Anderson Midways has transitioned from traditional staffed ticket boxes to a digital ticketing and armband system utilizing self-serve kiosk machines. There will still be a staff member present at the kiosks to assist guests as needed.

Payment Information:

We will continue to accept cash and credit cards. Cash must be exact change, as the machines do not provide change. A staff member will be available to provide change if needed.

All online and credit card transactions are subject to a 6% credit card processing fee.

Ticketing Process:

Instead of paper tickets, all purchases will be loaded onto a QR code embedded in an armband worn by the guest. QR codes can be scanned via phone and may be used by multiple people. All-day armbands remain non-transferable, with strict rules in place to ensure proper use and fair processing.

Online ticket sales will be available 30 days prior to beginning of fair and end Monday July, 27th at midnight. **SAVE** on your Daily Ride Bracelets & Mega Ride Passes by purchasing online prior to the fair!!

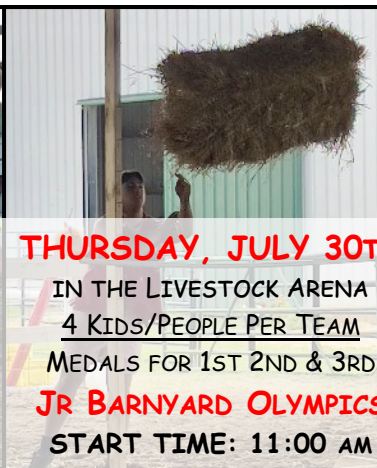

NO DOGS ALLOWED ON GROUNDS EXCEPT ON RENTED CAMPSITES.

GENERAL RULES:

- Rule 1: **Absolutely no alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs or marijuana on the fairgrounds.**
- Rule 2: **Firearms are prohibited on the fairgrounds** with the exception of on duty law enforcement officers and antique firearms being exhibited.
- Rule 3: **All entries in the fair must be pre-registered.** Pre-registration may be done through on-line entry by going to loscoCountyFair.com (the fair website), or by mailing pre-registration forms to the address on the forms. Pre-registration forms mailed in by U.S. Postal Mail must be post-marked on or before June 29th, 2026. Those pre-registering on-line through the fair website will have until midnight on July 6th, 2026 to pre-register.
Pre-registered Open Class & Youth still exhibit entries may be dropped off either Sunday, July 26th from 1pm to 4pm, or from 8am to 12pm of opening day - Monday, August 1st. Youth Still Exhibit entries should be dropped off in the Samson Building. Open Class Still Exhibit entries should be dropped off in the Dooley Building.
Livestock entries may begin arriving at 8 a.m. on opening day (Monday) and have until 4 p.m. to get all entries exhibited with the exception of the Poultry Department. All Poultry Department entries are required to be checked into the fair on Sunday, July 26th, 2026 between 2pm and 6pm All other livestock department entries may only haul in on Sunday if approved in advance by the Superintendent of the department.
- Rule 4: Still exhibit and Livestock entries may be removed Sunday, August 2nd from 8am to 10:00am
- Rule 5: Awards will be paid according to the record of the Judge's book, not ribbon on exhibit.
- Rule 6: No unauthorized fires allowed on fairgrounds.
- Rule 7: All animals must remain in their designated areas.
- Rule 8: The losco County Agricultural Society will not be responsible for injuries and property stolen or lost, at or during the losco County Fair.
- Rule 9: The management will not be responsible for any loss, damage or injury to any animal exhibited or article destroyed or in any way injured. Each exhibitor will be responsible for an injury that may be occasioned to any person or to the property of any person by any animal owned or exhibited by an exhibitor; and shall indemnify the losco County Agricultural Society against all claims or injury occasioned by an animal owned or exhibited by him/her or arising from the acts of negligence of the person in charge of any such exhibit.
- Rule 10: Dogs are not allowed on the fairgrounds with the exception that dogs will be allowed in camping areas & at specified locations for scheduled dog shows, but only at the time of, and for those, specific showing or entertainment events. These dogs must be the animals of the registered camper or dog exhibitor - no guest dogs. **All dogs in the campground must be registered at the time of campsite registration.** You must present proof of a dog license, the breed and coloring of the dog. All dogs must be leashed or tied at the campsite and must stay on the assigned lot. The dog's owner must clean up all dog droppings. Those not obeying these rules will forfeit the opportunity to camp in the future and have the potential to lose any premiums earned during the current fair year. Dogs causing disturbance to neighboring campers will be required to leave the grounds.
EXCEPTION:
Seeing-eye (Service) dogs will be allowed in all parts of the fairgrounds but must be cleaned up after. Proper paperwork must be presented verifying a dog as a Service Dog to be on the grounds.
- Rule 11: The losco County Fair Board reserves the right to remove any person and/or their exhibit from the grounds for any un-sportsmanlike behavior, or for displaying any inappropriate exhibits.
- Rule 12: **Golf carts, UTV's and ATV's are not allowed for use within the fairgrounds unless written permission is given expressly by the losco County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors.**

