

KYNERD - KINARD FAMILY

In the early 1700's a group of people came from Germany via England and settled in South Carolina at the junction of the Broad and Saluda Rivers. This area, which included portions of Lexington and Newberry Districts and was made up almost entirely of German immigrants who spoke only the German language, and did not intermarry with the English, until about 1800, became known as the Dutch Fork area. They had no love for the British and fought with the Americans in the Revolutionary War.

One of these Germans who fought in the Continental Army was named Kynerd. He married after the war and had a son, Jacob Kynerd, and then he and his wife both died. Young Jacob, born July 21, 1796, was taken in and raised by a family named Taylor, who lived in Lexington District. Aaron Taylor had also served in the Continental Army as a Private in Capt. William Caldwell's Company in the 3rd South Carolina Regiment which was commanded by Col. William Thompson.

Aaron and Mary Taylor had a daughter, Miss Rosannah Taylor. Jacob Kynerd and Rosannah came to love each other and were married in Lexington District on June 16, 1816. Jacob was just one month short of being 20 years old.

About this time news started drifting back from different families who had gone to the new Alabama Territory to settle. It was a long, hard journey of over 500 miles, mostly through untamed wilderness, but once you arrived you could stake a claim and buy land from the government for \$1.25 an acre. They told of rich river bottoms where you had only to put seed in the ground and crops grew abundantly.

Jacob and Rosannah thought they would like to have a life in this new land. In the fall of 1818, they loaded their belongings onto ox-wagons and taking their baby, David, they joined with a group that were going to Alabama. They waited until the fall until their crops were sold and the rivers and streams were low enough to be forded, and then they headed west.

The group of settlers crossed the Savannah River into Georgia near what later became Augusta and then followed weeks of hard going, through sparsely settled land at first to land that wasn't settled at all. The roads were poor to non-existent and traveling through the wilderness was slow and back-breaking work. After they crossed Georgia they entered the eastern part of Alabama Territory which was still Creek Indian land. As they came to the part of the Territory that was open to settlement, one by one the family groups began to drop out to stake their claim.

Jacob and Rosannah Kynerd selected the site for their new home. It was on the rolling hills which led down to the Cahaba River. Jacob bought land from the government at first but as he prospered, he added to it until he owned several hundred acres. He bought slaves and grew cotton in the rich bottomland and became a wealthy and respected plantation owner. The small cabin he had built when they arrived was replaced by a larger more substantial home and is still standing and being lived in at the time of this writing.

There was a wagon crossroads three miles from the Kynerd home and one by one shops and houses were built there. The village grew into a town which became known as Marion. Later, when Perry County, Alabama, was formed, Marion became the county seat.

The Kynerns had fourteen children, 13 of whom were born after they arrived in Alabama. All but four of the children grew up and married and had families of their own. They started a Kynerd Family Cemetery, and Jacob and Rosannah are both buried there along with many of their descendants.

There were no public schools at the time the children were growing up, but Jacob believed strongly in education and he hired tutors to teach his children. As each child married he gave them a slave and \$1500 to buy land to make their start in life easier.

There were no churches when they first came to the new land. Jacob, a German, had been a member of the Lutheran Church in South Carolina. A Baptist church was the first church started in the new territory and Jacob, being a religious person, attended. He joined the Baptist church and became a deacon and remained so for 29 years.

Rosannah Kynerd died June 19, 1872 at the age of 74 years. She was buried in the family cemetery at their home in Marion, Ala, beside her children who had died before. Jacob Kynerd died a year later on April 10, 1873 and was buried beside Rosannah. He had lived to be 76 years old.

Of Jacob's children, the three oldest later migrated on to Lauderdale County, Mississippi.

THE CHILDREN OF JACOB KYNERD

NOTE: David, the oldest, was born in Lexington Dist. S.C. The rest were born in Perry Co, Ala. The three oldest, David, Mary Ann and Salathiel Kynerd, were the only ones that came to Lauderdale Co, Miss. (Mary Ann, who m. a Smith, was in Lauderdale Co. but later moved to Neshoba Co. and raised her large family there.) A descendant of Salathiel, Samuel D. Kinard, was the only Kynerd that came to Pine Springs, where some of his descendants are found today. Notice the different spelling of the name. With different county clerks to keep records and different teachers in school, the name is found spelled in several different ways. The Pine Springs family spells the name Kinard.

I. DAVID C. KYNERD

Born: 1816, Lexington Dist, S.C.

Died: 1893, Lauderdale Co, Miss.

Married: Mary E. McGraw, Dec. 29, 1841, Perry Co, Ala.

First bought a farm in Perry Co. where they had four children. In 1851 David with his brother Salathiel and his sister, Mary Ann (Kynerd) Smith, sold their farms and moved to Lauderdale Co, Miss. David bought land near Marion Station in Miss. and there they reared their family and lived the rest of their lives.

