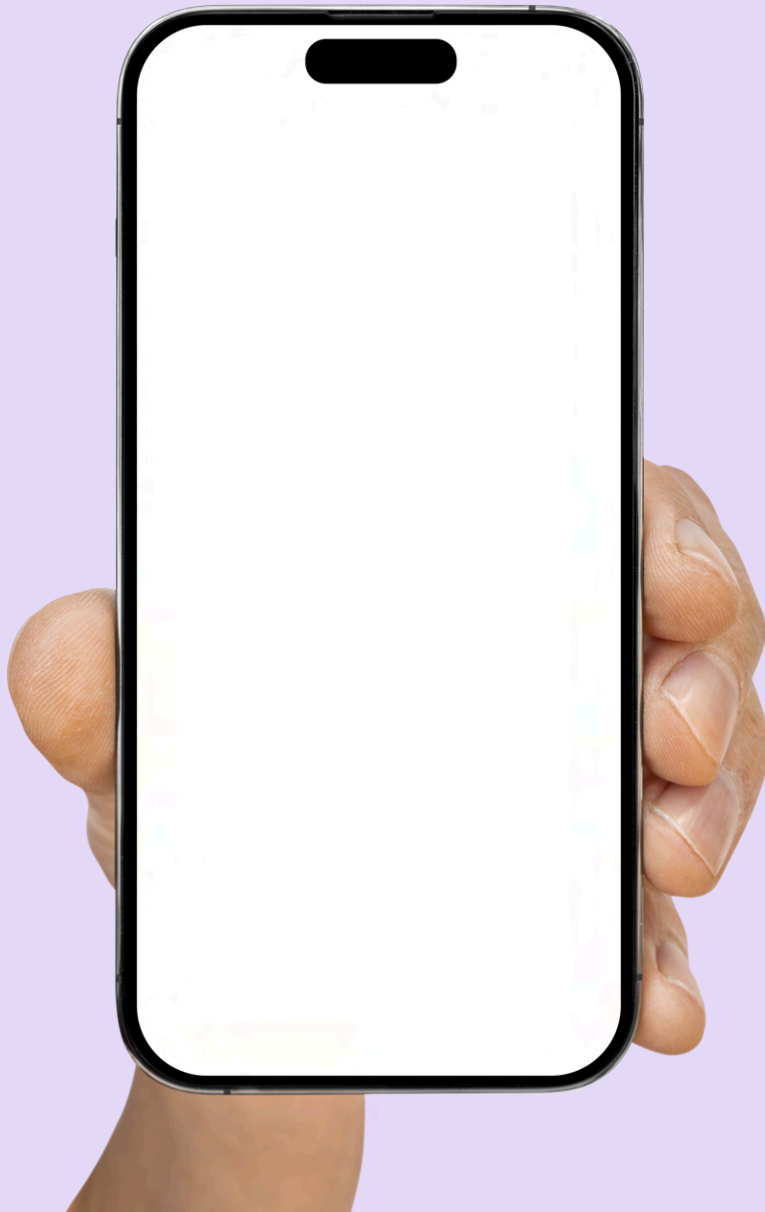

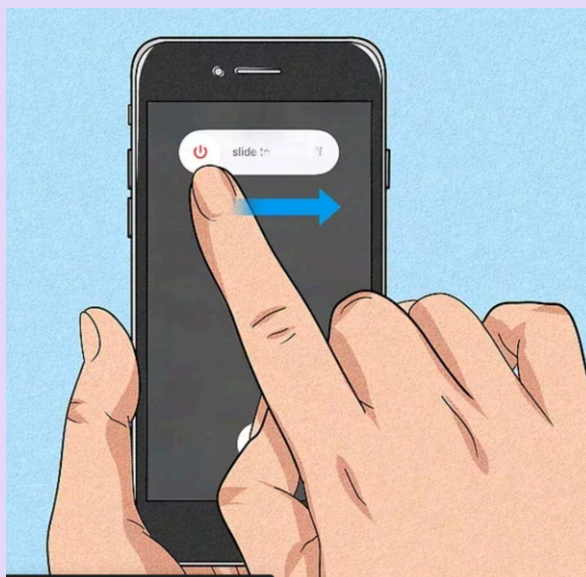
Turning Off/On Your Device

How to restart your device if it has a home button

1. Click the button power button that is located either on the top half of the right side of your device



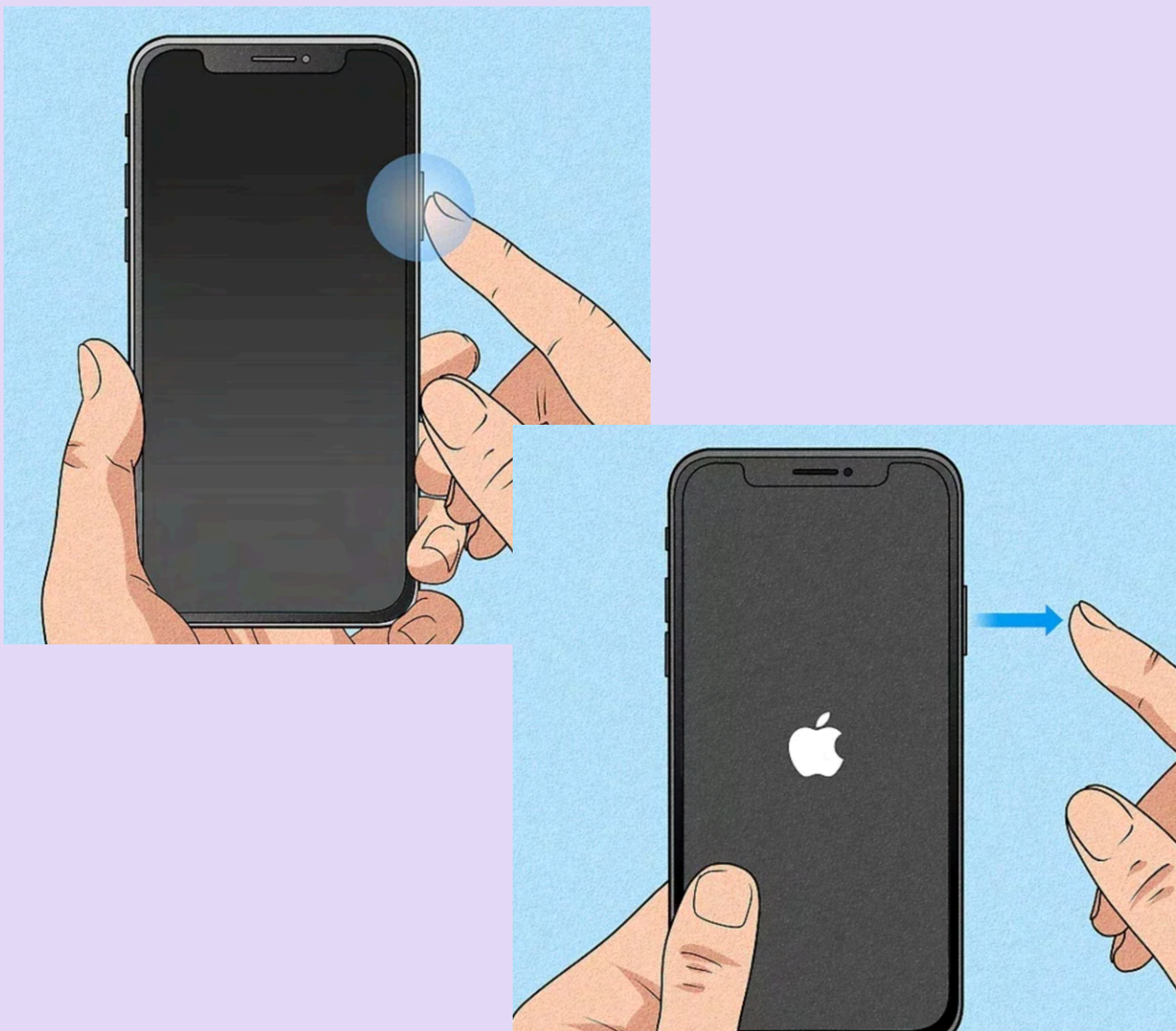
2. Hold the power button until you see “slide to power off” appear on your screen.
3. Slide the slider to the right, and then let go.

4. Your phone will now shut down.
5. When you want to turn it back on, hold the power button until you see the Apple logo appear, then let go.



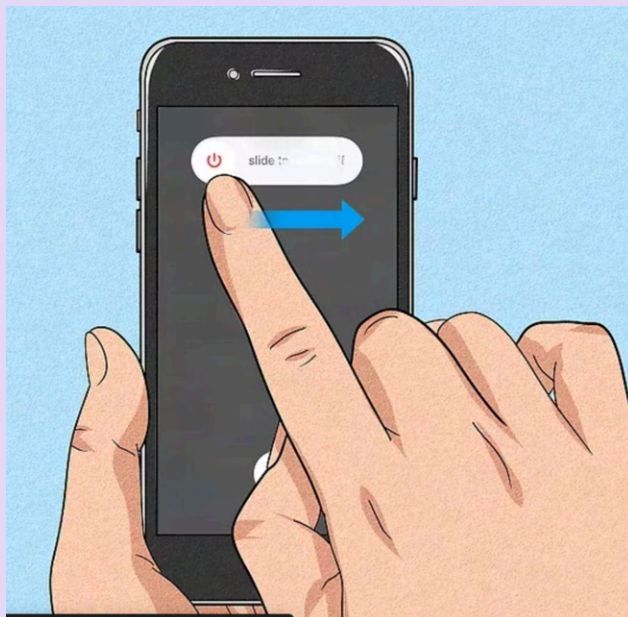

1. Hold the power button and the volume up button until you see “slide to power off” appear on your screen.



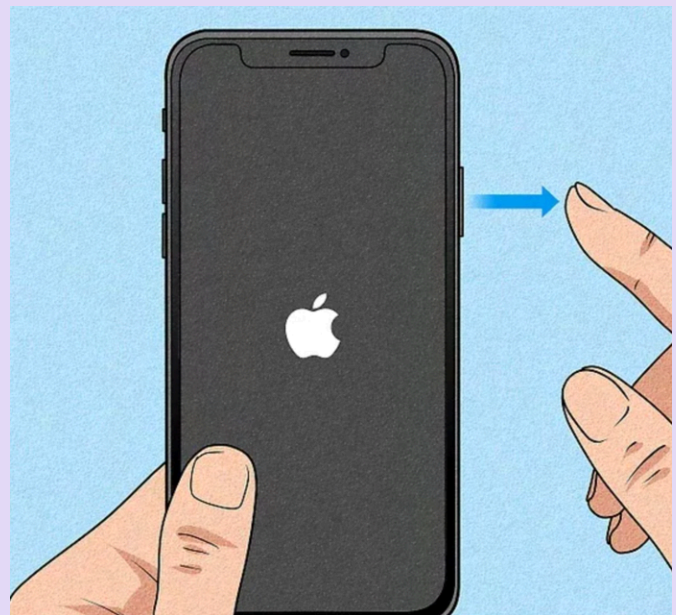

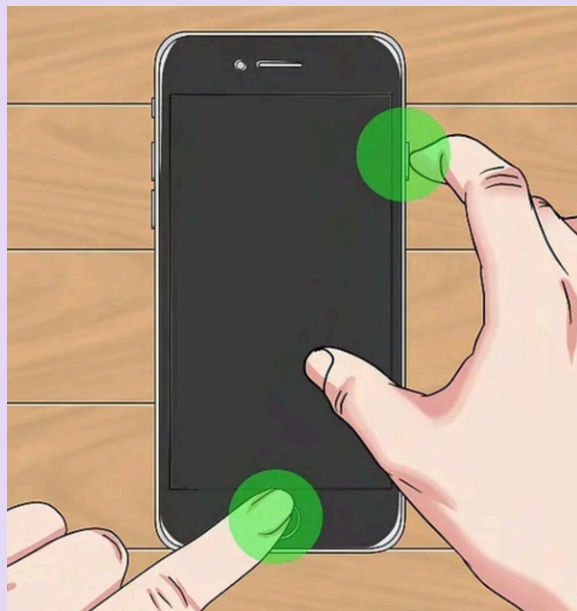

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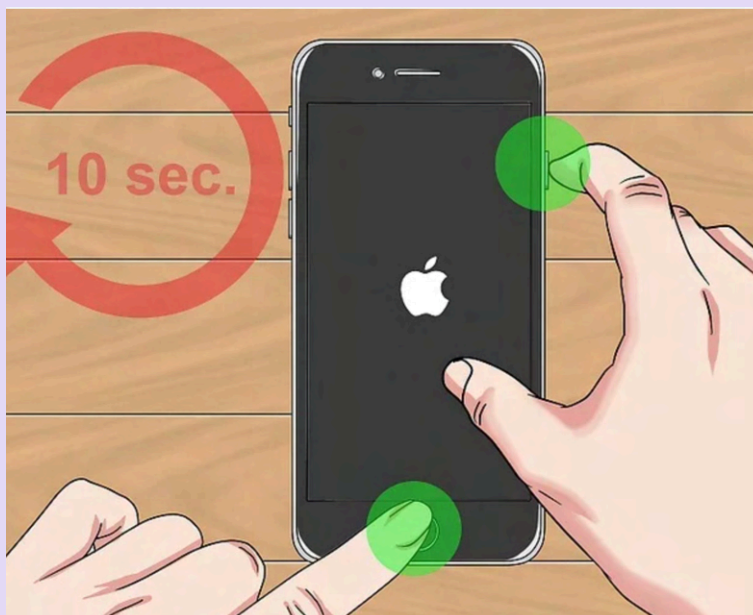
Restarting Device