CAMPGROUND RULES & REGULATIONS

Campers may start setting up after **4:00 p.m.** on **Sunday, July 26, 2026** for camping during the week of the fair. Camping will be in designated camping areas. Campsites available by reservations.

Camping Costs: \$20.00 per night.

Must check in with campground superintendent before pulling onto site!

1. A person may camp in a designated campsite only when the established fee is paid, and camping permit has been issued.
2. A person shall not obtain a camping permit for use by another camping party of which the person is not a member.
3. Quiet hours are between 12:00 midnight and 7:00 a.m. All non-campers must leave during quiet hours.
4. No more than one single family or more than 4 unrelated persons shall camp on 1 site. For the purposes of this rule, a single family shall include a mother or father and their unmarried children. A single family may include relatives if no more than 1 shelter is used.
5. All dogs must be on a leash at campsite or kept in trailer. Dogs are not allowed on the fairgrounds with the exception that dogs will be allowed in camping areas & at specified locations for scheduled dog shows, but only at the time of, and for those, specific showing, or entertainment events. These dogs must be the animals of the registered camper or dog exhibitor - no guest dogs. All dogs in the campground must be registered at the time of campsite registration. You must present proof of a dog license, the breed and coloring of the dog. All dogs must be leashed or tied at the campsite and must stay on the assigned lot. The dog's owner must clean up all dog droppings. Those not obeying these rules will forfeit the opportunity to camp in the future and have the potential to lose any premiums earned during the current fair year. Dogs causing disturbance to neighboring campers will be required to leave the grounds. (Taken from Rule 8 of the General Rules for the Iosco County Fair)
6. A "camp" means the use or intended use of any device, shelter, or equipment for the purpose of sleeping or shelter during the nighttime hours.
7. A person shall not allow, place, or drive more than 2 motor vehicles onto 1 campsite or into a campground. Additional vehicles must be parked in designated parking areas on the Fairgrounds.
8. A registered party shall not leave a campsite continuously unoccupied for a period of 24 hours or longer without written permission from the Camping Superintendent. A campsite is considered occupied if at least 1 member of the registered party is in attendance during nighttime hours.
9. A person shall not use a campground for a permanent or semi-permanent residence or base for the operation of a business.
10. Any destruction, damage, or theft of property, trees, shrubs, wildflowers, planted grasses, or vegetation may be subject to fines or dismissal.
11. Fires may be built in designated locations or pits (unless a local burning ban is in place). Campers are responsible for supplying their own firewood. Campers must also fill in any pit they dig before leaving.
12. Campers shall not dump, place, throw, or leave any litter on the campground or any part of the fairgrounds. All trash shall be put in trash barrels or dumpsters.
13. Campers shall not engage in any violent, abusive, loud, boisterous, wanton, obscene or disorderly conduct tending to create a breach of the peace; disturb or annoy others; or remove, damage, or steal the property of another.
14. Violations of rules may result in revocation of camping permit, eviction and/or legal action.
15. Alcohol, firearms, illegal drugs and marijuana are prohibited in all areas of the Fairgrounds, including the campground.
16. All people camping & staying overnight on the fairgrounds will be required to camp in areas designated by the Iosco County Agricultural Society.
17. No grey water or black water dumping on the ground. It must be hauled away or dumped at the Dump Station provided on the fairgrounds.
18. Parents or guardians are legally liable for children under the age of 18, and a parent or guardian must be in attendance with children at night.
19. Golf carts, UTV's and ATV's are not allowed for use within the fairgrounds unless written permission is given expressly by the Iosco County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors.

