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LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

As required by law, we hereby submit the Annual Town Report of the municipal activities of the Town of Burnham by the various department heads, committees and organizations for the year ending December 31, 2020.

We closed the books at noon on December 31, 2020, with a General Fund balance of **\$1,600,538.55**. This money is invested in an interest bearing account.

Please take a moment to check to make sure your **E911 number** is present on your home, mailbox and at the end of your driveway. If there is an emergency in your home and you need help, the number will clearly identify where the emergency is located. Time is of the essence in an emergency, so please take the time to make sure your property is clearly marked.

The **coronavirus pandemic** presented a unique set of challenges for 2020. Gathering limits, social distancing requirements, and other health and safety measures remain in effect at the municipal office in light of the ongoing State of Emergency. Despite the difficult circumstances, significant progress was made in 2020, and we extend our gratitude to our employees, officials, and citizens for their hard work, cooperation and understanding.

Substantial improvements were made at the town **transfer station** in 2020. The old office building was removed and replaced with a new, heated office building, furnished with updated safety equipment. The outhouse was removed and replaced with a portable toilet and plans are under way for the construction of a new building to cover the dumpsters. Finally, with a number of landscaping improvements and cleaning efforts, the transfer station is looking better than it has in years. Please remember that while all residents are welcome, you must obtain a sticker from the municipal office before using the transfer station, and attendants will be checking vehicles for clearly displayed stickers. In addition, please note that no metal of any kind should be removed from the metal pile by any citizens or employees of the town.

Other improvements in 2020 included progress with landscaping at the **Veterans' Memorial** and other cemeteries and the construction of three snowplow turn-arounds to assist with winter roads maintenance.

We continue to welcome volunteers who are interested in forming a planning committee for the Burnham **Bicentennial Event**, which will take place in 2024. Anyone who is interested should contact the administrative office or a member of the Select Board.

We look forward to the year ahead and hope you will join us at the Annual Town Meeting.

Born on December 23, 1933 in Burnham, Arlene Miles became the Town Treasurer in 1953 at 19 years of age, one year after graduating from Maine Central Institute in Pittsfield. She has been elected consecutively ever since – a highly unusual statistic for an elected official. Arlene has always been known of as being easy to work with, straight forward, knowledgeable and capable, working from her home, while also working a full-time job for many years. Since the 1990's, this also included working in the Town of Unity as the assistant to the Clerk, Tax Collector and Treasurer. Her consistent hard work, high standards and dedication to the town earned her nominations for the Ethel Kenney Memorial Award in 2003 and 2009. On May 12, 2003, the Town of Burnham honored and recognized Arlene's 50th year of service as not only the Treasurer, but as an invaluable asset to the town, with a surprise celebration at the Town Office. In 2014, Arlene was also awarded the State of Maine Spirit of America Award, nominated by the Towns' Board of Selectmen. In addition to keeping the Select Board well informed, she has been very successful at managing all of the responsibilities of the job, while still balancing the checkbook and municipal expenditures to the penny. Her exemplary service, commitment and longevity has earned her the towns' confidence, trust and respect over the years.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to reflect on 2020, an incredibly challenging year for Maine families, small businesses, and communities.

When the pandemic struck, our country faced the specter of an overwhelmed health care system and devastation to our small businesses and the millions of people they employ. I immediately worked with Republicans and Democrats to pass multiple laws allocating approximately \$3 trillion to respond to this public health and economic crisis, including more than \$8 billion directed to Maine to support testing, schools, the economy, and other purposes — that is nearly double Maine's annual state budget.


I am especially proud of the bipartisan Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) I co-authored. This program has provided three out of four Maine small businesses with nearly \$2.3 billion in forgivable loans, which has helped sustain more than 250,000 Maine jobs. I have met thousands of Maine small employers and employees in all 16 counties who are surviving because of the PPP. As one small business owner told me, the PPP provided "exactly what we needed at exactly the right time." The PPP also allowed employers to maintain benefits, such as health care, during this challenging time. Another round of PPP is needed to sustain small businesses and their employees.

While the pandemic continues across Maine, our nation, and the world, I thank the first responders, health care professionals, teachers, grocery store employees, factory workers, farmers, truck drivers, postal employees, and so many others who continue to stay on the job during this difficult time. With the deployment of the first vaccines, better tests, and the incredible speed with which these life-saving responses were developed, I am hopeful we can emerge from this crisis in the next few months.

