UNVEILING OF MEMORIAL BY GENERAL SIR WALTER ROSS, K.B.E., C.B.

On Monday, 2nd October, the people of Sleat assembled in large numbers to pay their tribute of respect to the memory of the sons of the parish who gave their lives in defence of their King and Country in the Great War. General Ross, on his arrival, inspected the ex-Service Men, who were drawn up in front of the Memorial, under the command of Sergeant C. Angus, late 4th Camerons. Among the ex-Service men were many who had served overseas under command of General Ross.

The memorial service opened in Gaelic with the singing of Rsalm 60, second to fourth verse, led by Rev. K. Ross, after which Mr Maclean, United Free Church, engaged in prayer, and read Isaiah ii., 1-4, and Romans viii., 28-39.

Colonel Kemble, hon, secretary to the Memorial Committee, in a few words of formal introduction, referred to the distinguished services which General Ross had rendered to his country.

General Ross expressed his thanks for the honour conferred upon him in being asked to unveil this Memorial. It was natural that the Sleat Memorial should have a special and sad interest for him, as it bore the names of two Interest for film, as it bore the names of two of his nephews—sons of his sister, the late Lady Macdonald. It was our duty to keep in loving remembrance the memory of those who went forth to fight for their country's honour and safety and never returned. It was due to them that we as a nation had been saved from the horous of a faccion involved. saved from the horrors of a foreign invasion. They all heartily wished that war could be abolished amongst the nations of the world; and there was now a new conception or plan to bring that about, namely, the League of Nations. But they never knew what might Nations. But they never knew what imparts happen. It was therefore still necessary for Britain to insure against war—in other words, to be prepared.

General Ross then pulled the cord, released the Union Jack, exposing the four panels of

the Memorial.

Thereupon Colonel Kemble read out the Linereupon Coionel Kemble read out the Roll of Honour, consisting of fifty-one names in all, being natives of the parish, and including no less than eight officers, out of a total population of one thousand.

This concluded, the Rev. K. Ross offered the dedication prayer in English, and led the singing of the last three verses of Psalm 46, in the same language.

Colonel Martin Martin thanked General Ross for his excellent address, which he felt sure they all greatly appreciated. He was sorry they did not have the pleasure of seeing Lady Ross, as was expected. Colonel Martin Martin, on behalf of the subscribers, then handed over the Memorial to the custody of the Pewish Causell of Sleat the Parish Council of Sleat.

Rev. K. Ross, Chairman, in the name of the Parish Council, accepted the custody of the monument. He said it gave the Council special satisfaction to receive this charge from Colonel Martin, the gallant soldier father of a distinguished soldier son, whose name, with so many others, appeared upon the Maranial the Memorial.

Rev. K. Ross pronounced the benediction in Rev. K. Ross pronounced the henediction in Gaelic, and afterwards Pipe-Major Young, 3rd Camerons, played "Flowers of the Forest" and "Lochaber no more," and Bugler Cameron, of the Cameron Highlanders, sounded the "Last Post," and, after a minute's silence, the "Reveille."

The Hon. Mrs Macdonald then placed a beautiful evergreen wreath to the memory of the glorious dead at the foot of the inscription panel; and Pte. Donald Nicolson, late Cameron Highlanders, Sasaig, the most severely disabled soldier in the parish, placed a wreath of white heather given by the ex-Service men in memory of their fallen and the parish were serviced. comrades. A number of other wreaths were also placed around the base of the monument, making a most pleasing display of colour.

The monument will be a prominent landmark, standing as it does on a knoll overlooking the Sound of Sleat and quite close to the main high road.

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
