August Webinars:

Topic: The Heads & Tails of Birth-Year Collecting

Date: August 14

Presented by: Peter Lawrence

This presentation will highlight the challenges and rewards of birth-year collecting. It is based on Peter's experience researching and building a collection of 1963 world coins and commemorative medals. It highlights events of the time, including the JFK assassination, the space race, the Civil War centennial, the death of Pope John XXIII, and the Civil Rights Movement. It also features an interesting commemorative series of the time from Mexico, Venezuela, Germany, and the USA. It will discuss how to determine what coins and medals were issued by or minted in a specific country in a given year. It will also identify various sources of the coins and medals, how you might display them, photograph and catalog them, and put parameters on your collection.

Peter Lawrence spent 35 years managing technology products for companies including Planar, Canon, and Autodesk. Today, he is a small business consultant living in Scottsdale, Arizona. He was born in Portland, Oregon, where his family was in the saddle and holster manufacturing business from 1857 to 1985. He studied business at Oregon State University and then received a master's degree from the Thunderbird School of Global Management in Phoenix, Arizona. Peter is a musician, world traveler, and coin collector. His current focus is a 1963 birth-year collection of world coins and commemorative medals. Peter is a veteran public speaker and has delivered hundreds of continuing education presentations to architects, engineers, and technology consultants throughout his career. His sessions are always filled with entertaining stories, colorful anecdotes, and humor.



Topic: Collecting Confederate Paper Money

Date: August 28

Presented by: Pierre Fricke

This presentation will discuss what Confederate money was, how it came about, and the various types across the 7 issues. It will include many pictures of notes, people, and books, explanations of various types, and what varieties are. Military issuers and contemporary counterfeits will be discussed. Modern fakes will also be covered, and how easy they are to tell from the genuine article.

Pierre Fricke is a well-known collector, dealer, and author of Civil War paper money and early American coppers. He has been a dealer for over 20 years and a collector for over 50 years. Pierre is the author of the standard catalog for Confederate paper money - *Collecting Confederate Paper Money*, and several other books. He was a past president of the Society of Paper Money Collectors. Member of the ANA, Early American Coppers (EAC), Professional Numismatist Guild (PNG), Professional Currency Dealers Assoc (PCDA), and many more.


Topic: The Fabulous \$10 Million Saddleback Ridge Gold Coin Hoard

Date: September 11

Presented by: Robert "Bob" Bair

This presentation describes the February, 2013 discovery of 1,427 buried gold coins in California, by a couple walking their dog through their wooded property. Containing (mostly \$20 Liberty) gold coins dated from 1847-1894, this "buried treasure" realized over \$9 million for its finders, and is the most valuable land-buried gold coin hoard ever found in the United States.

Robert "Bob" Bair has been involved in numismatics since 1956, first as a collector, then as a coin dealer starting in 1987. As a boy growing up in northwestern Wisconsin in the 1950's he began collection coins that he received from his newspaper route, and a lifelong passion was born. Bair holds masters degrees in U.S. History (1970) and Educational Administration (1994)



Topic: Medieval European Coinage; The Fall of the Western Roman Em-

pire to the Rise of the Carolingian Empire

Date: September 25

Presented by: Douglas Mudd

This talk is about the first half of the Middle Ages from the traditional date of the fall of Rome in 476 AD to the beginning of the Carolingian Empire during the 9th century AD.

Douglas Mudd is the Curator / Director of the American Numismatic Association's Edward C. Rochette Money Museum in Colorado Springs, Colorado. He is responsible for developing, planning, and content of the museum's exhibition program and the organization and care of the ANA collections. He has created dozens of numismatic exhibits for the museum and for the ANA's semi-annual conventions. His recent work has expanded the museum's exhibits into the virtual world of the internet including *Trenches to Treaties: World War I in Remembrance* and *Money of Empire: Elizabeth to Elizabeth.*

Packaging error found in 2025 Uncirculated Mint Set

When collector Howard Dewald placed his order online July 17 with the United States Mint for the 20-coin 2025 Uncirculated Mint set, he was looking forward to receiving a set exhibiting 10 pristine coins each from production at the Denver and Philadelphia Mints.

As soon as he received his delivery from the U.S. Mint that contained the set, Dewald was surprised to notice that the slot for the 2025-P Roosevelt dime in the folder containing coins from the Philadelphia was empty. He proceeded to examine all of the other coins in the set and then turned the Philadelphia coin folder over.

Staring back at him was the reverse of the 2025-P Roosevelt dime, but in the same plastic slot containing the 2025-P Jefferson 5-cent coin. A rogue robotic finger had placed the dime in the wrong slot and covered it with the 5-cent coin.

Trays containing coins by denomination are manually placed within dedicated positions in the robotic packaging complex.

The blister pack plastic folders are also placed in their assigned location within the packaging system.

The multi-finger robotic arms rotate to pick up specific coins as programmed in a sequential order, using what the Mint calls "reverse suction" to pick up each coin, and placing it within the designated position in the folder. The same robotic operation is used at both the Denver and Philadelphia Mints. The Denver Mint folders are shipped east to the Philadelphia Mint to join that Mint's folders for final assembly into complete sets. The completed sets are then shipped to the U.S. Mint's contracted order fulfillment center, PSFWeb, in Memphis, Tennessee. From there, the products are shipped to the Mint customers who ordered them.

The 20-coin sets — which retail for \$33.25 each — are supposed to contain a Lincoln cent, Jefferson 5-cent coin, Roosevelt dime, the five 2025 American Women quarter dollars, Kennedy half dollar and Native American dollar in each folder from the respective circulation coin production facilities.

Considered a packaging error, Dewald's set does not carry a premium above its issue price.

Dewald says he plans to keep the packaging error and order another set, hoping to receive all 20 coins secured in their proper positions.

The numismatic product has an issue limit of 190,000 sets. As of the July 27 Mint sales report, 140,450 of the sets are recorded sold.