OPEN CLASS DEPARTMENTS

These classes are open to all who wish to exhibit, youth & adult. The American Judging System shall be used to judge exhibits in all open classes. Entries will be placed in rank order according to quality.
(i.e. 1st, 2nd, 3rd)

YOUTH DEPARTMENT

These classes are open to all youth who wish to exhibit. Age categories are found in the rules sections below, and in the livestock & horse department descriptions. The Danish Judging System shall be used to judge youth exhibits. See Youth Class Rule #4 for more information.

RULES APPLYING TO BOTH OPEN & YOUTH EXHIBITS- *per MDARD regulation 811*

PERTAINING TO ALL EXHIBITS:

- Rule 1: In all categories other than animal, antique or tractor, the exhibitor shall be the creator of the article, item or project.
- Rule 2: State-funded premiums shall not be paid to a class in an antique category that contains an item that has been entered for competition in the previous 3 years. (Items can be displayed but not judged).
- Rule 3: a. Judging shall occur during or not more than 3 days before the opening day of the fair, unless otherwise approved by the director or his or her designee.
b. All exhibits shall be judged by using the American or Danish system for judging in competition; however, if there is only 1 entry in a class, then the exhibits shall be judged against standards accepted by the fair board. c. Judges shall not have a supervisory role at the fair or have an ongoing and direct relationship with any participating exhibitor or employee in the class where he or she is to serve as judge.
- Rule 4: Any fair exhibitor may file a complaint regarding any of the following concerns: A. Conflict of interest of the judge. B. Disqualification of an exhibit or exhibitor. C. Exhibitor, group leader, or superintendent behavior. D. Eligibility of the exhibit. In accordance to the annual appropriation act, exhibitors are allowed to file a written complaint to the Iosco County Fair Board within 10 days after the end of the fair.
- Rule 5: An exhibitor filing a complaint in Rule 4 above may make an appeal to the MI Department of Agriculture & Rural Development within 45 days of filing the initial complaint if the exhibitor is not satisfied with the fair's action. The department shall have 60 days after receipt of any appropriately filed appeal to investigate the complaint, and shall issue a finding of fact and notice of department action and a recommended action for the fair.

PERTAINING SPECIFICALLY TO ANIMAL EXHIBITORS:

- Rule 6: State-funded premiums shall not be awarded in an animal class where an exhibitor is under 6 years of age by Jan. 1 of the fair year, and who participates as an individual. Youth exhibiting animals under the age of 6 by Jan. 1 of the fair year shall be eligible for state-funded premiums only where separate classes for their age bracket occur, and when youth are accompanied by a parent or guardian during the handling & showing of their animal(s).
- Rule 7: Ownership is not required for an exhibitor to show in any animal classes other than market classes.

OPEN CLASS RULES:

PERTAINING TO ALL OPEN CLASS EXHIBITS:

- Rule 1: ENTRY FEE must be submitted with pre-registration form - as listed under each department heading.
- Rule 2: Premiums offered in each class. There will be one first, one second, one third place paid in each class. If classes are created the day of entry, ribbons only will be awarded - NO premiums.
- Rule 3: Exhibits may be eligible for premiums in more than one class if properly qualified.
- Rule 4: No more than two entries from one exhibitor will be accepted in each class.
- Rule 5: In any class where there are fewer entries than premium placings offered, the placing of the entry (or entries) will be awarded at the discretion of the judge.**
- Rule 6: The judge's decisions are final.**
- Rule 7: In case the receipts of the fair are insufficient to pay the expenses and premiums, the Iosco County Fair Board will prorate the premiums.
- Rule 8: The American Judging System shall be used to judge exhibits in all open classes. Entries will be placed in rank order according to quality.

PERTAINING SPECIFICALLY TO OPEN CLASS ANIMAL EXHIBITS:

- Rule 9: Each purebred animal must be accompanied by its registration papers in order to be eligible.
- Rule 10: All livestock must be shown to be free from disease before entering the grounds.