II. MARY ANN KYNERD 1819-1911, m. George Rayford Smith, Nov. 16, 1843, Perry Co, Ala. He was son of Solomon Smith and Elizabeth Crow, neighbors of Jacob Kynerd.

They bought land in Perry Co, farmed it until 1851 when they sold out and traveled to Lauderdale Co, Miss. with Mary Ann's two brothers, David and Salathiel Kynerd and their families. Five of their children were born in Perry Co. before they left.

In Miss, the Smiths bought a farm near Rushing Store which was about a mile south of where Center Hill School was later built. When Civil War came their two oldest sons joined the Confederate Army. The father, George, was drafted but opted not to go and hired a man to go in his place, paying him \$25 a month and promising to gather his corn for him that fall.

After the war the Smiths moved to Neshoba County, some thirty miles northwest, where they bought land and lived until their deaths. George died of cancer in his back in 1894. Mary Ann, who lost her sight before her death, lived until 1911. Both are bur. in Boyd Cem. in Bethsaida Community in Neshoba County. They had eleven children, several of which had large families of their own, so they have many, many descendants. The Smiths did their share in populating Neshoba County.

1. ROBERT WILEY SMITH 1844-1863, Volunteered Feb. 8, 1862 for Confederate Army, was accepted by Capt. J.M. Hicks at Marion Station, Ms. Assigned to Co. C, 41 Reg, Miss. Volunteers. Wounded at Murfreesboro Tenn. Dec. 31, 1862, died Feb. 1863 in hospital at Murgreesboro. His mother never saw him again after he left home. He was 18.
2. JACOB KYNERD SMITH 1847-1937?, m. Narcissa Stephens, 1866, Lauderdale Co, Ms. She was dau. of Charles Stephens and Mary Smith.
Jake was also in the Civil War where he served in Paton's Battalion, CSA. After the war he and Narcissa lived in Neshoba Co. where they had 11 children and many descendants. Both buried in Neshoba.
3. TALITHA JANE SMITH 1846-1846, Infant, bur. Kynerd Cem, Marion, Ala.
4. JOSEPH ABNER SMITH 1849-1849, Infant, bur. Kynerd Cem., Marion Ala.
5. FREEMAN REESE SMITH 1851-1851, Infant, bur. bynerd Cem, Marion Ala.
6. WILLIAM DANIEL SMITH 1852-1837, m. Frances Sharp, dau. of John W. Sharp and Indiana Harrison. They liv ed and died at Union, Miss, where they are bur. in Golden Grove Cem. They had 7 children.
7. CHARLES RUSHING SMITH 1854-____, m. Angie Sharp, moved to El Campo, Texas, ca 1890 where both are buried. They had six children and it has been said that at least one of this line became a multi-millionaire. Maybe it did some good to name this

son for Charles Rushing who owned Rushing Store. C.E. Rushing of Lauderdale Co. was a wealthy man and owned several thousand acres in Lauderdale Co. Maybe some of his business acumen rubbed off on his namesake.

8. MARTHA PERMELIA SMITH 1858-1914, m. James Davis Sharpe, 1877. He bought the farm George and Mary Ann Smith purchased when they first came to Neshoba Co. in 1869. Sharpe added to the farm until he owned 700 acres. He also had a general store where a good number of community people bought their supplies.

Jim Sharpe made trips to Meridian in Lauderdale Co. to buy supplies for his store, making the forty-mile trip in three days. The first day took them to within five miles of Meridian where they camped on the Okatibbee Creek. The second day they went on into town and picked up their supplies. It took two people; one to hold the horses and watch the wagon while the other was in the stores. The third day of the trip was from the campground on home. They first used oxen to pull the wagon, but later switched to horses or mules.

Martha and James D. Sharpe had eight children, all reared at their home near Union, Miss. Martha lived her entire life on the same farm.

9. PRESTON BROOKS SMITH 1860-1943, m. (1) Margaret Luvenia Kilpatrick, Dec. 10, 1878. After her death in 1898 he m. her sister (2) Nancy Rebecca Kilpatrick and moved to Jones Co, Miss. where he lived out his life. Preston and Nancy Smith are bur. in Shelton Ch. Cem, Jones Co. Preston had 12 children; 9 by 1st wife, 3 by 2nd.
10. JOHN G. SMITH 1862-____, m. Mary Jane Rice, had eleven children and moved to Covington Co, Miss. when children were young.
11. ROSANNA ELIZABETH "BETTY" SMITH 1863-1932, m. John Carrol Savell 1878. He was son of William Savell and Elizabeth H. Killen. John and Betty had a farm near Union where they had 13 children in 19 years (Boy!) when he was killed in 1898 in a logging accident near their home.

Their great grandson, Billy Ab Cannon, b. 1935, Neshoba Co, was the winner of the Heisman trophy, the top award given in the sport of football when he attended L.S.U. Some say it was football's finest hour when Billy Cannon made such a long run with the ball in Cajun Hollow (L.S.U.'s stadium) in the game with Ole Miss. None of the Miss team were able to bring him down. This was in 1959.