How to restart your device if it has a home button

1. Hold the power and home buttons until you see the apple logo on your screen.



2. Release the buttons when the Apple logo appears. Restart should start automatically.



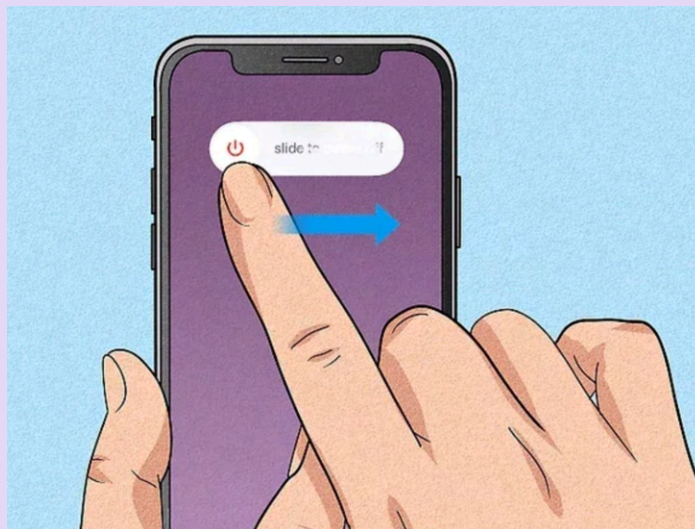
Restarting Device

How to restart your device if it does not have a home button

1. Hold the power button and volume up button until you see “slide to power off” appear on your screen.



2. Slide the slider to the right, and then let go.



Restarting Device

3. Wait 30 seconds for your phone to fully turn off.

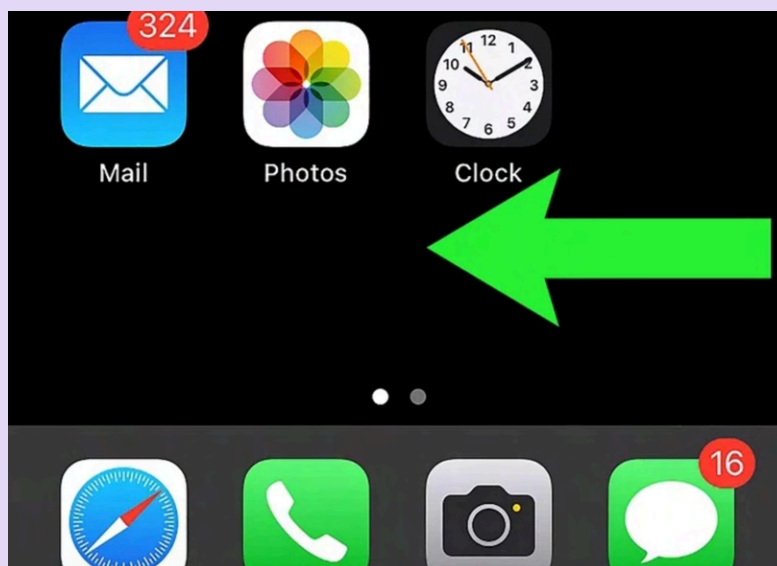


4. After 30 seconds, hold the power button until you see the apple logo appear, then let go.



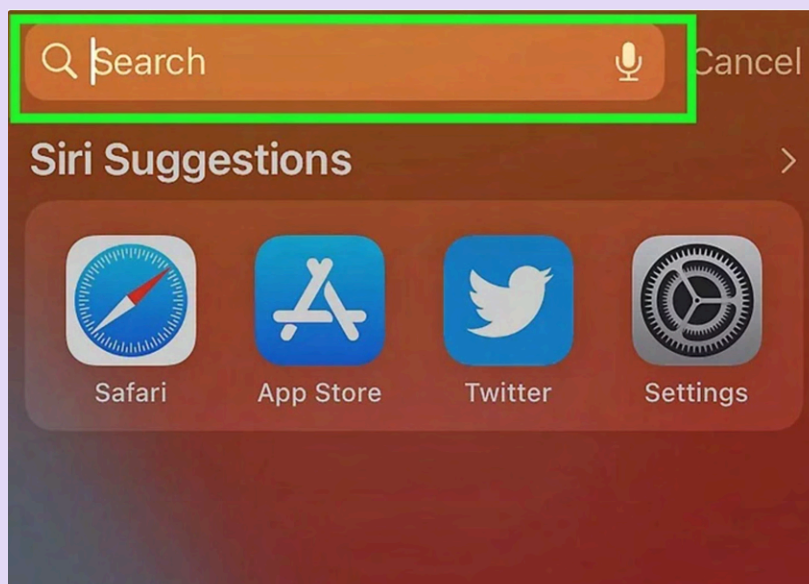
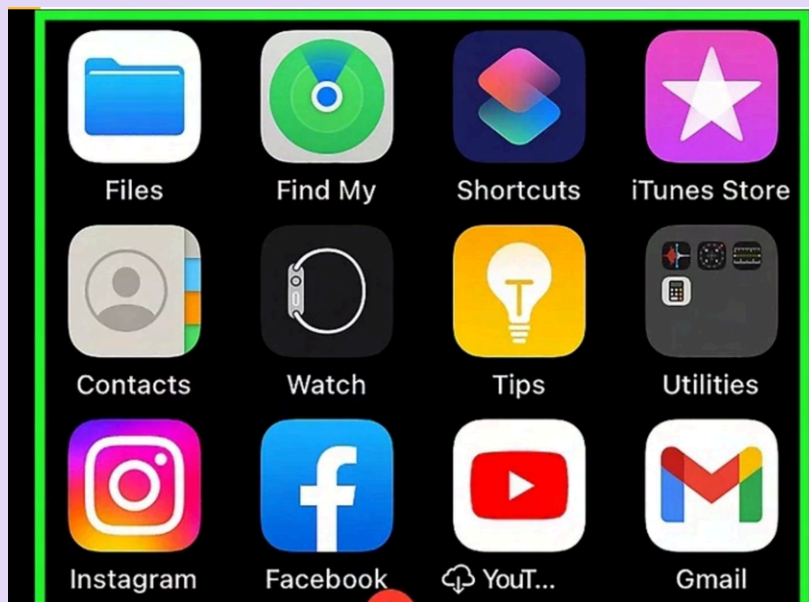
Navigating the Home Screen

1. **Unlock the iPhone:** Press the home button (if your iPhone has one) or swipe up from the bottom of the screen if you have a newer iPhone model.
2. **Swipe Between Pages:** The iPhone's home screen can have multiple pages of apps. To move between these pages, simply swipe left or right on the screen.



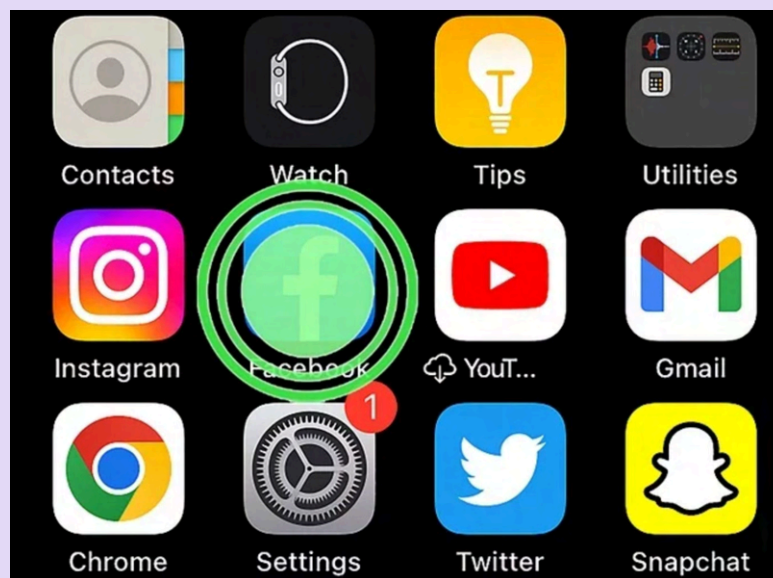
Navigating the Home Screen

3. Find Apps: Apps are organized in rows and columns across the screen. If you can't find a particular app, swipe down from the middle of the screen to reveal the search bar. Type in the app's name to locate it quickly.



Understanding Icons, Apps, and Folders

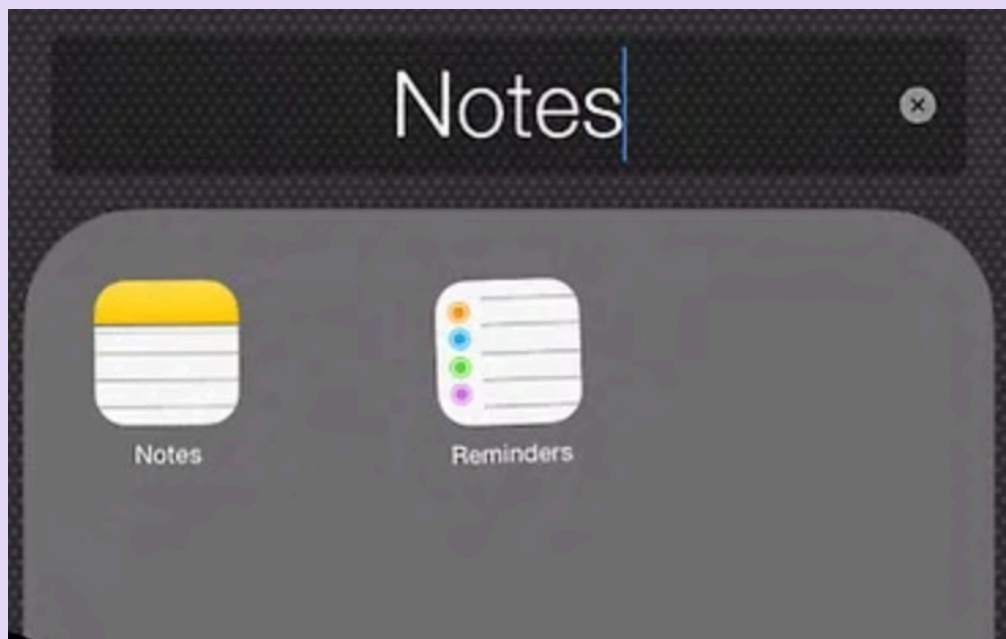
1. **App Icons:** Each icon on the screen represents an app. Tap an icon to open the app.



2. **Folders:** Sometimes, you'll see icons that look like a small square with multiple smaller icons inside it. These are folders containing several apps. Tap on the folder to open it and reveal the apps inside. Tap on any app inside the folder to open it.

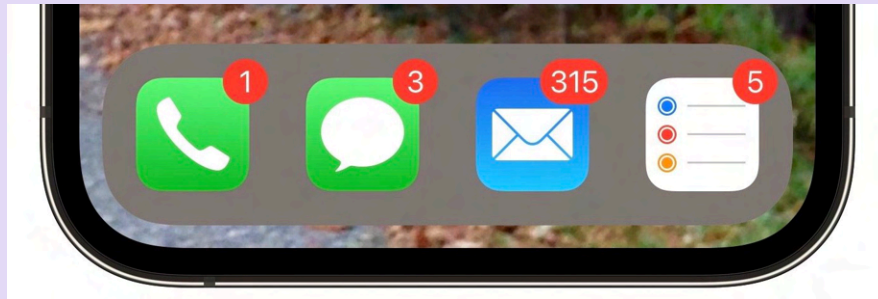
Understanding Icons, Apps, and Folders

3. **App Labels:** Under each app icon is a label that tells you the app's name. This helps identify the apps at a glance.



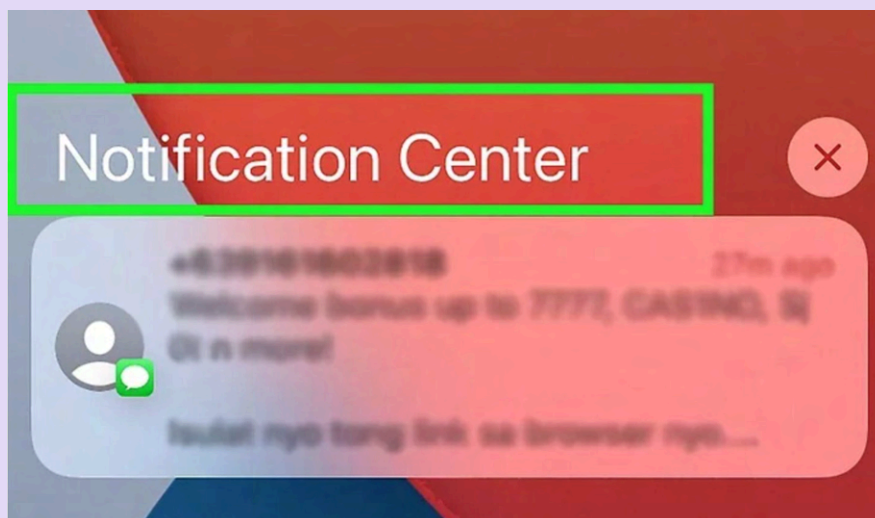
Notifications

1. Notification Badges: Some app icons might show a small red circle with a number. This is a "badge" that indicates the number of notifications or alerts for that app. For example, the "Mail" app might show a badge if you have new emails.



2. Viewing Notifications: To see more details about notifications, swipe down from the top of the screen. This will reveal the Notification Center, where you can read all your recent alerts.

3. Clearing Notifications: In the Notification Center, swipe left on a notification to clear it or tap "Clear All" to remove all notifications at once.



Using the Touchscreen

1. Tap: To select or open an app, gently tap on its icon with your finger. This is the most common gesture used on the iPhone.

2. Swipe: To move between screens or scroll through a list, place your finger on the screen and swipe in the direction you want to go:

- Swipe left or right to navigate between home screen pages.
- Swipe up or down to scroll through a webpage, list, or settings menu.

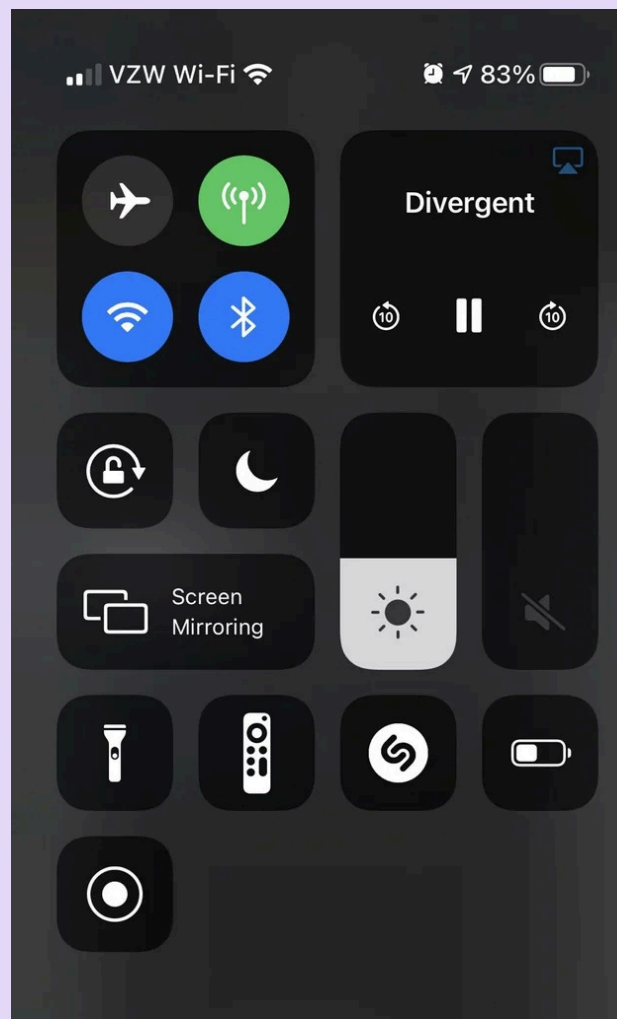
3. Pinch: Place two fingers on the screen and bring them closer together to "pinch" and zoom out on photos, maps, or webpages.

