FUTURE OF HAGUE DISCUSSED AT MEETING

A full house of residents and other stakeholders gathered on July 10, 2025, at the Hague Community Center to discuss the future of Hague. Town Supervisor Joshua Patchett welcomed attendees and explained that the meeting was intended to gather public input on long-term planning for the town and on possible improvements, especially to the Hague Town Park and Beach.

Tracey Clothier, CEO of Clothier Planning and Consultants, presented the results of a recent town survey, which had 248 responses out of 660 households, which she described as a strong participation rate. She introduced a proposal for a new Welcome/Visitors Center to replace the current building at the town beach, noting the structure's lack of ADA-compliant bathrooms, limited winter use, and lack of an optimal lake view.

Clothier emphasized that no funding had yet been secured and that her priority would be to apply for grants, including a \$25,000 Smart Growth Grant that would require a \$5,000 match.

She presented architectural renderings from JMP Architects showing a modern Adirondack building with glass facing the lake. She encouraged attendees to share feedback on posters that had been placed around the room.

Supervisor Patchett noted the proposed building's estimated cost of

The Hague Historical Society's (HHS) newest exhibit, "Meet Me at the Cave," opened to an enthusiastic crowd on June 25, 2025 at the Hague Community Center. The event celebrated the much-loved bar that once operated beneath the Beachside Motel, bringing together residents and former patrons for a night of shared memories.

HHS President Ginger Kuenzel began the evening with a presentation tracing the site's history from pre-Revolutionary days to the Cave's run from the 1940s until its demolition in 1991. Staying open until the wee hours of the night, the Cave was a year-round gathering place for the community.

SCHOOL ADVISORY COMMITTEE (SAC)

Interestingly, the School Advisory Committee (SAC) Report as presented in the minutes of the July 8, 2025 monthly regular Town Board Meeting, (see page five) was reported in its entirety in the *Glens Falls Post Star* and the *Plattsburgh Press* (both Republican newspapers) and in *Yahoo News*. This coverage is good news for the citizens of the Ticonderoga Central School District (TCSD.) The SAC has been trying to inform them about our perceived need for academic performance improvement in the TCSD.

Michael Galow, who is a SAC member and a new Rural Schools Association of NY (RSA) member for the SAC, attended the July 2025 RSA Summer Conference in Lake Placid. Mike has filed a complete report of the conference. One of Mike's observations was a sense of "realistic optimism" regarding the deep cuts to federal funding for education, not wariness and dread. Mike also reports that the attendees he spoke with were exemplars of professionally trained and dedicated educators and board members who exude a can-do spirit on behalf of the kids they serve.

In July, the SAC requested a series of meetings to work with the Board of

Education (BoE) and the TCSD community to better understand the District's Pre-K - 12 programs, curriculum, instruction, and assessment protocols developed and implemented in the district. Our request stems from our concerns regarding the NYSED current rankings, which remains the SAC's only available measure of academic performance. Our goal is to support the superintendent, the BoE, and the broader community in fostering a positive, can-do spirit focused on improving student achievement. In response to our request, the SAC has been informed by the superintendent that "The district will not be participating with the SAC group on any of the mentioned meetings that you are requesting per our attorney's directive."

With regard to rankings, the SAC has discovered another rating system of interest from Public School Review. For the 2025 school year, it reports that "This district's average testing ranking is 3/10, which is in the bottom 50% of public schools in New York," further supporting SAC's concerns. Also in July, Supervisor Patchett requested from the superintendent that the analysis of the 2025–2026 school tax levy apportionment and related rates be provided to the BoE and to the public well in advance of the August 19th BoE meeting.

Inclusion of two scenarios in the analysis was requested, viz., with and without the Full Market Value (FMV) of completed solar projects with PILOT agreements, with particular attention to the assessed values used in the analysis. This analysis affects our shared constituency and should be open to public review and input before any decision is made in the board's setting of the September school tax levy. The superintendent's response to the request had not yet been received as of the *The Hague Chronicle's* July 20th press deadline.

On a side note, in a letter to SAC on July 9th, the superintendent informed the SAC that the TCSD considers that the SAC has created "several months of correspondence, questioning, and unnecessary work for TCSD staff members." The letter says that the TCSD is increasingly concerned with the SAC's "ongoing communications, spreading of misinformation, and attempt to pressure the district into action the committee desires." Therefore, the superintendent has informed the SAC, "in the future, the district will only respond to correspondence which is required by law or policy." The SAC is pondering a response.