YOUTH CLASS RULES:

PERTAINING TO ALL YOUTH CLASS EXHIBITS:

- Rule 1: This division is open to any girl or boy 19 years of age and under as of January 1st of the fair year. Refer to livestock age divisions and horse (equine) age divisions indicated within the headings of their respective departments.
- Rule 2: For classes under the educational projects or demonstration projects categories, participants are limited to youth 19 years of age and younger by Jan. 1 of the fair year. Participants 26 years of age by Jan.1 of the fair year or younger, who have been determined to be eligible for special education services by the local school district, may participate in classes under the educational and demonstration projects of the youth department. (as per MDARD Regulation 811)
- Rule 3: No entry fee is required in youth classes.
- Rule 4: The Danish Judging System shall be used to judge youth exhibits. Entries will be judged against an established set of standards. All entries meeting the standards may receive the same or differing awards. Placing will be in the form of A, B, C Award ribbons.
- Rule 5: Exhibitors may enter no more than two entries per class. Rule 6: All state sanitary and health regulations must be adhered to.
- Rule 7: In case the receipts of the fair are insufficient to pay the expenses and premiums, the Iosco County Agricultural Society will prorate the premiums.
- Rule 8: Still exhibits and Livestock entries may be removed between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. on Sunday, July 28th

PERTAINING SPECIFICALLY TO YOUTH STILL EXHIBITS:

- Rule 10: No article or work previously exhibited at the Iosco County Fair will be accepted for competition until at least 2 years have passed.
- Rule 11: All vegetables and flowers exhibited must be raised by the exhibitor. Rule 12: Baking food exhibits should be shown on 9 inch plates.
- Rule 13: For flowers, fruits, and vegetables: if these produce items are not available at the time of the fair as pre-registered for then another exhibit may be substituted.
- Rule 14: Still exhibit entries may only be entered in one class per item.

PERTAINING SPECIFICALLY TO YOUTH LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS:

- Rule 15: All exhibitors with animals are responsible for feeding and caring for them during the fair. Exhibitors are responsible for keeping, animals, pens, etc. clean at all times.
- Rule 16: Exhibitors are to fit, show and take care of their own animals.
- Rule 17: Showmanship awards based on: Showmanship of Owner, Fitting of animal, and Training of animal. Showmanship classes are divided by exhibitor ages as indicated in the livestock departments.
- Rule 18: All livestock exhibits, and the area occupied by them must be kept in order by the exhibitors as directed by the Superintendent in charge. Each youth is responsible for his/her own clean-up equipment (rakes, forks, shovels, etc.)
- Rule 19: No bulls shall be shown in the Youth Division.
- Rule 20: All livestock shall be shown at halter in the ring in a manner prescribed by the judge.
- Rule 21: Exhibitors must completely clean their pens/stalls at the end of the fair or forfeit their premium monies.

SHOWMAN OF SHOWMEN RULES:

1. To be eligible to participate youth must be enrolled in Iosco County JML, marketing an animal at the Iosco County Fair, and must own the animal in which they become eligible to participate in the Showman of Showmen competition.
2. 1st and 2nd place of the overall showmanship in beef, sheep, and swine will compete for the Showman of Showmen.
3. If the 1st or 2nd place of overall showmanship in beef, sheep, or swine has previously won Showman of Showmen, the 3rd place will take said spot, then 4th place will take said spot if 3rd place has also won, so on and so forth.
4. The Showman of Showmen winner may not compete again.
5. Members will show three species. Beef, then lambs, followed by hogs.
6. Members may not use their own animal in any part of the Showman of Showmen competition.
7. The judge will rate each showman 1 to 6, with one being the best in each species.
8. If there is a tie the judge will determine an appropriate livestock related question to determine the overall winner.
9. Results will not be announced until the livestock auction.
10. Results will be kept by appropriate fairboard member until the livestock auction.
11. Infraction of any of these rules will result in automatic withdrawal from being eligible to win Showman of Showmen.

