

I moved to Granite Bay in 1999 and immediately took up quilting. My California budget did not have room to pay others to quilt for me, so I learned to free motion quilt. By 2006 I was teaching locally and began to travel to teach in 2011.

I did my first presentation at an NCQC Meet the Teachers event that year and my teaching life pivoted - I booked 6 gigs from that very first visit! I would estimate that NCQC helped me land 90% of my California guild bookings in my first 10 years of teaching.

I am passionate about the mission of NCQC. It has helped me and hundreds of other teachers, guilds, shops, professional quilters, vendors, and judges. We organize, inform, support, connect and have spawned innovative ideas that affect the quilting community of Northern California.

We want to hear from you if there are more ways that we can support you. Guild Reps, let us know if we can help. And, exciting news: a new Quilt Judge Training program is being launched! We will be talking about that and other relevant news at our upcoming virtual meeting on Oct 2, from 10AM – Noon. Be sure to attend!

UILT JUDGE TRAINING February 25 and 26, 2025 Vacaville, CA oin us in the NCQC virtual meeting on Oct 2rd to learn more about this opportunity

The course will be an intensive two-day training covering all aspects of quilt judging, including extensive hands-on practice. It is intended for individuals who intend to become active quilt judges. The course would also be beneficial for current quilt judges who wish to further their knowledge of current best practice and hone their skills.

Experience in the judging arena is crucial in preparing for this course. Participants are encouraged to seek opportunities to participate in the judging process: planning, scribing, assisting, observing and shadowing. Candidates should be able to endure the physical rigors of full-day judging with minimal breaks.

Instructors are accomplished quilters and trained/experienced judges: Julie Curry, Diana Muenzler and Kitty Oliver. Our mission is to provide training in quilt evaluation that is fair, thorough and encouraging.

Registration will open in early November. The cost is \$375, which does not include meals or lodging.



The show went up remarkably smoothly and saw a great deal of traffic during the show - or so they say. I was not there because I was madly making cookies, cleaning and painting walls and doors and in my house because 42 women were going to get on a bus at PIQF and come to my house for a studio tour on Friday. My husband and I strung clothesline around the back yard and hung 15 quilts up in the back yard (much harder than it sounds due to the Dublin wind), plied the ladies with homemade cookies and lemonade, and also gave them a tour of the 30 quilts on the walls and my studio; then they were gone.

The only bad part was the insane traffic and horrendous parking situation on Saturday, due to restricted parking, blocked off access roads, an arcade convention at the same location as PIQF, and an upcoming international soccer game. Some people just gave up and went home, and it was a highly complex logistical nightmare trying to get in to take the guilts down, pack them up and get them to our cars to take them home.

What has California Heritage Quilt Project (CHQP) done over the last 40 years?

1. CHQP was established in 1984, thousands of guilts were registered. Records are currently archived at Los Angeles County Museum of Art. As of 9/1/24 We are now in Phase 1 of digitizing over 6000 slides from the 32 Quilt Days held in 1984-1986. To learn more on how you can help support this effort, check out our website! In 1996, The Commission for the California Sesquicentennial Celebration, asked 3. CHQP to create a tribute guilt to California history. You can see it on permanent display at the California Museum in Sacramento or online at www.californiaheritageguiltproject.com through the kiosk we maintain at the museum. CHQP continues to fund the "kiosk" explaining the quilt and the history it represents!

CHQP developed a children's program called "Make History" where local guilds 4. presented lessons to schools for 4th grade students to learn CA history and hand guilt on a quilt supplied by the local guild.

Overview

The Quilt Index, originally launched in 2003, is an open access, digital repository of thousands of images, stories and information about guilts and their makers drawn from hundreds of public and private collections around the world. It represents the work of thousands of community-based and independent scholars, digital humanists, and professionals in libraries, archives, and museums who are dedicated to preserving and making accessible quilt history.

The Quilt Index is a digital humanities research and education project of Matrix: The Center for Digital Humanities & Social Sciences at Michigan State University. Major support from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Institute for Museum and Library Services was critical in the initial planning and implementation phases. Maintenance and growth of the Quilt Index has relied on individual donations, contracts, grants (with special support from the Salser Family Foundation and the Robert

ty.

TOOLS

As of 2020, all the data in the Quilt Index is associated, meaning that many connections will be automatically presented as individuals search data. Additional tools to help mine and use this enormous data set include search and compare, filters and sorts, Zoom (the capacity to enlarge images), and automated citations. RESOURCES

Additional resources to facilitate the use of the Quilt Index and to expand quilt studies include:

Essays

Under a grant from the Institute of Museums and Library Services, the Quilt Index began to add short essays about a variety of quilt-related topics by Quilt Index staff and invited contributors. Each essay currently consists of an unlimited text area, a side bar of featured quilt image records, and an option of embedding specific quilt, ephemera, or other images in the text area. Future plans for the Quilt Index call for adding new essays by scholars around the world.

Exhibitions

Under a grant from the Institute of Museums and Library Services, the Quilt Index began to preserve the history of exhibitions by working with exhibition curators to add the text and images that were included in original, physical exhibitions. Future plans for the Quilt Index call for adding more exhibitions.

Galleries

Galleries feature groupings of quilts curated by Quilt Index staff, invited scholars, educators, and Michigan State University students. Each gallery explores a facet of quilt history, similar quilts, and thematic groupings and includes a brief description of the gallery's overall theme (typically 200 words or less) and 3 - 15 guilt image records from the Index. The gallery format was initially developed as part of a grant from the Institute for Museum and Library Services.

Lesson Plans

These consist of K-adult instructional materials built around specific guilts, groups of guilts, or collections using the Quilt Index database. In some cases, the educational materials were developed in conjunction with exhibitions or collections originally presented elsewhere, but are now also presented and preserved in the Index. Other lesson plans were intentionally made for the Quilt Index and consist of a description of the activity, materials required, target audience or grade-level, education standards or benchmarks (when identified), additional resources, and guilt image records from the Quilt Index. Future plans for the Quilt Index call for adding more lesson plans.

FOLSOM HISTORY MUSEUM



The front and back of this '40s quilt are joined together by a decorative feather stitch.

This quilt is handpieced and tied with a combination of pink and blue threads. The ties are about two to three inches apart.

The fabric "spoke" pieces of the dresden plate block differ throughout the quilt.

The centers of the quilt and the edge of the "plate" have a black thread running stitch.








Zuan-cho: Kimono Design in Modern Japan (1868–1912)

Through Aug 25, 2024

In the Meiji era (1868–1912), Japan became active on the global stage, embracing new technologies, fashions, and design trends from the Western world. During this period, kimono design books were revived and evolved into print albums known as zuan-cho (literally "design idea books"). These print albums circulated among artists, designers, kimono merchants, and wealthy patrons in Japan's major cities. Combining bold colors, geometric lines, and influences from Western styles such as Art Nouveau, they reflected Japanese visual traditions but also reimagined popular themes in the context of modern Japan. Created as style guides and design sources, these albums were also seen as independent works of art to be contemplated and admired.

Presented alongside Japanese Prints in Transition, this exhibition features a selection of zuan-cho from the Achenbach's collection of artist's books.