\$3.4 million, which prompted immediate public discussion. Residents raised concerns about redundancy, cost, beach conditions, environmental impact, infrastructure needs, and ongoing maintenance. Suggestions included improving the beach, dredging Hague Brook, addressing the stage direction, and resolving long-standing water and muck issues.

Some speakers expressed skepticism about investing in a new building before solving existing problems. Others proposed volunteer efforts and practical solutions, such as installing screens to prevent debris and creating a dredging schedule. Several residents shared frustrations over delays in pond maintenance and flooding impacts.

After many negative comments, one person said that people might feel differently if we get the grant money. He said, "This forward thinking is good."

Patchett then reiterated that the project would not move forward without public support and full funding. He also stated that the presentation would be made available online for further comment.






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ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS - 6/26/2025

Present were Chairman Robert Goetsch and Board Members Tina Barth-King, Donald Vogel, and Chris Richards. Absent were Jon Hanna and Chris Navitsky. Also present were Zoning Enforcement Officer (ZEO) Ed Kirchberger, Recording Secretary Kathy Santaniello, Linda Fusco, Bruce MacPherson, and other guests.

Zoning Issues:

FUSCO - 20 Silver Bay Road

Fusco proposed a lot line adjustment to sell a 0.06-acre strip of her 1.13-acre conforming property to neighbor Bruce MacPherson, which would result in a non-conforming lot. The Planning Board had previously expressed concern over the potential creation of a non-conforming lot.

Fusco and MacPherson explained the reasoning for the change, citing ongoing issues with trees, invasive species, and property access. MacPherson said the strip would provide a buffer for his right of way, improve access, and noted no construction was planned. Fusco emphasized that the change would not affect views or result in new structures.

Goetsch and Kirchberger both expressed concern that the variance request was unlikely to be approved due to the reduction of a conforming lot to non-conforming. Alternatives such as a smaller transfer or an easement were discussed. Fusco ultimately withdrew the application and may pursue a lot line adjustment through the Hague Planning Board.

DALEY - 9 Lakeshore Hills Drive

Shawn Daley submitted an application for a 13' x 14', one-bedroom addition and 10' x 14' screened porch on a non-conforming lot. A corner of the porch would be 9'3" from the sideline, which is under the 10' minimum setback.

Daley explained that building in the back was not feasible due to terrain and the existing layout. He has consulted with neighbors and is connected to the town sewer. The board deemed the application complete, and a site visit will be scheduled before the July 3rd planning board meeting. Daley plans to begin construction in the fall.

Other Business:

Chairman Goetsch welcomed Donald Vogel as a new ZBA alternate and reminded attendees of the Planning Board's meeting time change to 2 pm on July 3rd.

TOWN BOARD - 7/8/2025

Present were Supervisor Joshua Patchett and Board Members Edna Frasier, Lara Smith, Maureen Cherubini and Jack Bast (arrived at 6:48 pm). Also present were Deputy Supervisor Sally DeLarm Rypkema, Zoom Coordinator Tim Fiallo, Highway Superintendent Chad Dunklee, Town Clerk Kim Coffin, and 20 community members. Additional attendees joined via ZOOM.

A Moment of Silence was held for Sean Winchell and Jon Hanna.

PUBLIC HEARINGS:

Convery Irrevocable Trust (17 Oneida Drive) and Voss (9665 Lake Shore Drive): Both hearings remain open. A postponement letter was received from neighboring residents requesting the Voss hearing be continued in August. A motion passed to postpone both hearings to the August 12, 2025 meeting.

WELCOME GUESTS / PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR:

Concerns were raised about the removal from the community center of a donated coyote mount. The board explained it had been removed due to complaints of it being scary and the pending redesign of the display area. A motion passed to restore the coyote until a new display is proposed and approved by the board.

REGULAR COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Administrative (Patchett): The town is phasing out the @townofhague.org email addresses and transitioning to @HagueNY.gov by year's-end.

Buildings & Grounds/Community Center

(Frasier/Patchett): A second coat of stain was applied to the community center. Patchett repaired the historian's door. Storage quotes for dog control equipment are forthcoming.

