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RESULTS OF NY STATE PROFICIENCY AND REGENTS EXAMS

Ticonderoga Central School District ranked near the bottom statewide in the 2023–24 New York State proficiency and Regents exams, performing significantly below many neighboring North Country districts. According to data compiled from Syracuse.com and the NYS Department of Education, Ticonderoga placed 596th in Grade 3–8 ELA proficiency and 548th in Math out of roughly 600 participating schools.

In contrast, top regional performers like Keene and Lake George consistently ranked in the top 100 across most subjects.

While Ticonderoga achieved a strong 96% proficiency in the Geometry Regents (ranked 39th), its performance in core academic areas and middle school science, where it ranked 527th, highlights concerning academic challenges that may warrant closer attention and intervention.

LGPC SEPTIC SYSTEM INSPECTION REPORT

The Lake George Park Commission (LGPC) was created by the State of New York to protect and enhance the resources of the Lake George Park and its surrounding environment. To this end, the commission is granted powers and authorities by the NYS Legislature to enact and carry out projects, programs and regulations that advance these causes. Article 43 of the NYS Environmental Conservation Law is where the commission's authorities and responsibilities lie and one of those responsibilities is to help ensure that wastewater discharges within the Lake George Park meet or exceed NYS standards.

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SAC UPDATE

The 2024-2025 school year has ended, but the School Advisory Committee (SAC) is continuing its efforts to address the Ticonderoga Central School District's (TCSD) academic performance improvement.

The SAC is seeking a meeting with elementary school administrators and personnel to look into curriculum, policies, and practices and how we can effectively help.

Academic Performance Improvement (API) is a major thrust in the SAC's ongoing direct efforts with the district and its Board of Education (BoE). In that regard, parent participation, not just committee involvement, will be needed to make significant progress. The SAC will be reaching out to Hague and Ticonderoga parents with school-age children for their insight and their influence in dealing with the API.

The SAC efforts have continued to attempt to understand how we school taxpayers have seemingly been shortchanged in the several Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) agreements entered into by the Town of Ticonderoga and the TCSD.

The terms and conditions of the energy project PILOTs were actually negotiated by the Essex County Industrial Development Agency (ECIDA) in the early 2020s. The Town of Ticonderoga and the TCSD BoE were signatories.

The ECIDA was at the June 17th TCSD BoE meeting mainly to respond to the SAC's PILOT White Paper, which was presented at the March 13th Hague Town Hall. Hague citizens got to ask lots of questions, as did TCSD BoE members. The ECIDA defended its position, saying it was the best they could do at the time and that "something was better than nothing."

It was claimed that the solar projects would not have happened without PILOTs and it was stated that they thought they had no jurisdiction in Lake Champlain with the Canada - NYC cable project.

The representative did admit that 91% and 77% reductions for solar and cable projects respectively would "not be agreed to today." Based on an initial review, it appears we have little recourse regarding the existing PILOT agreements.

The SAC will continue to advocate with the TCSD BoE for inclusion of the Full Market Value of the energy projects in the calculation of the school tax levy apportionment, an option which is within the TCSD BoE's limited discretion.

The levy is largely determined by the TCSD BoE in July and finalized in August, so time is of the essence. \square

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PLANNING BOARD - 5/1/2025

Present were Chairman Sandra Powell and Board Members Pamela Peterson, Alane Vogel, and Henry Friedman. Absent was Judy Gourley, who was recently deceased. Also present were Zoning Enforcement Officer Ed Kirchberger, Recording Secretary Kathy Santaniello, and guest Ken Parlin.

There were no public hearings.

ZONING ISSUES: Parlin Subdivision

The board discussed a proposed subdivision involving four parcels owned by the Parlin family, located on Dot and Jack Lane and on Pudding Lane. The proposal seeks to rearrange the current four parcels — some of which are nonconforming — into four all-conforming lots. The purpose of the change is for future conveyances and estate planning.

Because one of the proposed lot line changes passes through wetlands, the Adirondack Park Agency (APA) has determined that this is a Class A Regional Project, which gives the APA jurisdiction as lead agency. The Hague Planning Board reviewed the application and proactively issued its advisory opinion, pending official notification from the APA.

After review, the board determined the application to be complete and voted to make a positive referral to the APA, with no conditions. Considerations included: conversion of two nonconforming lots into conforming ones, compliance with shoreline width requirements, and lack of new development or construction. The motion passed unanimously (4-0).

ZONING ISSUES: Viscardi Solar Panel Installation

The board reviewed a site plan application for rooftop solar panels and inverters at 7 Viewpoint. Because the project is located within 100 feet of the lake, it requires additional scrutiny under zoning code 160-23 C(1)(g). Questions were raised about the panel height, angle, glare, and direction. No applicant representatives were present. A site visit was scheduled for May 13th at 2 pm, and ZEO Kirchberger requested that a representative attend and be prepared to answer outstanding questions.