4. Zoom: To zoom in, place two fingers close together on the screen and move them apart. This works well for photos, maps, or anything you need a closer look at.

Accessing Control Center

1. Open Control Center:

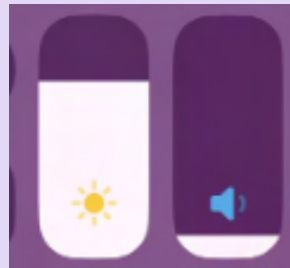
- For iPhones without a home button: Swipe down from the top-right corner of the screen.
- For older iPhone models with a home button: Swipe up from the bottom edge of the screen.



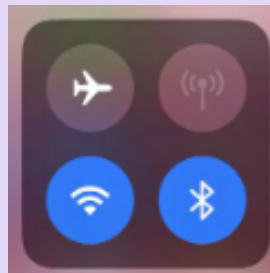
Accessing Control Center

- **Key Controls:**

- Brightness: Adjust screen brightness by sliding the brightness bar up or down.
- Volume: Use the volume slider to increase or decrease the sound.



- Wi-Fi and Bluetooth: Tap the icons to turn Wi-Fi or Bluetooth on (blue) or off (gray).
- Airplane Mode: Tap the airplane icon to disable all wireless communication (useful during flights).



- Flashlight: Tap the flashlight icon to turn it on or off.
- Do Not Disturb: Tap the crescent moon icon to enable "Do Not Disturb" mode, which silences notifications.

Introduction to Key Settings

1. **Open Settings:** Find and tap the "Settings" app (it looks like a gear) on your home screen.

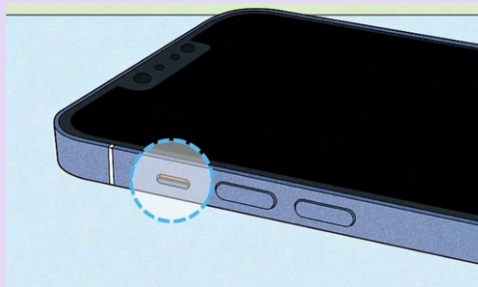
2. **Wi-Fi:**

- In "Settings," tap "Wi-Fi."
- Ensure Wi-Fi is turned on (the switch will be green).
- Tap the network name you want to connect to and enter the password if required.

Silent Mode and Do Not Disturb

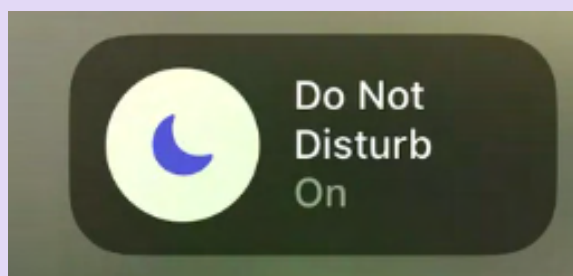
Silent Mode:

- Locate the physical switch on the left side of the iPhone.
- Flip the switch down so you see an orange stripe. This puts the phone in silent mode, which silences ringtones and alerts.



Do Not Disturb:

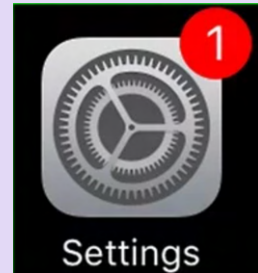
- To use "Do Not Disturb," swipe down from the top-right corner of the screen (or swipe up from the bottom on older iPhones) to open Control Center.
- Tap the crescent moon icon. This will silence all notifications and calls until you turn it off.
- For more options, go to "Settings" > "Focus" > "Do Not Disturb." Here, you can schedule times for "Do Not Disturb" and allow calls from certain contacts.



Updating your iPhone

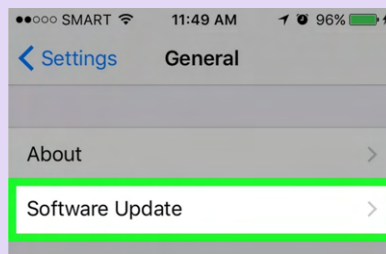
1. Open Settings

- Locate and tap the "Settings" app on your home screen. It looks like a gray gear icon.



2. Navigate to Software Update

- Scroll down and tap on "General."
- In the "General" menu, find and tap on "Software Update." This is where you can check for new iOS updates.



3. Check for Updates

- The iPhone will automatically start checking for available updates. If an update is available, you will see details about the new software version.
- If it says "Your software is up to date," you do not need to do anything further.

Update" screen, tap "Automatic Updates."

Updating your iPhone

4. Install the Update

- If an update is available, tap "Download and Install."
- If prompted, enter your iPhone's passcode to start the installation.
- Important: Ensure your iPhone is connected to Wi-Fi and has enough battery (preferably 50% or more). It's also recommended to plug your iPhone into a charger during the update.
- The update will begin downloading. Once downloaded, tap "Install Now." Your iPhone will restart and install the update, which can take several minutes.

5. Automatic Updates (Optional)

- To make future updates easier, you can enable automatic updates.
- In the "Software Update" screen, tap "Automatic Updates."
- Toggle on "Download iOS Updates" and "Install iOS Updates." Your iPhone will then automatically download and install updates overnight when it's charging and connected to Wi-Fi.

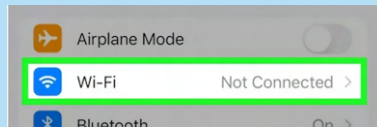

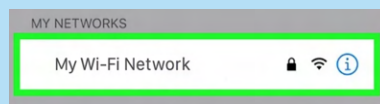
CONNECTING TO WI-FI AND SETTING UP ACCOUNTS

Connecting to Wi-Fi

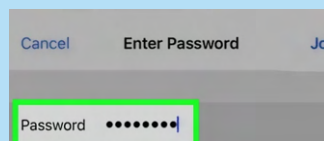
- Open the "Settings" app on your iPhone. This is represented by a gray gear icon.
- Tap on "Wi-Fi" at the top of the list.



- Make sure the "Wi-Fi" switch is turned on (the switch will be green). This will display a list of available Wi-Fi networks.
- Find your network in the list and tap on its name.



- If the network is password-protected, a box will appear asking for the password. Type in the Wi-Fi password using the on-screen keyboard.

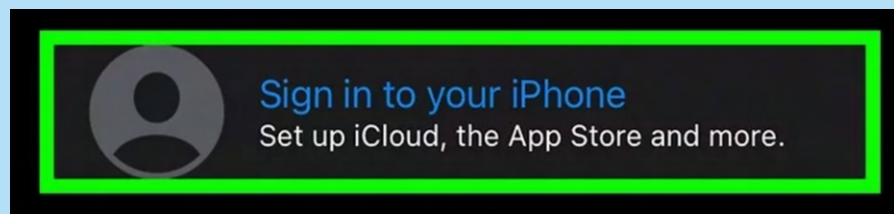


- After entering the password, tap "Join" in the top-right corner of the keyboard. If the password is correct, your iPhone will connect to the Wi-Fi network.
- Once connected, a checkmark will appear next to the network name, indicating a successful connection.

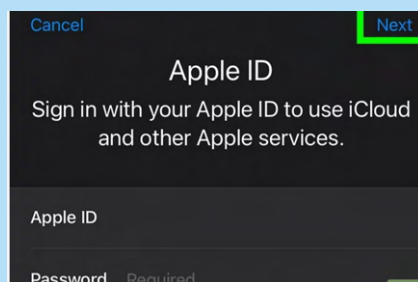
Logging into Accounts

Setting Up Your Apple ID and iCloud Account

- Open the "Settings" app.
- At the top of the Settings menu, tap "Sign in to your iPhone."



- Enter your Apple ID (email address) and password. If you do not have an Apple ID, tap "Don't have an Apple ID or forgot it?" and follow the prompts to create a new one.



- Once signed in, you'll be asked if you want to use iCloud. Tap "Merge" to sync your iPhone with iCloud, which backs up important information like contacts and photos.
- You may be prompted to enter your device's passcode or set up two-factor authentication for added security. Follow the on-screen instructions to complete these steps.

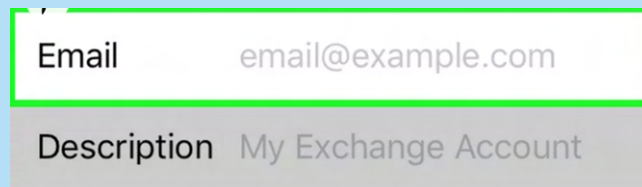
Logging into Accounts

Setting Up an Email Account

- Step 1: Open the "Settings" app.
- Step 2: Scroll down and tap on "Mail," then tap "Accounts."
- Step 3: Tap "Add Account," then select your email provider (e.g., Gmail, Yahoo, Outlook).



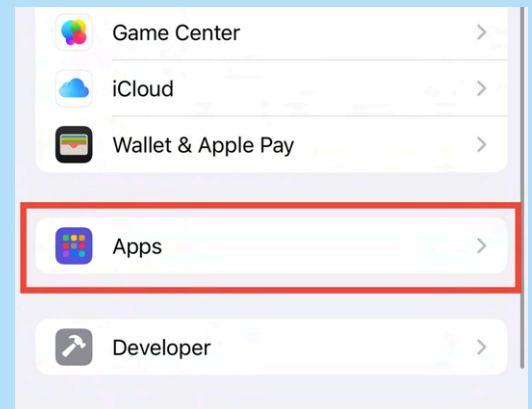
- Step 4: Enter your email address and password, then tap "Next."

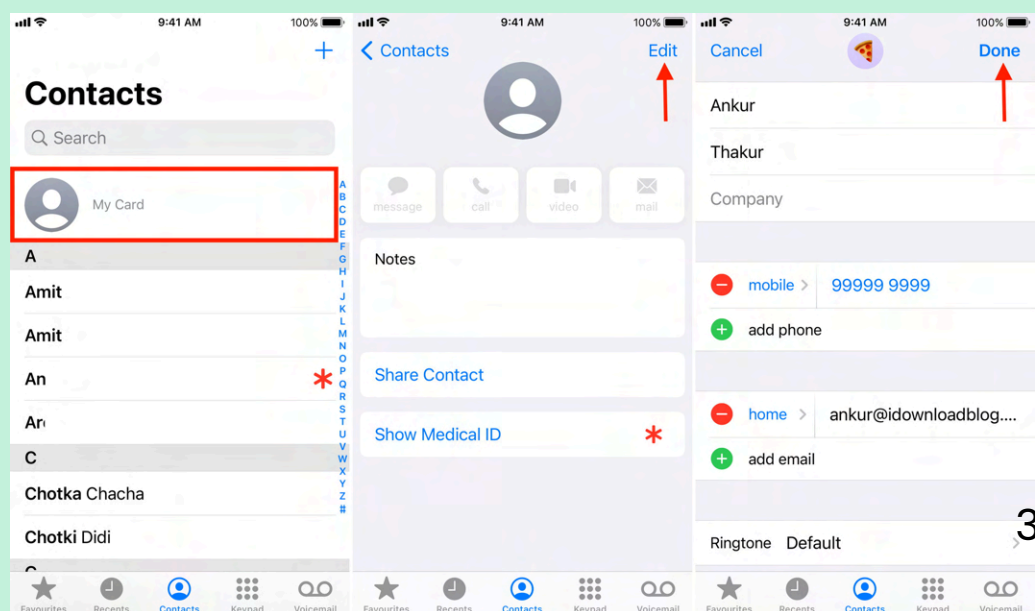
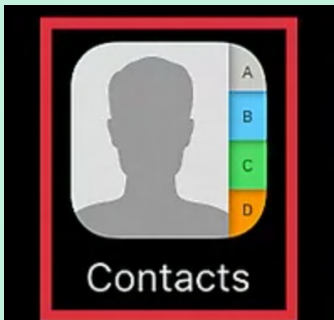

MANAGING CONTACTS

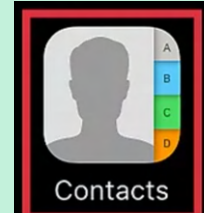
Setting Your Contact Information

- Step 1: Open the "Contacts" app on your iPhone. You can also access this through the "Phone" app by tapping "Contacts" at the bottom.
- Step 2: Scroll to the top of the "Contacts" list and tap "My Card" (it may say "Your Name" or "My Info").
- Step 3: Tap "Edit" in the top-right corner to add or update your personal information, such as your phone number, email, address, and photo.
- Step 4: After entering the information, tap "Done" in the top-right corner to save it.

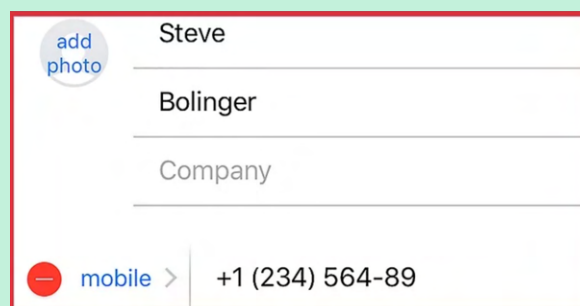


Adding and Saving Contacts

- Step 1: Open the "Contacts" app or the "Phone" app and then tap on "Contacts."



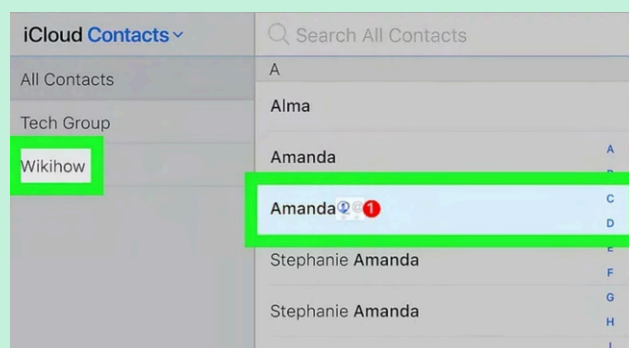
- Step 2: Tap the "+" sign in the top-right corner to add a new contact.
- Step 3: Enter the contact's details:
- Name: Enter the first and last name.
- Phone Number: Tap on "add phone" and enter their phone number.
- Email: Tap on "add email" to include their email address (optional).
- Additional Info: Add other details like address, birthday, or notes if needed.

