

## William Makepeace Thackeray

William Makepeace Thackeray was born in Calcutta, India in 1811. When he was six years old, Thackeray was sent to England where he received an education at the Charterhouse school (in Richmond), and at Trinity College, Cambridge.

In 1833, Thackeray moved to Paris where he sustained a severe financial loss and became dirt poor. Thackeray wanted to become a painter; instead he became a novelist. In 1836 he married Isabella Shaw who became the role model for his virtuous, yet fragile, heroines. In 1841, increasing domestic pressures caused the vulnerable Isabella to become mentally ill, a state from which she never recovered. The subsequent failure of Thackeray's marriage greatly affected his writing.

Most of Thackeray's earlier works center around rogues and villains, and poked fun at Victorian Society. In 1844 Thackeray authored The Luck of Barry Lyndon, which he revised in 1856 under the title, The Memoirs of Barry Lyndon, Esq.

Between 1847 and 1848 Thackeray wrote his masterpiece: Vanity Fair, A Novel without a Hero. In his classic, Thackeray describes the occupants of a small industrial community in 1840's England. William Thackeray died suddenly, on Christmas Eve in 1863.
