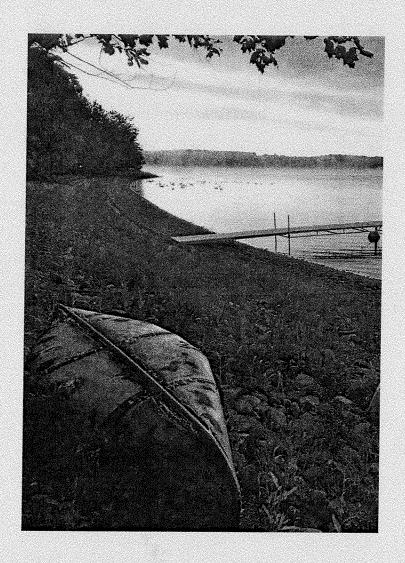

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# LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

As required by law, we hereby submit the Annual Town Report of the municipal activities of the Town of Burnham by the various department heads, committees, and organizations for the year ending December 31, 2021. We closed the books at noon on December 31, 2021, with a General Fund balance of \$1,785,166.95.

We thank our first responders, office staff, town officials, and other town employees for their excellent work during another challenging year. The Town's resilience in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic is attributable in large part to the dedicated efforts of our essential workers, as well as to our volunteers and committee members who have generously donated their time and efforts for the benefit of our Town. We are grateful for each and every one of them.

The Town was fortunate to receive \$85,029.48 in 2021 from the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds established under the American Rescue Plan Act. The funds may be applied by the Town for specific purposes to aid public health and economic recovery in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Select Board is working diligently to research permissible uses and determine how the Town may achieve the greatest benefit from the receipt and application of these funds.

The transfer station has undergone substantial renovation in the last two years, and our last major project using the funds dedicated in 2020 – the construction of a new building – is in progress and expected to be completed very soon. We appreciate the cooperation of our residents and the hard work of our attendant to maintain a safe and clean environment moving forward. As a reminder, residents making use of the transfer station are required to purchase a sticker and may do so at the municipal office during regular office hours.

Although recycling is no longer available at the transfer station, residents are encouraged to participate in recycling at the Unity Area Regional Recycling Center. The cost of your non-resident annual pass (\$30) will be reimbursed in full by the Town upon proof of payment. For more information on the UARRC, please <a href="https://www.uarrc.org">www.uarrc.org</a>. Thank you to those who participated in 2021 and to those who will continue to do their part in the year ahead.

As a reminder, please take a moment to make sure your E911 number is present on your home, mailbox, and at the end of your driveway. If there is an emergency in your home and you need help, the number will clearly identify where the emergency is located. Time is of the essence in an emergency, so please take the time to make sure your property is clearly marked.

We look forward to the year ahead, and we hope you will join as at the Annual Town Meeting.

# Dear Friends,

On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6<sup>th</sup> Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the *American Rescue Plan*, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the *American Rescue Plan* is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the *American Rescue Plan*, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband – because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21<sup>st</sup> century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in *the American Rescue Plan*, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've accomplished this year — but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It remains a privilege to represent you in Congress, and I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I have been working on for the people of the Second Congressional District.

This year, our small businesses, workers and families, hospitals, states, and towns continued to face challenges related to the coronavirus pandemic. COVID-19 has been a serious threat to public health and our economy that requires a comprehensive, ongoing response. While we are not yet out of the woods, there is a light at the end of the tunnel. Still, I know there are many Mainers who will continue to need assistance getting through this pandemic. I am committed to making sure our communities' most urgent needs are met to get our economy back on track.

One thing I am particularly proud of this year is that Democrats, Republicans, and the Biden Administration worked together to pass the bipartisan *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act*, which will make a once-in-a-generation investment in our nation's infrastructure and support Maine jobs. This bill will bring \$1.3 billion to Maine for highways and \$225 million for bridge replacement and repairs, as well as \$234 million to improve public transportation options. It will also allocate over \$100 million to help provide broadband access to the 42,000 Mainers currently without it and make 310,000 Mainers eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Benefit to help families pay for internet access. Crucially, it will also provide Maine with \$390 million to combat Maine's historically high rates of lead poisoning by replacing lead pipes and allowing Maine families access to clean drinking water.

Another one of my priorities in Congress is protecting Maine jobs. For one, shipbuilders at Bath Iron Works are a vital part of our economy, and the ships they build are critical to our national security. Throughout 2021, I led the Maine congressional delegation in pushing back against the Biden Administration's proposed decrease in DDG-51 shipbuilding, a proposal that would have had serious consequences for the shipbuilding workforce at BIW, one of the two shippards that produces these destroyers, and American naval capabilities around the world. We fought successfully to include authorization for construction of three new DDG-51 destroyers in the final National Defense Authorization Act. I will continue to work hard with my colleagues on the House Armed Services Committee to ensure that we protect our national security and shipbuilding jobs in Maine.

My most meaningful work in Congress continues to be providing direct assistance to Mainers. My staff and I stand ready to serve you. **VETERANS** who have served in a federally recognized war period, have reached the age of 62, or are receiving government compensation for a service-connected disability, may be eligible for a **Veteran's Property Tax Exemption**. Applications are available at the Town Office. Please bring with you your DD214. If you are an un-remarried spouse of a deceased Veteran who may have met these criteria, you may also be eligible. This is a one-time application.

