# A Message from the Mayor...

#### Saving our Police and Fire – Job #1 for 2022

<u>Numbers can be tricky</u>: Who would have imagined that having an increase in our census count would be a bad thing for our city. Population numbers determine how Federal Programs such as Medicaid, Highway Planning, School Lunch programs and Head Start are funded. Population numbers also affect a provision in Public Act 33 which allows the City of Harper Woods to have an annual special assessment to fund our Police & Fire operations if we have under 15,000 residents. Well, the 2020 census count has brought our population up to 15,492 residents. So, starting in 2022 this part of P.A.33 no longer applies to us or any other community across the State with over 15,000 residents.

Our City Council and City administration took immediate action when we realized our dilemma. The City could not afford to cut (14) Police Officers, (3) Firefighters, furlough staff

from Finance & Treasury and lay off virtually all (24) parttime employees from our City and District Court.

A concerted effort was made to contact our District State Representative and State Senator and State Treasury Officials to explain our unique problem. We even contacted



our City Auditors to help explain our unique need. All agreed we need help, and all have agreed to help. We now understand there is a State House Bill that is in committee to amend the P.A.33 population threshold from 15,000 to 25,000 residents. Please let our State Representatives and Governor know you are supporting this bill on behalf of the city to keep staffing levels of Police & Fire at least at their current level. We will move cautiously optimistic in the Budget of 2022.

<u>Major road construction planned for 2022</u>: Major investments in roads throughout the city will take place in 2022. Danbury Lane will be paved and lots of spot surface replacement projects will take place throughout the entire city. Beaconsfield, from Woodland to Vernier will also be finished. Use of traffic calming devices throughout the city will be evaluated as well.

<u>New City Manager</u>: As of August, the city has received resumes for this position and will begin the process of filling this vacancy soon. Our Acting City Manager will remain to help transition the new City Manager, then return to his full-time position as Finance Director/ Treasurer and devote more time to the financial matters of the City and the new property developments replacing the current Eastland Mall site and others. Our best years remain close ahead!

# Employee in the Spotlight


#### **James Bennage**

It is with great sadness that we inform you of the passing of James Bennage. Jim passed away suddenly in his sleep on August 5, 2021, at the age of 70 years old. Jim had been a valued member of the City of Harper Wood's Building Department (SAFEbuilt) as a Rental Inspector since 2016 and will be greatly missed.

Jim's background was vast, and his experiences gave him the knowledge to resolve matters professionally and courteously. He was known around town as "Uncle Jimmy" or just "Bennage" by homeowners, contractors, tenants, and landlords. He strived every day to give people a fair shake, better living conditions and a sense of security. He was known for his laugh, his spunk, his intelligence, his attention to detail and generosity. There are plenty of residents in Harper Woods who would attest to his generosity; as he would help with finding

His co-workers characterized him as the "life of the office" and how he will be extremely missed. "I never knew of another inspector that could make people feel so at ease by simply telling them a story of a similar incident in his life," said Jim LaPalm, Building Official.

"Bennage was more than just a coworker. He was a mentor in my life inside and outside of the office. His absence will be felt by our entire staff. But his kind words, laughter and outrageous jokes will remain with us forever," said Tara Boschman, Permit Technician.

"Jim was one of the most personable people I've ever met in my life. From the first day we met, it felt like we had been friends forever in which he had the greatest knack of doing with everyone. We would talk about anything from our beloved SPARTANS to our stories as young kids and told many stories about our families and adventures. We had more laughs together in the office than should be allowed, which I'm sure annoyed some co-workers at times, but we always felt like middle school kids that never grew up once we got started- as Jim would say, "GO GREEN" and I would say, "GO WHITE!" He will truly be missed!" said Greg McBryar, Code Enforcement.

# Featured Business/Organization – The Grosse Pointe Animal Adoption Society

The Grosse Pointe Animal Adoption Society is inviting the community to celebrate its 25th Anniversary, on Sunday, October 10th, 3:00-6:00pm with food and beverages at their new adoption center location. The entertainment will be by Harper Wood's famous Sun Messengers!

Their new facility, the Thomas A. Mackey Animal Adoption Center founded in May of 2019, provides a pleasant environment with natural light for cats and dogs to live in while waiting for adoptive homes. Prospective adopters enjoy outdoor showings of multiple dogs on Saturdays, as well as individual appointments to meet cats and kittens throughout the week. GPAAS places about 350 pets per year, mostly finding homes in our community.

