Just what is a Caucus anyway???

Iowa just had their Caucus. I've heard about these for years but never have understood the difference between a caucus and a primary. So, I decided I might not be alone about that.

At a caucus, members of a political party get together to debate which candidate is the best one for the position. Someone will try to persuade others in the group to be on the side of who that person is in favor of, while others are likely to campaign for their own choices. The group finally gets around to voting for candidates, but it was traditionally done by raising hands and being counted, not doing the vote by secret ballot. To me, this seems like a fair and simple way to choose a candidate; trying to persuade the others in the group to vote for their person. Not unlike choosing a school senior class president by counting the raised hands in the auditorium. It's all done in one day and you know the outcome.

Could voting be so easy? Raise your hand. Count. Announce the winner.

I found this little bit of Iowa Caucus history in an AP News article by Will Weissert and Steve Peoples as I was researching:

lowa assumed its position as the state that votes first for a presidential nominee more than 50 years ago. But its 1972 caucuses didn't feel very historic. Two folding tables at state Democratic Party headquarters were enough to accommodate all staff and media present. No TV cameras rolled. Results from around the state trickled in on two phone lines because the party didn't want to pay



for a third. Just one person, a then-25-year-old anti-Vietnam War activist who helped engineer the lowa caucuses, did the counting. I did borrow a memory calculator to speed up the process," recalled Richard Bender, now 78, with

a laugh. "That was state of the art."

What's the Matter With Us

What is the biggest reason for the mess in our country and the world? Is it gun availability, drug addiction, open borders, crime, government corruption? No, these are effects of another cause.

Guns do not kill people- people do, drugs do not addict people- people do, borders do not self-open, people open them, crime does not erupt- people do bad things, governments are not intrinsically corrupt, people now in government are.

The big question is what motivates people to cause these ill and devastating effects on our society. The answer is very simple – we as a people, as a culture have lost our moral compass. Our basic understanding of right and wrong and truth and falsehood have evaporated and have given way to the idea that every individual can properly decide for themselves what is right and wrong or true or false. Postmodernism has been introduced into our society and converted us to a twisted way of thinking which leads to chaos.

This country was founded and developed on Judaeo/Christian ideals and values given by God. In the case of America, it was Protestant ideals, carried over by the English pilgrims seeking religious freedom from the dictatorial Church of England, that influenced the founding fathers.
