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In Memorial

REV. HENRY L. HARLAN.

Our beloved and lamented pastor, Rev. Henry L. Harlan, was born in Lawrence District, S. C. Dec. 7th, A. D., 1808. He professed religion and joined Upper Dun-kan's Creek Baptist Church, in 1831. His consistency and piety were such that he was ordained a deacon, in 1833.

In 1837, he moved to then thinly settled State of Alabama. He assisted in contributing and building Providence church, of which he remained a consistent, pious and efficient member until he fell asleep in Jesus. He was called and licensed to preach by this church in 1850 — was ordained Jan. 14th 1853, and continued to serve this church among, many others, as a faithful and zealous pastor until the 4th day of May, 1879, when he received the welcome applaudit, "Well done thou good and faithful servant, etc."

He was ever prompt in performing ministerial duties, as we, his little flock, can testify, until affliction seized him with its destroying hand.

His preaching was perhaps most effectual while lying upon his dying bed. His patient endurance of the long and severe affliction fully convinced his neighbors and church of his piety. The mildness of his sweet instructions under severe sufferings proclaimed to his sorrowing loved ones at home and abroad, that there was a divine reality in the religion he professed, while the language of the Inspired Pensman manifested in him its truth, "My grace is sufficient for thee." No more on earth will he join with us in the sweet songs of Zion; but he has only gone before, to welcome us to the shining shore of eternal bliss.

"The pains of death are past,
Labor and sorrow cease;

And life's long warfare closed at last,
His soul is found in peace.

Soldier of Christ well done!
Praise be thy new employ;
And while eternal ages run,
Rest in thy Saviors joy."

5th. That these resolutions be spread upon the church minutes and a copy be furnished his family.

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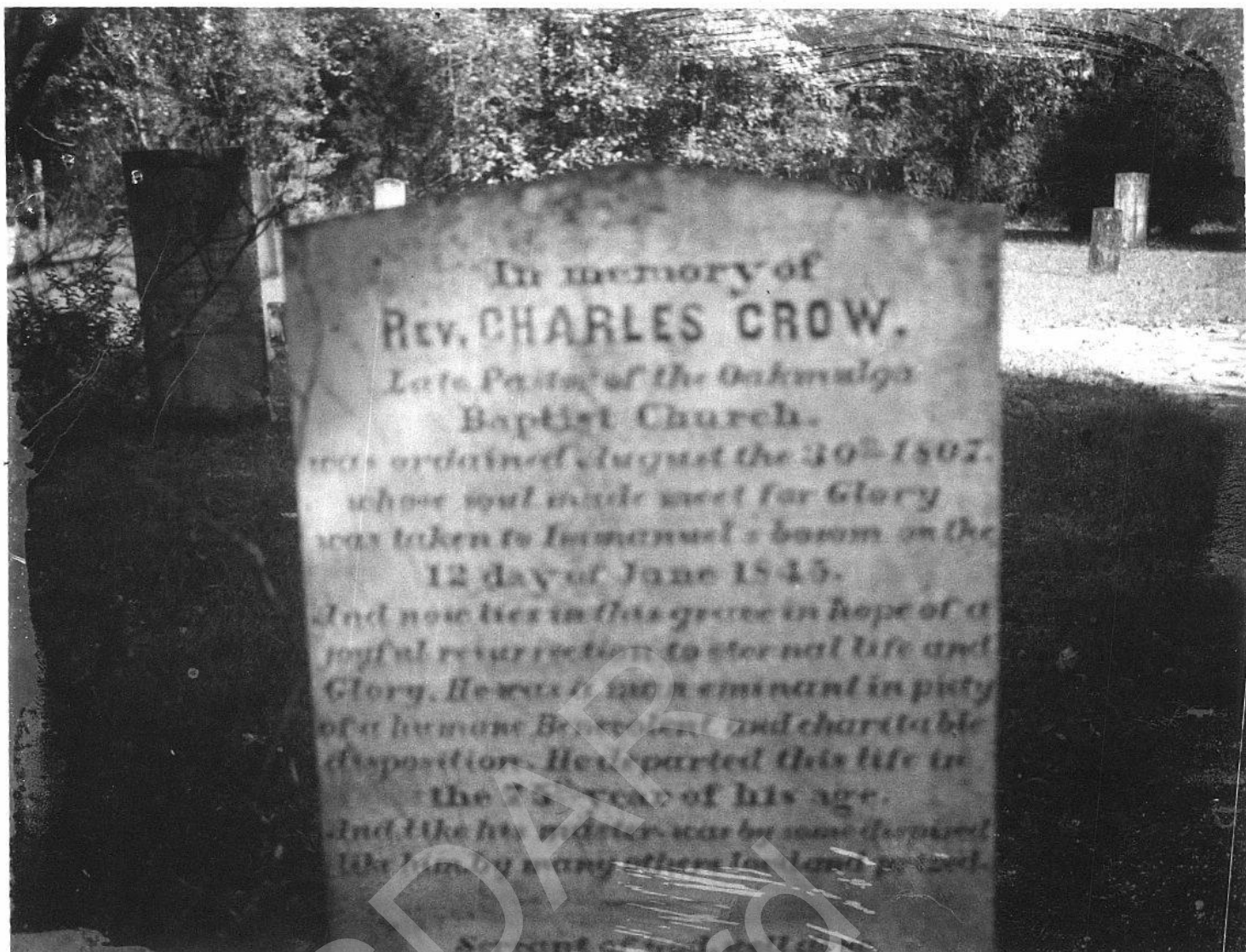

