



How U7 & U8 Zones are formed

Clubs enter their teams into the league.

Zones [for u7-u8) are formed by the Fix Sec for:

Sept – Oct (Impossible to tell if team are equally matched):

How U9 Zones are formed

Player / Team Development

"We all want children to enjoy playing and **fall in love with football** from an early age.

U7-U10 Football (and beyond) is designed to allow children to do just that.

Football has a key role to play in the development of young players in the Foundation Phase.

We want to **create an environment that is exciting, memorable** and one that keeps children coming back.

We ask **all coaches to see players as children first**, rather than kids who might be good at football.

The overriding message for us all is to make it fun and enjoyable."







Excessive Scores

There is little benefit from matches that result in very one-sided games

If you are part of a match that is one sided.....what will you do?

Coaches need to adjust team set up and try to provide a worthwhile experience for the players

'Best' player in Goal and changing player positions rarely changes an outcome of a game

How can we equal things up?....





Excessive Scores

- Mix and Match the teams (use bibs)
- Add **Challenges** to the stronger team Can you provide your young players with 'puzzles' to solve.

Try to keep the challenges 'Match Real'

Some suggested challenges:

- Once across the halfway line return the ball to the goalkeeper to restart attack
- Keep possession is your half/penalty area for x mins before attacking
- Set 1 or 2 defender(s) only when opposition attack or defenders not to enter their own penalty area
- Limited touches
- Can only score 1 goal, and no more, until all other team-mates have scored
- The 1nil game (1 nil up, then retain the ball for x mins before scoring again)
- Send limited number of players over the retreat line, let the opposition attack relatively unopposed

Player / Team Development



Development football is designed to create the best learning and fun experience for young players. To ensure an imbalance in ability does not spoil this, the FA has approved 'Power Play' as an option that mini-soccer and youth leagues can adopt.

- If a team is losing by a four goal difference they can put an additional player on – so 5v5 becomes 6v5.
- If the score returns to less than a four goal difference the team takes off a player. It does not have to be the last player to come on.

Player / Team Development

POWER PLAY LAW

The diagram below helps to explain the process:

Score	What happens?	5v5	7v7
Red Team 3-0 Blue Team	No change	5v5	7v7
Red Team 4-0 Blue Team	Blue Team brings on one extra player	5v6	7v8
Red Team 4-1 Blue Team	Blue Team removes one player*	5v5	7v7
Red Team 5-1 Blue Team	Blue Team brings on one extra player	5v6	7v8
Red Team 6-1 Blue Team	No change	5v6	7v8
Red Team 7-1 Blue Team	Blue Team brings on another extra player	5v7	7v9
Red Team 7-2 Blue Team	Blue Team removes one player*	5v6	7v8
Red Team 7-3 Blue Team	No change	5v6	7v8
Red Team 7-4 Blue Team	Blue Team removes final extra player*	5v5	7v7


* This does not need to be the same player that was put on as the additional player.



- If a team goes on to be losing by a six goal difference a further additional player can be added – so 6v5 becomes 7v5.
- The main aim of the Power Play option is that all players are being challenged and enjoying the game.
- Power Play is available through all mini soccer football formats 5v5 and 7v7.

The laws of the game

Mini-soccer | England | Football



KEY CHANGES

There is nothing more important in football than keeping players, coaches, spectators and everyone involved safe. If we can do that we can all enjoy the game we love.




Goal sizes: the goal size for Mini-Soccer is 12ft × 6ft.



- U7s 8s: the maximum number of players per team is 5v5 with a squad of 10 or less.
- U9s 10s: the maximum number of players per team is 7v7 with a squad of 14 or less.

*A team must have at least four players for a game to begin and continue.





Playing time

- 40 mins/day [u7-u8]
- Children should not exceed the maximum playing time for their age in any one day
 [It is the responsibility of the junior club and/or the child's parent or carer to ensure this]
- Half time should not be more than five minutes
- Development games should be split into quarters

Referee



- The home team is responsible for providing a referee
- The role can be shared by both teams
- Any person who referees a game of football has the authority to apply the laws of Mini-Soccer even if they are not a fully qualified referee
- The referee should always help the players to learn the game by explaining their decisions and helping with match situations

Laws of the Game (Often mis-understood or questioned)


- All free kicks are direct [EXCEPT THOSE AWARDED FOR A HEADER]
- For all free kicks defending players must be 5 yards from the ball (that also includes restarts and corners)
- A goalkeeper is not allowed to pick the ball up from a back pass or a throw in.
 If this happens a free kick should be given on the penalty area line closest to where the incident occurs
- There a no throw-ins. The sideline restart is now a pass or dribble in [the ball must be stationary prior to restart]
- A player cannot score direct from a pass-in

Laws of the Game (Often mis-understood or questioned)

The Retreat rule

- If an attacking player kicks the ball over the goal line a goal kick is awarded to the defending team (taken from anywhere within the goal area)
- The team without the ball must retreat to their own half until the ball is in play
- Once the ball is in play, the team without the ball can try and win it back.

