to 60% of winners were declared with support from fewer than half of all voters who cast ballots.

Pelayed Election Results Breed Distrust

Traditional Michigan elections give us results on Election Night. With RCV, results take days or even weeks, because every ballot must be re-tabulated in multiple rounds. These delays fuel rumors, conspiracy theories, and mistrust in the system. **We need clarity and transparency, not confusion and waiting games.**

It's Confusing for Voters

Even supporters of RCV admit it's complicated. Voters must rank multiple candidates correctly — and many ballots are discarded for being filled out "wrong." In places like New York City, confusion was so high that **tens of thousands of ballots were disqualified** in the very first RCV election.

It Divides and Weakens Conservative Voters

RCV can actually punish grassroots conservative candidates. If several like-minded candidates split the vote, the transfers often push through a less-preferred candidate from the other side. That means the system could **weaken the very base it pretends to empower.**

Michigan Law Blocks It — For Now

Though some cities (Ann Arbor, Royal Oak, Kalamazoo, East Lansing, Ferndale) have voted for RCV, **Michigan law does not currently allow it.** Pro-RCV groups are already gearing up for a **2026 statewide ballot proposal**. Meanwhile, Republican legislators are working on bills to permanently ban it. The fight is coming.

Why This Matters for Saginaw County

Michigan families are already stretched by high taxes, inflation, and uncertainty. The last thing voters need is a new voting system that is confusing, divisive, and expensive to implement. Ranked-Choice Voting isn't about making democracy better — it's about changing the rules to benefit special interests

Bottom Line: Ranked-Choice Voting is a scheme designed to divide and confuse Michigan voters. Let's keep our elections simple, transparent, and trustworthy.

Remembering our History....

Eisenhower and the Interstate Highway System

Have you taken a vacation this summer? Did you travel over an interstate highway? If you did, you might say a prayer of thanksgiving for President Dwight D. Eisenhower (R)!



In 1908, Henry Ford introduced the Model T—a dependable, affordable car soon found in many American garages. By 1927, his company had sold nearly 15 million of them! "Automobiling" became, no longer a mere luxury for the wealthy, but a necessity for everyday Americans. Other manufacturers took note & began building affordable cars as well.

A nation of drivers needs good roads—but building roads was EXPENSIVE. Who would pay?? At first, private companies built & operated them for a profit. However, car companies, manufacturers, gas station owners & suburban developers set out to convince state/local governments that roads were a public concern—and they were successful! Elected officials began using taxpayer dollars to construct & improve roads. Prior to 1956, the federal government split the cost of roads with the states (except for the New Deal public works agencies)—but this was not getting roads built fast enough. Enter Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Eisenhower's experience as Supreme Commander of Allied Forces in western Europe during World War 2 convinced him of the value of high-quality, long-distance roads. Deeply impressed by the German Autobahn, he saw how good roads permitted quick & efficient transit of troops & supplies. The Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1944 had authorized the construction of a 40,000-mile "National System of Interstate Highways" in the U.S., but offered no way to pay for it. So, after he became president in 1953, Eisenhower resolved to build the highways that lawmakers had been talking about for years.





In 1954, he appointed Lieut. Gen. Lucius Clay, one of his former aides & an engineer, to lead the President's Advisory Committee on the National Highway System. Clay's committee drafted a plan, highlighting increases in safety, enhanced economic activity, cost reductions, and benefits to national defense as compelling reasons to invest billions into highways. The national-defense argument became more convincing as the Cold War progressed—fear of nuclear conflict & the need for mass evacuations of urban areas galvanized support. At Eisenhower's urging, Congress passed the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1956, creating the Interstate

Highway System as we know it today. The law authorized the construction of 41,000 miles of interstate highway spanning the nation, and allocated \$26 billion to pay for them. The federal government would pay 90% of the cost through increasing the gasoline tax from 2 cents a gallon to 3.

Over decades in construction, our interstate highway system was the largest public works project in our history—pumping billions into the economy all over the nation, and continuing to do so today thru ongoing maintenance & repairs. Even Hawaii, Alaska & Puerto Rico have "interstate highways" because this term designates a class of road whose funding & upkeep are mostly provided by the federal government. President Eisenhower spent years guiding the implementation of the 1956 Highway Act—thus becoming "the Father of the Interstate System." Although our interstates were created, in part, to help in the event of an emergency, these highways—with their controlled-access, absence of intersections (thanks to overpasses & underpasses), minimum of 4 lanes, and design supporting high-speed driving—bolster interstate



commerce. Trucks move products & supplies quickly. The mobility of Americans fuels the growth of suburbia & the popularity of vacation travel (& the hospitality industry). Today, Americans drive more than 285 million cars & trucks over 48,890 miles of America's Interstate Highway System. Thank you, President Eisenhower!