The GPAAS intake shelter, also in Harper Woods next to the Harper Woods Veterinary Hospital, is still in place and continues to operate taking in lost and stray animals brought in by local police departments by contract. The shelter was established next to the Harper Woods Veterinary Hospital as many of the incoming animals need immediate veterinary care. Intake is about 500 animals per year which are returned to owners once vaccinated and licensed, or offered for adoption.

According to GPAAS President Corrine Martin, the following Milestones have steered the organizations long-lasting success:

- 1996- GPAAS was established as a foster home based non-profit organization serving the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods community.
- 2010- GPAAS opened a state licensed Animal Protection Facility in Harper Woods to provide a needed service to the Grosse Pointe and Harper Woods municipality's for housing of lost/stray and injured animals.
- 2016- GPAAS founded the Harper Woods K9 Program to raise funds to establish a K9 Team including purchase of a K9 dog, training, specially equipped vehicle, and ongoing support.
- > 2020- GPAAS opened the Thomas A. Mackey Animal Adoption Center in Harper Woods to provide a facility where the public can meet animals for adoption.



Martin explained, "GPAAS provides community outreach and are always available to provide advice and education about pet ownership. Many of our callers have concerns about feral cats in the neighborhood, appropriate veterinary care for their dogs, or where to find low cost sterilization services. We are always there to answer a call and offer information and advice."

Martin also expressed, "On a personal note, I am very fond of Harper Woods, having grown up on Williamsburg Court and always having friends, family and ties to the community. When considering where to have our animal shelter, Harper Woods was the perfect location to serve our needs... close to the Harper Woods Veterinary Hospital, the Harper Woods Police Department and easily accessible on the service drive from anywhere in the community. We are pleased to provide this service to the community."

Coinciding with their 25th Anniversary, the need for donations are continuously welcomed. GPAAS does not receive any state or federal funding and is solely supported by public donations. Their adoption fees have remained the same for more than 5 years as fees were set at a breakeven point. In addition, GPAAS assists the Harper Woods K9 Program by hosting a Pancake Breakfast and Spaghetti Dinner fundraiser to help raise funds for the program. The Harper Woods K9 Program is solely supported by donations and needs about \$10,000 annually to sustain.

Mayor Valerie Kindle said, "Congratulations to Corrine and GPAAS on their 25th Anniversary. The City of Harper Woods is fortunate to have their organization as part of our community. Their commitment to maintaining facilities servicing pets in our area is a wonderful example of true community spirit."

Public Safety Director Vincent Smith said, "On behalf of the Public Safety Department, I want to congratulate Corrine and GPAAS on their organizations 25th Anniversary. Corrine and GPAAS have been a friend to the Public Safety Department, pet owners locally and in other communities for many years. In addition, the Harper Woods K-9 Program would not exist without Corrine's support and innovative ideas to sustain the program. To sustain public health, in 2020-2021, Corrine's efforts have led to more pet owners licensing and vaccinating their pets through educational programs. Corrine may not recognize it, but her service to the community and lost or stray pets are invaluable. Corrine, Cheers to you and GPAAS on your 25th Anniversary!"

#### **Halloween Tips for Kids**

- 1. Walk with other kids or have your parents walk with you.
- 2. Stay on the sidewalks and don't cut across people's yards.
- 3. Cross at intersections only and obey traffic lights.
- 4. If you wear a mask, make sure the holes are large enough to see and breathe through easily. MAKE-UP IS SAFER.
- 5. Have a plan for walking so you cross the street only when necessary.
- 6. Do not go into other people's houses. Stay outside.
- 7. Go only to houses that are well lighted.
- 8. Wear bright, reflective colors so that drivers can see you when it gets dark. Remember that just because you see the cars doesn't mean the drivers see you.
- 9. Be courteous and say "Thank you" to the people who give out treats. Don't push others when you are at the door.
- 10. Have your parents check your treats for tampering. If you see something suspicious, throw it away. Make sure that the treats are in their original wrappers. Do not eat homemade treats unless you know the people who gave them to you.
- 11. Carry identification, including your name, address, and phone number.
- 12. Trick-or-treat only in your own neighborhood.
- 13. After dark, take a flashlight along. This will help you see where you are going, and let drivers see you.
- 14. Wear costumes that are fireproof and not too long or too loose.
- 15. Do not forget to invite a parent to go with you.

