John Robert Harlan

(1928 - 2014)

The Harlan Family in America Association has lost one of its longest serving, most ardent supporters and original treasurer, John R. Harlan. John died unexpectedly January 3, 2014, in Augusta, Ga., at the age of 85.

John began as a member of the board of directors and treasurer of the Harlan Family in America Association in 1985. He was instrumental in taking the association to its current positive financial position. After stepping down as treasurer in 2012, he remained an active member of the board of directors until his passing.

John and his wife, Annette, to whom he was married 53 years, and most of their immediate family, attended every Harlan Family reunion. They also traveled on each Harlan trip to England, Ireland and Wales. Second to his family was his passion for the Harlan Family in America Association. Annette also shares this passion. As stated in John's obituary, "One of his special pleasures of his life was serving as Treasurer of the Harlan Family in America for 25 years." John would hand write and send a personal letter to each and every contributor to the Harlan Family.

John contributed stories to *The Harlan Record*, found ancestor Silas Harlan most interesting and was working on a book about Silas. In 1968, he obtained an original copy of the Alpheus Harlan book which he had rebound while stationed in

Update on Senator James Harlan Statue

Editor's Note: The following article appeared in the Spring 2013 issue of The Harlan Record. For an update, see story on page 7.

It came as a shock and dismay to many Iowans, and especially members of the Harlan Family in America, to learn two years ago that the larger-than-life statue of our beloved cousin, Sen. James Harlan of Mt. Pleasant, was to be removed from Statuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol Building and replaced by one of Norman Borlaug who died in 2009. (Borlaug became known as "the father of the green revolution" and was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1970 for his contribution to world peace through increasing food supply.)

Senator Harlan's statue had stood in our nation's capitol building since 1907, one of two statues from each state of the Union, but the Iowa legislature voted to oust Harlan in favor of Borlaug, and "provide a suitable location for the statue within the Iowa statehouse."

However, there is a move on to relocate Harlan's statue to Mt. Pleasant, a suggestion that most Harlans would surely approve of, whether it would be located on the lawn of the Harlan-Lincoln House, or across the street on the campus of Iowa Wesleyan College where served twice as president. (It was due to his tenacity and fund-raising efforts that Old Main, the brick centerpiece of the campus, was built, and still, more than 150 years later serves the college as classrooms for the music department, and it houses the International P. E. O. Sisterhood Memory Rooms.)

As more details s are learned about the relocation of the bronze statue, sculpted by Nellie V. Walker, readers of The Harlan s Record will be apprised and may have the opportunity to contribute to the project if Mt. Pleasant is given the honor of bringing the senator home.

Ankara, Turkey. This copy was used for reprinting of the *green book*.

John was a native of Hagerstown, Ind., and lived in Augusta for many years. He was a graduate of Wabash College with a major in history. He retired as a Lt. Colonel from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers after 21 years of service. He served in Turkey, Japan, France, Korea and two tours in Vietnam. He received numerous military awards including the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Army Commendation Medal plus others.

For the past 40 years, he worked for Sherman and Hemstreet, a real estate company in Augusta, and was a member of the Society of Industrial and Office Realtors. He had a tremendous love of golf and his golfing friends at the West Lake Country Club. He also held tickets to the Masters Tournament for many years.



He is survived by his wife, Annette; daughters, Nancy Gooding and Jane Beson; and seven grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his son, Matthew Duggan Harlan and grandson, Zachary Ryan Harlan.

Daniel Harlan

(1923-2012)

In the mid-1980s, Dan Harlan of Maine began wondering whether any plans were underway to celebrate in 1987 the 300th anniversary of the arrival in America of George Harlan(d) and family and brother Michael. Hearing of no such plans, he initiated and coordinated Celebration 300, the Harlan Family Tricentennial in New Castle, Del., the landing site of the brothers. Dan was born in Ohio in 1923, the son of a Methodist pastor, and has academic degrees from American University in Washington, D.C. (BS in Communication) and Boston University School of Theology (Master of Divinity). In addition to a pastoral career serving United Methodist

churches in Maine, Maryland, Alaska and New Mexico, Dan was an agricultural economist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture and retired in 1985 as Deputy Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Maine.

Daniel Dunaway Harlan, 88, of Carrboro, N.C., died on Thursday, March 1, 2012, at The Laurels of Chatham, Pittsboro, N.C. (*See The Harlan Record Number 40*). At the time of his passing, his body was donated to Duke Medical Center to be used



for research. His ashes were recently provided to his family and a memorial service was held June 21.

"Dan is the reason our organization exists today," said Robert R. Harlan, past president of the Harlan Family in America Association.

"He was such an important member of the family," added Pat Fluetsch, president, HFAA.

In our last *The Harlan Record*, I challenged you to help strengthen our organization; then, I took the challenge myself.

Thanks to you, we added more family members to the Harlan Family in America Facebook group. This is a great place to post your family news and pictures for all of us to enjoy.

As I travelled from California to Philadelphia for the board meeting, I studied the entirety of the Harlan Family in America website. I learned so much. The website contains a wealth of information. I encourage you to check it out!