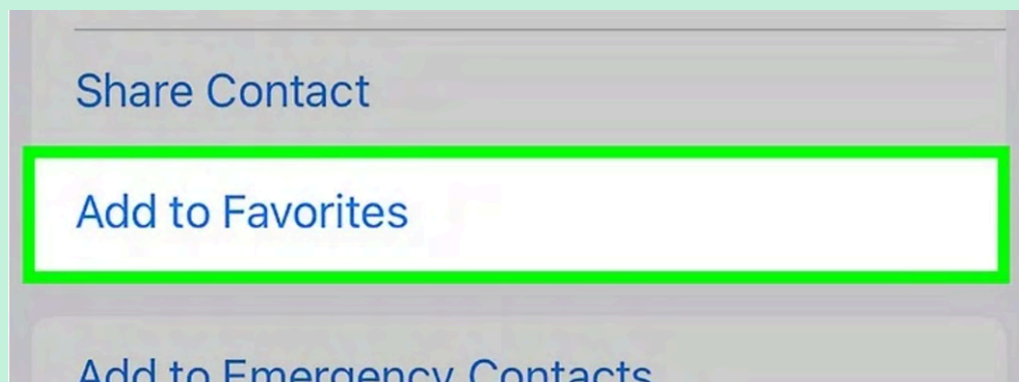
- Step 4: Once you've filled in the information, tap "Done" in the top-right corner to save the contact.

Organizing Your Contacts

- Groups: If you have many contacts, you can organize them into groups (e.g., Family, Friends, Work). This is done through the iCloud website (iCloud.com) rather than directly on the iPhone. Log in with your Apple ID, go to "Contacts," and create groups that will sync to your phone.

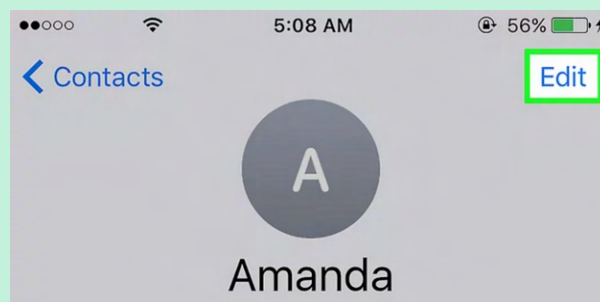


- Favorites: For quick access to frequently contacted people, open the "Phone" app, tap "Favorites" at the bottom, and tap the "+" to add contacts to your Favorites list.



Updating Contact Information

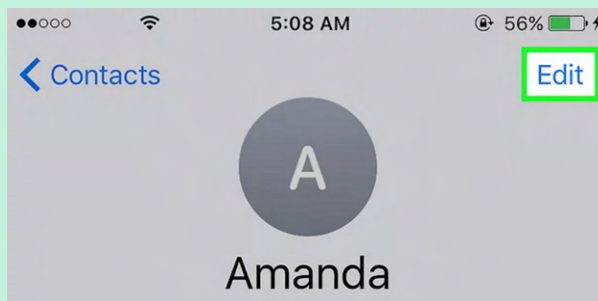
- Step 1: Open the "Contacts" app and find the contact you want to update.

- Step 3: Tap "Edit" in the top-right corner.



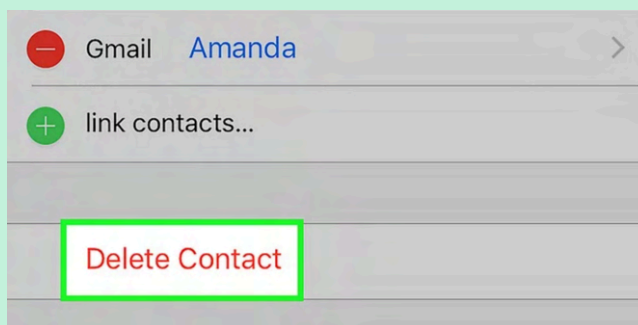
- Step 4: Make the necessary changes, such as updating their phone number, email, or address.
- Step 5: Tap "Done" to save your changes.

Deleting a Contact

- Step 1: Open the "Contacts" app and find the contact you wish to delete.
- Step 2: Tap on the contact's name.
- Step 3: Tap "Edit" in the top-right corner.

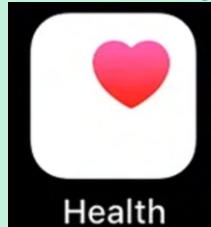


- Step 4: Scroll to the bottom and tap "Delete Contact." Confirm by tapping "Delete Contact" again.

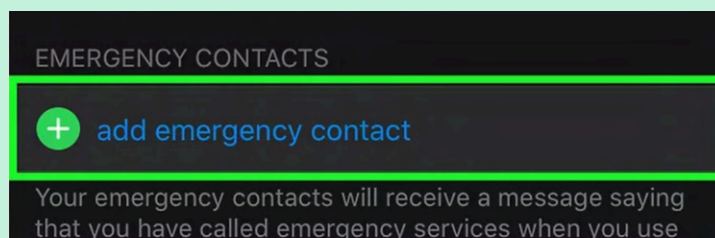


Setting Up Emergency Contacts

- Step 1: Open the "Health" app on your iPhone.

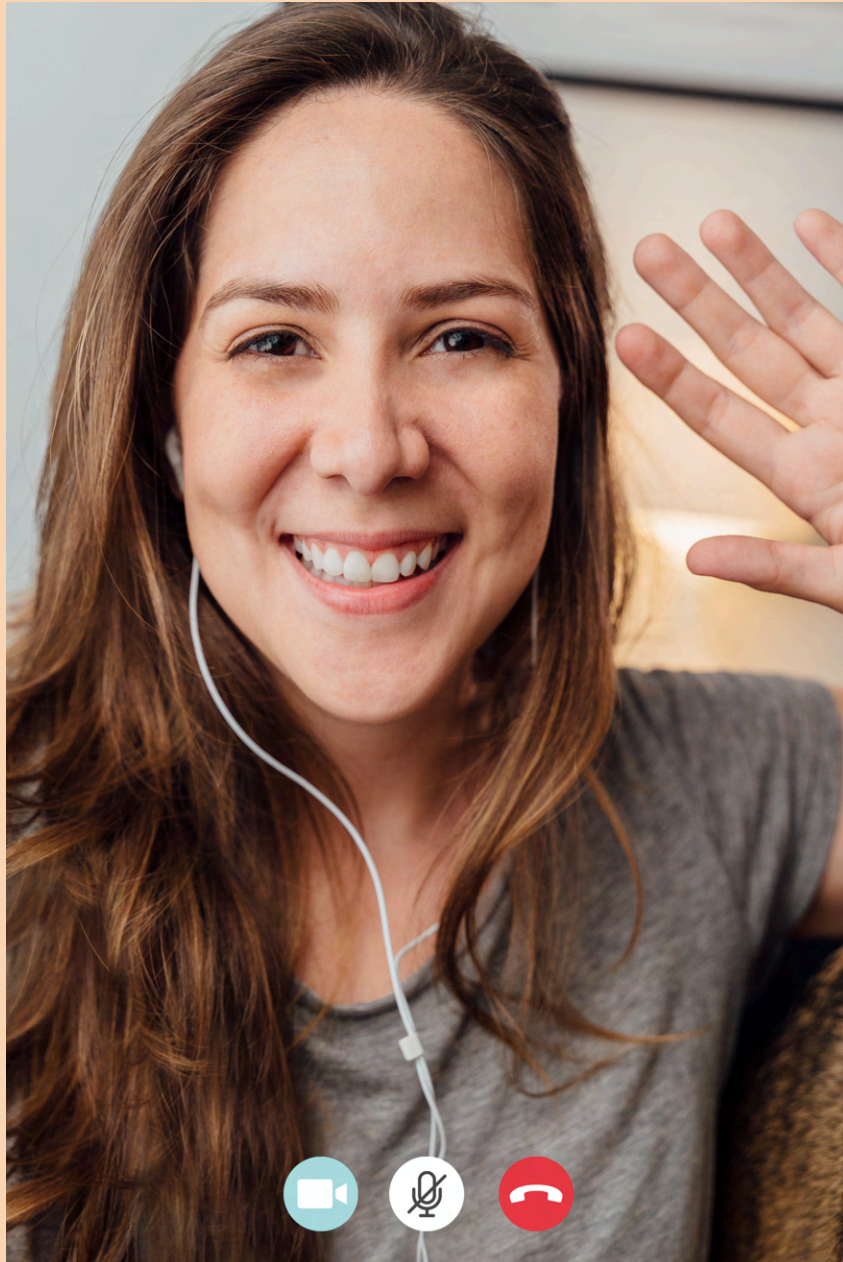


- Step 2: Tap on your profile picture in the top-right corner, then tap "Medical ID."
- Step 3: Tap "Edit" in the top-right corner.
- Step 4: Scroll down to the "Emergency Contacts" section and tap "add emergency contact."



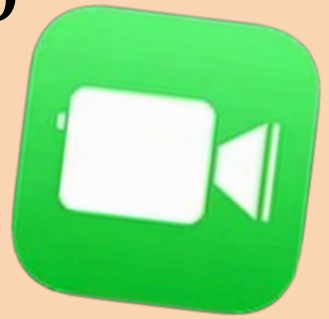
- Step 5: Choose a contact from your list and specify their relationship to you.
- Step 6: Tap "Done" to save. These contacts can be accessed in an emergency by first responders even if the phone is locked.

USING FACETIME

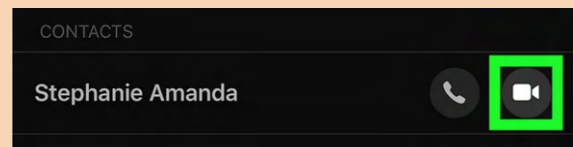
Introduction to FaceTime



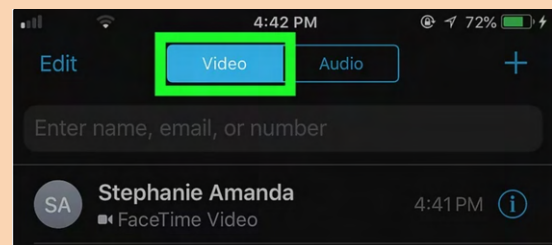
- **What is FaceTime?** FaceTime is Apple's video and audio calling app that allows you to make free video and audio calls over Wi-Fi or cellular data to other Apple devices. It's a great way to stay in touch with family and friends, especially when you want to see each other face-to-face.
- **Why Use FaceTime?** FaceTime is built into all Apple devices (iPhones, iPads, Macs), making it easy to use without needing to download anything. It offers high-quality video and audio, and it allows for group calls, which is perfect for family gatherings or virtual meetings.

Making a FaceTime Call

- Step 1: Open the "FaceTime" app on your iPhone. If you don't see it, swipe down on the home screen and type "FaceTime" into the search bar.
- Step 2: In the FaceTime app, tap the "+" sign in the top-right corner.
- Step 3: Enter the name, phone number, or email address of the person you want to call. If the person is in your contacts, you can start typing their name, and it will appear.



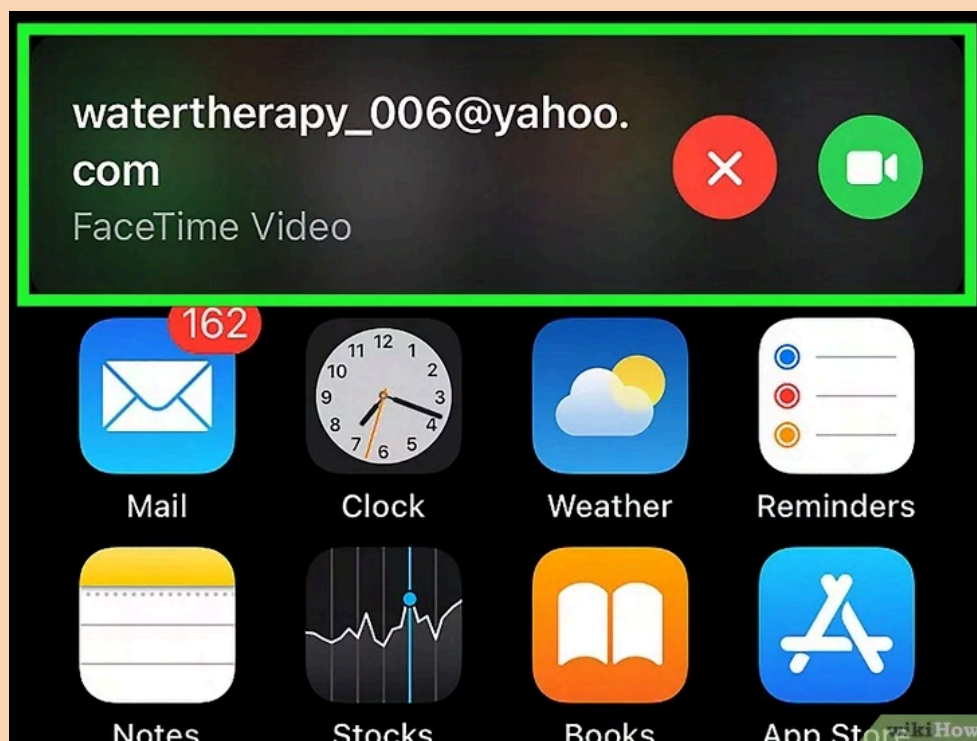
- Step 4: Once the contact is entered, tap "Video" to start a video call or "Audio" to make an audio-only FaceTime call.



- Step 5: During the call, you can switch between the front and back cameras by tapping the "flip" icon or mute your microphone by tapping the microphone icon.

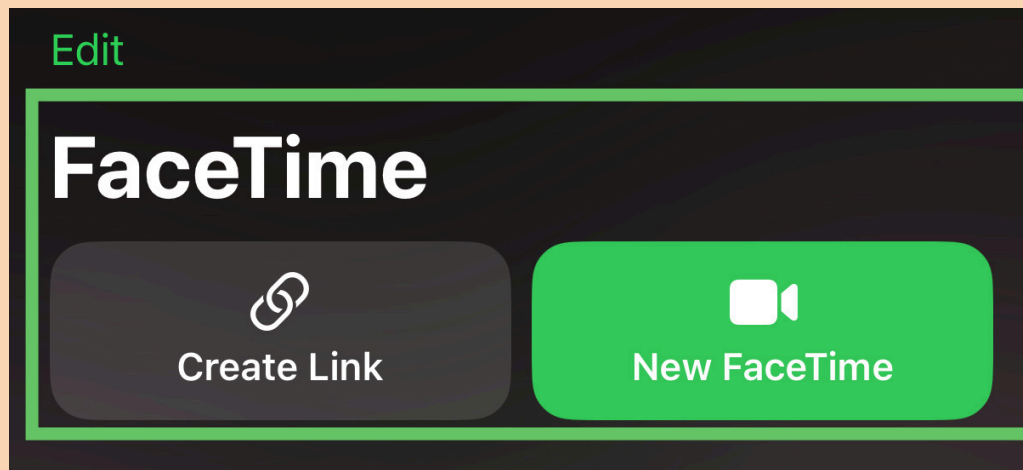
Answering a FaceTime Call

- Step 1: When you receive a FaceTime call, a notification will appear on your screen showing the caller's name or number.
- Step 2: To answer a video call, tap the green "Video" button. If it's an audio-only FaceTime call, tap the green "Audio" button.
- Step 3: If you're unable to take the call, tap the red "Decline" button. Alternatively, tap "Remind Me" or "Message" to set a reminder or send a quick text response.