John and Rosanna E. Savell are both bur in the Killen Cem. in Neshoba Co.

- III. SALATHIEL W. KYNERD 1821-1912, m. (1) Martha Ann Wilkerson, Jan. 16, 1845, Perry Co, Ala. Her father was John Wilkerson of Perry Co. (2) SARAH IRENE PACE, dau. of ALSA PACE of PINE SPRINGS, Lauderdale Co. (qv)

In 1851, Salathiel was the brother that moved his family and slaves to Lauderdale Co, Miss. with David Kynerd and their sister, Mary Ann Smith. They all three sold out in Alabama and gathered up their 'bottles & gourds', children and slaves and made the long journey together.

After their arrival in Miss. about ten years, the Civil War came. Salathiel and his oldest son both joined the Confederate Army. They were together in the 2nd Miss. Cavalry Co. C. After the war, Salathiel went back to farming his land. In 1868 his wife, Martha Ann, died. Matthais, his older son, moved in with his wife to run the house and to see after the younger children. The following year, Salathiel married Irene Pace and she was a good wife to him for the next forty-odd years.

Money was pretty scarce after the war and it seemed like for a while that everyone was going off to Texas, trying to find something better. Some of Salathiel's children moved to Texas but two sons, Christopher Columbus Kynerd and Jacob Burton Kynerd, remained in Lauderdale County.

Salathiel W. Kynerd died at the Old Confederate Soldiers Home, Gulfport, Miss. He was 91 years old.

Jasper was in the Confederate Army when they married and he fought in Co. K, 13 Miss. Infantry. The Browns owned a good bit of land near Marion and after the war they bought more from Thomas L. Gillespie for \$857. Jasper was a merchant and they had a store in Topton, about 3 miles northeast of Marion. He applied for a Civil War pension in 1880, giving Topton as his address. They had only one son that we know of.

They bought a farm near Perryville in Perry Co where they farmed and Daniel taught school to the neighborhood children. They were doing rather well financially when Daniel became quite ill and died. Martha never did marry again. They had 3 children.

VIII. JACOB HILLARD KYNERD 1830-1876, m. Ann Virginia Baxter. She was born ca1836 in Virginia but moved to Wetumpka, Ala. with her parents as a young girl. She was attending a girls boarding school in Montgomery when she met Jacob and they fell in love. They were married in 1860 and moved to White Co, Ark. where Jacob bought land and started a new plantation. In Arkansas they had six children born, two of whom died in infancy. In 1878 they both died of a fever, leaving their three little boys orphans. Salathiel Kynerd in Lauderdale Co, went and brought his three nephews home to Mississippi with him, where he reared them as his own.

Infantry, Capt. Butler's Co, Frazer Reg, Alabama Volunteers and served there three years. He became ill and was in hospital for 3 months before he was paroled by Federal forces in May, 1865. When he came home he studied and became a medical doctor. He became closer to God while he was in the war and he also became a Baptist minister.

Old Jacob and Rosannah Kynerd were getting on in years and all their children had moved out so Andrew Jackson Kynerd moved his family to live with his parents and to take care of them. When his widowed sister, Parmelia Ann and her children returned from Arkansas, they also lived in the old family home in Marion, Ala.

Andrew died at the age of 51 and was bur. in the family cemetery at Marion.

SAMUEL D. KINARD OF PINE SPRINGS

Sam Kinard, the grandson of Salathiel and Martha Ann Kynerd and the fourth son of Christopher Columbus Kynerd and V. J. Richardson, was born on his father's farm in Lauderdale County, Miss. on February 6, 1880. The farm was located near Fellowship Baptist Church near the (now) water tower on Hwy. 495. Sam married Laura C. Jones on Nov. 22, 1900. Laura was the daughter of Spinks M. Jones (qv) and Callie Ballard of Pine Springs.

Sam and Laura bought land from her father in the northwest quarter of Section 3 in Pine Springs. They first bought the northeast quarter of the quarter section (40 acres) in 1903, and there they built their house. They bought more land from Mr. Jones in 1910 and soon they had a sizeable farm.

Sam and Laura sent their children to school at Pine Springs which was about one and a half miles distant. The Pace children lived up the road and would come by to pick up the Kinard children and then go by the White's and then the Vincent's. When they reached 'The Forks' on the Pine Springs road, there would be the Snowdens, the News and the Byrds waiting. They all walked along the road together, playing and fighting along the way.

Although the children went to Pine Springs School, the Kinards remain Baptist and were members of Fellowship Baptist Church, where they attended regularly. Sam and Laura were both buried in the Fellowship Church Cemetery.

Their farm was divided among their children when they died. Their son, Burton, got the part on which stood their old home. In later years, Burton took the old house down and built a neat brick home off to one side of where the old house had been. Burton is still living on the old homeplace at this writing.

Somehow the spelling of their name got changed with Samuel D. Kinard. His father spelled the name 'Kynerd'. Sam spelled his name 'Kinard'.
