2022 Budget: Balance Your Guild's Options

Things will be stable again, and you want your guild to be its vibrant best when that time comes. As guild members we have changed plans greatly to protect our family of quilters. There has been a cost; declining income for some of our guilds has led to low cash levels, a risk warning. A reduction in programs, and services puts a guild at greater risk of further decline. In this environment when your guild's cash is at perhaps an all-time low, and you see a choppy outlook for large special events, it may take an all-in strategy to stay in the game.

Everyone in your guild is a potential resource, but they need to be able to clearly see what has happened financially, to help plan the future. A transparent budgeting process brings it to light.

What can we learn from the rhythm of the last couple of years? Let's look at one of the tougher scenarios; a guild that used the alternate year large-event (quilt show) strategy tracking back to 2018. The years 2020 and 2021 indicate a guild with an every year show cycle as well. What is the cumulative impact of an interrupted income flow?

- 2018 Event quilt show (raised funds for 2018 and 2019)
- 2019 No event (operating from reserves-planned)
- 2020 and 2021 Events cancelled (operating from reserves-unplanned)
- 2022 Event year-? Hoping for a clear recovery but covid spikes and covid regulations could be spoilers.

Without the cash received from special events, how does the guild cover their mission of teaching/charity, etc.? Does it raise dues, raise the cost of classes, request donor involvement or dip further into reserves? A sample cash flow:

Could Threaten Reserves. In the budget, general income comes from payment of dues, opportunity quilt ticket sales, and events like quilt shows. In some guilds membership has slightly decreased, quilt tickets sales dropped with fewer face-to-face meetings, and fund-raising events were cancelled. Facility rental costs are likely to rise. Don't let a growing operating deficit surprise you.

This is the time for members and board members to examine budget proposals and be given time to discuss the consequences and merits of their planned activities.

Each one of your guilds will have a unique outcome, but you have common adversaries like the unpredictable spike cycle of covid in your county.

Perhaps planning several smaller events becomes the norm while we regain confidence about the certainty of execution for major events. What can we rely on?

What Income Level Would Balance Your Budget? Know what you need to break even and try to beat it. In this sample, if expenditures are \$3900, and your dues income is \$2000, you could perhaps have four events, each of which is targeted to raise \$500, raising total targeted income to \$4000. "Country store" sales, an auction, volunteer teacher classes, a donor tea, are traditional sources of funds and guild involvement that might be reinvented for these times.

Costs rise for Speakers & Education-Workshops. Education is a defining mission of many guilds. Quality speakers draw in members. Most guilds try not to supplement workshop payments intending students to pay the full cost. Hospitality and transportation cost increases loom ahead. Identify your break-even point for classes.

Begin a Multiyear Effort to Reduce Expenses Now. Phase-in changes that will continue to make you profitable in the long term, so you will be able to cover rising costs and still be able to add back to your reserves.

Budget exhibits can be clear enough for anyone to understand "what is happening," so you can be intentional with a plan for the future.

In a normal budget presentation, you see multiple income line items tower over a long list of expenses. Year-over-year, you compare changes in each line item.

Simple exhibits help members see how things come together so you can assess not just how you are doing, but why you are doing it.

Your budget committee can prepare an additional separate illustration of cash flow by "activity source." This way anyone can see how each activity contributes to the overall funding plan.

A heading might be "Cash flow from Dues Activities." Do you expect more members or fewer? How can you pull members back in who are sitting on the side-lines?

Are dues expected to cover speaker fees, facilities rental, utility bills, & equipment for general meetings? These costs are essential to delivering a quality membership experience, and if your members know the true cost of delivering guild benefits, they can recognize the value of membership.

If the total is a negative number, it is subsidized by another activity or your guild savings. Think about how viable the subsidizing notion is, or how sustainable is the recurring dip into savings. How else might the negative be offset?

More options to consider:

 Two budgets: one with and the other without Covid interruptions.

- A cash flow budget for the first 6 months, month-by-month, building financial operating practices based on the clarity of real time experience.
- Invite a CPA to give
 your board a 2022 outlook
 for your guild and the
 charities it serves.

You don't need to be an expert in financial matters to judge a budget. The more information and insight you share, the more satisfing the process will be.

What should be a priority? Use your knowledge of people, money, and groups. Review the budget and get clarifications. Talk with interested members, and understand their enthusiams and concerns. Pick your path, voice your perspective, cast your vote, and support your guild's plan.