# Cold Weather AHEAD

### Safety Tips for Dealing With the Upcoming Snow and Cold Weather.

**Stay off the roads if possible.** More cars and people out in severe conditions raises the chances of accidents. If you can, keep yourself safer by staying inside.

**Increase awareness and leave space.** Be aware that other vehicles and pedestrians won't be moving as quickly or may begin to lose traction. Keep a safe distance and allow time to avoid problems.

Avoid parking in street during snow emergency. Parking in the street during snow emergencies causes hazards for city plow drivers and residents themselves. It prevents the plow drivers from doing a thorough job and poses a risk to residents who now have to remove large snow drifts to gain access to their vehicles.

#### **Special cautions for pedestrians:**

Don't walk in the street. Streets are for vehicles and bikes, and pedestrians in the roadway can become a hazard for drivers or cyclists who are already contending with snow and ice.

**Look up and around, not down.** Be aware and put the phone away. Hazards like bad footing and sliding vehicles could be nearby.

**Use crosswalks and be visible and purposeful.** Cross streets at intersections, with the proper signals, and go straight across. Don't go in a diagonal line and spend more time in the street than necessary. With the snow and ice, cars or bicycles will have a very hard time slowing, stopping or avoiding a pedestrian who is in the roadway.

**Wear appropriate clothes.** It's cold and wet. Exposed skin can become frostbitten or lead to other medical problems. Cover up and wear shoes that can take the snow and keep some traction.

#### How can I protect myself on the internet?

Opting to join Black Friday or Cyber Monday from your couch? You still need to be on the lookout.

- Stick to retailers you know and preferably, have shopped with before.
- Research a business you haven't purchased from before by checking customer reviews or complaints with the Better Business Bureau.
- Never commit to a deal that seems too good to be true.
- Refrain from using public Wi-Fi to make purchases, or use a VPN to avoid hackers intercepting your information.
- Check a webpage's security by looking for the lock icon in the URL field, and making sure the URL starts with "https", not just "http". The "s" means the site is safer and more secure.

# FIRE PREVENTION TIPS FROM THE HARPER WOODS FIRE DEPARTMENT



Is there a beep or a chirp coming from your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm? What does it all mean? Knowing the difference can save you, your family, and your home!

### October 3-9, 2021 is Fire Prevention Week.

This year the NFPA has focused on "Learn the sounds of safety". The Harper Woods Fire Department encourages parents and teachers to educate children on the different sounds created by the alarms within the home.

- A continuous set of three loud beeps beep, beep, beep means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single chirp, every 30 or 60 seconds, means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced, means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.
- Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory and/or physical disabilities.

As we enter the fall and winter months many homeowners will be turning on furnaces or enjoying a nice warm home cooked meal. During these months the Harper Woods Fire Department will typically see an increase in 911 calls to Carbon Monoxide alarms, this is a good time to check your alarm to make sure it is in operating order and as always check your smoke detector, if it is chirping it needs a battery! Most carbon monoxide and smoke alarms have a life expectancy of 10 years, if yours is near its life it may be time to replace it. Ventilating your home while cooking can help reduce any carbon monoxide produced from the oven or stovetop.



As colder months move in many residents often turn to alternative heating methods in order to heat their home. The fire department is often dispatched to residences that have been heated with space heaters and open ovens. Remember the best way to heat your home is with the furnace. If using a space heater, make sure it does not exceed the capacity of the provided eletrical outlet and is meant for indoor use. It is never a good idea to heat your home using vour oven! This may lead to fire: excessive carbon monoxide within the home and may cause burns to people within the home, especially small children.

October 18, 2021 - Last day to register in any manner other than in person with the local clerk for the November general election

October 19 - November 2, 2021 - In person registration at the City Clerk's office with proof of residency

November 2, 2021 - General Election. Polls Open from 7:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m.

Voters will be responsible for electing the Mayor to a two-year term and three Council members to four-year terms.

#### **New Polling Location**

With the closure of Poupard Elementary School, precincts 5 and 6 will now be voting at Triumph Middle School located at 19800 Anita Street. If you are unsure where your precinct is located or your voter status, please contact the Clerk's office or Michigan.gov/vote.