\*\*\*\*

**DOG LICENSES** expire on December 31<sup>st</sup> of each year. - Once a dog is **6 months old**, it needs to be licensed!

- You must have a current **rabies vaccination** certification (we will then keep a copy on file in the office).
- If your dog is <u>neutered or spayed</u>, the cost is **\$6.00**. (You must show verification from your veterinarian that your dog has been fixed!) Otherwise, the cost is **\$11.00**.
- As of February 1<sup>st,</sup> of each year, a **late fee** of \$25.00 per dog is collected, in addition to the cost of the license.

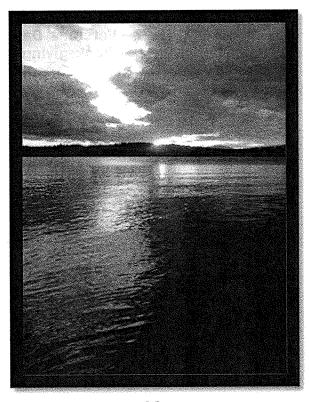

Citizens of Waldo County,

The Members of the Waldo County Sheriff's Office are proud to serve the citizens of our great County. We want to thank the members of the public for their continued support. We are a full-service Sheriff's Office providing Law Enforcement, Corrections and Civil Paperwork Service to folks who live, work and visit Waldo County.

The Covid Pandemic continued to complicate the delivery of our services throughout the year. The Deputies, Corrections Officers and Civil Process Servers did a fantastic job working through the pandemic to ensure the safety of our citizens.

Our patrol division handled 9,280 calls for service in 2021. These calls included all types of incidents from murders, domestic violence, robberies, burglaries, thefts, child abuse, sexual abuse, drug overdoses, and much more. The drug abuse epidemic continued to ravage our citizens and cause much of the crime in our county. The patrol division also conducted 1,175 traffic stops throughout the county in an effort to increase traffic safety on our roads and highways.

Our Corrections Division finished its twelfth year in the operation of the Maine Coastal Regional Re-entry Center serving 52 residents in 2021. These are men who were nearing the end of their term of incarceration. Our many programs assist them with their integration back into society as productive and contributing citizens. During their stay at the re-entry center, residents provided 3,075 hours of community service throughout Waldo County. This translated to a savings in labor costs of \$37,361 to citizens and non-profit agencies. Residents also provided more than 173,000 pounds of fresh vegetables to local food pantries and those in need from the County's Garden Project overseen by Waldo County Commissioner William Shorey. The residents also paid \$3,552.36 dollars in room and board to the County.

The seventy-two-hour holding and booking facility processed 734 persons who were arrested in Waldo County by all the law enforcement agencies serving our County. If a person who has been arrested cannot make bail within 72 hours, he or she has to be transported to the Knox County Jail in Rockland by our Transport Division. Our average daily population of Waldo County prisoners held at the Knox County Jail was 25 men and women. This along with bringing prisoners to court and medical appointments, generated 274 transports with our transport division, traveling more than 29,748 miles in 2021.

Our Civil Service Division served 1,224 sets of legal paperwork all over the County in 2021.

It has been an honor for all of us to be of service to the citizens of Waldo County in 2021. We look forward to a safe and productive 2022.

### Total Number of Complaints received in 2021 for Burnham

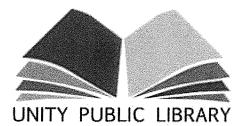

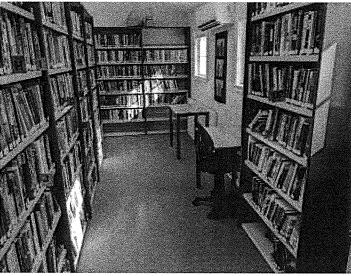

- Later this year we will apply to become part of the Maine Library System. When that happens, you will have access to all libraries and other resources in the Maine system.

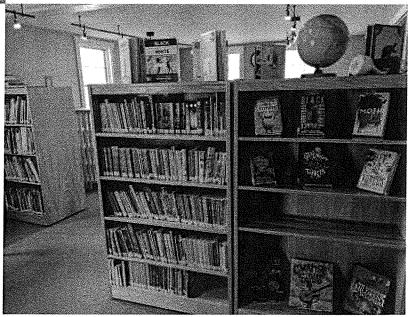
### How did the library happen?

When Unity College closed its campus in 2020, the towns lost access to its library. Two women in Unity bought the Maine Farmland Trust office building next to the community center and leased its downstairs portion to the new nonprofit Unity Public Library for 99 years rent free. Rental of the upstairs portion of the building funds all the costs of the building.

### Who pays for the library?

Generous donations and grants have paid for books and shelving. In 2023 the library will ask each town for a small allotment in their budgets. It is important for membership in the Maine Library System to show that the library has financial support from the area it serves.

The library has no paid employees; it is run by dedicated volunteers.



### What kind of programming will the library offer?

This summer and fall the library will offer Saturday morning programs for children including story walks, reading by children's authors, explorer backpacks, and coding classes.

For adults the library will sponsor readings by Maine authors, book discussion groups, and tech help sessions.

The library is committed to improving job skills in our area. For this reason we have licensed access to Udemy, an online learning platform that offers thousands of courses. With your library card, you can take courses from home.