Species Specific Rules

Market Steer Rules

1. Steers must be born after January 1, 2025.
2. All steers being raised for the sale must be on feed and under the member's ownership and management on or before January 1 of the current year.
3. All steers must be weighed in on January 11, 2026. All steers will be tagged with a county tag and have RFID Tag numbers and starting weight recorded for official entry for beginning rate of gain. The second weigh-in will be held on April 26, 2026. Weigh-ins are mandatory.
4. All market steers must be castrated prior to the first weigh-in.
5. All steers must be tagged with an RFID tag prior to the first weigh-in and species leaders will verify these numbers at the weigh-in.
6. To sell, market steers must weigh between 1,000 pounds and 1,600 pounds.
7. No heifers or bulls will be included in the sale.
8. Steers are required to be shown to the MLS Committee no later than one (1) week prior to fair and the Monday of the fair week. Exhibitors must demonstrate that the steers are trained and ready for show.
9. Market steers must be checked in at the fair by 11:00 am and remain in their stalls.
10. All steers are required to follow state health guidelines and fair requirements.

Market Dairy Steer Rules

1. Steers must be born after September 1st, 2024.
2. All steers being raised for the sale must be on feed and under the member's ownership and management on or before January 1 of the current year.
3. All steers must be weighed in on January 11, 2026. All steers will be tagged with a county tag and have RFID Tag numbers and starting weight recorded for official entry for beginning rate of gain. The second weigh-in will be held on April 26, 2026. Weigh-ins are mandatory.
4. All market steers must be castrated prior to the first weigh-in.
5. All steers must be tagged with an RFID tag prior to the first weigh-in and species leaders will verify these numbers at the weigh-in.
6. To sell, market steers must weigh between 1,500 to 2,000.
7. No heifers or bulls will be included in the sale.
8. Dairy steers are required to be shown to the MLS Committee no later than one (1) week prior to fair and the Monday of the fair week. Exhibitors must demonstrate that the steers are trained and ready for show.
9. Market dairy steers must be checked in at the fair by 11:00 a.m. and remain in their stalls.
10. All dairy steers are required to follow state health guidelines and fair requirements.

Market Beef Feeder Steer Rules

1. Steers must be born after January 1 and May 30 of the current year.
2. All steers being raised for the sale must be on feed and under the member's ownership and management on or before June 1 of the current year.
3. All steers must be weighed in on June 7, 2026. All steers will be tagged with a county tag and have RFID Tag numbers and starting weight recorded. Weigh-ins are mandatory.
4. All market steers must be castrated prior to the first weigh-in.
5. All steers must be tagged with an RFID tag prior to the first weigh-in and species leaders will verify these numbers at the weigh-in.
6. No heifers or bulls will be included in the sale.
7. Dairy steers are required to be shown to the MLS Committee no later than one (1) week prior to fair and the Monday of the fair week. Exhibitors must demonstrate that the steers are trained and ready for show.
8. Market steers must be checked in at the fair by 11:00 a.m. and remain in their stalls.
9. All steers are required to follow state health guidelines and fair requirements.

Market Dairy Feeder Steer Rules

1. Steers must be born after January 1 and April 30 of the current year.
2. All steers being raised for the sale must be on feed and under the member's ownership and management on or before June 1 of the current year.
3. All steers must be weighed in on June 7, 2026. All steers will be tagged with a county tag and have RFID Tag numbers and starting weight recorded. Weigh-ins are mandatory.
4. All market steers must be castrated prior to the first weigh-in.
5. All steers must be tagged with an RFID tag prior to the first weigh-in and species leaders will verify these numbers at the weigh-in.
6. No heifers or bulls will be included in the sale.
7. Steers are required to be shown to the MLS Committee no later than one (1) week prior to fair and the Monday of the fair week. Exhibitors must demonstrate that the steers are trained and ready for show.
8. Market steers must be checked in at the fair by 11:00 a.m. and remain in their stalls.
9. All steers are required to follow state health guidelines and fair requirements.

Market Beef/Dairy Cross Feeder Steer Rules

1. Steers must be born after January 1 and May 30 of the current year.
2. All steers being raised for the sale must be on feed and under the member's ownership and management on or before June 1 of the current year.
3. All steers must be weighed in on June 7, 2026. All steers will be tagged with a county tag and have RFID Tag numbers and starting weight recorded. Weigh-ins are mandatory.
4. All market steers must be castrated prior to the first weigh-in.