Using Group FaceTime

- Step 1: Open the "FaceTime" app.
- Step 2: Tap the "New Facetime" button on the top



- Step 3: In the "To:" field, enter the names, phone numbers, or email addresses of the people you want to add to the call. You can add up to 32 people on a Group FaceTime call.
- Step 4: Once you've added everyone, tap "FaceTime" to start a group video call or the phone icon for a group audio call.
- Step 5: During the call, the screen will automatically highlight the person who is speaking. You can also tap on anyone's tile to bring their video to the forefront.

USING AIRDROP

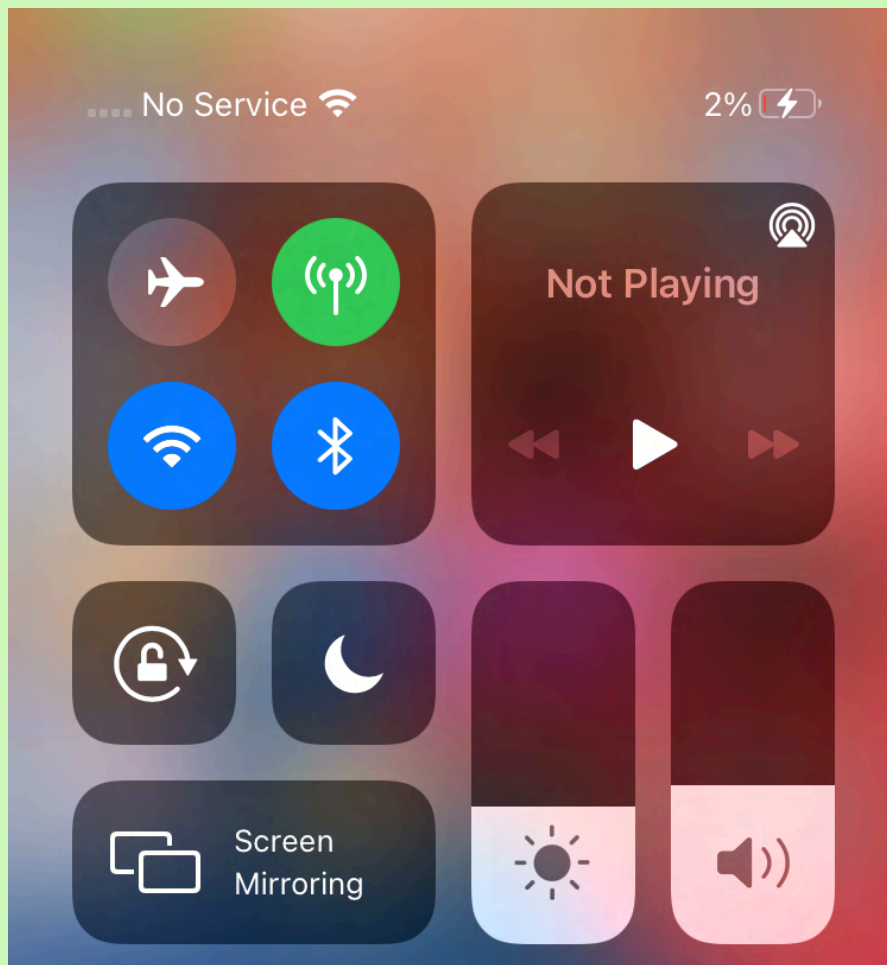
Introduction to AirDrop



- **Understanding AirDrop:** AirDrop is a simple and fast way to share files wirelessly between Apple devices, such as iPhones, iPads, and Macs. You can share photos, documents, videos, contacts, and even websites instantly with nearby devices.
- **How does AirDrop work?** AirDrop uses Bluetooth to find nearby Apple devices and Wi-Fi to quickly transfer files. Both devices need to have AirDrop turned on and be close to each other.

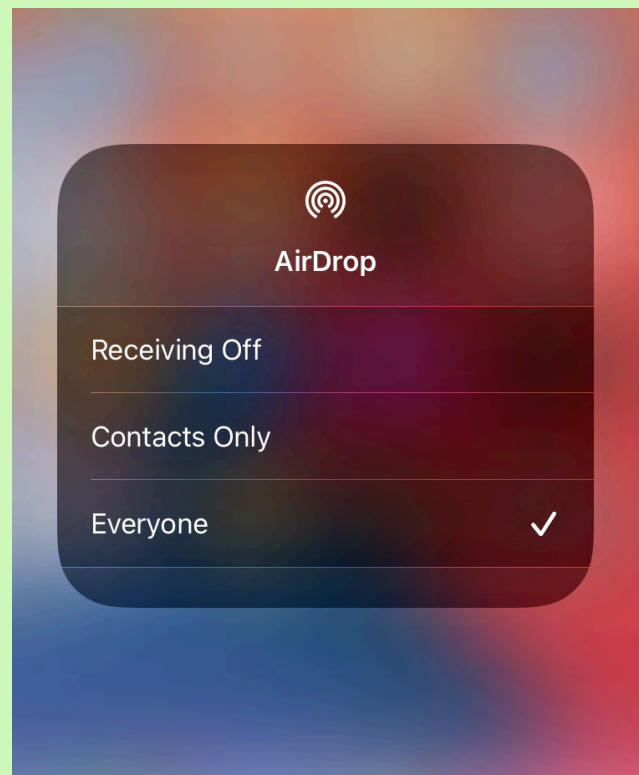
How to Enable AirDrop

- **Step 1: Open Control Center:**
 - On an iPhone or iPad: Swipe down from the upper-right corner of the screen (or swipe up from the bottom if you have an older iPhone model).



How to Enable AirDrop

- Step 2: Turn on AirDrop:
 - On iPhone/iPad: Tap and hold the section with the Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, and Airplane Mode icons, then tap 'AirDrop.'
 - Select 'Contacts Only' (to share with people in your contacts) or 'Everyone for 10 minutes' (to share with anyone nearby).
- Make sure Bluetooth and Wi-Fi are turned on: AirDrop needs both to function properly.



Sending Files with AirDrop

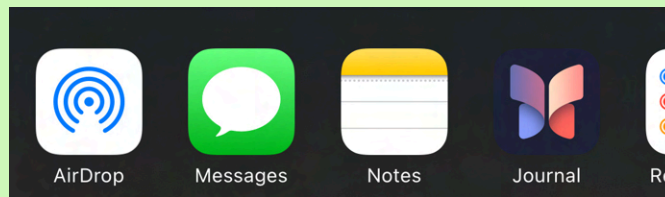
1. Select the file you want to share:

- On iPhone/iPad: Open the app with the file you want to share (Photos, Notes, Files, etc.). Tap the 'Share' button (it looks like a square with an arrow pointing up).
- On a Mac: Right-click the file you want to share, or click the 'Share' button in the app you're using.



2. Choose AirDrop:

- In the sharing options, tap 'AirDrop.'



1. Select the recipient:

- You will see nearby AirDrop-enabled devices. Tap the device or person you want to send the file to.

2. File transfer:

- Once the person accepts the file, it will be sent instantly. A confirmation message will appear once the transfer is complete.



Receiving Files with AirDrop

1. Accept the AirDrop transfer:

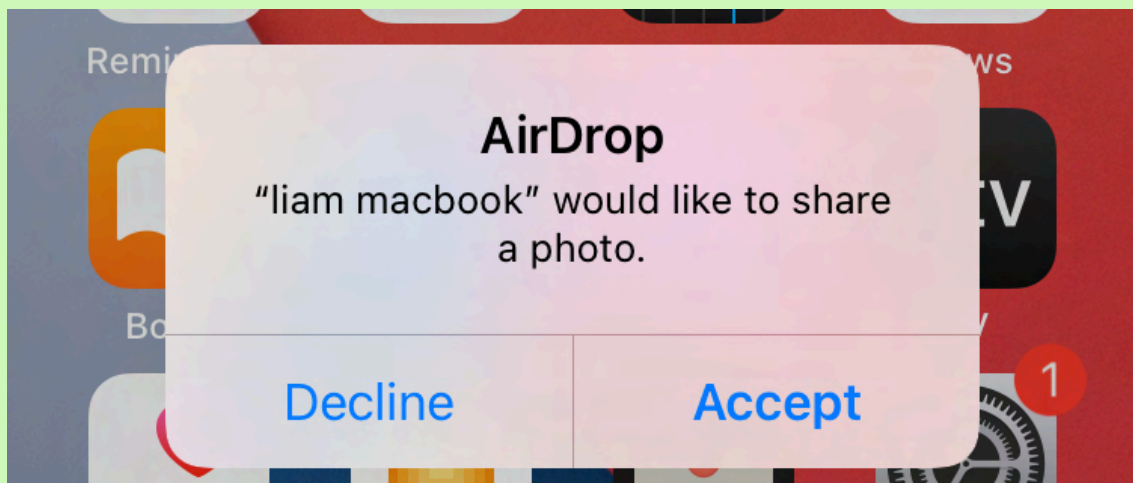
- a. When someone sends you a file via AirDrop, a notification will appear on your screen asking if you want to accept or decline.

2. Tap 'Accept':

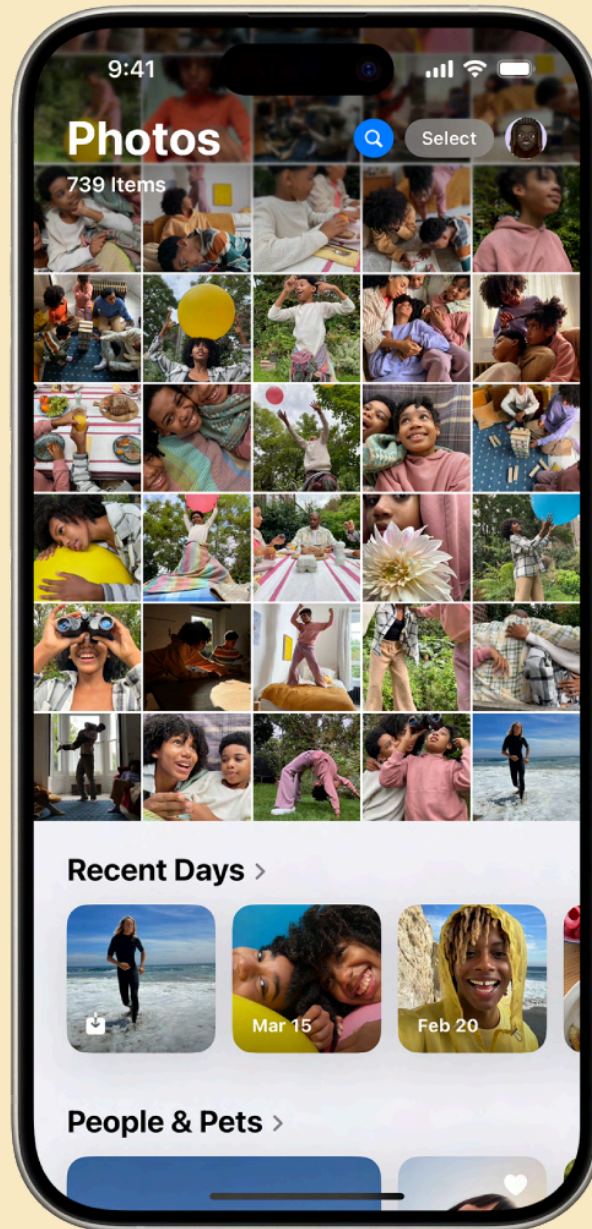
- a. If you tap 'Accept,' the file will be downloaded to your device.
- b. Photos and videos will be saved to your Photos app, documents will appear in Files or the relevant app, and websites will open in Safari.

3. Decline the transfer:

- a. If you do not want to receive the file, tap 'Decline,' and the transfer will be canceled.



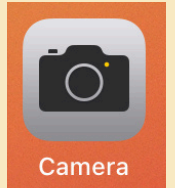

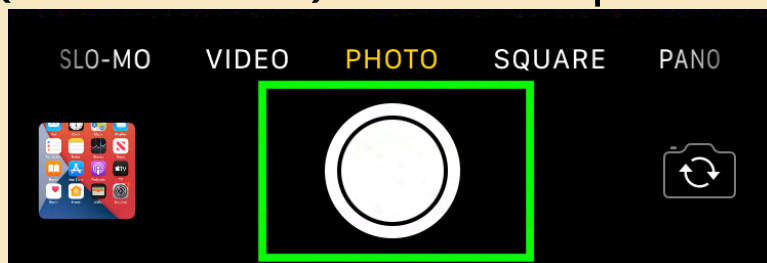
ORGANIZING AND MANAGING PHOTOS

Taking Photos and Videos

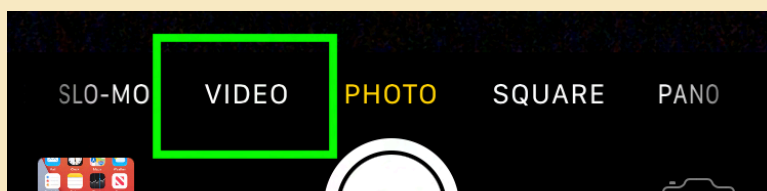
- Open the Camera app: Tap the Camera icon on your home screen or swipe left from the lock screen.



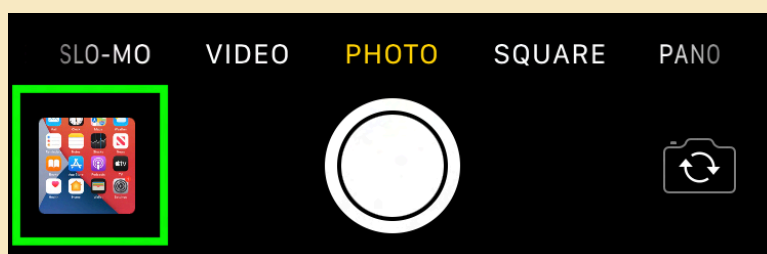
- Take a photo: Frame your shot by pointing your phone's camera at the subject. Tap the shutter button (white circle) to take a picture.



- Record a video: To switch to video mode, swipe left or right until "Video" is selected. Tap the red circle to start recording and tap it again to stop.

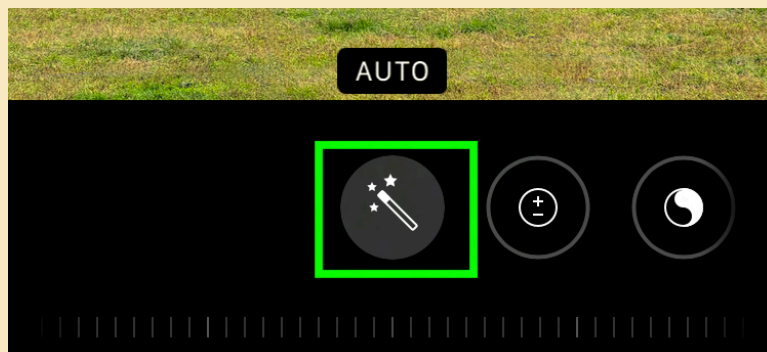


- View your photos and videos: After taking a picture or video, tap the small thumbnail in the bottom-left corner to view it in the Photos app.