Highway (Frasier/Dunklee): Paving was completed on Robin Hood, Lake Shore Terrace, and Overbrook. The new blower has arrived. The state will be funneling water under Hague Brook Bridge over the next two weeks.

Museum & Historian (Smith): "The Cave" program on June 25th drew such a large crowd that a second presentation will be held July 30th at the community center.

Personnel (Cherubini): A number of staffing changes were reported, including:

- Jessica Tuthill is leaving due to health issues.
- Emily Gould is stepping in as Confidential Secretary, bookkeeper, and office manager following the resignation of Desiree LaPointe. Desiree is taking up a new job as a legal assistant in her hometown of Glens Falls. We'll miss her and wish her great success!
- Oum Hilliard is expected to return in August.

New hires include:

- Jennifer Masiello as the Temporary Receptionist
- Traci Aloi on the Visitor Center staff.
 Craig Bateman on the Transfer Station staff.
- Pat Hintze was appointed Manager of the Visitor Center and Hague Town Beach and Park.

Planning/Zoning/Stormwater (Cherubini): As of July 8, 2025, 57 Short-Term Rental permits have been issued.

Town Park & Beautification: Hintze raised concerns about vehicles blocking the stairs to the beach. The highway department was notified. Markers are in place correctly.

Environmental Concerns (Patchett): The knotweed treatment program is ending soon. Residents may still request treatment.

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Technology and Communications (Patchett): All essential computers are now protected under shared services with Warren County.

School Advisory Committee (SAC) (Patchett read a report by Bast):

Ticonderoga ranked 596th in ELA and 548th in Math statewide. The fact that there are fewer teachers at Ticonderoga compared to other districts may be a factor. The SAC continues to press for improvements in academic performance and curriculum. The next school board meeting is August 19th, when the tax levy will be discussed. Residents of Hague are encouraged to attend.

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WRIGHT FAMILY TO PRESENT BOOK AT SILVER BAY

As part of the Silver Bay YMCA's summer lecture series, author Tamara Jacobi and the Wright family will present their new book, Lake George Journey, on Sunday, August 3, **2025 at 2 pm** in Morse Hall at Silver Bay. This special multi-generational event features all 11 Wright family members — from



the grandkids to grandparents Forrest and Nancy Wright, who are longtime members of the Silver Bay community.

Each family member will share a story from their favorite letter of the Lake George alphabet such as "H is for Historic Hotels of Huletts and Hague," "L is for Loon Love," or "Y is for Yacht Clubs and YMCAs." Local artists Kathy Becker, Chris Quinn, Wendy Soliday, Andrew Thompson, Shay DeRusso, and Shaundra Bartlett will share their accompanying I-spy illustrations.

Author Tamara Jacobi married into the Wright family in 2019. "I had so much to learn about the lake and wanted my kiddos to learn alongside me," she says. "This book blends family storytelling, colorful I-spy artwork from seven local artists, and education together into one. It's a journey through nature, history and community that is designed to be enjoyed by all ages — kids, parents, grandparents, and anyone who loves Lake George."

Co-authored by Jacobi and husband Walter Wright, *Lake George Journey* is the result of a deeply local, collaborative effort. The book was created in partnership with the Lake George Association (LGA) and the Lake George Land Conservancy (LGLC), and includes contributions from the Waterkeeper Alliance, the Darrin Freshwater Institute, and The Arts Project.

NEW LGA VIDEO SHOWCASES SCIENCE-TO-SOLUTIONS APPROACH

A new video from the Lake George Association (LGA) focuses on the organization's science-to-solutions approach to protecting Lake George. From reducing road salt and preventing harmful algal blooms to upgrading wastewater systems and restoring natural stream corridors, the LGA uses science, not just to study the lake, but to actively protect it.

The <u>Jefferson Project</u>, a world-renowned collaboration between the LGA, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (RPI), and IBM, is at the core of this approach. Through the deployment of roughly 500 high-tech sensors, real-time lake monitoring, and advanced data modeling, the Jefferson Project has made Lake George the "Smartest Lake in the World."

Using the data collected, the LGA develops and implements the solutions that will protect our lake for generations to come.

LGA LAUNCHES NEW INTERACTIVE PROJECT MAP

The Lake George Association (LGA), founded in 1885 as the country's first lake conservation organization, has been working to protect and preserve our lake's legendary water quality for 140 years. This is a worthy cause, but what *specifically* is the organization doing to achieve that goal?