#### **City Council Installation**

Newly elected Mayor and City Council members will be sworn in on Monday, November 8, 2021 at 8:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers in City Hall. The public is invited and encouraged to attend.

#### **Registering to Vote:**

- Will now be automatic when obtaining a driver's license at a Secretary of State office, unless specifically declined.
- In-person or by mail is permitted up to the 15th day prior to the election.
- In-person is now required to be processed only at the City Clerk's office beginning the 14th day prior to the election up through and including election day with residency verification.

Acceptable Proofs of Residency shall identify the applicant's name with a current Harper Woods address. The following will be accepted: current utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, government check or other government document.

#### Voting by Absent Voter Ballot:

- An absent voter ballot can be issued by the Clerk's office to any registered voter that requests one, with no reason needed.
- A regular AV ballot can be requested by mail until 5 p.m. on the Friday prior to the election.
- In-person AV deadline is 4 p.m. on the Monday prior to Election Day, however a resident may register to vote and obtain an AV ballot after this deadline, if voting the ballot in the Clerk's Office.
- The Clerk's office will be open the Saturday prior to Election day from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

#### Permanent Absent Voter Application Mailing List:

- A reason is no longer required to obtain an Absentee Ballot, thereby qualifying all registered voters to be placed on the Permanent AV list upon request. A request may be received by the City Clerk in writing or by phone for a voter to automatically receive an Application for Absent Voter's Ballot for all future elections. Once you are on the permanent list, you will remain there until you request to be removed.
- Absentee voters who do not wish to automatically receive an Application for Absent Voter's Ballot in the mail for all future elections will have to request an application form prior to each and every election that the voter desires to vote by absentee.
- Avoid long lines at the polls, vote absentee. Contact the City Clerk's office at 313-343-2510 or by email, lfrank@harperwoods.net to request an application, to request placement on the permanent list or to check on your voting status.

## Public Notice – City of Harper Woods Applications for Deferment 2021 Taxes

The Harper Woods Treasurer's Office accepts applications for the 2021 tax deferments starting July 1 for the Summer and December 1 for the Winter tax bills. To qualify, a household income cannot exceed \$40,000. The applicant must also be 62 years of age or older, paraplegic, hemiplegic, quadriplegic, eligible service person, veteran, widow or widower, blind, or totally and permanently disabled. The deferment applications can be obtained at the Treasurer's Office Monday-Thursday from 9:00am – 5:00pm.

## <u>Assessing, Tax and Utility Billing</u> Information Online



The City's website www.harperwoodscity.org provides a link for: assessing/ property information including photos, sketches, assessed values and taxable values as well as tax amounts due and payment history. We

now have water billing information on the same website. Once you are online, go to bsaonline.com, and it will take you to the Access My Gov website to view and pay all City invoices and view property information. There is no charge to view this information however, there is a fee to pay invoices with a credit card; 2.95% of the amount you are paying.

## **Delinquent Tax Information Online**

www.waynecounty.com/treasurer is the website address for delinquent taxes. Searching for delinquent real tax information can be done by entering the parcel ID, street number, and street name.

## Property Transfer Affidavit

The "Property Transfer Affidavit" must be filed whenever real estate is transferred. The new owner must file the affidavit with the City Treasurer's Office within 45 days of the transfer.

## **Electronic Debit Transactions**

When a check is provided as payment, it is an authorization for the City to use the information from your check to make



a one time electronic funds transfer from your

account or to process the payment as a check transaction. When the City uses the information from your check to make an electronic funds transfer, funds may be withdrawn from your account as soon as the same day your payment is received, and you will not receive your check back from your financial institution.

## Water/Sewer Rates

#### As of May, 2020

## **Refuse Collection Guidelines**

The maximum weight of any one item is 40 pounds. Thirty to thirty-five gallon cans or bags are recommended. Oversize containers will not be collected.