While providing relief to American families was my focus throughout 2020, other accomplishments include the passage of the Great American Outdoors Act, which provides full funding of the Land and Water Conservation Fund and addresses the maintenance backlog at our national parks, forests, and wildlife refuges. As Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee, in 2020 alone, I secured \$132 million to improve Maine's roads, bridges, airports, buses, rail, ferries, and seaports. Finally, as Chairman of the Aging Committee, I led the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act, which funds programs that improve the well-being, independence, and health of our nation's seniors and their caregivers, and I authored laws to reduce the cost of prescription drugs and protect individuals with Alzheimer's disease.

As the end of 2020 is approaching, I have cast more than 7,535 votes, never having missed one. In the New Year, my focus remains to work with colleagues to find common ground on policies to help support the health and safety of Mainers and the safe, responsible opening of our communities. If ever I or my staff can be of assistance to you, please do not hesitate to contact one of my state offices. May the coming year be a successful one for you, your family, your community, and our state.

Dear Friends,


2020 was a year unlike any in our lifetimes. Our state and nation dealt with unprecedented challenges--the coronavirus pandemic, ensuing economic fallout, and a prolonged, heavily divisive campaign season each took a significant toll on all of us. The worst part? In order to protect each other, we had to face these challenges in isolation. But a new year represents new possibilities; a chance to take stock of what we're grateful for and focus on the opportunities in front of us. As we reflect back on 2020, we will remember heartbreak and loss – but we cannot forget the shining rays of hope that broke through the darkness, reminding us all that better days are ahead.

Throughout the pandemic, my top focus has been on bridging the partisan divide in Washington in order to deliver desperately-needed relief for Maine people. Joined by colleagues last March, we pushed for bipartisan negotiations to produce a strong bill that helped fellow Mainers, businesses, and institutions weather this storm. In the weeks and months after the *CARES Act* passed, our team stayed in close contact with people throughout the state to determine how we should adjust our response to best support our citizens. Unfortunately, the aid provided by the *CARES Act* lapsed without Congressional action, leaving too many families and businesses in limbo. I never stopped pushing for a bipartisan relief bill and, after extensive negotiations, we ended the year on a good note by breaking the gridlock and passing new relief legislation. This new bill isn't perfect; in fact, it should just be the start our renewed response. As we enter 2021 with a new administration and new Congress, we must fight for additional legislation to help restore stability to our working families and rebuild our economy and public health infrastructure.

In the midst of this crisis, Congress did manage to accomplish a few successes that will outlast this awful pandemic. Among these was the *Great American Outdoors Act*, a bipartisan bill which was enacted into law in August 2020 and will help address a \$12 billion backlog at our national parks so future generations of Americans can enjoy these beautiful lands and create lifelong memories. Also, as we learn more about the recent hacks of our nation's networks, there is help on the way: 27 of the cybersecurity recommendations made by the Cyberspace Solarium Commission – which I co-chair with Republican Congressman Mike Gallagher– made it into this year's defense bill. While there is no guarantee that these provisions would have prevented the massive hack, they will certainly improve our cyber defenses.

Despite the challenges, I'm hopeful for the future. Vaccines are being distributed across our state – starting with our healthcare heroes, who have sacrificed so much throughout this unprecedented catastrophe and deserve our eternal gratitude. If there can be a silver lining from these challenges of 2020, maybe it will be this: I hope that, in the not-so distant future, we will be able to come together physically and we will be reminded of our love for each other. We have differences, without a doubt. But as Maine people stepped up to support each other, we saw again and again that our differences pale in comparison to the values we share. We are one state, and one community – and there is nothing we cannot or will not do for each other. Mary and I wish you a happy and healthy 2021. We can't wait to see you soon.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. I know that this year has been challenging for many of our communities. In the midst of these challenges, it remains a privilege to represent you, and I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I have been working on in Congress for the people of the Second Congressional District.