OTHER BUSINESS

The board recognized the recent passing of Judy Gourley, who had served on the Hague Planning Board since 2013 and was also active in the Hague Volunteer Fire Department (HVFD). A memorial service is planned for this summer.

The board also noted the upcoming memorial for Linda Mury on June 5th at the Episcopal Church in Ticonderoga.

Chairman Powell reminded members that attachments for their notebooks would be distributed soon and that she and Alane Vogel would attend APA training next week. Board vacancies remain and interested residents are encouraged to apply.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS - 5/22/2025

Present were Chairman Robert Goetsch and Board Members Jon Hanna, Tina Barth-King, and Chris Navitsky. Absent was Chris Richards. Also present were Zoning Enforcement Officer Ed Kirchberger, Recording Secretary Kathy Santaniello, and guest Todd Lincoln.

There were no public hearings.

ZONING ISSUES: Lincoln – 5 Bayberry Lane – VAR 16-23 & VAR 01-24

Lincoln previously received variances and completed his project, but a small change required review before final compliance. A door originally approved for the utility room was replaced with a window based on advice from the Warren County Building Inspector. The change avoided the need for a step and possibly another variance due to elevation concerns. Zoning Enforcement Officer Kirchberger confirmed the utility room's small size made the door impractical and that no other changes were made to the approved plan. The Cape Cod Homeowners Association was also agreeable to the change.

After discussion, the board approved the modification, stating it did not alter the original variance. The vote was unanimous.

Goetsch thanked those who attended the recent APA training. He also noted that there are current vacancies for alternates on both the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Appeals, as well as one regular Planning Board member. Interested individuals are encouraged to contact ZEO Kirchberger.

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PLANNING BOARD - 6/5/2025

Present were Chairperson Sandra Powell and Board Members Pamela Peterson, Alane Vogel, and Henry Friedman. Also present were Zoning Enforcement Officer Ed Kirchberger, Recording Secretary Kathy Santaniello, Zoning Board of Appeals Chairperson Robert Goetsch, and ZBA Board Members Jon Hanna, Tina Barth-King, Chris Navitsky, and Chris Richards.

ZONING ISSUES: Baird Sketch Plan - 44 Pudding Lane

Robert Holmes of RU Holmes Engineers presented plans for the Bairds' proposed redevelopment at 44 Pudding Lane, involving a lot line adjustment, site plan review, and variance. The project includes replacing existing buildings with a three-bedroom home and garage/in-law apartment, maintaining a four-bedroom total. Setback improvements are planned, though parts remain within the 50-foot shoreline buffer. Board members asked about lot size, stormwater control, building height,

shoreline buffering, impervious surface increase, and neighbor notification. The board thanked ZBA members for attending.

ZONING ISSUES: Fusco Sketch Plan - 20 Silver Bay Road

The applicant proposes a lot line adjustment that would reduce a conforming lot to non-conforming. The applicant was not present. ZEO Kirchberger noted unresolved joint ownership issues. The board expressed consensus against proceeding.

SUBDIVISIONS: Bullock - 6 and 18 Chipwick Lane

The applicant proposes separating the two lots, with Lot 6 receiving a 20-foot easement over Lot 18 for lake access. The board requested an updated survey, SEQR form, and clearer legal language on the easement. A site visit will be scheduled once materials are submitted. Action was tabled until July.

OLD BUSINESS: Viscardi - 7 Viewpoint

Following a site visit, the board made a negative SEQR declaration and deemed the application complete for rooftop solar panels. As neighbor notification is unconfirmed, the item was tabled to the July 10th meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: Walker - 9094 Lakeshore Drive

Architect Renee Poulin presented plans for a six-bedroom home on the former Lakeshore Garage site. The board raised concerns about potential soil contamination, shoreline buffering, neighborhood character, and insufficient parking. A SEQR form is pending, and the board requested additional information.

OTHER BUSINESS

Chairperson Powell thanked attendees of the recent APA conference.

tax map #60.13-1-20, owned by C. Stuart Kelley. Holmes detailed the need for eight variances and explained the system layout. There were no public questions. The board then approved the variances after reviewing a letter from Cedarwood Engineering dated June 6th.

ANNOUNCEMENT: July Hearing for Voss and Convery Trust

Patchett noted that public hearings regarding recommendations from the New York State Department of Health for the Voss and Convery Trust properties will be held in July.

PRESENTATION: Medicaid Cuts

Dr. John Rugge discussed potential Medicaid cuts and urged residents to join the Healthcare Coalition for the North Country by visiting www.northcountrymedicaid.org/tools-for-residents.

COMMUNITY REQUESTS AND UPDATES

Ginger Henry Kuenzel received permission to hang storyboards for the June 25th HHS event.

Residents again raised concerns about dredging Hague Brook. Patchett reported ongoing efforts with the grant writer and agencies.