- Please do not dispose of liquids in refuse.
- ✓ Paint must be dried out and placed on the boulevard with lids removed for pick-up.
- Cardboard, scrap wood, and lumber must be bundled securely with heavy binding material. Please remove all nails. Bundles should not exceed five feet in length and should not weigh more than 40 pounds.
- Carpet, carpet padding, and bundled brush will also be collected according to the same size and weight limits.
- Window or plate glass is not recyclable and will only be collected if it is broken into pieces and placed in a secure container marked GLASS.
- Encapsulated mattresses, encapsulated box springs, appliances, TV's and furniture will also be collected on regularly scheduled refuse collection days.
- ✓ Building materials such as wood with nails, dirt, cement, and sod can be collected as a special pick-up by the Public Works Department by calling 313-343-2570.
- ✓ (Bulk waste exceeds size limits) includes the following: Move outs, evictions and large set outs. Contact the Department of Public Works for a special pick up.
- ✓ Loose debris will not be cleaned up by the trash contractor. All trash <u>must</u> be contained in bags.
- ✓ Do not place trash bags/cans in the street, this creates a traffic hazard. All cans/bags should be placed on the boulevard.

### Household Hazardous Waste Drop-Off Day

# Trash Delay Reminder!



A delayed trash day will ONLY occur when the holiday falls during a weekday. If the holiday falls on the weekend, your trash pick-up day will remain on your normal day. \*When in doubt, put it out. **MISS DIG** – If you notice colored flags in your yard or along the roadway, it is an indication that someone is planning to perform

## Grass Cutting Violations #89-9 Sec. 16-42 (b)

Residents, please note that according to the City ordinances, any grass over 5" is in violation. This also includes flower beds. When a GREEN TAG is placed on your door, you will have 48 hours to take corrective action. If your grass is not cut within that time, the City will hire a private contractor to cut your grass/weeds and the owner will receive an invoice to reimburse the City for such costs. If the owner fails to pay, the City Assessor shall add these charges to the tax rolls for this property. If you have <u>any</u> questions, please call 313-343-2570 upon receipt of warning or notice.

## <u>Sidewalk</u> Maintenance

A friendly reminder to all homeowners and business owners that they are responsible for maintaining and correcting any sidewalk or



driveway approach defects. However, before any repairs are made, a permit from the Building Department must be obtained. For more information, please call 313-343-2526.

## **Maintaining Sewer Lines**

Below are a few tips to help maintain your sewer lines!

- Decrease your chances of home sewer issues by making an effort not to flush any paper products other than rolled toilet paper.
- Limit the use of your garbage disposal to small scraps that fall through the strainer. DO NOT use your disposal as a food processor.
- ✦ Do not pour cooking grease or cooking oil down your sink. This causes blockages as it hardens and can restrict flow.
- Living in a community with large, mature trees has its benefits, however, wandering roots can be problematic for sewer lines. To prevent possible sewage back ups, it is recommended that homeowners, with or without trees in their area, perform annual sewer



line maintenance. This could include routine line cabling, root cutting and chemical treatments.

- ◆ The sanitary sewer line from the home to the City main is the responsibility of the homeowner. We suggest you get several quotes and references before having any work performed.
- Sewer line excavation and repair is a permittable event. The permit and inspection can be secured by contacting the Building Department at 313-343-2526.

Don't forget – the only paper product that should be flushed is toilet paper! All others belong in the trash – grease too!

### **Rodent Control**

The following check list will help eliminate rodents from breeding in your area.

- Keep your yard free of trash.
- Use trash cans with tight fitting lids.
- Keep your yard free of high weeds, brush/branch piles and building materials.
- Make sure debris does not collect under wooden decks and porches or along side garage. Pick up fallen fruit and vegetables from gardens daily.
- Clean up dog feces and leftover uneaten food daily.
- Firewood must be stored a minimum of eighteen inches above ground.
- If you compost, turn pile daily. Food scraps should not be put in compost piles. This will only invite rats.
- Feeding the birds and squirrels on a regular basis can cause rodent problems.
- Lastly, rat bait (poison) can be purchased at your local store. EXTREME CAUTION should be exercised when using these products. Always follow manufacturers instructions. These products **MUST** be kept away from children and pets.

Professional exterminators can be hired to address this situation, if need be. Please contact our department if we can provide additional information.

### **Downspouts, Surface Drainage, Etc.**

The City requires that downspouts be disconnected from the drain tile or weeping that surrounds your home. Failure to do so is a violation of City Ordinance# Sec. 27-54. Downspouts, surface drainage, etc. and can

significantly contribute to a flooded basement.