5. All steers must be tagged with an RFID tag prior to the first weigh-in and species leaders will verify these numbers at the weigh-in.
6. No heifers or bulls will be included in the sale.
7. Dairy steers are required to be shown to the MLS Committee no later than one (1) week prior to fair and the Monday of the fair week. Exhibitors must demonstrate that the steers are trained and ready for show.
8. Market dairy steers must be checked in at the fair by 11:00 a.m. and remain in their stalls.
9. All steers are required to follow state health guidelines and fair requirements.

Market Hog Rules

1. Market hogs must be born after January 1, 2026.
2. All market hogs being raised for the sale must be on feed and under the member's ownership and management on or before May 1, 2026.
3. All market hogs will be weighed in at the Iosco County Fairgrounds on May 3, 2026. All sale participants are responsible for ensuring that their market hog project and floater are tagged with the state required ID tags.
4. All market hogs must be castrated prior to the first weigh-in.
5. To sell hogs must weigh between 220-300 pounds.
6. A mandatory meeting and pre-show for all swine exhibitors will be held on Monday afternoon following the completion of the weigh-in.
7. All hogs sold at the auction must be slaughtered or sold at another market location.
8. Market hogs are required to follow state health guidelines and fair requirements.

Market Lamb Rules

1. All market lambs must be born after January 1, 2026.
2. All market lambs being raised for the sale must be on feed and under the member's ownership and management on or before May 1, 2026.
3. Market lambs will be weighed in on May 3, 2026 at the fairgrounds.
4. All market lambs must be castrated prior to the first weigh-in.
5. To sell market lambs must weigh between 100-175 pounds.
6. A mandatory pre-show and meeting will be held on the Monday of the fair.
7. All market lambs must have a USDA scrapies ID tag.
8. All market lambs are required to follow state health guidelines and fair requirements.

Market Goat Rules

1. All market goats must be born after January 1 of the current year..
2. All market goats being raised for the sale must be on feed and under the member's ownership and management on or before May 1, 2026.
3. Market goats must be weighed and tagged with a club tag on May 3, 2026, at the fairgrounds.
4. All market goats must be castrated prior to the first weigh in.
5. To sell market goats must weigh between 60 pounds and 100 pounds.
6. A mandatory pre show and meeting will be held Monday of fair.
7. All market goats must have a USDA scrapies ID tag.
8. All market goats are required to follow health guidelines and fair requirements.

Market Poultry Rules

1. All market poultry being raised for the auction must be under the member's ownership and management within one week of the chick's hatch.
2. A market pen of broilers will consist of a pen of three (3) birds of the same breed between six (6) and twenty-four (24) weeks of age and weighing a minimum of five (5) pounds to the maximum of twelve (12) pounds. Sex of the bird is not considered.
3. Production pens will consist of a pen of five (5) hens of the same breed between 24 and 26 weeks of age at the time of fair. Birds must be of pure breed and not mixed breed.
4. A market turkey will consist of one bird of either sex between four (4) months and eight (8) months of age and weighing a minimum of fifteen (15) pounds and maximum of thirty (30) pounds.
5. All poultry must be inspected and undergo pullorum testing before they will be accepted for entry.
6. All market poultry will be verified by the Small Animal Leader June 27, 2026. All poultry must have a recorded identification band for auction.
7. All poultry must be inspected and undergo pullorum testing before they will be accepted for entry.

Market Rabbit Rules

1. All market rabbits being raised for the auction must be under the member's ownership and management four (4) weeks prior to the first day of the fair.
2. All market rabbits will be weighed and tattooed by the species leader on June 27, 2026. An identification tattoo is mandatory to sell at the auction.
3. A market pen of rabbits will consist of a pen of three (3) rabbits of the same breed and variety between ten (10) and fourteen (14) weeks of age and weighing a minimum of four (4) pounds and a maximum of seven (7) pounds.
4. Market pens must be of a commercial breed. Mixed rabbits will be allowed but must be a cross of commercial breeds.
5. A market pen does not necessarily have to come from the same litter but must be of the same breed or breed cross.
6. All rabbits must be inspected before they will be accepted for entry.