The coronavirus pandemic has made this year an especially difficult one. We've seen the struggles of small businesses, workers and families, hospitals, and states and towns. COVID-19 has been a serious threat to public health that requires a comprehensive, ongoing response. In March, Congress passed the largest of three bipartisan pieces of relief legislation, the *Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act*. The *CARES Act* was a \$2 trillion economic relief package to provide immediate assistance for some of those hit hardest by the pandemic. While an important start, many of the programs and benefits created by the *CARES Act* were set to expire by the end of 2020 at a time when COVID-19 cases were on the rise. That's why in late December, Congress passed another bipartisan bill to provide COVID-19 relief to small businesses and hospitals, the unemployed, and families struggling to put food on the table. However, the action Congress took at the end of 2020 cannot distract from its failure to act sooner. The unwillingness of many members of Congress to accept compromise throughout the fall left many Mainers struggling and led to a rushed process that produced a bill with serious flaws. In 2021, Congress needs to step up, come together, and lead the country through this pandemic and get our economy back on track.


There are a few bright spots that came out of the work done by Congress this year. As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I helped advocate for a national defense bill that would include important priorities for American national security, Maine shipbuilders, and servicemembers and their families. The legislation authorizes a new DDG-51 Arleigh Burke-class destroyer to be constructed at Bath Iron Works and helps BIW compete for new work by encouraging a new multi-year procurement process for the DDG-51 Flight III. This funding bill also makes permanent new federal guidelines proposed by Senator King and me to allow Gold Star Families free admission to national parks and other federal lands.

I've been working to improve mental health services for veterans for years, and I led the Maine delegation's effort to address the need for long-term mental health substance abuse treatment for veterans in our state. This past fall the Veterans Administration announced we were successful. Construction starts next year on a new, 24-bed facility at Togus that will ensure Maine veterans won't be sent out of state to receive residential care for substance use disorder and associated mental health issues. This is one result that I am especially proud to deliver for my fellow Maine veterans.

As I reflect upon what I am most grateful for this year, I am especially glad to be able to share that my wife Izzy and I are expecting a baby in 2021. We are excited about this new addition to our family and look forward to the blessings ahead.

This period is challenging for Mainers as we all take steps to limit the spread of the coronavirus, protect our families and our communities, and lean on each other to withstand this pandemic and economic hardship. My staff and I stand ready to assist Mainers as we work through these challenges together. I look forward to continuing to work on your behalf in 2021.

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

It has been a pleasure to serve the residents of House District #99 in the Maine Legislature. I am honored that you have entrusted me again with this responsibility. As you are aware, these past ten months have brought unprecedented challenges to our country, the State of Maine and our communities.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the second session of the 129th Legislature adjourned *Sine Die* on March 17, 2020. REMINDERS...

Are you new to town? Have you applied for your **HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION**? This exemption is currently worth up to \$24,500 off your assessed value. You must be a resident of Burnham, have owned your home (which is your primary residence) for at least one year and file an application by April 1st. Applications are available at the Town Office. This is a one-time application and as long as you own your home, there is no need to reapply!



★ ★ ★ ★ ★ ★ ★ ★ ★ ★

VETERANS who have served in a federally recognized war period, have reached the age of 62, or are receiving government compensation for a service connected disability, may be eligible for a **Veteran's Property Tax Exemption**. Applications are available at the Town Office. Please bring with you your DD214. If you are an un-remarried spouse of a deceased Veteran who may have met this criteria, you may also be eligible. This is a one-time application.

DOG LICENSES expire on December 31st of each year.

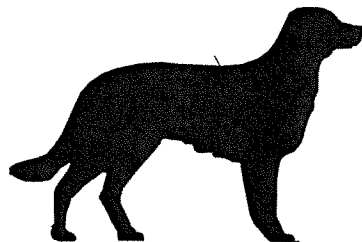
- Once a dog is **6 months old**, it needs to be licensed!

- You must have a current **rabies vaccination** certification (we will then keep a copy on file in the office).

- If your dog is neutered or spayed, the cost is **\$6.00**.
(You must show verification from your veterinarian that your dog has been fixed!) Otherwise, the cost is **\$11.00**.

- As of February 1st of each year, a **late fee** of \$25.00 per dog is collected, in addition to the cost of the license.