Gutters should be kept clean of debris. Downspouts should have elbows, splash



blocks and extensions to direct storm water away from the foundation of your home. Additionally, the grade (slope) of dirt around your home should be pitched to direct storm water /melting snow away from the foundation of your home. Driveways or other solid materials should also be pitched to direct water away from the foundation of your home. Failure to take these corrective actions can significantly increase the likelihood of a flooded basement.

Just a reminder ..... Be a good neighbor and DO NOT direct storm water on to your neighbors' property.

# Department of Public Works



The Michigan Safe Drinking Water Act has changed to better protect your health. New water sampling rules have been added to better detect possible lead in your drinking water. These changes require communities with lead service lines to do more sampling. The new sampling method is expected to result in higher lead results, not because the water source or quality for residents has changed, but because the act has more stringent sampling procedures and analysis.

In 2019, the City of Harper Woods increased the number of water sampling locations to 30 residential homes. This is known as lead and copper monitoring. The criteria was to sample water from homes known to have or suspected to have lead water service lines. These samples were then analyzed by the Great Lakes Water testing lab. The results were forwarded to the participants.

Of the 30 locations sampled, 4 yielded results in exceedance of the action level of 15 ppb (parts per billion). All copper results were in the acceptable range. **This exceedance is not a health based standard nor a violation of The Michigan Safe Drinking Water Act**, but rather an indicator that triggers additional action on the City and water supplier's part. To date, the City has made a public service announcement through media outlets. Additionally, the City will provide public education material to every water customer in Harper Woods. As in the past, important information will also be included in the Annual Consumer's Confidence Water Quality Report.

In 2020 we increased our sampling location sites from 30 to 60. We sampled 60 sites twice. Samples were analyzed, and the results forwarded to the participants while continuing to drive public education.

Due to our favorable results in 2020, The State has placed the City of Harper Woods on a "reduced monitoring schedule."

In 2021 the City will ask 30 residential locatons to participate in 1 round of sampling between June and September.

#### **Snow and Ice Emergencies**

Our Public Works Department is responsible for keeping streets clear throughout the winter season whenever there is snow or ice. During a major winter storm, please check to see if Harper Woods has declared a snow emergency by looking at the City's Informational sign, watching your local television news, or listening to the radio. When a Snow or



Ice Emergency is declared, all vehicles **must** be removed from the street or they may be towed at the owner's expense. If you live on a corner lot, please be aware that you are responsible for the clearing of the corner cross walk areas. During a salting or plowing event, we typically begin treating the major streets such as Harper, Beaconsfield, 8 Mile, the east section on Vernier, Canton and Peerless. Depending on the time of day, we will focus on the areas around schools.

Please be a good neighbor and do not pile snow against your neighbor's house or cover basement windows, furnace or dryer vents.

#### **Ordinance Penalty**

Sec. 23-4. - Removal of snow and ice from sidewalks by owners of abutting property. The occupant or owner of any premises shall keep the sidewalks in front of, or adjacent to such premises cleared, so far as is practicable and reasonable, from snow and ice to facilitate pedetrian use. Where there are no sidewalks, the occupant or owner as aforementioned, is required to clear a path free from snow and ice where a sidewalk would otherwise be, to facilitate pedestrian use. Whenever any snow or ice has fallen or accumulated it shall be cleared within thirty-six (36) hours after it has fallen or accumulated.

(Code 1962, § 7-119; Ord. No. 2014-01, § 1, 7-14-2014; Ord. No. 2016-02, § 1, 3-7-2016)

Sec. 23-4a. - Penalty; enforcement.

(a) Any person who is found to have violated this section shall be deemed responsible for a municipal civil infraction as defined by section 113(1) of the Revised Judicature Act (MCL 600.113 (1)) and punished by a civil fine as provided herein plus costs and expenses. (1) For first offense, a fine of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) shall be assessed.

(2) For a second offense, a fine of seventy-five (\$75.00) shall be assessed.

(3) For third offense and all subsequent offenses, a fine of one hundred twenty-five (\$125.00) shall be assessed.

