PLEASANT HILL, CA – The Northern California Quilt Council (NCQC) is hosting an education session, "Promoting Your Guild," at their quarterly member meeting on July 9, 2025, from 10am-12pm, at the Pleasant Hill Community Center, 320 Civic Dr, Pleasant Hill, CA 94523.

"NCQC members have told us that the pandemic years had a significant effect on their membership and activities," said Jenny Lyon, NCQC Board Director. "Guilds are looking for new ideas on the best ways to attract new members, get attendees for a quilt show, or highlight the guild's community service activities."

The July meeting will feature two panels – one with guild leaders and one with instructors – to discuss how they get attention for their guilds, quilt shows and workshops.

My guild (the Amador Valley Quilters who meet in Pleasanton, California) began with a handful of members on February 14, 1982, and has grown to be a strong, enthusiastic, well-connected guild with a current membership of 400. sharing and the fellowship, not to deal with minutiae that could be handled by a subcommittee. Yes, the details are tedious; yes, you have to deal with them; but let the Board handle them so the General Meeting can be fun for EVERYBODY, including the Board. Our quild has about 400 members, about 200 of whom come to the General Meetings, and (at least during my tenure) the business part of the meeting (including the committee reports - and it was a Show year) NEV-ER lasted longer than 22 minutes. I know, because Linda Ballou timed them with her stopwatch.

Seventh, Delegate. There are committee people who have volunteered to do specific tasks. Someone volunteered to be the Hospitality Chair for the Christmas Brunch or run the **Quilt Show or get quilts** ready for distribution to the needy - LET THEM DO THEIR JOBS. Don't try to do the jobs for them, and don't criticize them when they do them their own way. It may not be the way you would have done it, but now

that someone, ANYone else has done it, praise whatever gods may be that you don't have to worry about it anymore.

**Eighth: In time of cri-**

sis, all of the Past Pres-

idents are available to

you, the current President, ready to help. This happened in our guild, quite recently. There was a major problem; all of the currently resident Presidents met at the pie shop, were informed about the problem, and wound up giving advice and helping to resolve the matter in a very material way, including each donating \$20 towards to the purchase of materials for a new Group Quilt. In fact, the whole Guild is there to help. All of them are thanking their lucky stars THEY aren't President, and they think the President has such a hard job they're willing to help out in any way they can, just to be sure you don't throw in the towel. So call, ask. You'll be surprised at who will come out of the woodwork. It's especially nice if you call on a new member - it makes them feel part of the group, gets them into the swing of things, and that way they'll be sure to know some new people at the Guild meeting.

All of this sounds fairly grim, but I assure you I dearly loved my year as President. Being President was a growth experience for me, one that temporarily metamorphosized this unorganized, impractical, dreamy, shy person into an organized, efficient, showman capable of typing up agendas, running meetings and leaping tall quilting frames at a single bound. It was a stretch, and I doubt I'll ever be quite the same again. But even though my Presidency is over, I'm still a member of the Guild, still active, and the memories of my year remain.

When the fat lady sang and my job was over, when the new President was elected, it was my turn to come to the Past President's Pie Party as a contributor. It was just her luck that I write bad poetry in my spare time:





## **Sun Country Quilters Guild of Red Bluff**

Our 80 member guild recently held a well-attended show with over 200 quilts. We followed that by displaying many "Sun Country in Bloom" Challenge Quilts at the county fair and then at the "Tactile Dimensions" Fiber Arts Show in Red Bluff. Along with the "Quilt of the Month" at our county library, these showings help fulfill our guild's mission to "promote the appreciation and knowledge of fine quilts."

Education is another part of our mission statement. Many meetings feature speakers who also teach workshops. This month we have a "Make and Take" Sashiko presentation. Next month four members will give demonstrations involving wool and reverse applique, machine embroidery, and cross-stitch. Many members have been quilting over 20 years, with the expertise to share their skills with beginners or those looking for new techniques.

The guild also comes together for Sewins and Community Service Sewing Days. Our annual goal is to give away 300 quilts, mostly lap size for HeadStart and the elderly, but also to local Veterans. We meet at the Red Bluff Veterans Hall, so last year we provided dozens of patriotic table runners for their events.

### **Folsom Quilt and Fiber**

Guild has an active Cuddle Quilt Committee, making a significant impact in the community. Each year, they create and donate over 200 quilts to various local charities.

These organizations include:

- **NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit)**
- Palliative care and hospice foundations
- **Veteran organizations**
- **Homeless shelters**
- **Foster care organizations**

The guild hosts quarterly Sew Days at a local business center, which is provided by one of their members. Two to three quilt tops are generally completed during the day all while enjoying laughter, camaraderie, and mutual support.

At their monthly meetings, the guild hosts a table with various options including:

- **Quilt kits for 3-yard patterns**
- Quilt tops, backing and batting kits
- **Quilts that need binding**

Members can choose any aspect of the quilting process that suits their preferences and skills, thus each quilt can pass through many loving and skilled hands prior to finding its' final recipient.

Before gifting, every quilt receives a special iron-on label that identifies it as a creation of the Guild. These labels feature Folsom's well-known Rainbow Bridge and were designed using Canva. They are printed by **Spoonflower on their Organic Sateen Ultra** fabric and applied with Steam a Seam Lite 2.

### LECTURE

## Life With a Border Around It

In this lecture, I share a very eclectic collection of quilts. I start with some quilts from my great grandmother, grandmother, and mom, and then move on to my own quilting and designing journey. As I share my quilts, I also share stories about the quilts or stories that inspired the quilts. If I can teach you something or make you smile, all the better. And don't be surprised if I throw in a song or two.



### WORKSHOP

### **Taking Out the Dye**

This workshop is a little different in that you don't need to bring your sewing machine (unless you want to) and there isn't a project you need to finish. I teach a variety of techniques for using DeColourant on fabric and demonstrate how to use all the different tools I have acquired. I then let you play with my toys and give you any assistance you might need or want for the rest of the workshop.

I provide all the DeColourant you need during the workshop, and send you home with a small container at the end.



### WORKSHOP

### **Notan Design**

Notan in Japanese means light dark harmony. The technique taught in this workshop is based on a version of Notan involving cut paper. We'll be using the same technique, only with fabric. After the initial instruction, participants will experiment first with paper, and then with fabric to create Notan designs. Participants can choose whether to just play making blocks, or to choose a pattern and create a small quilt using blocks they have made. This works really well with fabrics that basically look the same on both sides like batiks; however it can be done with fabrics that have a right side and a wrong side.