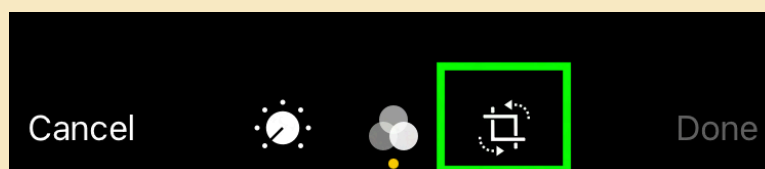


Editing Photos

- Open the photo you want to edit: In the Photos app, tap the photo to bring it up.
- Tap 'Edit': In the top-right corner, tap the 'Edit' button.
- Basic edits: Adjust lighting and color by tapping the 'Magic Wand' icon (Auto), or use sliders to change brightness, contrast, and more.

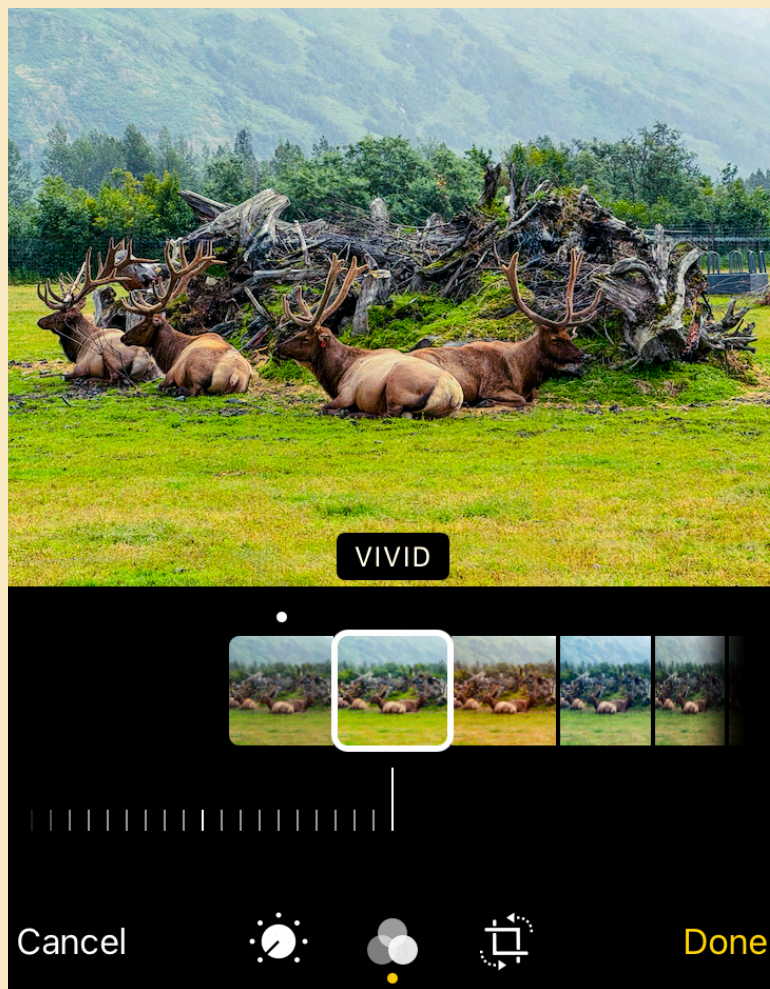


- You can also crop or rotate the photo by tapping the crop icon (square with arrows).

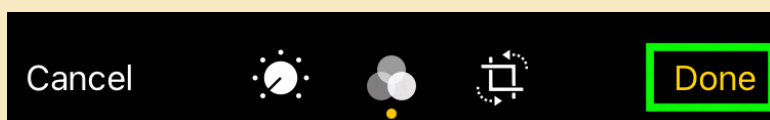


Editing Photos

- Apply filters: Tap the filter icon (three circles) to choose a preset filter like 'Vivid' or 'Dramatic.'



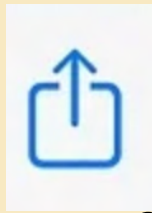
- Save your edits: Once you're satisfied with your edits, tap 'Done' to save the changes.



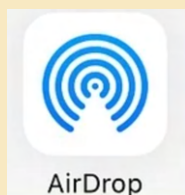
Sharing Photos

Sharing photos via AirDrop, Messages, or Email:

- Open the Photos app: Tap the photo or video you want to share.
- Tap the 'Share' button: This is the icon that looks like a square with an arrow pointing up.



- Choose how to share: Select 'AirDrop' to send to nearby Apple devices, 'Messages' to text the photo, or 'Mail' to send via email.



Follow the prompts to complete the share:

- For AirDrop, tap the person's device name.
- For Messages or Email, type the recipient's name and send it as you would normally.

Backing Up Photos to iCloud

How to ensure your photos are safely stored in the cloud:

1. Enable iCloud Photos:

- Go to 'Settings,' tap your name at the top, then tap 'iCloud.'

2. Turn on 'iCloud Photos':

- Under 'Photos,' toggle the switch next to 'iCloud Photos' to enable backup.

3. Automatic backup:

- Your photos and videos will automatically back up to iCloud when your device is connected to Wi-Fi.

4. Access your photos anywhere:

- You can view your photos on any Apple device signed in to your iCloud account by opening the Photos app.

Saving Photos from Text Messages

How to save photos shared in Messages:

a. Open the Messages app:

- Find the conversation with the photo you want to save.

b. Tap and hold the photo:

- When the options appear, tap 'Save.'

c. Find the photo in your Photos app:

- The saved photo will now appear in your Photos app under 'Recents.'

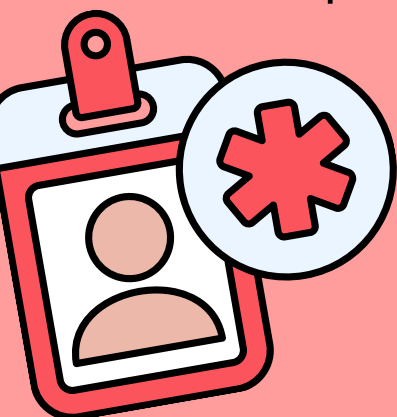
SETTING UP AND USING MEDICAL ID

What is Medical ID?

Medical ID is a feature available on iPhones that provides essential health and emergency contact information. It can be accessed directly from the lock screen, even when your phone is locked, allowing emergency responders to quickly learn about your medical conditions, allergies, blood type, and contact your emergency contacts if needed.

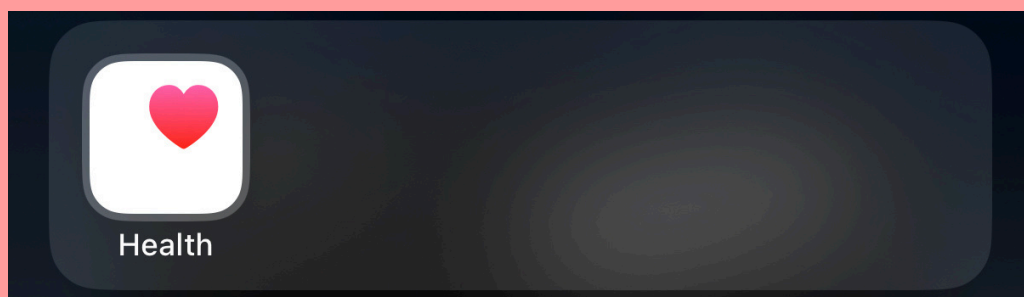
- **Why is Medical ID important?**

- In case of a medical emergency, first responders can use your Medical ID to understand your health conditions, medications, or allergies, which could be life-saving.
- It also allows others to notify your loved ones quickly without needing to unlock your phone.



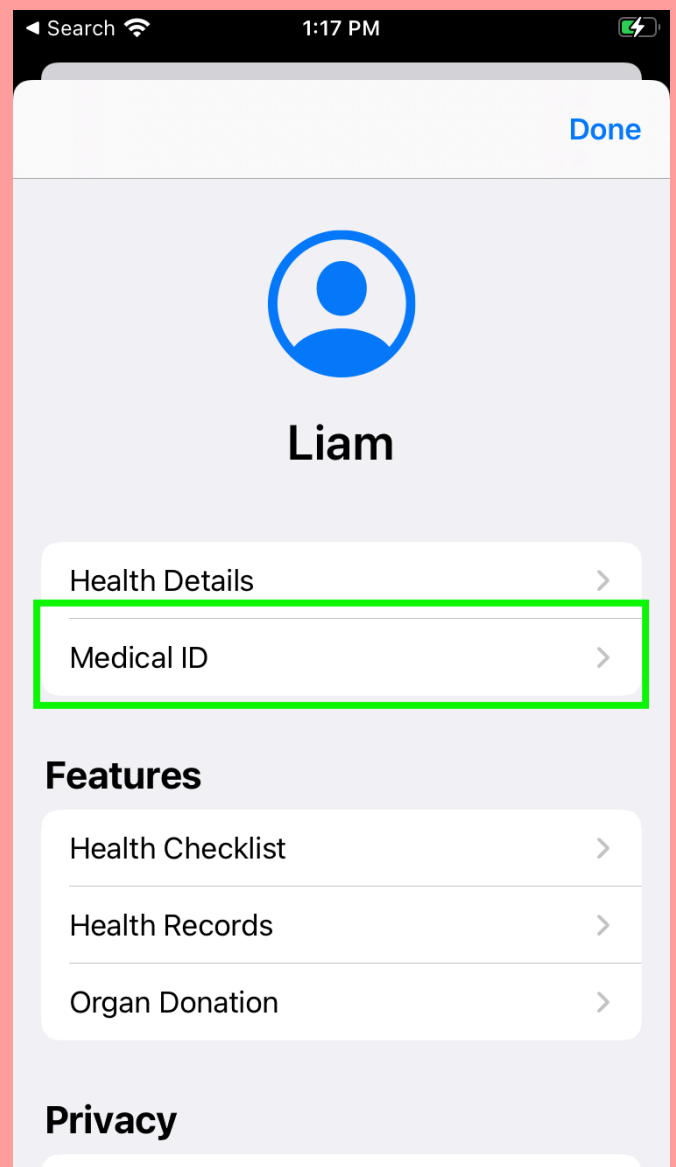
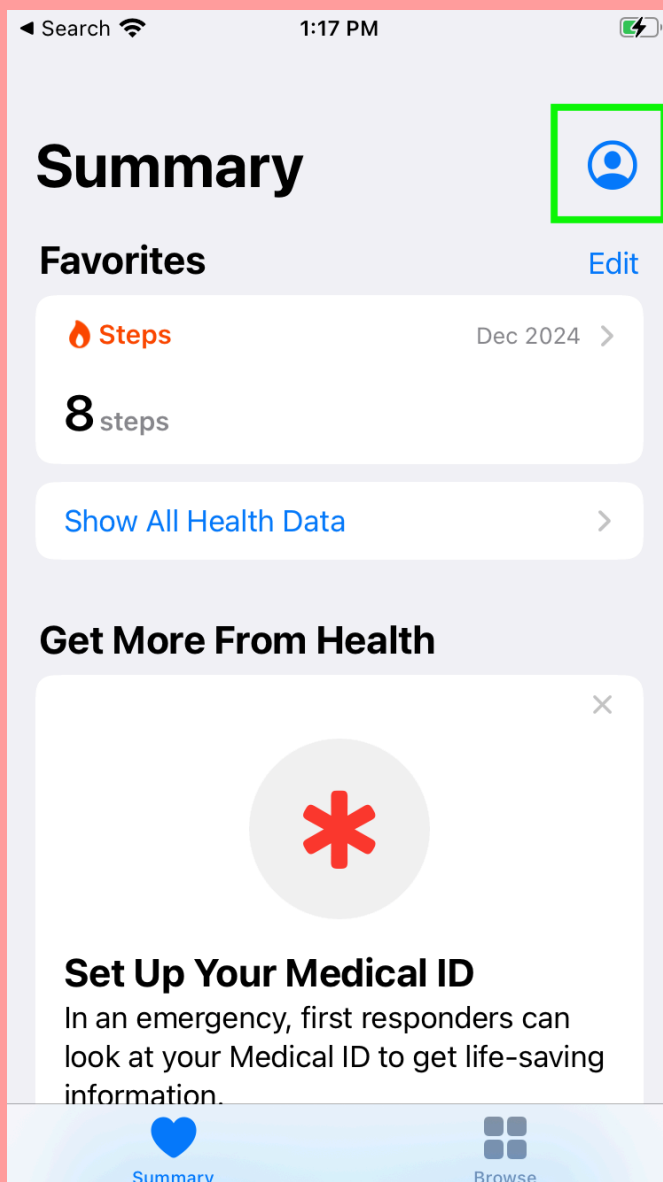
Creating Your Medical ID

- Step-by-step guide to setting up Medical ID:
 - a. Open the Health app:
 - Find the 'Health' app on your iPhone (it looks like a white icon with a red heart) and tap to open it.
 - b. Go to the 'Medical ID' section:

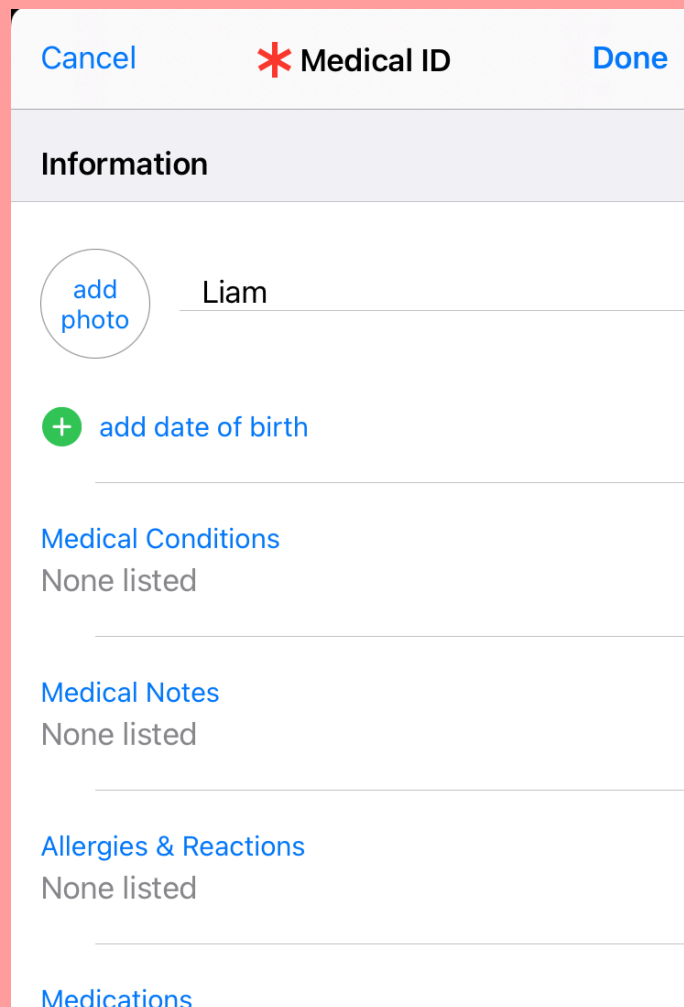

- Add emergency contacts:

Accessing Medical ID in Emergencies

How to access Medical ID from the lock screen:

- Access Medical ID on an iPhone:
 - If you find yourself in an emergency or need to help someone, access the Medical ID by following these steps:
 - From the lock screen, press the 'Side' or 'Home' button (depending on your iPhone model).
 - On the password entry screen, tap 'Emergency' in the bottom-left corner.
 - Then tap 'Medical ID' in the bottom-left corner. You will now see all the health information entered in the Medical ID, including emergency contacts.
- For emergency responders:
 - Medical personnel or bystanders can access this information without unlocking the phone, helping them make informed decisions and contact family members.

