Whether you listen to Hip Hop. Reggae, R&B, Soul music, Jazz, Country, Rock, or even Gospel, Cape Breton and Nova Scotia have had many great Black musicians worthy of attention and praise. Many of the organizations which support these artists began as regional start-ups and some have grown into national and international institutions promoting African Nova Scotian talent. The regional and Nova Scotian governments have collaborated with some of these organizations, but many more groups are maintained and promoted by dedicated individuals who value the quality of what they are hearing and are helping to create a more profitable and equitable climate for struggling Black artists, young and old. The province's Black immigrant population continues to flourish with growing community support, and their music traditions have attracted public curiosity. Even small Nova Scotian communities have embraced African musicians, their traditions, dance, and instruments. Talented artists across Canada are also choosing Nova Scotia and Cape Breton as their home base because of the province's natural and human charms. In every corner of Cape Breton and Nova Scotia, you will find Black musicians and their traditions. Since the stunning career of Portia White in the early 20th century, universities still continue to support and promote young musicians from the Black diaspora, and the special events held in venues across the province highlight Nova Scotians' commitment to sharing their rich variety of Black music traditions.

ANSMA pressed extremely hard and worked very diligently to help artist gain exposure and recognition that they were well deserving of and now there is a Black Vibes Showcase which is put on by ANSMA and ECMA that takes place during the ECMA weekend, this showcase is designed for artist to put their music and themselves in the spotlight.

The African Nova Scotian Music Association also seeks to give local artist advice on professional development, provide for them a viable social network with professionals in the music industry, as well as seminars, workshops and conferences where artist can gather and explore musical concepts and expand their musical inclinations.





The **2021** African Heritage Month theme, Black History Matters: Listen, Learn, Share and Act, recognizes the important legacy of people of African descent and the long-standing history in the development of Canada.

The theme brings focus and increased awareness of racialized issues and calls on us to listen, learn, share and act to make society a better place. Nova Scotia has over 50 historic African Nova Scotian communities with a long, deep, and complex history dating back over 400 years. African Heritage Month provides us with another opportunity to celebrate our culture, legacy, achievements, and contributions of people of African Descent .

Black History Month in Canada



In the past, the contributions of African Canadians have been acknowledged informally. Nova Scotian efforts include:

- 1985 The official opening of Black History Month at the Halifax North Branch Library
- 1987 First meeting of the Black History Month Association
- 1988 First Black History Month in Nova Scotia
- 1996 Black History Month renamed to African Heritage Month in Nova Scotia

Some of these actions have influenced Canada to act on a national level:

- 1995 The House of Commons officially recognized February as Black History Month following a motion introduced by the Honourable Jean Augustine, the first Black Canadian woman elected to Parliament.
- 2008 The Senate officially declared February as Black History Month. Nova Scotia Senator Donald Oliver, Q.C., was the first Black Canadian appointed to the Senate. His motion was the final parliamentary procedure needed for Canada's permanent recognition of Black History Month.

AHMIN selects the theme and promotes African Heritage Month events and produces an educational poster that is distributed and displayed in community centers, schools, churches, government offices, and businesses.