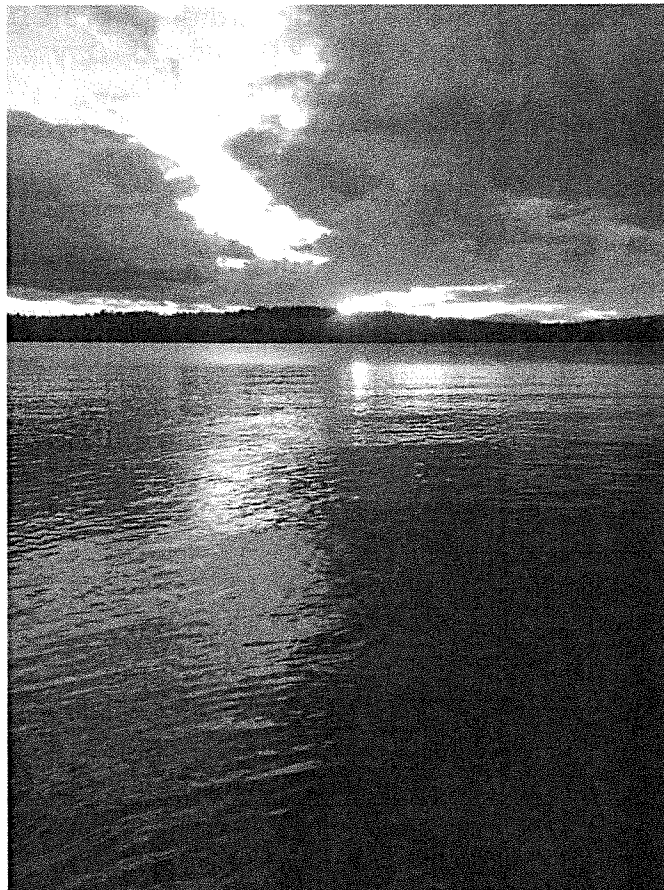

Superintendent's Report

To the *Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town:*

Herewith I respectfully submit to you my third annual report of the schools of this town for the year ending March 1st, 1921.

This year has been a crisis in world affairs. There has never been a time in the history of the nation when the price of labor and all materials have soared to such enormous proportions. The nation is yet in a fluctuating unsettled condition. This state of affairs has affected the schools of our country in no small degree. Teachers who have always been underpaid have been obliged to seek other employment in order to live in the strenuous times. It has meant work the year round or starve. Parents could no longer support teachers during the long vacations. Consequently this great teacher shortage. Teachers' wages have risen and they will have to stay up if the worth while teachers are attracted to the service.

This year we have supported thirty-two weeks of schooling. Six schools have been maintained the whole year. The Ridge school was opened in winter term as the matter

of conveyance for such small children was considered inadvisable.

As I have made my visits to the schools I have been more concerned about the physical surroundings and physical conditions of many of the children of this town than I have for their intellectual welfare. For no child can do good school work who is suffering from physical defects such as eye strain, malnutrition caused by poor teeth, undernourishment, adenoids, etc. In these days of high costs the parents of large families dread the sound of any new expense. But the child's happiness and usefulness for life depends upon a good start. These matters should be attended to before it is too late.

Six boys and three girls were graduated from the eighth grade in June. All but one has entered high school. These pupils will all make good.

We were the first town in our union to adopt the helping teacher plan. I find that many do not understand the object of this plan. Like all new undertakings and reforms it is received critically and with skepticism as to results. This plan is not intended to lessen the superintendent's duties in any way but rather to increase the efficiency of the schools. It was very unfortunate that the model school should have had an epidemic of skin disease which proved to be quite serious. The trouble would have been lessened if the parents had had medical attention and followed it up more closely. Mrs. Ham struggled faithfully to get rid of the nuisances of her school. The building has been fumigated and we feel that there will not be a renewal of the afflictions. As it has been the plans of the school were thwarted.

VILLAGE SCHOOL

There are so many grades in this school and so many pupils that it is quite impossible for one teacher to do justice to the work. Considering this fact, Mrs. Alice Dyer has done remarkably good work this year. The fine children in this school deserve a better building in a better

location. I hope the morning dawns when the town will be aroused to its school needs.

MOUNT

This small school has been under the efficient instruction of Mrs. Nellie Shaw. The building was put in fairly good repair last year, though not a standard type school house it has been fairly comfortable. They are in need of a water cooler, maps and globe.

EELWEIR

A new floor was laid in this schoolhouse. Also a new blackboard was put up and new seats installed. Four or six large seats are still needed. This school has grown in numbers and efficiency. It has been the best school this year since I have known it.

WINNICOOK

This school house still has the antiquated wooden desks. It is simply impossible for children to learn to write well or even do penmanship exercises properly in these seats. It would be almost crime to oblige children to sit properly in these desks. Because they cannot do it without causing spinal trouble or some other natural growth. Consequently we have a noisy school and it is hard to discipline. It isn't fair to pupils or teacher. Conditions will be no better until we have a centralized school under strong teachers. If parents would do more constructive work for the schools instead of idly criticizing, better results would be obtained. School officials are only directors. They cannot get results without the cooperation of parents.