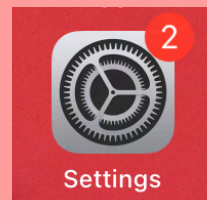


Customizing Notifications

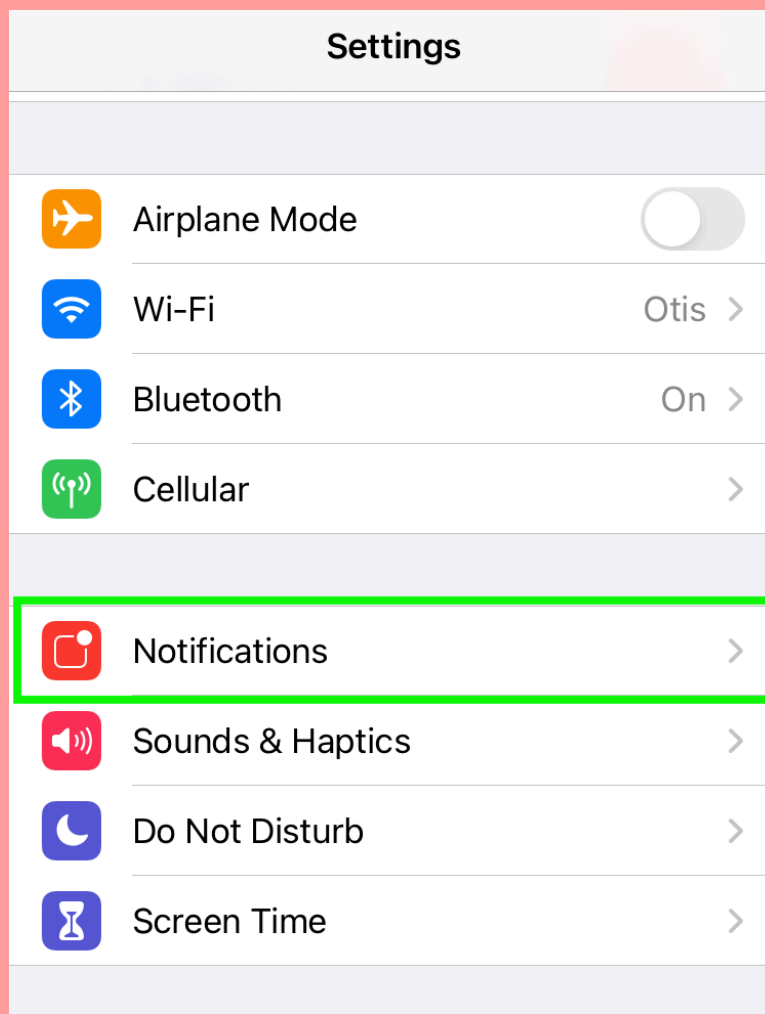
1. Open 'Settings':

Tap the 'Settings' icon on your home screen (it looks like a gear).



1. Go to 'Notifications':

Scroll down and tap 'Notifications.'



Customizing Notifications

1. Select an app:

You'll see a list of all the apps on your device.

Tap any app to customize its notifications.

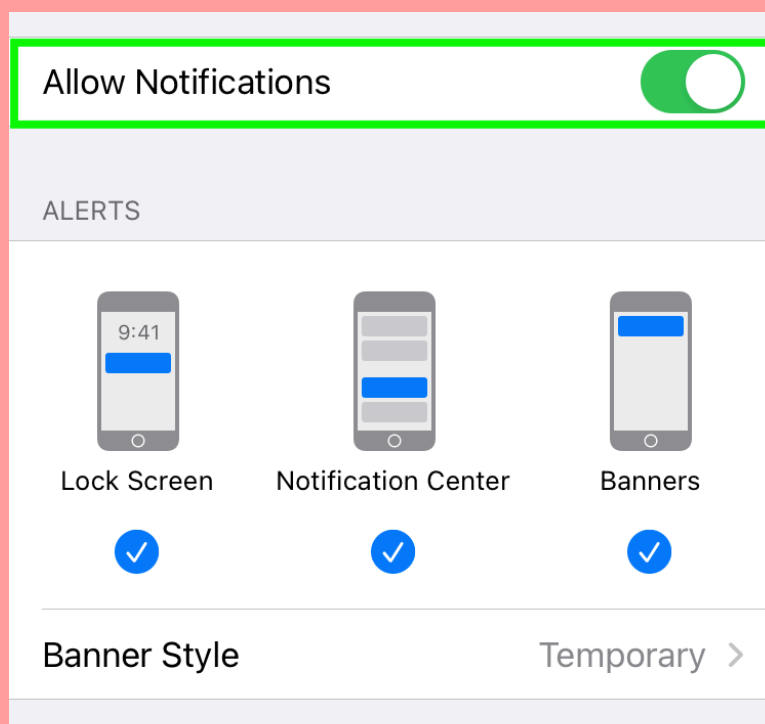
2. Turn notifications on or off:

Toggle 'Allow Notifications' to enable or disable notifications for that app.

3. Choose how notifications appear:

You can decide if notifications show on your lock screen, in the notification center, or as banners when the app sends an alert.

You can also adjust the sound and badges (numbers that appear on app icons) for each app.



Adjusting Privacy Settings

Ensuring your information is protected: Your iPhone has several privacy features to help you control what information apps and services can access. Here's how to check and adjust your privacy settings:

1. Open 'Settings':

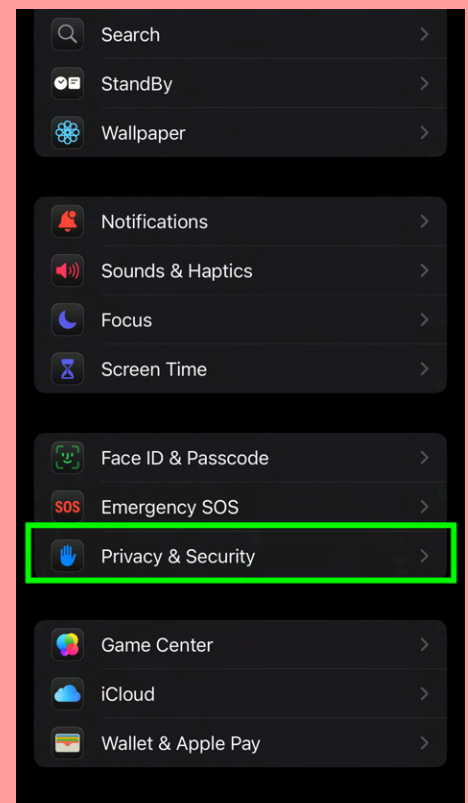
- Go to 'Settings' and scroll down to 'Privacy & Security.'

2. Review privacy options:

- You'll see categories like 'Location Services,' 'Contacts,' 'Photos,' and more. Tap each one to see which apps have access to that information.

3. Turn off access to personal data:

- For each category, you can decide whether to allow apps to access certain data. For example, in 'Location Services,' you can choose whether an app can always, never, or only use your location while the app is in use.



Adjusting Privacy Settings

Understanding app permissions:

1. What are app permissions?

- When you download an app, it may ask for permission to access parts of your phone, like the camera, microphone, or contacts.

2. How to manage app permissions:

- Go to 'Settings' > 'Privacy & Security,' then tap the permission category (like 'Camera' or 'Microphone') to see which apps have requested access. You can toggle each app's permission on or off.

3. Why it's important:

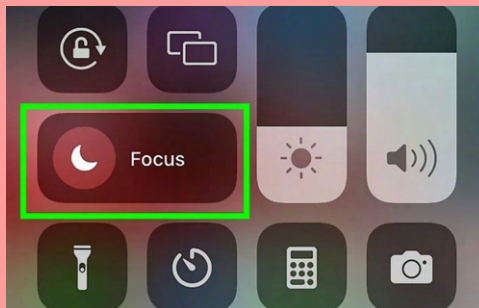
- Limiting access to personal data ensures that apps can't collect or misuse your information without your consent. Only grant permissions to apps you trust.

Using Do Not Disturb

How to enable and schedule Do Not Disturb mode for peace and quiet: Do Not Disturb mode silences calls, messages, and notifications so you can enjoy uninterrupted time. Here's how to use it:

1. Enable Do Not Disturb:

- Open the Control Center by swiping down from the upper-right corner of your screen (or up from the bottom if you have an older iPhone).
- Tap the crescent moon icon to enable Do Not Disturb.



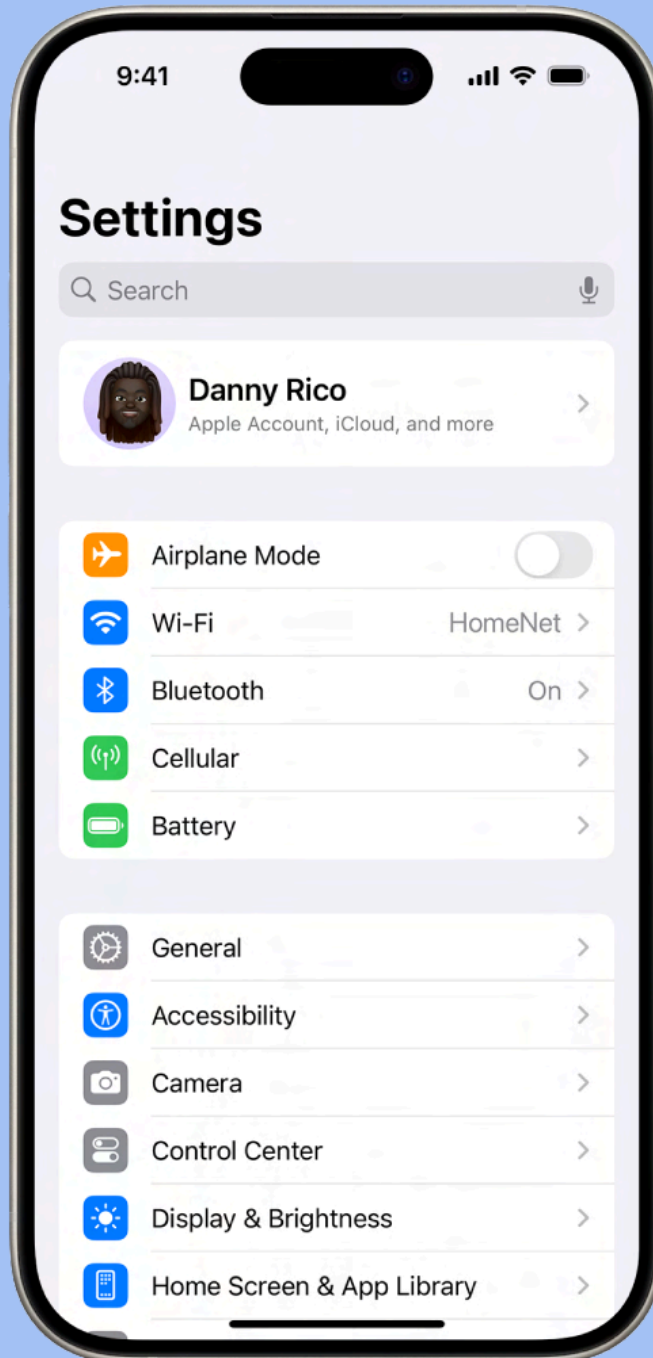
1. Schedule Do Not Disturb:

- To schedule it, go to 'Settings,' tap 'Focus,' then 'Do Not Disturb.'
- Tap 'Add Schedule or Automation' to set specific times when Do Not Disturb automatically turns on, like during bedtime or meetings.

2. Customize Do Not Disturb:

- You can choose to allow calls from certain contacts even when Do Not Disturb is on. In the 'Allowed Notifications' section, tap 'People' and add the contacts you still want to hear from while the mode is active.

Common Issues and Fixes

Solutions to common problems: Here are some simple solutions to common issues you might encounter with your iPhone or iPad:

- Wi-Fi issues:



- If your device won't connect to Wi-Fi, go to 'Settings' > 'Wi-Fi' and make sure it's turned on.
- Tap the Wi-Fi network you're trying to connect to and select 'Forget This Network,' then reconnect by re-entering the Wi-Fi password.

- App crashes:



- If an app keeps crashing, try closing it and reopening it. Double-tap the Home button (or swipe up from the bottom of the screen) and swipe the app away.
- Ensure the app is up to date by visiting the App Store and checking for updates.
- If that doesn't work, try deleting the app and reinstalling it.

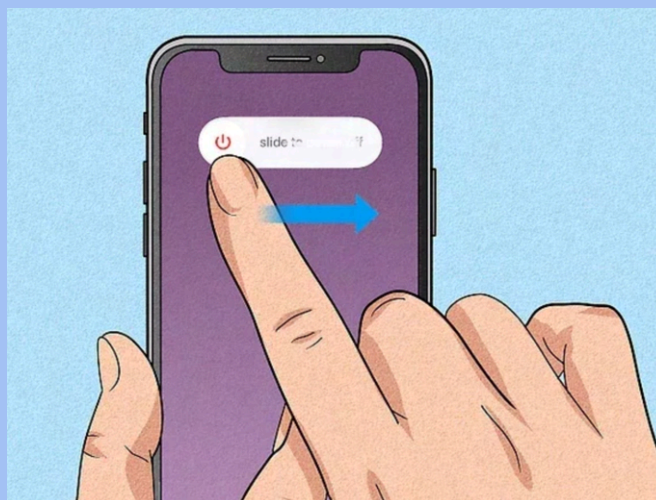
- Battery drains quickly:



- Check which apps are using the most battery by going to 'Settings' > 'Battery.'
- Turn off background app refresh for unnecessary apps in 'Settings' > 'General' > 'Background App Refresh.'
 - Lower screen brightness or turn on 'Low Power Mode' in 'Settings' > 'Battery.'

