MPEG Awards

On Saturday, February 24th, 2024, the inaugural Music Producer and Engineers' Guild (MPEG) Awards unfolded at the Music Market at Collingwood Yards. It was a night dedicated to honouring the unsung heroes of the music industry – the producers and engineers whose innovative work shapes the sonic landscape of our favourite tunes and the projects and studios that facilitate making them.

Conceived by the MPEG Board and its members, the awards aimed to fill a void in celebrating the often overlooked contributions of individuals and studios in Australia's music scene.

Co-hosted by Eddie Perfect and Mo Sesto, the event saw industry veterans and rising stars come together for the presentation of prestigious awards across 9 categories and a Lifetime Achievement Award.

The inaugural MPEG Awards Ceremony marked a significant moment in the industry, highlighting the importance of recognising and celebrating excellence in music production.

❖ MPEG Forum

The 2024 MPEG Forum was the first time Australia's community of music producers and engineers gathered together to openly discuss a range of issues concerning their corner of industry.

Covering everything from AI to A&R, the Forum focused on evolving members' creative skill sets and securing their value as a practitioner, with leaders in the field of production giving their thoughts and asking for insights.

Discussion Panels included:

Production Futures - Producers Steven Schram, Becki Whitton and Michael Carpenter took centre stage for this epic forward thinking panel.

The world of production always feels like it's rapidly changing but in 2024, things are moving faster than ever before.

This discussion took stock of what the future holds for producers and engineers, looking at the most pressing topics of the era. What impact will AI have on the craft? Will the rise of the deeply immersive Dolby Atmos and Spatial technologies set a new standard for delivery? What does A&R look like in the TikTok age and do our current best practices need an update?

Living Creatively - Creativity doesn't have to look just one way. In this Support Act led session which featured psychologist Carly Dober and producer manager Charlotte Abroms, we looked at how to optimise your creative process and how to put tools in place to make sure you're entering the studio as your best self.

We explored how different activities can help you reach your most creative output without sacrificing your wellbeing at the same time, and how nurturing the conditions around you can maximise your output.

Money for Nothing and Your Points for Me - *Producers Franc Tetaz and Chelsea Warner, lawyer Stephen King and producer manager Kurt Luthy helped to untangle the world of producer points.*

Do you ever feel like you need a maths degree to work out your producer points? How many producers does it take to get a point? What even is a point? And what's the point of it all? No, really, can someone tell me?

Led by career focused producers, managers and legal experts, this forum lifted the lid on the all important negotiations, getting insights into creating equitable outcomes, and discussing a standardised practice for points to ensure you're not getting shortchanged on your creative contributions.

These include, What is a...


- Producer

Membership

We currently have 448 Members, some statistics around the makeup of our members:

- 40 of our members don't qualify for full membership but are student / intern members. If you are one of these but have since qualified please get in touch so we can update your membership. You can only vote if you are a full member.
- 18 are engineers or engineer / mixers but not producers.
- 119 list Mastering Engineer as one of their titles, but only 7 specialise in just Mastering.
- 29 list themselves only as a producer (not engineer, mixer, mastering engineer or composer etc)
- 80.8% of our members are male, 14.1% are female and the remaining 5.1% are non-binary or prefer to self describe.



- 3% of our membership are Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people.
- 8.3% of our membership describe themselves as a person of colour.
- 76.6% of our members are based in NSW or VIC. We also have members in every state and territory of Australia and many currently based overseas.
- 85.7% of our members are also members of APRA AMCOS, which means that many of you are also writers / composers. I hope to see you nominated for our Producer / Writer Award this year!

Overseas Collaborations and Research

• The Great Escape

This year at The Great Escape (TGE), a series of sessions was curated by the Council of Music Makers, which includes the Featured Artists Coalition (FAC), Music Managers Forum (MMF), Ivors Academy, Musicians Union, and the Music Producers Guild (MPG).

The main issues identified by the coalition in the UK are:

- 1. Streaming
- 2. Metadata
- 3. Transparency
- 4. Remuneration
- 5. Music & Al
- 6. Touring

These sessions highlighted how music organisations can unite to address shared challenges faced by their members. Inspired by this collaborative approach, MPEG sees an opportunity to foster greater cooperation among Australian music organisations to tackle key issues together.

British Council

Anna Laverty and fellow MPEG member Kiah Gossner attended the international reception hosted by the British Council this year. We have since initiated discussions with them regarding potential funding for a cultural exchange with our UK counterpart, the UK MPG.