HORSE FACILITY USE RULES

- Rule 1: The superintendent is in charge of all within the horse area, including stall assignments.
- Rule 2: **All horses will be checked for signs of infectious and/or contagious diseases and must present valid Coggins test papers BEFORE unloading horses onto fairgrounds.**
- Rule 3: Removal of sick horses will be at the discretion of the Iosco County Fair's Board of Directors.
- Rule 4: Dogs are not allowed around the barns, show area or fairgrounds. (See GENERAL RULES section)
- Rule 5: Parking will be allowed in the area west of the barns and in the field to the northeast of the arena.
- Rule 6: **NO HORSES IN THE CAMPGROUND AREAS OR THE HARNESS RACE TRACK.**
- Rule 7: No foul language allowed by contestants or their parents/guardians in or around the barns and arena.
- Rule 8: All garbage must be put in trash barrels.
- Rule 9: All manure is to be dumped in the concrete manure pit area only. NOT AROUND THEM - IN THEM. If the pits are getting full then contact the horse superintendent so they can get them cleaned.
- Rule 10: No "horse play" will be allowed in the horse barns or area. WALK HORSES ONLY.
- Rule 11: Persons with animals stalled in the horse barns may use the sawdust provided by the fair board. However, waste is to be avoided; instead of stripping stalls every time, simply remove manure and wet spots. Each stall used will be allowed two (2) wheelbarrows of sawdust to start with. Then each stall will be allowed one wheelbarrow of sawdust every other day during the week. Any extra needed will be provided by the exhibitor at their own expense.
- Rule 12: Exhibitors will have their stalls and the barn area they occupy cleaned by 10:00 a.m. daily to present a clean barn for fair patrons.
- Rule 13: Aisles shall be kept clean of rakes, shovels, buckets, wheelbarrows, etc.
- Rule 14: All horses are to be cared for by their owners. If owners are not able to be present they MUST find someone to feed and water their horses AT LEAST TWICE DAILY.
- Rule 15: Do not tie buckets to stall cage. It breaks the wires.
- Rule 16: No horses in aisles of any of the barns for any reason. These are for pedestrians only.
- Rule 17: Do not leave horses unattended if outside their stall.
- Rule 18: All horses must be in their stalls by 11:00 p.m. - no riding from then until daylight.
- Rule 19: Lights out at 11:00 p.m. and this may ONLY be extended by the horse superintendent.
- Rule 20: Halters are to be left on your horses while in their stalls.
- Rule 21: Excessive whipping, spurring, or rough treatment of horses will NOT be tolerated.
- Rule 22: All riders MUST wear boots.
- Rule 23: In order to receive fair premiums horse participants have earned during the week of the fair, all horse owners stalling horses must strip and clean their stalls of manure, bedding, and litter before removing horses from the grounds. This will be inspected by the horse superintendent. Also, removing horses before the fair is officially over will result in loss of premiums. Time removal can start will be determined by the Iosco County Fair's Board of Directors.

ADDITIONAL ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK ENTERED IN THE IOSCO COUNTY FAIR

Cattle: No cattle allowed with horns 1.5 inches or longer. All cattle must be identified by an official RFID ear tag. All cattle, to be eligible for awards, must be shown at halter in the show ring in a manner prescribed by the judge. **State of Michigan TB testing requirements must be adhered to. State regulations in effect at the time of the fair will be followed.**

Swine: No swine shall be presented for exhibition purposes that have originated from any garage feeding premises or that are in a quarantined area for the prevention of the spread of vesicular exanthema, or if quarantined is on the premises for any reason.

ALL swine exhibited at the fair must go directly to slaughter upon leaving the fairgrounds.

Poultry: It is recommended that all birds exhibited at the fair shall be vaccinated against infectious Bronchitis and Newcastle disease thirty days or more prior to the date of exhibition. Poultry with clinical signs of infectious laryngotracheitis (ILT), also known as respiratory herpes virus, will not be allowed on the fairgrounds, nor will they be allowed to show at the fair. Additionally, poultry vaccinated for ILT will not be allowed to show at the fair either.

