Winter Reading Recommendations

THE COVENANT OF WATER, by Abraham Verghese An "Oprah Book Club" selection, the New York Times tells us "It is ... grand, spectacular, sweeping and utterly absorbing. Verghese has a gift for suspense, and his easy relationship to language draws you through the narrative so effortlessly that you hardly realize you are plowing through decade upon decade and page upon page. The book begins in 1900, as a 12-year-old girl in what is now the state of Kerala, in southwest India, prepares for an unwanted arranged marriage." Note: KRL has many copies, in all formats, but there are people waiting.

Robert Morris: Financier of the American **Revolution**, by Charles Rappleve (2010) This biography "recovers an immensely important part of the founding drama of the country in the story of Robert Morris, the man who financed Washington's armies and the American Revolution. Morris started life in the colonies as an apprentice in a counting house. By the time of the Revolution he was a rich man, a commercial and social leader in Philadelphia", with Morris dining and dealing with the founders of our country: including George Washington, Alexander Hamilton, Gouverneur Morris, John Paul Jones, Lafavette, Thomas Paine, the Lee brothers (Arthur & Richard Henry), Horatio Gates, and Benedict Arnold. Combining the detailed story of Morris and his family with an insider's view of the war and continental congresses, this is a multi-dimensioned presentation of the American Revolution. The only flaw - it is missing a map of the major battles of the revolution.