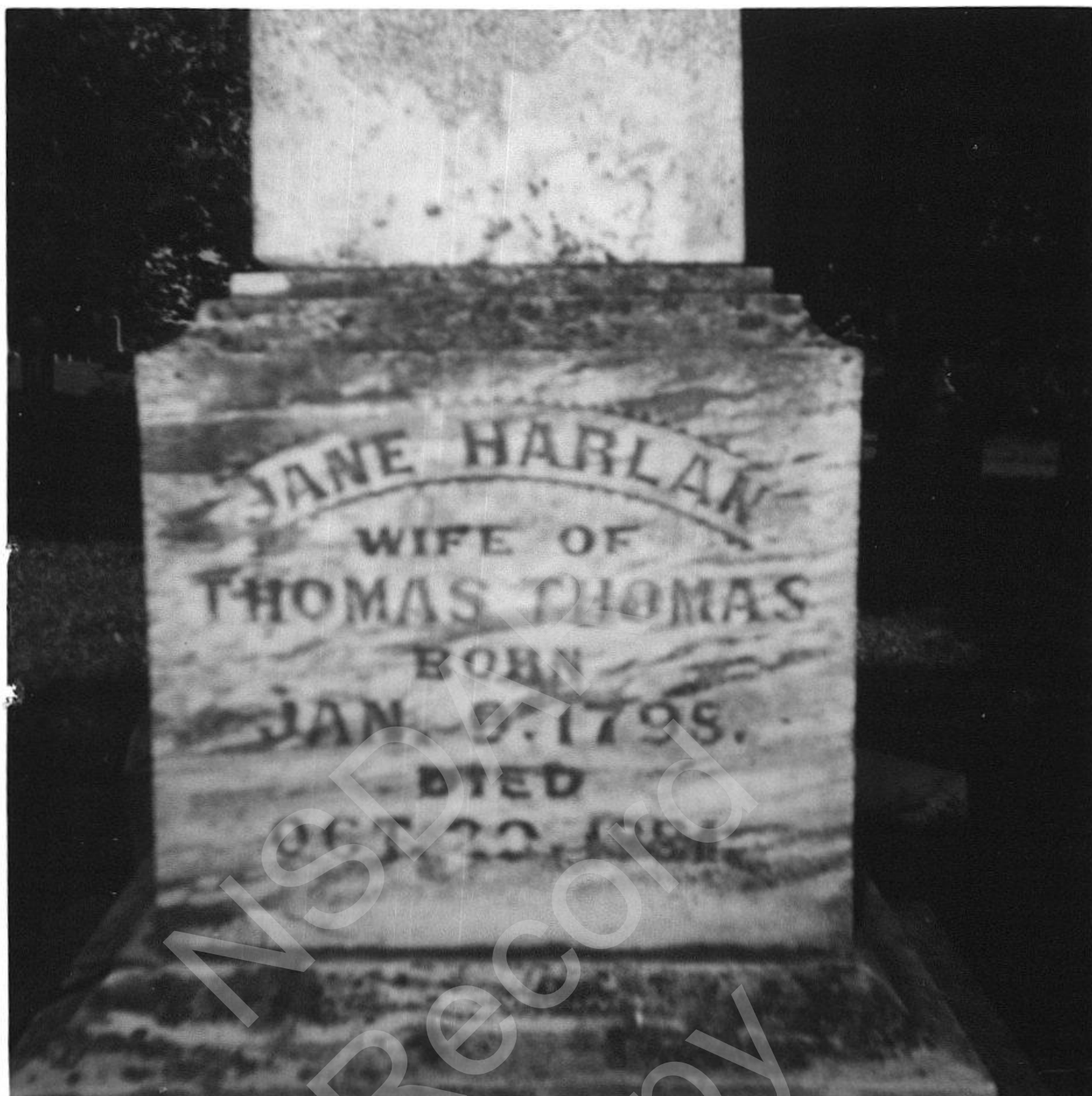