Horse: Exhibitors of stallions must be 18 years of age or older. **All equine, except foals under 6 months and nursing their dam, entered in fair must test negative to an official Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test within the current calendar year. Exhibitors must be able to present proof in the form of an official EIA laboratory report.** A fair authority is responsible for assuring that all participating equines are test-negative for EIA.

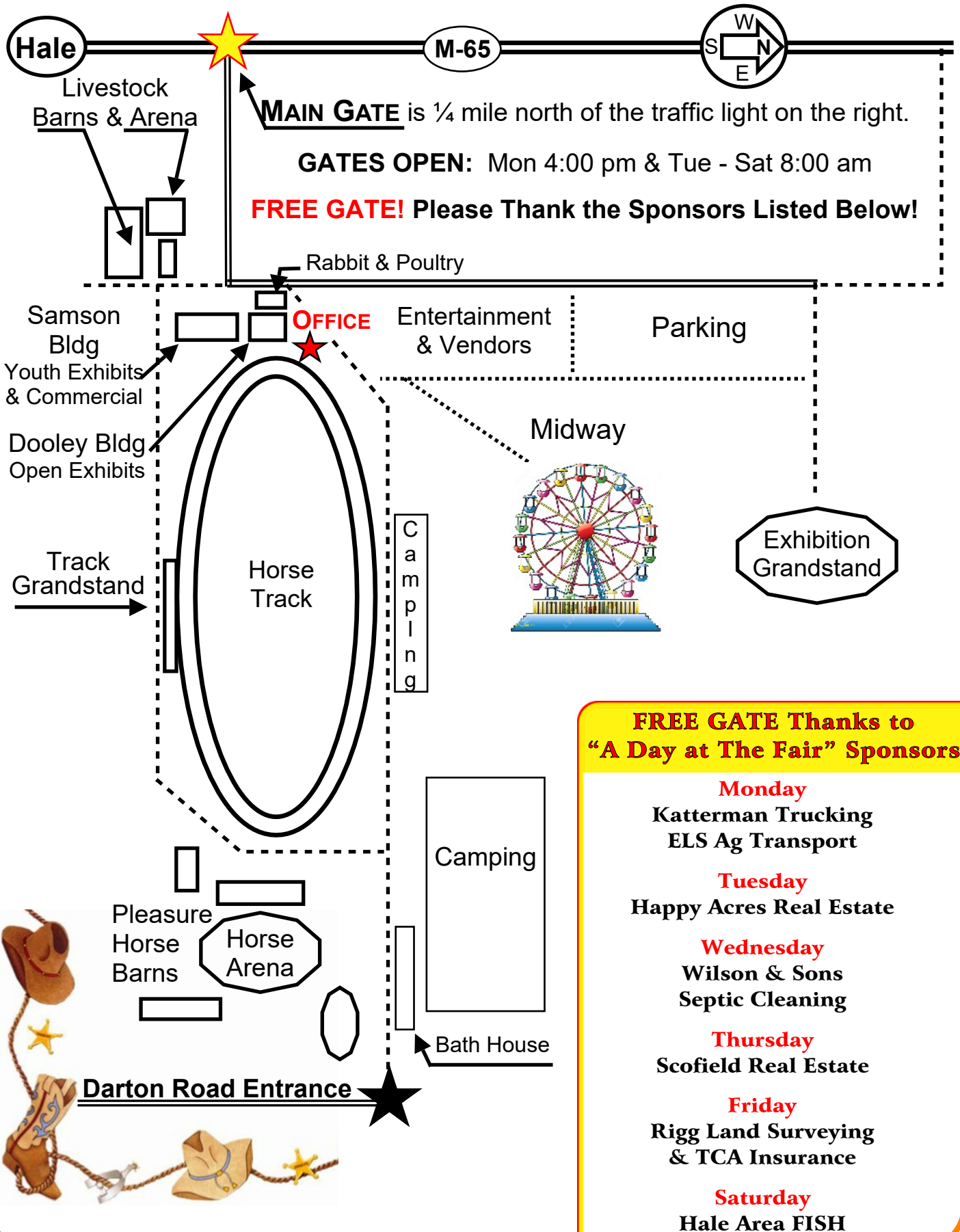
Sheep & Goats: Please do not remove tags prior to weigh-in or showing.
It is illegal to remove official USDA individual animal identification.