School Bond Millage Increases

With nothing else on the ballot, there will be a special election in Saginaw Twp and Birch Run for **November 4th 2025**. Saginaw Township Community Schools is proposing a \$169.2 million bond which the school board presents as "affordable" for local residents, however many who already are finding it hard to make ends meet do not agree. It is a large

amount they want to borrow and the interest on nearly \$170 million over 25 years will have taxpayers footing the bill for 25 years. They will be paying long after the improvements and technology they want to buy will be obsolete and in need of upgrading again. Even the fact that the board has chosen to hold an election when nothing else is on the ballot demonstrates poor planning as it will generate yet another bill of approx. \$120,000 to be paid. They did the same thing two years ago and paid for that election which failed.

Likewise in Birch Run the school board there has proposed a \$17.8 million Michigan's property tax system already places many homeowners at risk. Falling behind on taxes—even by a small amount—can eventually lead to foreclosure. Seniors, veterans, and fixed-income households are particularly vulnerable. Adding a long-term bond of these sizes increases these risks, making it essential for voters to fully understand the financial commitment before casting a ballot. Voters across the region are being asked to dig deeper into their wallets, with little assurance these spending plans will deliver results.

More Volunteers Needed for Free Food Distributions in Saginaw County



The risk of going hungry continues to affect many families across Saginaw County. Local groups like Hidden Harvest, the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan, East Side Soup Kitchen, and The Caring Closet provide free groceries and meals each week, but the need keeps growing. AMERICANS FOR CITIZEN VOTING: SECURING MICHIGAN ELECTIONS

Americans for Citizen Voting (https://www.michcov.com) is leading a ballot initiative to amend the Michigan state constitution to require that *only U.S. citizens* may vote in Michigan elections. The measure also calls for stricter voter ID laws and regular voter roll verification.

Supporters, including state Republican leaders, say the proposal is needed to restore confidence in elections. Opponents, like the ACLU of Michigan and Common Cause, argue it would create unnecessary barriers and disenfranchise eligible voters.



The Citizens Only Voting Initiative delivers the safeguards Michigan voters need to restore confidence in our elections. This isn't about partisanship — it's about protecting the voices of real Michigan citizens and ensuring that every lawful vote counts. The initiative takes a three-step approach to secure the integrity of our elections:



Citizens-Only Guarantee

Our initiative amends the Michigan Constitution to clearly state that only U.S. citizens may vote in state and local elections. This closes the loopholes that allow non-citizens to slip through the cracks and ensures our elections remain for citizens only.

Voter Roll Verification

It requires the Michigan Secretary of State to regularly review the voter rolls and remove any non-citizens who are found. Clean and accurate

voter rolls are the backbone of fair elections, and this mandate ensures every ballot cast comes from a qualified voter.

Photo ID Requirement

The initiative establishes a commonsense requirement that voters present a valid photo ID before casting a ballot. This safeguard confirms voter identity, prevents fraud, and protects the value of every legitimate vote.

Together, these reforms will restore trust in Michigan's elections, strengthen our democracy, and ensure that the voices shaping our future are the voices of Michigan citizens.

The campaign is now gathering signatures to qualify for the 2026 ballot.

Dear Secretary Benson,

Under section 13 of article 5 of the Michigan Constitution of 1963 and the Michigan Election Law, 1954 PA 116, MCL 168.178 and MCL 168.634, I issue this call for a special primary election and special election for the 35th District of the Michigan Senate. This election call is issued for the purpose of filling the vacancy caused by the resignation of Senator Kristen McDonald Rivet.

The vacancy described above will be filled according to the following schedule:

4:00 p.m. on Last Date for Democratic and

Republican Party candidates to file affidavits of identity and nominating

affidavits of identity and nominating petitions or filing fee – by 4:00 p.m.

February 3, 2026 Special Primary Election.

May 5, 2026 Special Election.

Please initiate the procedures required under Michigan law to accomplish this call for a special election. Thank you for your assistance.