We truly regret plowing snow into driveways and covering crosswalks. We know what a difficult task removing this snow can be. Our objective is to keep the streets safe for travel and access for emergency vehicles. <u>Please refrain from blowing or pushing</u> <u>snow onto cleared streets</u>. It can cause additional icing and hazardous situations. Please watch the forecast. When snow is predicted, it would be appreciated if vehicles were removed from the street to allow for a safer cleaner job. There need not be a snow emergency to remove your vehicle from the street.

# Building Department Info

With Autumn in full swing, there are little to no cost maintenance items that can be addressed preventing costly damage and unnecessary repairs:



- 1. Keep your gutters and downspouts clean to prevent water and ice backups.
- 2. Make sure your downspouts have a minimum 3' extension to disperse water away from the foundation wall preventing basement flooding and/or cracked walls.
- 3. Clean the lint out of the dryer vent preventing fire.
- 4. A furnace inspection from a licensed contractor can save on energy costs and prevent carbon monoxide poisoning.
- 5. Replace the batteries in your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors
- 6. Turn off outside water spigots and disconnect hoses prior to freezing weather.
- 7. Please rake the leaves and pick up debris that may end up under snow creating slip hazard.
- 8. Please shovel the snow. We find no glory by issuing ordinance tickets.

# Assessing Department Info

The Assessor is available on Wednesday's during normal business hours 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. You can contact the Assessor at 313-343-2527 or by e-mail assessing@harperwoods.net. All assessment information is available online through the City's website: www.harperwoodscity.org. For a better understanding of your assessment and taxes, please go to the City website, click on Departments; Assessor; and review the Frequently Asked Questions page.

As a reminder, whenever there is a change in ownership on a property, you must file a Property Transfer Affidavit (PTA) within 45 days to the Assessor's Office. It is the owner's responsibility to ensure the name and mailing address is correct on their property. You can find the PTA on the City website under the Assessing Department or at the Assessor's Office.

The State of Michigan has adopted new mandatory Poverty guidelines for requesting a reduction in taxes based on household income. You can obtain a copy of the new application and guidelines at the Assessor's Office or on the City website under the Assessor's Department. All applications must be received prior to the last session of the Board of Review. Please contact the Assessor's Office for these dates.

Local businesses that are no longer open should inform the Assessor's Office to ensure the personal property tax roll is updated. All businesses are required to file a business personal property statement that is mailed out in January. Small business owner's who have less than \$80,000 of equipment can be exempt from the personal property tax by filing the form 5076 Small Business Property Tax Exemption Claim Under MCL 211.90. This form is mailed to your business or you may pick up in the Assessor's Office.

# The End of an Era

For the past 6 months The Harper Woods Planning Commission has been engaged in reviewing significant new developments. These new projects signify the ending of one era for the Harper Woods community and the beginning of a new era of economic development for our City and its residents.

For example, in March the Commission reviewed a request by Tim Horton's corporate officials, for a special land use and site plan approval, to build a new Tim Horton's at the current Beaconsfield and Vernier location. A new more modern restaurant will be erected after the old building is demolished. The new operations will commence this fall. In June, the Commissioners held a public hearing on plans to redevelop Eastland Mall into a "light industrial" complex. Afterwards, the Commissioners reviewed an application from the Eastland redevelopment group, NorthPoint, for site plan approval and rezoning the "development site" to a "Plan Unit Development" (PUD) designation. Recently, at their July meeting, the Commissioners reviewed a request from the current Eastland Mall owners for a "lot split" and rezoning of the site where the Dollar General and Jimmy Jazz are located. That site will be legally separated from the current mall property because that property will not be included in the new "Eastland Commerce Center".

The Planning Commission is comprised of the following nine Commissioners (pictured below). They are a hard-working group of volunteers. Also, very soon, the Commissioners will entertain an application from "Dollar Tree" corporate officials, who will convert the old Pier One building into one of their newest stores.


# **Beaconsfield Resurfacing Project**

The Beaconsfield Resurfacing Project is nearing 95% completion. Pavement markings were applied, and it was open to traffic the 3rd week of August.

Boulevard restoration was completed utilizing a process called hydroseeding. Remaining is the removal of the erosion fabric from the catch basins and debris extraction cleaning from the structures. A couple of minor deficiencies (known as punch list items) identified by our DPW and engineering inspection will be addressed. The project will be completed on schedule and within the \$696,000.00, budgeted amount. Through a grant, the federal government paid for 82% of this project and the Cities portion was 18%.
