- **First, courage.** The courage to leave behind the comfort of the known and to face uncertainty.
- **Second, vision.** You must see opportunities where others see obstacles.

- **Third, persistence.** Failures are stepping stones; I have failed, learned, and built again, and that cycle is what made Sagar Asia today a global name in access systems, scaffolds, wind tower internals, and aviation docking solutions.
- **Finally, values.** Without integrity and social responsibility, success has no meaning. I've always believed in giving back—whether through training hundreds of engineers, supporting hospitals, or contributing to community projects.

Through my journey with Sagar Asia, I built businesses that today supply ladders, scaffolds, wind tower internals, and aviation docking systems worldwide. But the real joy has been in creating jobs, training engineers, and making India more self-reliant.

And self-reliance matters. In today's world, every country looks after its own interests. India must innovate, design, and manufacture here — or be left behind.

That's why I started the **Zillionaires Club** (https://zillionairesklub.com/) — a platform for young people to learn beyond textbooks. We blend skills, mentorship, culture, and leadership. Because entrepreneurship is not just business; it's about building yourself into a complete leader.

So how should you mould yourselves?

- **Cultivate curiosity.** Don't just look for answers in textbooks—ask questions nobody has asked.
- **Embrace technology.** Al, renewable energy, healthcare innovations—all these fields need entrepreneurs.
- **Develop resilience.** The road will be tough, but the rewards will be greater than anything a job could ever offer.
- **Build networks.** Entrepreneurship is never a solo journey; your peers, mentors, and collaborators will be your greatest assets.

My own career, spanning collaborations with companies from the USA, Germany, Italy, and beyond, has shown me that Indian entrepreneurs can compete with the best in the world. The only difference between success and stagnation is the willingness to take that first bold step.

To all of you sitting here today—your degree is not the end, it is just the beginning. Some of you may take jobs, and that is fine, but remember: India does not need millions of job-seekers. It needs thousands of job-providers who will change the economic and social fabric of our nation.

As I conclude, let me leave you with this thought: **Opportunities are like ladders—** you climb one step at a time. But if you dare to build ladders, you help not just yourself, but generations after you to rise.

Don't just wait for the future — build it, own it, and let others find their place in what you create.