If the Goalkeeper makes a save and retains the ball, the attacking team **do not need to retreat**



SIN BINS



Temporary Dismissals - otherwise known as 'sin bins' - are mandatory for acts of dissent across all of grassroots football.

HOW DO YOU FIND YOURSELF IN THE SIN BIN?



Players will only go into the sin bin for dissent cautions



For use of words, gestures, questioning or undermining the referee's decisions



EXAMPLES OF DISSENT:

Shouting at the referee, questioning the referee's ability, slamming the ball into the ground and sarcastically clapping a decision

DURATION OF A SIN BIN



For matches of 90 minutes, players spend 10 minutes in the sin bin



For matches of all other lengths, players spend 8 minutes in the sin bin



If the sin bin period has not expired at the end of:

1st half: Continues into the 2nd half

2nd half: Continues into extra time

Extra time: Players can participate in the penalty shoot out


Dissent

Dissent caution: Referee issues a Yellow Card and directs the player to the touchline Whilst in the sin bin, if the player commits a Yellow or Red Card offence they are sent off and can not be substituted A player can only return to the field of play with the referee's permission at a stoppage in play If a player receives a second Yellow Card for any type of offence, they will be shown a Red Card and dismissed from the field of play

Sin bins only apply to a player's first Yellow Card. If they receive a second Yellow Card they are dismissed from the field of play.

Offensive, insulting or abusive language and/or actions is still a Red Card offence!

Heading guidance



Why no heading in youth football?



In 2022, the FA became the first national association to successfully adopt the International Football Association Board [IFAB] trial to remove deliberate heading in grassroots football matches

The aim:

- is to help positively shape grassroots youth football and to ensure that matches at this level are aligned to the FA current heading guidance for training
- to help reduce any potential risk factors that may be linked to heading the ball, including injuries from head-to-head, elbow to head, or head to ground contact.

No heading of the ball in matches

It starts this season (2024-25)

The heading ban is in place in all **u7 – u9** matches

It will then expand to the u10s next season (2025-2026)

and then u11s the season after (2026-2027)

With the new rule, heading the ball will mean the opposition are awarded an indirect free-kick

- have you players parents/guardians etc been told of this new law of the game??

From the start of the 2024-25 season, there will be no disciplinary sanctions applied for a deliberate header in a match, <u>unless the action is considered a persistent deliberate offence</u>, which could then result in a caution

No Heading (New as of 2024/25 season)


FA guidance on heading in football in England | England Football

DELIBERATE HEADING

No deliberate heading for Under 7s up to and including Under 9s.

Deliberately heading the ball is an offence punishable by an indirect free kick. The indirect free kick is taken at the point where the ball was deliberately headed, except:

Where a player deliberately heads the ball within their own penalty area, the referee will stop the game and restart with an indirect free kick to the opposition from the nearest side line of the penalty area where the offence took place.





Pass or Dribble In

Pass or Dribble in - Guidance video

U7-U9 (2024/25) AND U7-U10 (2025/26)

15 PASS OR DRIBBLE-IN

- When the whole of the ball passes over the touchline, on the ground or in the air, instead of a throw-in, a pass-in or dribble-in is awarded.
- A kicker taking a pass-in may choose to touch the ball again before it is touched by another player


At the moment of delivering the ball:

- The ball must be stationary on the touchline at the point where it left the pitch; only the kicker may be off the pitch.
- All opponents must stand at least 5 yards from the point on the touchline where the pass-in or dribble-in is to be taken.

A goal cannot be scored directly from a pass-in.

The ball is in play when it is kicked and clearly moves.







- · Obliged to undertake an FA education course
- Requested not to attend future games, be suspended or have my membership removed
- Required to leave the club along with any dependents and/or issued a fine






















Match Day Behaviour

What to do when it goes wrong

- 1. Remain calm
- 2. Don't engage / Ensure safety of yourself, your players & spectators
- 3. Take notes
- 4. Report it [Club Secretary / Club Welfare Officer & the League]
- 5. Report it to the County FA (where applicable)

Discipline Process

	Action	Notes
1	Report the incident to your Club Sec & CWO	In writing, with statements from others present
2	Complete the Mid Wilts online Low Sporting Mark Form	This gives the league notice of incidents and can advise Club Secs of options
3	Report the Incident to your County FA [IF IT IS REQUIRED]	Your County FA are responsible for investigating and concluding discipline cases.
	- They gather evidence from all parties - Home/Away team and the Match Officials (where applicable)	
	- They issue, where required, a Charge sheet. They use a variety of FA Charge Numbers inc	Some incidents (e.g., racism) are reported by Wilts FA to the FA
	E3 (Player misconduct)	
	E20 (Failed to ensure directors, players, officials, employees, servants, representatives, conduct themselves in an orderly fashion whilst attending any Match)