I made a most exciting discovery. After the board meeting, I toured the Harlan Family historical sites in the Brandywine River area with Mary Harlan Murphy and Katherine Harlan. I posted some pictures on Facebook. A friend from my teaching days mentioned to me that her Quaker family also settled in the same area in the late 1600s. I asked her for family surnames. After researching in Alpheus Harlan's genealogy book, I discovered that we have a common ancestor: George Harlan #3! So now we are not just friends, we are *cousins*, and there is one more family on our mailing list.

Hidden Treasures in the Hagley Archives: 1795 Land Survey Map of Southern Chester County & Northern Delaware

The following is reprinted with permission of Marsha Mills and the Hagley Museum and Library.

A particularly interesting map was found in the archives at Hagley Library. The 4.5' x 5.1' map was drawn by John Harlan who notated "A map of surveys taken the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th month of 1795 when Sam Sharp was learning the art of him as this of the road was one."

Kennett Square is clearly listed on the western edge, while portions of Centreville, Delaware, are on the eastern edge showing land owned by Isaac Mendenhall. The fork of the Brandywine is on the northern edge and Red Clay Creek the southern edge. Numerous properties, meeting houses and taverns are named.

Its possible this John Harlan is related to the famed John Harlan where the Stargazers Stone is located. You know the story. Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon used the stone to mark where their observatory stood to settle the border conflict between Pennsylvania and Maryland. Mason and Dixon used the Harlan Farm as a base camp in January of 1764 through the duration of their 4 ½ year survey. However, there could be a Delaware connection: a John Harlan served as a Class 1

Senator under Governor Charles Polk, Jr. from 1828-1829.


Reading Alpheus H. Harlan's 1914 History and Genealogy of the Harlan Family and Particularly of the Descendants of George and Michael Harlan who settled in Chester County, Pa., 1687, what I have found so far is Mary Flower, a 5th generation Harlan, was born October 14, 1729 in London Grove Township. Her first husband, Isaac Starr, died in 1754. She then married Samuel Sharp, born August 30, 1734, in 1757. Is this the surveyor Sam Sharp? Census records list a Samuel Sharp living in Chester County, Londongrove Township in 1790, but no mention of a John Harlan.

The archivist at Longwood Gardens confirmed that Hannah Peirce (1782) married a Joseph Harlan in 1816 in Chester County Pennsylvania. Hannah's father, Caleb, was a brother of Joshua and Samuel Peirce who planted the arboretum at Peirce's Park which later became Longwood Gardens.

Louis R. Harlan states in his Harlan Family in America: A Brief History most Harlans are descendants of two English brothers, George and Michael Harlan, who arrived in 1687 at New Castle, Delaware, then part of the colony of Pennsylvania, and of a third brother, Thomas, who never came to America but some of his sons did 50 years later.

So...who are John and Sam? Why was this map of such importance that it has been lined with Japanese paper to preserve it through the years? And who is E.B.P. - who in 1881 (86 years after it was drawn) wrote this short poem on the map:

Fold it up neatly and up it away It may be of use in some future day And quietly bless the poor old soul Who thoughtfully labored with heart so whole.

Civil War Sesquicentennial Event at Iowa Wesleyan

The Friends of the Harlan-Lincoln House and the Henry County Historic Preservation Commission co-sponsored a Civil War Sesquicentennial event last October. The event was held to commemorate the addition of Camp Harlan to the National Register of Historic Places. This camp was the rendezvous point and training site for both the 4th Iowa Volunteer Cavalry and the 25th Iowa Volunteer Infantry in 1861 and 1862.

Lynn Ellsworth and Caroline Lehman, of HCHPC, were emcees for the event that featured the Marengo Civil War Band and a presentation by Rebecca McCarley, consultant for the Camp Harlan project.

CAMP HARLAN

With the assistance of Senator James Harlan, the War Department authorized a military training camp at Mount Pleasant in October of 1861. The first recruits began arriving that September at Camp Harlan, which was designated as a cavalry training post for the Fourth Iowa Volunteer Cavalry. Twelve companies had been mustered by November 23, 1861 with 1058 mer and offirers. These first recruits found only an open meadow and piles of lumber to be used for barracks construction, with the people of the county providing food and blankets. The first companies left by train on February 25 when the Fourth Iowa received orders to move to Benton Barracks, St. Louis, Missouri.

Starting in August, 1862 a second regiment was organized, the 25th lows Volunteer Infantry, with the military post now called Camp McKean. Ten companies were mustered on September 27, 1862 with a strength of 972 men. After training under the command of Colonel George A. Stone, the first units left for St. Louis early in November.

Nine soldlers died while on daty at Camp Harlan and

Senator Harlan is Coming Home

The statue of Iowa Senator James Harlan that was recently replaced by a statue of Norman Borlaug is coming home to Mount Pleasant, Iowa. The bronze-cast statue, by sculptor Nellie V. Walker, was given to the National Statuary Hall Collection in the U.S. Capitol by Iowa in 1910.

Elizabeth E. Garrels, Chairman, Friends of the Harlan-Lincoln House said "We were saddened that Senator Harlan was moving from the nation's capitol. However, we are thrilled and delighted that perseverance with legal process resulted in James's relocation to his home, Iowa Wesleyan!"



To commemorate the event, a celebration is planned for August 28 at two o'clock in the afternoon at Iowa Wesleyan College (see flyer on page 8). "This will be a milestone day long to be remembered, and most especially capped by the prominence and import of James Harlan's statue celebration," Garrels added.
