FLORIDA STATE FAIR YOUTH CHAMPION PROGRAM

I would like to introduce you to the <u>Florida State Fair Youth</u> <u>Champion Program</u> located in Tampa, Florida!

Just simply a great way for Florida youth, ages 8-18, with a desire to exhibit livestock and learn more about a specific species of an animal. An impressive program to be involved in with a yearly rotation of various topics, including: health, reproduction, nutrition, marketing & products of animals. It keeps the information challenging to the youth each year.

Each year, the Youth Program begins in September when Florida youth are invited to attend a seminar to educate them in the various aspects of the program. A choreographed day moves the first time exhibitors, as well as the experienced youth, through a variety of topics to prepare each potential exhibitor to do the best job in preparing themselves and their animal for the FSF Youth Livestock Show held each February.

The Champion Program promotes the positive aspects of showing livestock with the appropriate halter classes and showmanship opportunities for the exhibitors to earning ribbons and premiums for their efforts. The Champion Program includes other activities for the participants during their 3 to 4 days at the fairgrounds. The youth earn points by participating in the activities which, in turn, earns them money for participating and doing their best in those events.

• attend the 'ask me' booth, at the fair, to inform the public about the animal that is presented,

- 'hands-on' skill-a-thon stations to assess knowledge on particular levels of achievement,
- a <u>knowledge evaluation</u> over preparation of the animal record book and
- participation at the <u>annual workshop</u> in held each September prior to the Fair.

The FSF Youth Llama/Alpaca Committee also offers other workshops throughout the year to encourage youth to participate with their animals to increase showing skills or their fiber interests.

Each animal program is operated through the Florida State Fair Agriculture Livestock Staff and those folks are very devoted to the Youth Program. The specific species maintain committee chairs and members that work tirelessly to ensure that the workshops, seminars, and livestock shows are adequately staffed and operate smoothly. As I believe in all


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shows, there are many volunteers, sponsors, parents, leaders, and unknown heroes that contribute to the Youth Program faithfully throughout the year for these programs.

LLAMA LOVE

If I were asked to pick one highlight from this past year, it would be helping to train llamas.

How did I get interested in llamas? We passed a llama farm, Peloquin's Perch, on our way to almost everywhere and I began to like watching the

llamas. So we called the farm to see if we could stop by and meet the llamas. Now I enjoy helping the llamas every week with the owner, Dorthe Peloquin.

You're probably thinking that llamas spit and wouldn't be very fun to work with. No, llamas don't spit very often despite what people say. Only

the male llamas spit and for territorial reasons. So when I work with llamas, I don't get spit on.

What kind of tricks do the llamas do? Several times a year, the llamas go to competitions. They

do their tricks in front of the judges and are given awards depending on their performance. Some tricks that the llamas do are bridges, complicated bridges, teeter-totters, stepping through tires, loading and unloading into a trailer, self-loading into a trailer, going under covered "caravans," walking

through pool noodles, and even things as simple as looking into a mirror. When being judged for their physical form, they have to show their teeth and hooves to the judges. A straight back gets more points than an arched back. There are a lot of different awards the llamas can earn and a lot of tricks to perform.



Some of the baby llamas, called crias, I work with are Spotacular and Smokey. Spotacular is a very curious boy and always manages to chew on my shirt! He is very talented for being about 8 months old and has a quality physical form. Smokey is



only a few weeks old and is doing complicated bridges and self-loading, which are advanced moves. I was privileged with seeing his birth, and then halter-training him; getting him used to the halter. He's very sweet and pals with Spotacular. Watching them grow in not only size, but skills, is enjoyable.

One day, I came for my training session and met a new baby llama. Sadly, he had a wry face which means his upper jaw was twisted. Because of this deformity, it was hard for him to eat and he wasn't expected to live very long. The next week, he had managed to eat, and we began to hope he would survive. If he did, he was going to be a therapy llama named Phantom, from Phantom of the Opera due to his "masked" face. Even though he was able to eat, it didn't provide enough nutrition and he

passed away after two weeks. But now there is a new llama named Pearl E. White and she's a stubborn llama!

I love working with llamas and enjoy their fun personalities.

Mr. Peanut, the Pack Llama

Mr. Peanut and I go back a long way together. He was the first llama I purchased in 1997. So we sort of figured out llama packing as a team. Our team was built on trust and it has continued for 19 years. Mr. Peanut will turned 20, September 26, 2016. He has packed commercially for 17 years and **is still going**. He is one of those llamas who fits anywhere in the pack string. However, since he is older he prefers to bring up the rear where he can set his own pace.

I attribute his longevity in the packing industry to never overloading his panniers. You will notice in the photo his pasterns are not broken down and he still maintains a straight back for the most part. He has never been a llama to "over indulge in the groceries" and he has maintained a steady weight. His short wool and athleticism are also qualities found in the ideal pack llama. A will and desire to pack is also one of Mr. Peanut's attributes. Once he even climbed into the stock trailer before I was ready to go!

He has been used as a demo in several Llama Packing 101 classes in the southeast. Mr. Peanut has been an excellent role model for our younger llamas in training for our pack string.

Mr. Peanut still utilizes his original Mt. Sopris saddle and panniers I purchased in 1999. This packing system has become the "gold standard" for San Juan Mountains Llamas. I have tried other systems but Mt. Sopris has certainly proven its worth over time.