How to Restart Your Device

- Steps for restarting an iPad or iPhone:
 - a. For iPhones with Face ID (or iPad without a home button):
 - Press and hold the 'Side' button and either volume button until the 'Power Off' slider appears.
 - Drag the slider to turn off the device, then wait about 30 seconds.
 - To turn it back on, press and hold the 'Side' button until the Apple logo appears.
 - b. For iPhones with a Home button:
 - Press and hold the 'Power' button (usually on the side or top) until the 'Power Off' slider appears.
 - Drag the slider, wait 30 seconds, and then press and hold the 'Power' button again until the Apple logo appears.



How to Update Your Device

- **Here's how to check for updates:**

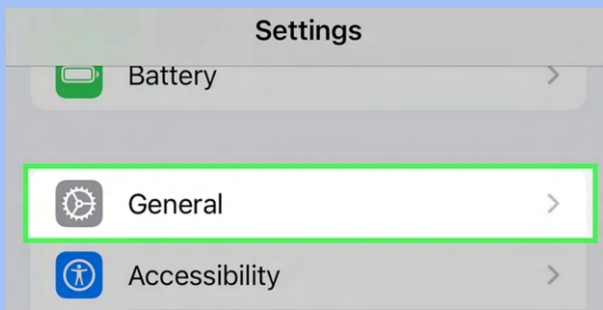
1. Open 'Settings':

3. Check for updates:

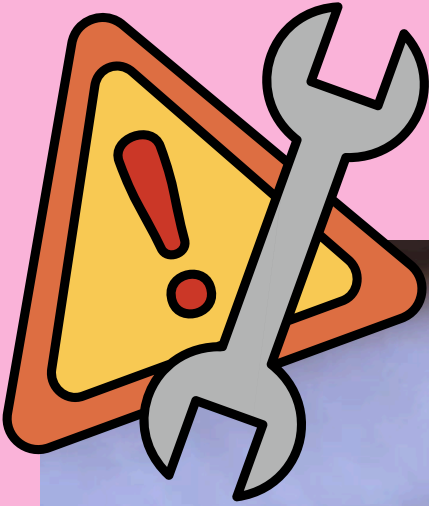

Internet Safety Basics

Understanding phishing, scams, and how to avoid them:

- Phishing: This is when scammers try to trick you into providing personal information, such as passwords or credit card numbers, by pretending to be legitimate companies (like your bank or email provider).
 - How to spot phishing attempts: Be cautious of emails or messages that ask for personal details or contain suspicious links. Scammers may use urgent language (e.g., "Your account is at risk!") to make you act quickly.
 - What to do:
 - Don't click on links in emails or text messages from unknown senders.
 - Verify the sender's email address or phone number—scammers often use addresses that look very similar to legitimate ones.
 - If you're unsure, contact the company directly using a verified phone number or website to check if the message is legitimate.



Internet Safety Basics

Understanding phishing, scams, and how to avoid them:

- Avoiding scams:
 - Unfamiliar requests: Ignore any request for money, prizes, or personal information that seems out of the ordinary.
 - Fake websites: Always check the URL of websites before entering sensitive information. Look for 'https://' at the beginning of the address and a padlock symbol, indicating a secure connection.
 - Unsolicited downloads: Never download attachments or software from unknown sources, as they may contain viruses or malware.



Staying Safe with Emails and Text Messages

How to handle suspicious emails and texts:

1. Be cautious of unexpected messages:

- If you receive an email or text message from an unknown sender, do not click on any links or attachments.

2. Look out for strange requests:

- Banks, government agencies, or legitimate companies will never ask for your password, PIN, or social security number via email or text. If you receive a message asking for sensitive information, it's likely a scam.

3. Verify sender details:

- Scammers often use email addresses or phone numbers that are very similar to legitimate ones. Always double-check the sender's details, and when in doubt, contact the company directly.

4. Block and report spam:

- Most email providers and messaging apps allow you to block and report suspicious emails or texts. Doing this helps protect you and others from future scams.

STAYING SAFE ONLINE

Avoid Clicking on Unknown Links

- **Common Scam:** You might receive messages claiming your package couldn't be delivered or that you need to "verify" your information for a shipment. If you didn't specifically request a delivery update, these messages are often fake.
- **What to Do:** Don't click on any links in messages from unknown numbers or emails. Instead, check the status of any legitimate orders by visiting the official website (like usps.com) and tracking your package directly.



Identify Fake Text Messages and Emails

Scammers will often send fake messages pretending to be USPS, UPS, or FedEx. Look for signs like:



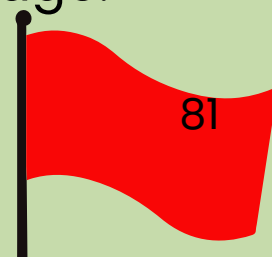
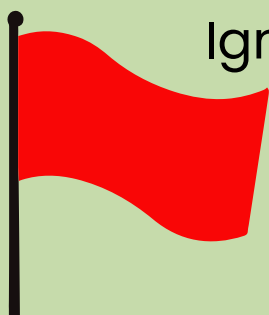
Poor grammar or spelling errors.

Urgent requests (e.g., “Act now!” or “Your account will be locked”).

Unusual web addresses that don’t match the company’s actual URL.

Don’t Give Personal Information Over Text or Email

- Reputable companies like USPS or your bank will never ask you to provide sensitive information (like your Social Security number, passwords, or credit card details) through a text message or email.
- If a message asks for this info, it’s a red flag. Ignore the request and delete the message.



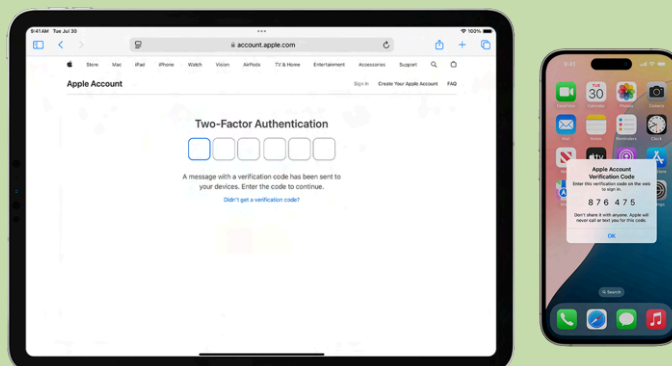
Install a Security App on Your Phone

- Use a trusted mobile security app that can help detect suspicious links and protect against malware.
- Some popular and reliable options include Norton Mobile Security, McAfee Mobile Security, or Lookout.



Use Two-Factor Authentication (2FA)

- Many accounts now offer 2FA, which adds an extra layer of security by requiring a unique code (usually sent to your phone) in addition to your password.
- This way, even if a scammer gets your password, they won't be able to access your account without the second form of verification.



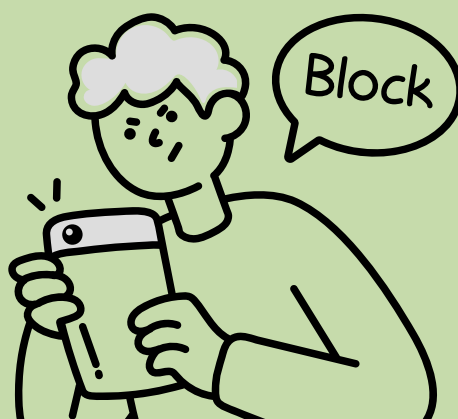
Regularly Update Your Phone's Software

Updates often include security patches that protect your device from new threats. Make it a habit to keep your phone's operating system and apps up to date.

Learn to Block and Report Suspicious Contacts

If you receive a suspicious text or call, you can block the number and report it as spam. Most smartphones have an option to report messages as "junk" or "spam" in the message app.

You can also report scam attempts to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) at reportfraud.ftc.gov.

Downloading Apps from the App Store

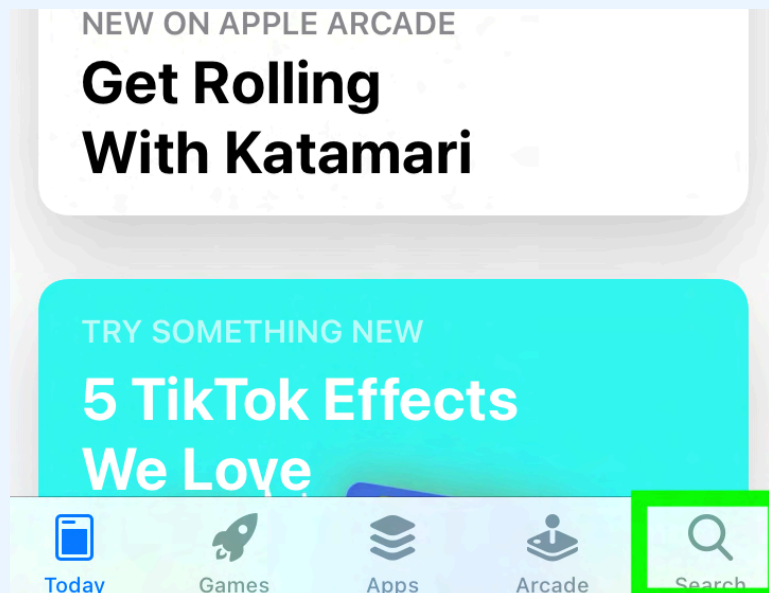
Step 1: Open the App Store

- Find the App Store icon on your home screen. It looks like a blue box with a white "A" made of three sticks.
- Tap the App Store icon once to open it.



Step 2: Search for an App

- Once the App Store is open, you'll see a menu at the bottom of the screen with different options like Today, Games, Apps, and Search.
- Tap on the Search option in the bottom-right corner.

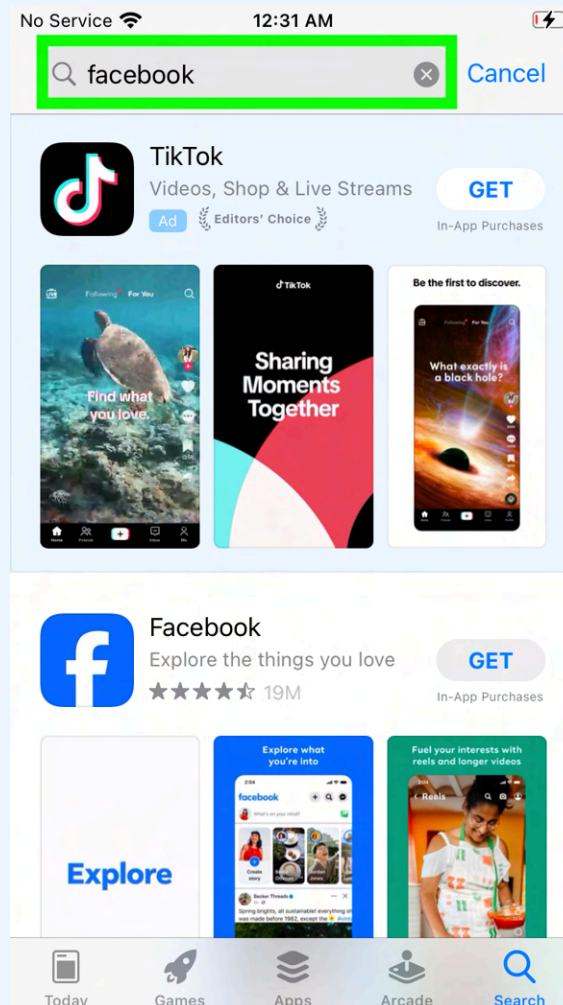


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Step 3: Type in the Name of the App

- At the top of the screen, you'll see a search bar that says "Games, Apps, Stories, and More". Tap in the search bar to type.
- Type the name of the app you want to download (for example, "Facebook" or "Netflix").

After typing, press the Search button on your keyboard.



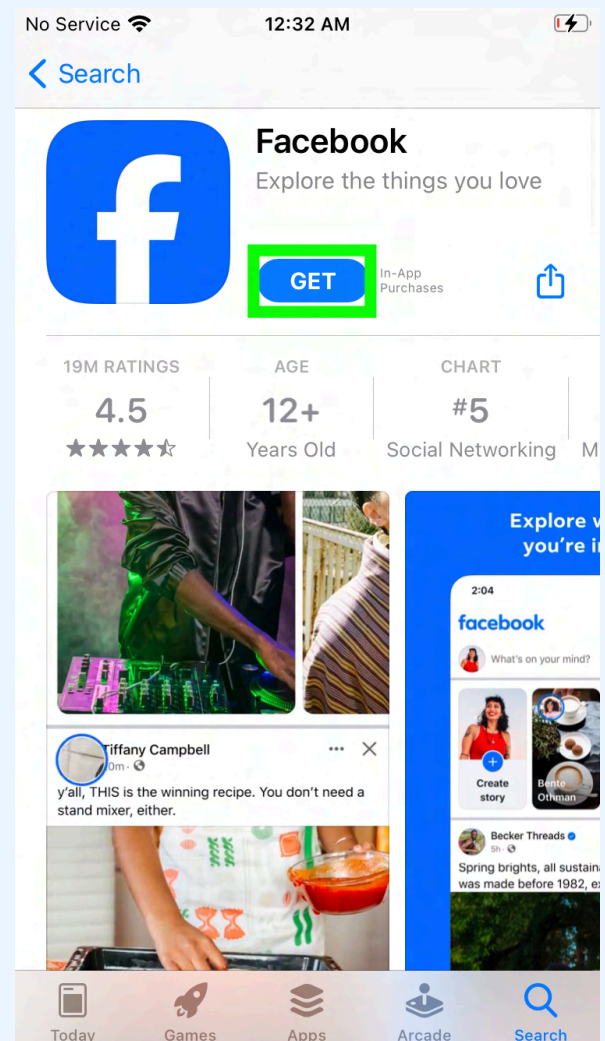
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Step 4: Select the App You Want

- A list of apps related to your search will appear.

Step 5: Download the App

- Tap on the Get button (or the price if it's a paid app).
- The button will change to show a spinning circle, meaning the app is downloading.



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Step 6: Use Your Apple ID to Confirm

- Depending on your device settings, you may be asked to sign in using your Apple ID or use Face ID/Touch ID (your face or fingerprint) to confirm the download.
 - If prompted, enter your Apple ID password or use Face ID/Touch ID to authorize the download.
 - If you don't remember your password, you can reset it by following the prompts or asking for help.

Step 7: Wait for the App to Download

- Once you've confirmed the download, you'll see a spinning circle that fills up as the app downloads. This usually takes just a few moments, depending on your internet connection.
- When the download is finished, the button will change to Open.
