In addition to the public informational forum, which is open to anyone, there are only two official requirements for the meeting: One is to hear annual summaries from the committees (to include our finances) and the other

is to elect board members. only be done if we have a quorum of 50% of our members. Membership is established by a household donating a minimum of \$10 for the year and doing so at least 10 days prior to the meeting. If you can't attend, please take the time to fill out the Proxy that is an insert in the newsletter and give it to your designated representative or email a picture of it to us. There will be a Zoom option, but it will be subject to the same registration process as if you attended in person so please join early prior to the 7pm start. The Zoom information is published on the website. Between proxies, in-person attendance and Zoom attendance, if a quorum is not established, the rights of members to elect board members will be assumed by the current board. While this may appear to be a side-stepping of the democratic process, please be assured that the Board takes this responsibility seriously. Also, as a reminder, Officers are elected by the Board and not directly elected by the membership.

Two of our dedicated board members moved out of Riverside this year creating two vacancies. Please let a board member know if you would like to appear on the January ballot, Or you could attend the December 15th board meeting to learn about the duties and commitment of a board member. The RCCA meets quarterly, usually with a Zoom option.



However, recent storms have silted the mouth of the creek and the backup of water could potentially undermine the cement channel. Addi-




tionally, the wood slats running along the creek edge have reached their effective lifespan. We certainly don't want to run afoul of any watershed regulations or permitting rules and, of course, we must be mindful of the costs. If you have experience in such matters and have suggestions, please contact a member of the board. Your

Neighborhood Watch

Riverside remains a relatively crime-free neighborhood. In fact, while crime rates are on the rise in several categories both City-wide and within each of the three precincts, ours have been steadily low. Through early October, the overall crime rate City-wide has risen roughly 10% (down in violent crimes, but up in property crimes). The crime rate in the Central district is up roughly 24% (down slightly in violent crimes, but up significantly in property crimes). Here in Riverside though, our crime rate has remained steadily low with no violent crimes and only a few larcenies. Those included one domestic larceny and the theft of recycling bins. A likely factor is that our neighbors continue to take the precautions necessary to prevent crime, like keeping an eye out for their neighbors, locking cars, leaving lights on, etc. Thank you Riverside, keep it up!



Beach Native Planting Update

The leaves are falling and our flowers are slipping into slumber for the winter. Much of the work accomplished over the summer months was the weeding necessary to assure our native plants do not get overwhelmed before they get well established and dominate the area. We did plant a few new species in late September that hopefully have taken hold and will wake up in the spring to prosper. Added to our mix are New York Ironweed (aka Vernonia noveboracensis), Spotted Joe Pye Weed (aka Eutrochium maculatum), Common Boneset (aka Eupatorium perfoliatum) and Swamp Milkweed (aka Asclepias incarnata). These perennial purple and white flowering bushes will grow tall and propagate among the grasses and sedges already established while providing major support for pollinators and their caterpillars that are so important for feeding the birds during the brooding season.



Throughout the winter we will wait to remove the tops of the dead plants until they have had the chance to support some of the friendly insects that use them for shelter during the cold months. Then we will look forward to another beautiful spring, summer and fall enjoying our various bushes, flowers, grasses and sedges. As always, if you would like to learn more about the process and

IN OUR BACKYARD

In the corner lot across from our beach an exhibition garden of native plants is growing. A collection of eye-catching plants that benefit the birds and bees can be found by searching the following topics on the internet. For example, we are using "Keystone" plants suggested by the Audubon's "Plants for birds" and the National Wildlife Federation's "Keystone plants by ecoregion". These plants focus on food sources for wildlife and show pretty options for planting in our own yards.

Additions planted this fall are:

- Butterflyweed; Asclepias tuberosa
- Sweet goldenrod; Solidago odora
- Wreath Bluestem goldenrod; Solidago caesia
- Showy goldenrod; Solidago speciosa
- Blue vervain; Verbena hastata
- Marsh blazing star; Liatris spicata
- Winterberry; Ilex verticillata
- Shadblow serviceberry; Amelanchier canadensis
- Southern wax myrtle/Bayberry; Morella cerifera

Edythe Lichtenstein—A Riverside Treasure

You meet some amazing people at our RCCA events. Thanks to Board member Debi Warren, who met Edythe Lichtenstein at Riverside Day, and realized she was talking to the resident who has lived in Riverside the longest! Edythe and her husband Jack were among the first buyers of a lot on the old D.S. Jones property.



Jack and Edythe met after the war in 1945. He had moved to the area to work for NACA, which was to become part of NASA, as an engineer. Soon their family began to outgrow their two bedroom house in Stuart Gar-



dens near downtown Newport
News. Their
search came down
to choosing between two neighborhoods, Christopher Shores just
down the street, or
a new development
way out in Warwick Virginia,

known as Riverside.

Because it was a big decision for them, they turned to friends and family for advice. Jim was making \$5,000/yr, which was considered good pay

at the time, but they only had one car, and there was no city bus service north of 62nd street. Another consideration? They were Jewish, and most of the Jewish community was settling in Christopher Shores. Friends worried about the kind of community support they would have. Would they be able to find needed car pools?



In the end, in 1954, they listened to Jack's fa-

ther Gabe's advise (who kicked in \$1,000 to help make the deal work), and bought a lot in Riverside. They picked one in the middle of the block on Woodland. It had a hill, ravines, and 250 trees - they counted! Theirs was about the 6th house built, basically in a forest on a dirt road. They did not know at the time that they had moved into

what would become known as the "Gold Coast of Newport News". Looking back, it was one of the best decisions they ever made.

Edvthe and Jack raised 3 children and many dogs, mostly Collies, who thrived playing in the woods of Riverside. Ronnie is a retired teacher, Garv a retired radiologist, and Robert a lawyer. They in turn had 4 children, Brian, Erin, David, and Johnathon. Edythe's 8 great grand kids are Caroline, Emma, Zelda, Jacob (named after his great grandpa Jack), Golda, Stuart, and Bennett.





Jack passed away in 2005, but Edythe still lives in her house of 69 years. She enjoys reading, water aerobics, dancing and going to Riverside events.



The Riverside Communitee Civic Association was formed in 1986 to help maintain our neighborhood's common land. Jack Lichtenstein became its first president. One of our neighborhood's biggest challenges was to hold on to our beach property. It was donated to the

neighborhood by DS Jones, and was sought after by a nearby neighbor. Jack and several others kicked in to pay for a lawyer to defend the Association's inter-

ests. Edythe remembers many court sessions were involved until the RCCA ultimately prevailed. If you see Edythe at another neighborhood beach gathering, be sure to thank her for her help in saving access to thousands of beautiful sunsets



for our residents to enjoy over the last 70 years.