The damaged railing near the DEC fish hatchery trail was discussed. DeLarm Rypkema will follow up with the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC).

HIGHWAY GARAGE RENOVATION

Nicholas Bandel of Cedarwood Engineering outlined the proposed scope of services for the highway garage renovation, including surveys, designs, permitting, and bid preparation.

LGA'S DR. WILTSE TESTIFIES

On May 21, 2025, the New York State Senate Environmental Conservation Committee held a public hearing on Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs) to assess current monitoring efforts, policy effectiveness, emerging solutions, and state support for communities.

Dr. Brandon Wiltse presented the Jefferson Project's science-driven approach, including a Low Impact Development Certification Program used in the Lake George Watershed to reduce nutrient runoff.

This model has helped prevent toxic HABs on Lake George and could serve as a statewide solution.



LGPC SEPTIC SYSTEM INSPECTION REPORT, CONT'D

regulations at 6NYCRR 646-3.6. The program includes a mandatory, five-year recurrent septic system inspection for all systems located within 500 feet of Lake George or within 100 feet of AA-S streams designated or mapped by the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) (NYS ECL 17-0301).

There are roughly 2,500 septic systems that are in the septic inspection. This population of systems is split over a schedule of five years (2023-2027), which requires the inspection of approximately 500 systems per year.

Inspection years are split geographically evenly throughout the park with roughly 20% of the systems in each municipality intended to be inspected per year. This helps ensure that any given municipality is not overburdened with subsequent reviews and approvals for any new systems required. To assist local communities and homeowner's associations, such properties were grouped together by tax map block and lot numbers so neighborhoods would be inspected on a similar year.



LOOKING BACK

July 1975 – 50 years ago – an interview NELSON WATERS RECALLS

The name Sabbath Day Point was used in Rogers Journal, June 25, 1758, the season before General Amherst landed there. Therefore, says Nelson Waters, the origin of the name is still and always has been in doubt.

When the John Jay burned near Garfield's Bay, the six who jumped overboard drowned, the rest (number unknown) were rescued by boats from the shore.

The year the old town shed was built, a saw mill called an "up and down" mill was run by Nathan Yaw. Later he built a saw mill powered by a water wheel which was underneath it. Logs were reduced to lumber at ground level. Slabs and edgings were sold and dry lumber was planed into finished products upstairs.

I was in school, Mr. Waters continued, when we had the greatest downpour of short duration that I ever witnessed. The mill collapsed and some of the large timbers and parts of the mill went all the way down to the lake. The plane, a Champion, weighing approximately one to two tons, came to rest just below Stanley Frasier's house. Steel shafting was washed as far as the post office. The plane stopped at a point where there was once a bridge over the brook. The abutments for the bridge were washed away as well as two-thirds of the new state road which had just been built. Also washed away were two piers which had been on the state road side, a low wall, 16 to 20 feet long and two large millstones, one of which can still be seen in the brook.

After this loss, a new mill was built on the edge of the bank. The steam engine, boiler and saw mill were purchased from Zilbert Eichen in Ticonderoga and drawn to the site with horses.

When Frank Crossman's house burned my father sold him and Fred Fish the grist mill and adjoining brush back

buildings to tear down and build a new house for Frank. This is the house where Clifton Frasier now lives. The shafting and pulleys were sold to Nathan Yaw who built a new cider mill which was operated by water power into the 1920's. The mill was eventually moved to my property where it was operated with a gasoline engine from about 1931 to 1945. It could again be made operational in about 30 days.

According to the history of Warren County, the original name of Hague Brook was Quaker Brook. It flowed into Lake George at McDonald's Bay. Ed Davis and Henry Shattuck tell me they can remember when there was no road alongside this brook. In those days it was called Alder Brook by town residents. Others called it Mill Brook because of all the mills on its banks.

When the original road went over Battle Hill, up Split Rock Road and Toad Hollow Road, the first voting place was up there in a house later owned by my father. There was also a cider mill there. Cider Mill Hill received its name because of it.

Jabe's Pond was originally called 7th Pond which was near an abandoned iron mine which is on the south-southwest side of Spruce Mountain.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE FORT

Commemorations, reenactments, and educational events are taking place nationwide to mark the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution—and Fort Ticonderoga is leading the charge with a multi-year tribute to the early fight for independence.

Although the official anniversary spans 2025 to 2026, Fort Ticonderoga will extend its programming into 2027, reflecting the site's key role in the Revolution's early stages. It was here, in 1775, that American forces secured their first major victory by capturing the fort and its artillery.

The anniversary programming includes reenactments, immersive experiences, and new exhibitions designed to bring the period to life. Central to these efforts is *Real Time Revolution*, a living-history initiative that recreates events from 1775 through 1777 on a day-by-day basis, highlighting the choices and actions that helped shape the emerging nation.

Educational outreach will also expand, connecting students, teachers, and history enthusiasts with this critical time in engaging ways.