NCQC welcomes ideas on how to help widen the dialogue on matters important to you.

Fund Raising With An Auction


Many thanks to Sherill Ash, President of Monterey Peninsula Quilters Guild, and the Auction team members Barbara Boyer, and Heather Clifton. They are sharing these notes with you about their successful quilt auctions. Contact them for details. They hope you give it a try, and share your ideas as well.

Initially we asked guild members to donate small art quilts that could be mailed easily to out of area winners. As we have become more confident in our margins, we have allowed larger items. Some members have offered to pay the shipping cost of their item as part of their donation as well as deliver to friends and family. By the third auction we also purses, table runners, oven mitts, tortilla warmers, baby blankets and long-arm quilting services donated.

Two of our members did most of the organizing, photographing and distributing. It would be better handled by 4 people. We have a guild of 180 members and we received 30-40 items for every Auction. Donation of items and distribution to winners was done primarily thru a central drop off / pick up location.

We progressed from raising \$1500 to \$4000 by the last auction. After the first auction we changed to the English bidding system, which bidders seem more comfortable with, and our bids increased. The increase was also due to the quality of the items donated (as people started to see art quilts going for over \$100 they donated more complex pieces) and increased advertising. Our Communications Chair sent out daily pictures of items for the auction. Some members also promoted the auction thru their personal social media feeds and their email contacts.

We will definitely use on line auctions as a fund raising tool!



Dizzy Geese Drawing May 8th, 2022 Monterey Peninsula Quilters Guild 2022 Opportunity Quilt

Dizzy Geese was designed, coordinated and quilted by Holly Casey. She distributed paper pieced patterns to members who chose a color and low volume backgrounds from their stash. Holly collected the blocks and put them into a rainbow layout. She also created 5 Little Sister quilts with the leftover blocks, each consisting of one ring of flying geese. Do you have any Primo Program Promotional tips to help Program Chairs promote and fill guild workshops?

I sure do! Here are a few Pro Tips to help you promote your upcoming guild workshops:

- 1. Pitch programs with energy and enthusiasm. Your members will pick up on your excitement and interest. Showcase the skills and techniques that will be covered in the workshop and how it will benefit your members! Chances are you've met the teacher and/or seen them present at Meet the Teachers—share your experiences and what caught your eye when you booked them to teach a workshop. Get your members excited to learn new quilting tips and techniques from award-winning quilters from all over the world! And let them know what a bargain they are getting through guild programs as compared to the costs to take the same workshop at many of the big quilt shows!
- 2. Partner with the visiting teachers. Teachers absolutely love the energy of teaching to a sold-out workshop and we are happy to assist by providing high quality workshop photos and enticing workshop descriptions. Some teachers may have a short promo video that can be shared with your members and/or played at a guild meeting. Zoom meetings provide the perfect opportunity to invite teachers to pop into an earlier guild meeting for a few minutes for a short introduction, answer questions, and share sneak peeks of the upcoming workshop. With enough notice, we may be able to assist by promoting workshop openings to our followers via our newsletters and/or social media platforms.

- 3. Involve your members. There is a good chance that some of your members have already taken the workshop and would love to show off the projects they started with the teacher. Gather student testimonials during the workshop to share in your guild's newsletter and/or following guild meeting. The East Bay Heritage Quilters had a notebook for participants to leave comments at the end of workshop. Similar comments can easily be gathered in the Zoom chat. Encourage workshop participants to bring their workshop projects to the next guild meeting Show & Tell. If it is a more involved project, maybe set a date for 2 months out to motivate members to work towards finishing their workshop projects for a class Show and Tell. Be sure to tell members when workshops are open to guests/visitors so they can invite their fellow quilting family and friends to register and join them for quilting fun.
- 4. Partner with other guilds to promote workshop openings to their members. Provide them with photos/descriptions to include in their guild's newsletter, Facebook Group, and/or social media channels. Invite guests/visitors to join your guild to get first access to future workshops (consider applying any guest/visitor workshop fee towards a new membership application).



Offer to reciprocate the favor by promoting any openings in their workshops to your membership and/or allow their members to sign up at the same members' workshop rate.

Sometimes the piece grows as I planned, but at other times, it grows as if it has its own intention. I just enjoy the rhythm of stitching, with the result beyond my control. I appreciate the beauty that results from the long and slow process of hand stitching – a meditative act that creates an unexpected and spontaneous result. @youngminlee_bojagi






Drawing October 9, 2021 "Sea Stars,"
