These dynamics begs the question: *How then shall I live?*

Yes, I know, this is not exactly a yippee skippy topic to write about in the Flame. Yet, I am compelled, with hopefully a touch of the Spirit, to offer input about what is actually going on in our lives.

Please consider the following insights, which hopefully encourage us all to think, pray, and talk with one another, leading to all of us being strengthened in the midst of adversity.

Here is an invitation to take specific action:

First - Live Philippians 4:4-7 (simplified):

Always rejoice! Do not be anxious, but in every situation, through prayer present your requests to God. Let God's peace guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

I observe that all of us, to varying degrees, are upset with life. We need to intentionally think and reflect to identify the underlying specifics that trigger difficult emotions. We should seek the spirit's guidance to determine and follow a wise course of action. Having accomplished what *is* possible, we can release our worry and anxiety and embrace rest having accomplished that which is possible. Such a plan counters a destructive human condition – nonaction breeds anxiety.

Second – Engage in conversation. Isolation from one another, especially with those who may view life differently, exasperates the divisions. I believe core Chrisitan living is to foster nonjudgemental relationships as we learn from each other.

Recently, I learned of a driving force in the life of historian Dave McCullough. He was curious, especially about people. When engaging with people he asked questions and then listened. His conclusion was there is always something to learn from anyone.

Dear Church Family,


I would like to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to all of you who came out on Sunday afternoon for the Jazz/BBQ on the lawn of the church.