Now, thanks to its recently launched interactive project map, you can learn about the more than 50 current LGA initiatives across the watershed, ranging from invasive species prevention and stream restoration to education programs, infrastructure upgrades, and policy advocacy.

The map allows users to filter by category and to view projects in specific locations. Zeroing in on Hague, for instance, you can click on the "storm" icon and read how a grant from the LGA is enabling Hague to capture rainwater from the highway department's roof and use it to make brine for winter road treatment. This win-win project helps reduce stormwater runoff while also supporting the town's road salt reduction efforts.

Dr. Brendan Wiltse, executive director of the LGA, describes the maps as "a living, visual record of how and where we're turning science into solutions for the protection of Lake George, every day." To view the map, click HERE.

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TI GOLF COURSE CELEBRATES 100 YEARS

The Ticonderoga Golf Course is marking its 100th anniversary with a Centennial Celebration Weekend on **Friday**, **August 15 and Saturday**, **August 16**, **2025**.

Events include a 100-yard par 3 tournament on Friday and the annual 1925 Golf Tournament on Saturday, along with family activities at Five Nations Golf and golf-themed events throughout the weekend. A centennial dinner with live music at Seymour's has already sold out.













Founded in 1925 by Scottish golf architect Seymour Dunn, the course opened with nine holes in 1926 and expanded to 18 in 1932. Recent renovations have included new greens, tee boxes, redesigned holes, and a new clubhouse. As part of its ongoing improvements, the club is currently focused on a capital campaign to replace its septic system to protect health and the environment.

The golf course board, staff, and members hope the centennial serves as both a tribute to the past and a commitment to the future.



LOOKING BACK

July 1973 – Hague Chronicle Newsletter

"THE CAVEDWELLERS"



All of the Cavedwellers either live or work in Hague and most of them played on Hague highschool teams in years gone by. Members of the team are: Daniel Belden, who is also the manager, Terry Bianchini, Loring Carpenter, Ray Bevins, Douglas Cash, Pete Plass, Al Perkins, Dave May, Mike Laundree, Phil Frasier, Al Jordon and Tom Stull.

During the season, the team played on the Tri-County (Warren, Essex and Hamilton) League. Hague won the league championship with a 121-111 overtime win over Speculator on March 4. The contest was forced into overtime when Phil Frasier scored with five seconds to play. In overtime, Hague overscored its opponent 18 to 8. After the season ended, the first four teams played a round-robin tournament. Hague won the first game, beating Speculator and in the finals beat Newcomb in a game played in (not legible in preserved Chronicle.)

The Cavedwellers also played in the Adirondack League with Crown Point, Glens Falls, Schroon Lake, Queensbury, (*)ville and Lake George. They finished fourth. The team also played in the Knights of Columbus tournament at Glens Falls and in the Crown Point invitational tournament.

The team does a good job to publicize our town and should have your support.

August 2025 - 53 Years Later

Try as we might, tracking down members of the Cavedwellers team has been very challenging. Looking back in New York archival newspapers did not help at all. One past member, Dave May, who is still with us, gave us a bit of information. He remembers playing three to four years, but after two years, two members, Al Perkins and Al Jordon, left to join the Dock and Dine team. They were replaced with youngsters whom Dave can't remember. He told of Charley Burgey providing bats, balls, and beer. The uniforms were t-shirts that the members had to supply. Dave gave kudos to Dan Belden and Pete Plass, saying Pete was a great player.

At some point, another team sponsored by Burgey's was called the Hague Nighthawks. The member we contacted was Jim Braisted. He only remembers two other members of the Nighthawks: Dan Belden and Al lordon.

Another team, softball, which one of us writers was on, was the Cave Girls. I can only remember Deb Denno, Mary Braisted, Gladys Fuller, and myself as members. Verne Rockwell was our coach, and a great one at that. We even played against the Hague High School boys and only lost by one point! After our games, a stop at the Cave garnered free beer.

We would love any information about these or any other Hague teams. This information should be part of the history of Hague, and perhaps many humorous tales could be included in a future issue. and nearby regions. As part of America's 250th anniversary commemoration, the legacy of this critical Revolutionary War theatre is being honored through a new heritage tourism trail.