Advocacy

Music Australia Survey and Research Feedback

MPEG has been actively engaged with Music Australia's recent survey, providing detailed feedback to the research team. This engagement ensures that the interests of music producers and engineers are well-represented in the broader discussions about the industry's future.

APRA AMCOS - Potential Board Role

MPEG is exploring the possibility of having a more direct role within APRA AMCOS by seeking board representation. This would strengthen the voice of writer producers and music producers and engineers in critical discussions around copyright, royalties, and the music ecosystem in Australia. If you are an APRA AMCOS Member I would strongly encourage you to vote for Anna Laverty - voting is open momentarily.

MPG UK Collaboration

Our continued collaboration with the UK's Music Producers Guild (MPG) has opened discussions about shared initiatives and strategies. We are also exploring future cultural exchanges that will allow for deeper professional and creative connections between Australian and UK producers.

VMDO (Victorian Music Development Office)

This year, MPEG partnered with the VMDO, who provided the venue and speaker fees for our February forum. We're actively exploring further opportunities to collaborate on additional initiatives, building on this successful partnership to support and advocate for producers and engineers in Victoria and beyond.

The Triple J One Night Stand

The One Night Stand initiative, which supports emerging artists through accessible opportunities, has our full support. MPEG is working to ensure that producers and engineers are integral to the program, offering mentorship and professional development. 14 other national organisations joined MPEG at the Warrnambool event in September. We facilitated one on one meetings with participants and introduced MPEG to a swath of interested artists and producers.

The Push

We were asked to attend The Push's careers expos in both Melbourne and Adelaide. We provided potential young producers and engineers information around pathways into the music industry. Our goal is to foster an inclusive and supportive environment for the next generation showing all possible options - education and possible internship scenarios. We are hoping to formalise this in the future. Luana Moreno - an Adelaide based member also presented a workshop on being a music producer.

Neighbouring Rights

We are advocating for a stronger understanding and enforcement of neighbouring rights, ensuring that Australian music producers and engineers receive fair compensation from international revenue streams. We are aware of the political sensitivity around this issue and will pursue a fair and reasonable outcome for all parties.

BIGSOUND

At BIGSOUND this year, Anna Laverty represented MPEG on two key panels focused on AI. The first, at the APRA AMCOS Breakfast, covered the findings of the APRA report on AI's impact on the creative industries, helping to unpack what these discoveries mean for music professionals. The second panel addressed the ethics of AI in music production, a topic that has sparked significant debate.

This is an issue close to the hearts of many MPEG members, particularly as AI tools continue to influence the creative and production process. MPEG is actively engaged in monitoring changes to laws and ethical standards around the use of AI, ensuring that producers and engineers remain informed and protected in this rapidly evolving landscape.

Overall Bigsound was a great opportunity for MPEG to network with the wider music community. There is a lot of change and goodwill around just now and we hope to work with that to make the industry better for our members.

Future Plans and Goals

Membership Fees

Starting from 24th October 2024, MPEG will introduce membership fees of \$85 per year, this is a voluntary payment for now, but we encourage you to support MPEG. Our goal is to encourage as many members as possible to opt in, allowing us to continue the important work of advocating for producers and engineers. These funds will help sustain our initiatives, ensuring we can support the community more effectively and will mean we do not have to rely on other external funding to sustain us.

New Executive Director

We are thrilled to announce Kurt Luthy as our new Executive Director. Kurt brings valuable experience from his work behind the scenes with music producers, as well as his ongoing legal studies. His legal expertise, which will be formalised when he qualifies as a lawyer in early 2025, these skills add a crucial layer to our team's ability to navigate complex industry challenges.

As the newly appointed Executive Director of MPEG I look forward to working closely with the Board to deliver tangible benefits to members.

Of prime importance is the ongoing implementation of MPEG's 2024-2027 strategic plan with the key objectives of continuing to foster a strong production and engineering community, liaising with Government and the broader industry, as well as providing MPEG members with access to professional advice, opportunities, experiences and information.

I am pleased to share that some of the current initiatives we are engaged in include providing members with key resources such as a Producer Agreement template and developing a national network of service providers and suppliers who will be offering discounts to MPEG members.

It is a genuine privilege to be working with MPEG and I cherish the opportunity to advance the interests of members for the next 12 months.