DODGE

Here we have practically the same housing conditions as at the Winnicook. The shortage of teachers made it necessary to hire an inexperienced teacher for this school. A small school with unfit physical conditions is a problem for an experienced teacher. What can we expect of a teacher without training as to methods of teaching. We

might say that all teachers are like the old adage about doctors, "Each one fills one cemetery before he is fitted to practice". A young teacher should not lose one opportunity to make herself better fitted for the work.

REYNOLD'S CORNER

Reynold's Corner school needs only new toilets installed in the basement to make it a fine type building for a rural community. Here is the possibility of making one of the finest rural schools of the state. The equipment is good. There are single desks. The lighting and heating is right. With the right conveyance wagon children could be conveyed comfortably to this school. The town of Albion received this year through the equalization fund of the state a splendid Wayne wagon which accommodates about twenty pupils. It is heated and has comfortable cushioned seats. The driver is also protected. They convey pupils in this wagon about four miles. If the parents would work toward the right end, it would be possible for Burnham to have such a conveyance. It is strange that parents will allow their children to sit in cramped positions in wooden desk of the worst type; live where there is a constant draft from floors and old windows; the heat coming from old tumbling down stoves and funnels; under the guidance of inexperienced teachers; rather than give up the sentimental "little school at home".

This town will not have as good schools as the surrounding towns until the people are willing to submit to a broader school policy. Let us work for it.

Citizens of Waldo County,

The Members of the Waldo County Sheriff's Office are proud to serve the citizens of our great County. We want to thank the members of the public for their continued support. We are a full-service Sheriff's Office providing Law Enforcement, Corrections and Civil Paperwork Service to folks who live, work and visit Waldo County.

2020 was a year different from any other. The Covid-19 pandemic has made providing Law Enforcement and Corrections services very challenging. The killing of George Floyd in Minneapolis has impacted how our Nation views the Law Enforcement profession and how the services we provide will be delivered and regulated moving forward. Locally, we have continued to enhance our collaboration with the Knox County Sheriff's Office with a new inmate boarding agreement and further sharing of resources resulting in savings of hundreds of thousands of dollars to county taxpayers.

Our patrol division handled nearly 8,400 calls for service in 2020. These calls included all types of incidents from murders, domestic violence, robberies, burglaries, thefts, child abuse, sexual abuse, drug overdoses, and much more. The drug abuse epidemic continues to ravage our citizens and cause much of the crime in our county. The patrol division also conducted 1,491 traffic stops throughout the county in an effort to increase traffic safety on our roads and highways.


Our Corrections Division continues to excel in the operation of the Maine Coastal Regional Re-entry Center serving 46 residents in 2020. These are men who were nearing the end of their term of incarceration. Our many programs assist them with their integration back into society as productive and contributing citizens. During their stay at the re-entry center, residents provided 4,455 hours of community service throughout Waldo County. This translated to a savings in labor costs of \$53,461 to citizens and non-profit agencies. Residents also provided more than 173,000 pounds of fresh vegetables to local food pantries and those in need from the County's Garden Project overseen by Waldo County Commissioner William Shorey. The residents also paid \$8,928 dollars in room and board to the County.

The seventy-two-hour holding and booking facility processed 649 persons who were arrested in Waldo County by all the law enforcement agencies serving our County. If a person who has been arrested cannot make bail within 72 hours, he or she has to be transported to the Knox County Jail in Rockland by our Transport Division. Our average daily population of Waldo County prisoners held at the Knox County Jail was 21 men and women. This along with bringing prisoners to court and medical appointments, generated 310 transports with our transport division, traveling more than 50,000 miles in 2020.

Our Civil Service Division served 1,030 sets of legal paperwork all over the County in 2020.

It has been an honor for all of us to be of service to the citizens of Waldo County in 2020. We look forward to a safe and productive 2021.

- D. Selectmen to negotiate sale of tax acquired property following an unsuccessful bid process outlined above with the terms and conditions that they deem appropriate.
- E. Notwithstanding A. through D. above, the Selectmen shall use the sale process required by 36 M.R.S. section 943-C, if they sell property tax-acquired from qualifying senior, low-income taxpayers to anyone other than the former owner(s).
