

Washing Machines

There continue to be ongoing issues with several of the washing machines in the laundry room. The company that services our appliances — including stoves, fridges, and washers — has advised that the current machines are not built to withstand the high level of use they are receiving.

Their recommendation is to replace the existing units with commercial-grade machines. However, this would come at a significantly higher cost, which may require a substantial increase in laundry fees or capital funding.

The Board is reviewing options and will keep members informed as we explore next steps. We appreciate your patience and understanding in the meantime.

Unit Inspections Scheduled for August

Throughout the month of August, unit inspections will be taking place across the co-op community. These inspections are part of our continued efforts to maintain property standards, ensure member safety, and plan responsibly for future maintenance needs.

Each unit will be inspected by our contracted engineering team, with the support of a Board

representative. Inspections will include both interior and exterior components and are expected to take approximately 30 minutes per unit.

Members will receive advance notice of their scheduled inspection date and time. If you are unable to be home during your inspection, please ensure the office has a working key on file (or your provide a neighbour with your unit key) and that pets are safely secured. These inspections are mandatory and form part of our co-op's commitment to responsible stewardship and community upkeep.

We thank all members for their cooperation and support during this important phase of our maintenance review process.

Maintaining Your Unit: A Shared Responsibility

As members of a housing co-operative, we share both the benefits and the responsibilities of community living. One of the most important responsibilities is keeping your unit in good repair.

When you were interviewed and accepted into the co-op, you agreed to uphold certain standards — including maintaining your unit and attending to small repairs yourself. This includes tasks such as replacing light bulbs, tightening door handles, clearing drains, or repairing minor wear and tear. These day-to-day efforts contribute significantly to the safety, livability, and overall condition of our homes and help reduce unnecessary strain on the co-op's limited maintenance budget.

In addition, members are reminded that basements must be kept clear and accessible. Excessive clutter, blocked electrical panels, or obstructed furnace areas pose not only maintenance barriers but also serious fire and safety risks. Inaccessible basements delay inspections, hinder emergency response, and compromise the overall integrity of the coop's property.

Taking pride in your unit is part of what makes cooperative living successful. When each of us does our part, we contribute to a safer, more affordable, and more respectful community for all.

If you're unsure whether a repair is your responsibility or if you need support in accessing resources, please contact the office or refer to your Member Handbook. Let's continue to care for our homes — together.

Without Us, There Is No Co-op


