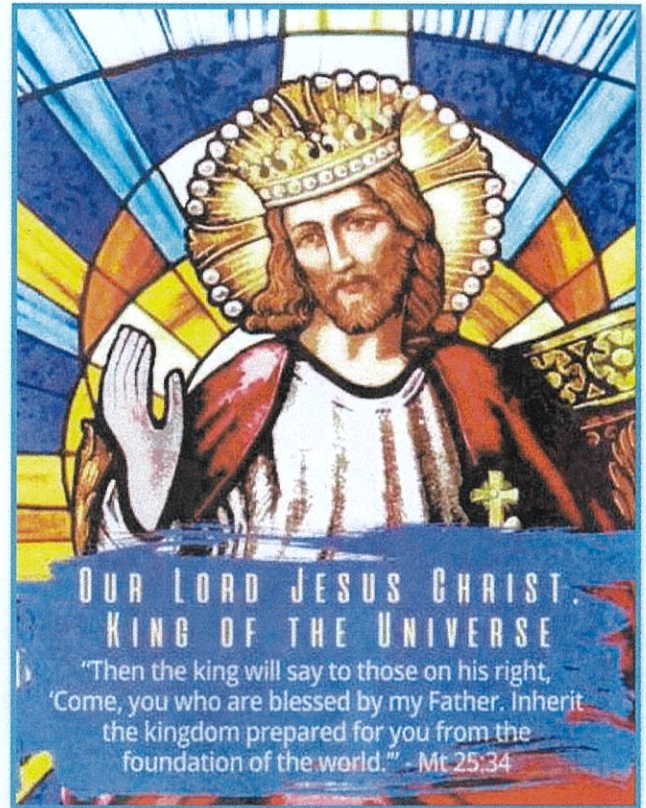

THE SERVANT KING

On the last Sunday of the liturgical year, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Christ the King. The image of Christ as King has been known throughout Christianity's history. In 1925, this feast's founding was a reaction to growing secularism, communism, and atheism that were becoming prevalent after World War I.

The job of shepherd and the appointment of a king couldn't be more different from each other. Shepherds are on the lowest rung of society. Kings are at the top. But God says, through the prophet Ezekiel, that the Messiah will lead in a way very different from earthly authorities who lord over their people.

Our King, Jesus Christ, like a shepherd, will give rest, seek out the lost, bring back the strayed and scattered ones. He will heal the wounded and bind up the injured. He does not delegate but will "shepherd them rightly." We have a king who cares for us and who will "judge between one sheep and another" (Ezekiel 34:17).

INHERIT THE KINGDOM

The world in which we live is complex. We are a diverse, global society, and there are many issues and opinions. These range from climate change to politics to the creed. Sometimes we try and sort it all out, and it is hard to know who and what to believe. One can find multiple takes on the same news story, and social media can easily sway us. Yet when we focus on the Gospel story, it seems very simple indeed. We do not have to know it all or figure it all out. We are not the ones on the throne during the Last Judgment. When God starts separating the sheep from the goats, the formula is a simple rule of thumb. "When did you see Christ in others? When did you respond accordingly?" It does not ask if you are Catholic or even Christian, whether you had a police record or an incurable disease, whether you had a Ph.D. or a fifth-grade education, or what languages you spoke. The call is to remember that "Whatever you did to the least you did for me." And then there will be the invitation, "Come you who are blessed. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

**What is Eucharistic Adoration?**

The practice of Eucharistic Adoration is a centuries-old ritual and falls within a broader category of devotions and traditions associated with the Sacrament of the Eucharist. In a particular way, Eucharistic Adoration is an extension of the Blessed Sacrament worship and adoration that occurs in every Mass.

In a long-standing practice, a period of Eucharistic Adoration often ends with "benediction," the blessing of the faithful with the Blessed Sacrament.

Several parishes throughout the United States have introduced the practice of perpetual Eucharistic Adoration, while other communities like ours have the custom of shorter periods of Eucharistic Adoration. Parishes take care that these periods of adoration respect the instructions outlined in Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharist Outside of Mass. This liturgical book gives the instructions for the proper celebration of Eucharistic Adoration.

Although adoration of the Blessed Sacrament can never take the place of Eucharistic Communion, many Catholics find great comfort and consolation in their prayers before the Eucharist. When we consider our eucharistic devotions, it is always important to remember the fundamental connection these acts of devotion have with the Eucharist's celebration in the Mass and reception of Christ in Communion.

Saint Clement of Rome
Feast Day: November 23

In the revised New American Bible, Clement is listed as the fourth pope, serving 88-97. He is an essential witness to the first century of the Catholic Church.

Early Christian writers called him a disciple of the apostles, and he may be the Clement mentioned in St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians (4:3). As bishop of Rome, Clement wrote an Epistle to the Corinthians that is believed to be the earliest surviving record of an intervention by Rome in a local church's affairs. Whatever problems prompted the letter, Clement gently urges the Corinthians to reconcile and accept apostolic tradition. Some legends suggesting his martyrdom are discounted. He is the patron saint of marble-workers and stonecutters.
