

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Alexander Dumas

A prolific author who enjoyed tremendous literary success, Alexandre Dumas was born in the village of Villers-Cotterêts, France in 1802. His father, the illegitimate son of a marquis, died when Dumas was only four years old. Although raised in austere circumstances—and receiving little in the way of a formal education—Dumas displayed promising literary talent. He became a copying clerk for a local notary when he was eighteen, and began writing theatrical plays. In 1820, he founded an amateur theater group and, in 1822, moved to Paris. There he entered the household of the Duc d'Orléans (later France's King Louis Philippe) and continued to write his plays, notably the highly acclaimed Henri III et sa coeur.

In 1839, Dumas began writing historical novels, generating such memorable tales as The Three Musketeers (1844), The Count of Monte Cristo (1845), and The Man in the Iron Mask (late 1840's). In 1850 Dumas wrote *The Black Tulip*, a story based on the 1672 lynching of the Dutch Prime Minister and his brother.

Most of Dumas' works deal either with France's wars of religion or the Revolution, although he also wrote travel books, children's stories, and, famously, his Mémoires. In 1870 he died at his son's home in Puys, France, and was buried in the little cemetery at Villers-Cotterêts. In 2002, his remains were exhumed and moved to the Panthêon in Paris.

Alexandre Dumas now quietly rests at the Panthêon with such literary greats as Victor Hugo, Émile Zola, and Jean-Jacques Rousseau.
